In the year 1851 there will be 4 Eclipses.

1st. The 17th of January, a partial Eclipse of the Moon, invisible at Quebec.

2nd. The 1st of February, an annular Eclipse of the Sun, invisible at Quebec.

3rd. The 12th and 13th July, a partial Eclipse of the Moon, visible at Quebec, as follows:

First contact with the dark shadow

1h. 15m. A. M. 13th July.

Middle of the Eclipse, 2h. 36m. A. M.

Last contact with the Shadow, 4h. 7m.

Magnitude of the Eclipse, 0.706.

4th. The 28th of July, a total Eclipse of the Sun, visible at Quebec as follows:

Begins.....7h. 47m. A. M.

Greatest Shade.....8h. 46½m. A. M.

Ends.....9h. 46m. A. M.

Magnitude of the Eclipse, 0.45.

QUARTER SESSIONS.—Act 13 and 14 Vic. cap. 35, provides for holding Sessions of the Peace, by one Circuit Judge, or by any two Justices of the Peace, of whom a Circuit Judge shall be one, or by any two or more Justices of Peace, in the absence of a Circuit Judge. The Quarter Sessions to commence as follows: In Quebec, Montreal, and Three Rivers, respectively, on the 8th January, 4th April, 4th July, and 4th October, in each year; and at Sherbrooke, 1st February, and 1st October, in each year.

CUSTOMS DEPARTMENT. QUEBEC.

CHARGES FOR STORAGE IN THE CUSTOM-HOUSE STORES, QUEBEC.

Act 10 and 11 Vic. Cap. 31.

Section 30. All charges incurred on Goods for landing, cartage, storage, unpacking, repacking, weighing or gauging, paid, in order to carry this act into effect, shall be at the expense of the importer of such goods.

One package at least in each Invoice to be opened, or more, if necessary; and, in case of suspicion or fraud, the whole to be opened.

The dues, according to the annexed Tariff, are to be charged and collected for Goods, &c., stowed or taken into the Examining Warehouse at the Port of Quebec. All unclaimed goods are to be sent to the Examination Warehouse, and goods will be received on storage from parties who may wish it.

Parties can either insure their goods against loss by Fire, or can have the value of the same covered by duly notifying the Officer of Customs of their wishes in that respect, and paying the cost thereof.

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EXEMPTIONS.

Arms, Clothing, Cattle, Provisions and Stores of every description, which any Commissary or Commissaries, Contractor or Contractors shall import or bring, or which may be imported or brought by the Principal or other Officer or Officers of Her Majesty's Ordnance into the Province for the use of Her Majesty's Army or Navy, or for the use of the Indian Nations in this Province; provided the duty otherwise payable thereon would be defrayed or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of this Province.

Horses and Carriages of Travellers; and Horses, Cattle and Carriages and other vehicles when employed in carrying Merchandise, together with the necessary harness and tackle, so long as the same shall be bona fide in use for that purpose, except Horses, Cattle, Carriages, Vehicles and Harness of persons hawking Goods, Wares and Merchandise through the Province for the purpose of retailing the same, and the Horses, Cattle, Carriages and Harness of any Circus or Equestrian Troop for exhibition. The Horses, Cattle Carriages and Harness of any Menagerie to be free.

Donations of Clothing specially imported for the use of or to be distributed gratuitously by any Charitable Society in this Province.

Seeds of all kinds, Farming Utensils and Implements of Husbandry, when specially imported in good faith by any Society incorporated or established for the encouragement of agriculture.

The following Articles in the occupation or employment of persons coming into the Province for the purpose of actually settling therein, viz.

Wearing Apparel in actual use, and other personal effects not merchandise; Horses and Cattle; Implements and Tools of Trade of handy-craftsmen. The personal Household Effects, not Merchandise, of inhabitants of this Province, being subjects of Her Majesty, and dying abroad.

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And the following articles when imported directly from the United Kingdom, or from any British North American Province, and being the growth, produce or manufacture of the said United Kingdom or of such Province, respectively, viz.:

Animals, Beef, Pork, Biscuit, Bread, Butter, Cocoa-Paste, Corn or Grain of all kinds; Flour, Fish, fresh or salted, dried or pickled; Fish Oil; Furs or Skins the produce of fish or creatures living in the Sea; Gypsum, Horns, Meat, Poultry, Plants, Shrubs and Trees, Potatoes and Vegetables of all kinds. Seeds of all kinds, Skins, Pelts, Furs or Tails undressed. Woods. viz: Boards, Planks, Staves, Timber and Firewood.

[This exemption in favor of the Provinces, applies to their productions only while they receive similar articles free from this Province.]

REMARKS.

The duties imposed by the present Tariff are in Provincial Currency, (24s 4d. currency equal to 20s. sterling, and 5s. 1d. currency, equal to one dollar,) and levied according to the old weights and measures, i. e., British Weights and Measures in use on the 6th of July, 1825.

Packages in which goods are contained shall be deemed goods within the meaning of the law, and subject to duty accordingly, excepting always such packages as are required only for the security of the goods during the transport thereof, and which do not usually accompany the goods when sold in this Province as being necessary for containing the same.

All duties are payable in CASH; but Goods may be entered for Warehousing, and transported in Bond from the Port of Entry, to be Warehoused in any Warehousing Port in the Province, and the duties paid when taken out for consumption; or the goods may be exported from the Province without payment of any duties.

Goods must be cleared the Warehouse within two years from date of first entry.

Cattle and Swine may be slaughtered, and Grain ground in Bond for exportation, under regulations to be made by the Governor in Council; which regulations may extend to the substitution of Beef, Pork, or Meal, in quantities equivalent to the produce of such Cattle or Grain.

WAREHOUSING PORTS — Amherstburgh, Belleville, Brockville, Bytown for supplies of the Lumber Trade only, Chippewa, Cobourg, Colborne, Cornwall, Dalhousie, Dinckinson's Landing, Dover, Goderich, Hamilton, Hope, Kingston, Maitland (on Grand River), Montreal, Niagara, Picton, Prescott, Quebec, Stanley, St. Johns, Grafton and Whitby; and such other Ports as the Governor in Council may appoint.

The present Tariff having been framed on the principle of ad valorem duties throughout, the following stringent provisions are made for preventing frauds by under-valuation, viz. :—

One package in each lot, or one in each ten, or a greater number, if necessary, may be opened, and if found not to agree with the Invoice, the whole may be forfeited.

The Collector has the power to take duties in kind, i. e., a portion of the goods entered corresponding to the rate of duty to which they are subject, less one eleventh part. Or he can take the whole, paying the owner the value at which they have been offered for entry, with the addition of ten per cent, and the import charges.

When goods are appraised, and found to exceed the value at which they were offered for entry to the extent of twenty per cent., then the duty on such goods shall be increased one half, and collected on the appraised value.

Persons smuggling, or attempting to pass goods with a false Invoice, are liable, in addition to former penalties, to a fine of £50, or imprisonment for one year.

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All acts of an Agent are made binding on his principal; and persons transacting business with the Customs through an Agent, are to furnish him with a power to act for them in the following form:—

These and a great many other enactments are made for the same object; amongst which are a number of lengthy oaths, one of which is here inserted for the information of shippers residing out of the Province. In the British Dominions this may be made before the Collector or the Mayor, and in Foreign Countries, before the British Consul.

OATH OF AN OWNER residing out of this Province, when there is no owner in this Province who can attest the Invoice, or when the owner is the manufacturer or concerned in the manufacture of the goods.

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UNITED STATES' TARIFF.

This Tariff Act, now in force, was passed on the 29th of July, 1846, went into effect on the 1st of December, and reduced the duties on imports below the scale fixed by Congress in 1842, changing, in many cases, specific duties, and adopting the ad valorem principle, which is to charge the tax by a fixed rate per cent. on the true value which the goods imported may bear at the port of entry, at the time. We give below a list of the various rates of duty upon a large number of articles imported, copied from "Palmer's Business Men's Almanac for 1851."

ONE HUNDRED PER CENT. DUTY ON [Schedule A.]

Brandy and other Spirits distilled from grain or other materials; and on Cordials and all similar beverages.

FORTY PER CENT. ON [Schedule I.]

German Silver; Ale, Beer, and Porter, in casks or bottles; Baskets; Bay Rum; Beads; Braces; Webbing, or other fabrics of India Rubber; Brooms and Brushes; Pickles and Sauces; Corks; Earthen, China, and Stone-ware; Flats, Braids, Plaits, Sparterre, and Willow Squares, used for making Hats or Bonnets; Glass Tumblers, not cut or printed; Hats and Bonnets, of Straw, Satin Straw, Chip Grass, Palm-Leaf, Willow, or of Hair Whalebone, &c.; Caps, Hats, Muffs, and Tippetts of Fur; Caps, Gloves, Mitts, Socks, Stockings, Wove Shirts and Drawers, &c. made on frames; Pocket-Books;

Carpets, Carpeting, of Brussels, Ingrain, Saxony, Turkey, Venetian, Wilton, or any similar fabric; Carriages and parts of do.; Cheese; Clocks and parts of do.; Clothing, ready made; Coach and Harness Furniture; Coal, Coke and Culm; Combs; Confectionary; Cotton Cords, Gimps and Galloons; Cutlery; Precious Stones; Feathers and Flowers, artificial; Furniture, Cabinet and Household; Ginger; Grapes; Hat Bodies of Cotton; Hemp; Honey; Iron, in bars, blooms, bolts, loops, pigs, rods, slabs; castings of Iron; Jappanned Ware; Jewelry; manufactures, not otherwise provided for, of Brass, Copper, Gold, Iron, Lead, Pewter, Silver, Tin, or other metal; manufactures of Cotton, Linen, Silk, Wool, or Worsted, embroidered or tamboured; manufactures of Wood, manufactures of Wool; Molasses; Muskets, Rifles, and other fire-arms; Oils, volatile, or expressed; Olive Oil, in casks; Olive Salad Oil; Paper; Parasols and Sun-shades; Parchment; Pepper; Plated and Gilt Ware; Plums; Potatoes; Saddlery; Salmon, preserved; Sewing Silk; Shoes, of India Rubber; Sealing Wax; Silk Twist; Side Arms; Soap, Castile, perfumed, Windsor, &c.; Sugar of all kinds; Tobacco; Syrup of Sugar; Twines and Pack Thread; Umbrellas; Vinegar; Water Colors; Wool; manufactures of Fur, Glass, Leather, Jet, Marble, Paper, and Papier mache; Wood, Fire-wood.

TWENTY-FIVE PER CENT. ON [Schedule C.]

Acids, not elsewhere provided for; manufactures of Flax, or hemp; Cotton Velvet; Velvet of cotton and Silk, chiefly cotton; Wax, Tallow, and Stearine Candles; Angola, Thibet, and other goat's-hair; Cedar, Ebony, Mahogany, Rosewood; Flax-seed; Alum; Antimony: Bacon; Barley; Beef; Beeswax; Blankets; Blank Books; Blue Vitriol; Staves; Spars, hewn and sawed Timber, Timber for wharves; Marble in the rough slab or block; Needles, Paving Stones; Butter; Caps, Gloves, Socks, Stockings, Wove Shirts and Drawers, made on frames, of cotton; Copperas; Copper Rods, Bolts, Nails and Spikes; Copper Bottoms; Plaster of Paris ground; Quicksilver; Fraziers' Copper; Fish, foreign, fresh, smoked, salted, dried, or pickled; Flour of Sulphur; Fruit, green or ripe; Furs, dressed on the skin; Glue; Gunpowder; Hams; Hats and Hat Bodies of wool; Oils used in painting; Indian Corn and Corn Meal; Lard; Leather, tanned, bend, or sole; Upper Leather; Lead, in pigs, bars, or sheets; Lead Pipes and Shot; Linens; Medicinal drugs, roots and leaves; Metals; Musical Instruments; Oats and Oatmeal; Oils, neatsfoot, spermaceti, whale and other fish oil, and whalebone, of foreign fisheries; Opium; Oranges, Lemons and Limes; Paints, dry or ground in oil; Paper Hangings; Pearl or hulled Barley; Periodicals and other works in the course of printing in the U. S; Pork; Putty; Quills; Rice; Roll Brimstone; Roman Cement; Rye and Rye flour; Saddlery; Carbonates of Soda; Salts, Epsom, Glauber; Skins, tanned, dressed; Skins; Spermaceti Candles; Spirits of Turpentine; Starch; Stereotype Plates; Tar; Thread Laces; Types; Vermillion; Wheat and Flour; White and Red Lead; Whiting; White Vitriol; Window Glass, broad, crown or cylinder.

TEN PER CENT. ON [Schedule F.]

Saltpetre, Lime, Books, printed, magazines, pamphlets, periodicals, and illustrated newspapers, Chloride of Lime, Building Stones, Burr Stones, Cochineal, Hempseed, Linseed, and Rapeseed, Fuller's Earth, Furs, hatters', dressed or undressed, not on the skin, Furs undressed, when on the skins, Indigo, Kelp, Hair of all kinds, India Rubber in bottles, Soda ash, Oil of Vitriol, Tallow, Watches, parts of do.

FIVE PER CENT. ON [Schedule G.]

Old Copper, Pewter and Brass, Copper and Brass in pigs or bars, Brazil Wood, other dye-wood in sticks, Bristles, Clay, unwrought, Berries, Nuts and Vegetables used in dyeing, Madder, Nutgalls, Lastings, for shoes, boots, or buttons, Cloth, for shoes, boots, bootees, or buttons, Rags, Raw Hides and Skins, dried, salted or pickled, Saltpetre, or Potash crude, Sumac, Tin, Zinc and Spelter.

FREE OF DUTY, [Schedule H.]

Animals, for breed, Bullion, Tea and Coffee, except in cases stated in the act, Coins, gold, silver, and copper, Copper Ore, Cotton, Garden and all other seeds; Merchandise, the growth, produce or manufacture of the U. S. exported and brought back in same condition, upon which no drawback has been allowed: Guano, Household Effects, old and in use, of persons or families from foreign countries: Oakum, Oil, spermaceti, whale, and other fish of American fisheries, and all other produce of do: Plaster, unground, Sheeting Copper,

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Wearing Apparel and other personal effects, professional books, implements, and tools of trade or employment of persons arriving in the U. S.

APPRAISEMENTS.—If the invoice does not show the true value at the port of entry, the owner or agent, in his entry, may add to the value stated in it; and it is the Collector's duty to cause the value of imports to be appraised, in accordance with the provisions of existing laws. And if the appraised value shall exceed by ten per cent. or more, the value so declared on the entry, then, in addition to the duties imposed by law on the same, there shall be levied a duty of *twenty per cent.* upon such appraised value.

ABSTRACT OF ACTS

Passed during last Session of the Pror. Parliament.

CUSTOMS.

The Act 13 and 14 Vic. cap. 5, empowers the Governor in Council from time to time to order any article not enumerated in the schedule to the Customs' Amendment Act (12 Vic. cap. 1), and thereby made subject to a duty of $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. *ad valorem*, to be placed among the articles subject to a duty of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. *ad valorem*. The $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. duty, and no other, shall be payable on such article, so long as the order in Council remains in force.

By section 2 it is enacted, That no duty shall be payable on Military Clothing imported into this Province for the use of Her Majesty's Troops, nor upon Wines so imported for the use of any Officers' Mess, nor upon Salt imported into the District of Gaspé for the use of the Fisheries in that District, provided such Regulations as the Governor in Council shall make for the purpose of preventing fraud or abuse under pretext of such exemption from duty, be duly complied with, and not otherwise.

INTERPROVINCIAL FREE TRADE.

Reciprocal free trade has been some time established between Canada, New Brunswick and Nova Scotia, by Acts of the several Legislatures, in articles of the growth, produce or manufacture of these provinces respectively. By the Canadian Act, 13 & 14 Vic. cap. 3, the Governor in Council is empowered from time to time to declare, that any article whatever, when of the growth, produce or manufacture of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward's Island and Newfoundland, or of any one or more of them, is or is not admissible into this province free from duty, and under what circumstances, conditions and regulations.

THE CURRENCY.

By the Act 13 and 14 Vic. Cap. 8, the legal value of the dollar and half dollar, is reduced (from 1st January, 1851,) from 5s 1d and 2s 6½d currency, respectively, to 5s and 2s 6d. The act authorises the Governor in Council to cause silver and gold coins to be struck, for circulation in the Province, the expense to be defrayed out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund. The Silver coins to pass respectively, for 5s; 2s 6d; 2s; 1s 3d; 1s; 6d. and 3d. currency. each; and to be a legal tender for £2 10s only. The Gold coins to pass respectively for £1 5s; £1; 12s 6d; and 10s currency, each, and to be a legal tender to any amount. By the Act 13 and 14 Vic. Cap. 9, the legal value of the following silver coins of Spain, of the several states of Peru, Chili, and Central America, and of the states of South America and Mexico respectively, being less than half dollars, is reduced to the following rates, viz:—the quarter dollar to 1s; the eighth of a dollar to 6d; and the sixteenth of a dollar to 3d currency.

British Silver coin is a legal tender only to the amount of £2 10; and Copper coins to the amount of 1s. The sub-divisions or dollars being less than halves, are a legal tender to the amount of £2 10s only. When they lose one-twenty-fifth part of their legal weight, then they shall not be lawful money.

The dollars and half dollars, above enumerated, and the five franc silver piece of France, are a legal tender to any amount; as are also the various gold coins.

BRITISH COPYRIGHT WORKS.

The Act 13 & 14 Vic. cap. 6, empowers the Governor in Council to impose an *ad valorem* duty, not exceeding 20 per cent., upon foreign reprints of British Works, wherein the copyright shall be subsisting, and with regard to which the notice to the Commissioners of Customs, required by the Imperial Act, shall have been given; and from time to time to alter the duty (but not to exceed the 20 per cent.) and establish such regulations and conditions as may be consistent with any Imperial Act then in force, and as he may deem requisite and equitable with regard to the admission of such books, and to the distribution of the proceeds of such duty among the parties beneficially interested in the copyright. The act to come in force when approved of by the Queen in Council, and proclamation is made in the province of such approval, and not before.

VENDERS OF TEMPERANCE TRACTS, &c.

The Act 13 and 14 Vic. cap. 7, declares that notwithstanding anything contained in the Acts of

Parliament in force relating to hawkers and pedlars, it shall not be necessary for persons in the employ of any Temperance, Benevolent or Religious Society in this province to take out licences as hawkers or pedlars, in order to enable them lawfully to sell and peddle temperance tracts, and other moral and religious publications, under the direction of such society.

EMIGRANTS.

By the Act 13 and 14 Vic. cap. 4, for the encouragement of the St. Lawrence route by Emigrants from Europe to the United States, it is enacted, That it shall be lawful for the Governor to instruct the Collector of the Customs at any port or ports on or near the frontier between this Province and the United States, to pay back to such person as shall be designated in a Certificate from the Emigrant Agent at the port at which the duty shall have been paid, as the proper person to receive such payment, a sum equal to one half of the duty paid upon any Emigrant arriving in this Province after the first day of May, provided such Certificate shall also shew that such Emigrant came into this Province with the declared intention of passing directly through it to the United States, and provided the Collector shall be satisfied by the Certificate of the same or some other Emigrant Agent, that such Emigrant hath not been (or if he be the head of a family, that no one of such family hath been chargeable upon the Province since his arrival therein, and shall also be satisfied by his own knowledge and inquiry, that such Emigrant hath come directly, and with all reasonable despatch, from the place where the duty was paid to such frontier port, and hath there paid for a passage by and embarked (with his baggage and family if any) on board of some vessel or boat bound for and immediately about to depart to a port or place in the United States. Collector shall obey any further instructions in this behalf

The word "Emigrant" shall in this Act have the meaning assigned to the word "Passenger" or "Emigrant" in the Act passed in the twelfth year of Her Majesty's Reign.

Letters may be pre-paid or not, at the option of the sender.

NEWSPAPERS.

Colonial Newspapers, not exceeding two ounces, to or from any part of the British North American Provinces, pay one half-penny, prepaid or not, at the option of the sender.

If sent to any British Colony beyond sea, (not intended to pass through the United Kingdom) or to any foreign country, except the United States, one half-penny, to be prepaid.

If sent to any part of the United States,—one penny---to be prepaid.

Newspapers from the United States pay, on delivery, one penny Provincial, in addition to the United States postage. United States Newspapers, re-posted in Canada, subject to letter postage.

Colonial Newspapers sent free to the United Kingdom or to any British Colony by way of England; and British newspapers, duly stamped, received free, from the United Kingdom to any part of Canada.

With the exception of these last, which are not limited as to weight, a newspaper to pass under the foregoing regulations, must not exceed two ounces, otherwise it will be liable to pamphlet postage,—*i. e.*, one penny per ounce.

British Newspapers can be re-posted in Canada, subject to one half-penny postage.

This trade is yet in its infancy, having only sprung up about three years ago, but it promises to employ a large amount of tonnage if the free navigation of the St. Lawrence is thrown open to the Americans. It is, strictly speaking, a carrying trade for the transport of heavy articles, such as Railroad and Pig Iron, Salt, Fish, &c., which can be imported by the St. Lawrence, into the Western States, bordering on the Upper Lakes, cheaper than they can be taken by the route from New York, or any other of the Atlantic cities. A large quantity of Sawed Timber has been sent this year from Quebec to ports on Lake Champlain.

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TIDE TABLE,

TO FIND THE TIME OF HIGH WATER AT THE
PORT OF QUEBEC, FOR ANY DAY.

Find the Moon's age, which multiply by 5 and divide the product by 6, which gives the time of the Moon's southing: to this add the time of high water at Quebec at the New and Full Moon, viz., 6 hours 45 minutes, the result will be the time of high water for the given day.

EXAMPLE.

Required the time of High Water on the 6th of February, 1851.

Moon's age 5, which multiplied by 5, gives 25, divide this by 6, and you have 4 hours and one-sixth, or 4 hours and 10 minutes; add to this 6 hours, 45 minutes, and you have 10 hours 55 min. or 5 minutes to 11 at night the time of high water.

Or, add 50 minutes for each day of the Moon's age, to 6 hrs. 45 min. the time of high tide at New and Full Moon.

Ex.—6th February.

Moon's age 5, which, multiplied by 50, gives 250 minutes, or 4 hours and 10 minutes, which, added to 6 hours 45 minutes, gives 10 hours and 55 minutes, or 5 minutes to 11, as before.

The morning tide will always be 12 hrs. 25 min. before the evening tide, or half-past 10, and *vice versa*.
