THIRTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL REPORT.

DEAR FRIENDS,—We welcome you to this, our thirty-seventh anniversary, in the history of our home.

About 1854 a few thoughtful women met together and conceived the idea that much good could be done with young girls if they could be removed from their evil surroundings and placed where they could be trained to habits of industry and economy. Their untiring zealous efforts were appreciated, for, in 1863, this work became a recognized chartered institution.

During the early years of its existence there was much anxiety and varying efforts to make the small penny subscriptions meet the demands of the great field of labor.

The good done, however, has been acknowledged, and larger subscriptions and donations have enabled the management to secure this commodious Home, and to surround its inmates with influences and occupations that will fit them for courageously and honestly fighting the battle of life.

The Directresses and Managers feel very grateful to the generous minded friends of the Home, for their sympathy, encouragement and material aid.

They feel their responsibility, and they trust the All Wise God will guide them in doing what is best for the continued successful operating of the facilities placed in their hands by a generous, trusting public, and earnestly pray that they may have grace to use their opportunities of usefulness for God's own glory.

It is a source of encouragement to know that during the past ten years no less than 560 children have been kindly cared for, that many of them are now holding useful, responsible positions, and that not a few of them have given bright glimpses of an inner life, which is the blessing and re-

sult of earnest Christian teaching. It may be our hopes fly too far ; we cannot expect that all of the girls will be able to do what we would wish them to do, but, judging from the cheering words which our corresponding secretary will read to you, many are trying to do their duty.

“ In God’s great field of labor
All work is not the same,
He hath a service for each one
Who loves His holy name.”

As the aim of the Home is to save, to rescue, and knowing the grand meaning of those two words, you can easily see how often our humane feelings alone compel us to admit little ones, saving them from privations and dangers which only too surely follow in the path of neglect.

To do this noble work we have had loving, earnest co-workers to whom our most grateful thanks are due, for all the kind help they have so generously extended to us ; especially would we acknowledge our obligations to the Ven. Archdeacon Boddy, for his weekly Christian instruction to the elder girls ; also to Mrs. McGee, as Superintendent of the Sabbath School and her Assistants, who are most faithful workers in this branch of the Lord’s vineyard.

Our solicitor has been most willing and ever ready with wise counsel to help us in our doubts and troubles, for which we are extremely grateful.

To our physicians we owe heartfelt indebtedness for professional services rendered so freely whenever called upon, in season, or out of season ; also to Dr. Adams for his kindness in relieving dental pain, and for his operations in dental surgery, in which great patience and kindness were exercised.

Diphtheria again appeared in March. The Home was quarantined, and for several weeks every precaution was taken to prevent the spread of this terrible disease.

The health officer made a careful inspection of the buildings and pronounced them to be in a perfect sanitary condition. As new cases appeared they were immediately sent to the Isolated Hospital, where they received kind and careful treatment. We had much cause for thankfulness as only *one* of the cases proved fatal.

That troublesome disease, ringworm, has again shown itself. Isolating the patients with a separate nurse, will, it is hoped, soon eradicate it.

The greatest care is taken in selecting homes for the children, and in sending suitable girls for the duties they are expected to perform.

In connection with this part of the work, where dissatisfaction may exist, we expect to receive much assistance from the lately appointed government officer, Mr. J. J. Kelso, as he has power to remove the girls if it is evident that they are not receiving proper treatment.

We feel that much of the success of the Home is due to the efficiency and devotedness of Mrs. Bright and her assistants. The former is more than a matron, she is an invaluable friend and spares neither time nor trouble to advance our efforts. Her motherly instincts are all kindness and love for the children. They are taught by her to respect manual labor, to assist in the household work, which is so divided that they do not find it an irksome duty; good manners, habits of cleanliness and helpfulness are parts of their training.

Annexed will be found a report of the sewing done by them, which is a most gratifying proof of the industrious habits to which they are trained. An inspection of the work reflects great credit on the busy little seamstresses who may be seen every afternoon, stitch—stitch—stitching, under the direction and supervision of Miss McKee.

The children have also the advantages of day school, under the able management of Miss McKee and Miss McMaster. The report of the School Inspector and the honor roll are most gratifying and testify to their painstaking efforts.

The pleasures and treats for the children have been most generously remembered. Although debarred from accepting many kind invitations in the early part of the season, later, they enjoyed most heartily those health-going resorts, the Island Park, High Park, etc. To Mr. Withrow they are grateful for a happy day spent at the Exhibition. To Mr. Wilkie they are indebted for a visit to the Cyclorama. To the Captains of the Steamers, Street Railway Officials, and all others connected with these kindnesses, the Board express their thankfulness.

The Management desire to place on record their appreciation of Mrs. Coleman's bounty, as week after week she so generously donates baskets of "good things." To All Saints Church, Carlton St. Methodist Church socials, for cake, buns, etc., and to the many kind friends, who from time to time were mindful of the needs which a large family like ours require.

The Christmas dinner, the donation of several kind friends, was a

happy event, after which parents and friends thronged the hall, adding to the children's feast their gifts of love.

A touching little scene was witnessed as the writer was passing through. A little one, answering to the name called for, came pattering down from the nursery, but the poor mother, in looking at her, did not, could not, recognize her child, in the plump, healthy, laughing little one before her. "Is this my Lulu? She cannot be!" and after some moments gazing at her, "Yes! yes! she is my darling; those are her eyes!" came from her in broken sobs, and tears in gratitude flowed, as she kept repeating her thanks for the good care her little one had received.

The Christmas holidays closed with a most enjoyable entertainment under the management of Mrs. Walker and Mrs. Beattie. The Magic Lantern (the gift of Mr. Oliver, John Bertram, Hugh Munro, John Donogh and Thomas West), giving lovely views of the far-famed World's Fair, was very much appreciated. Music charmingly rendered by Mrs. Galt, Dr. Geikie, Messrs. Hirschfelder, a recitation by Mr. Fred Baker, with a remarkable demonstration of ventriloquism by Mr. Simpson, combined to make the evening one of profit and pleasure for all present.

The Managers beg to acknowledge, most gratefully, the continued liberal grants from the Ontario Government and from the City Council.

In reviewing the joys and sorrows of the past year, the Board of Management desire to pay a loving tribute of respect to Mrs. McCaul, who has been identified with the Girls' Home since its inception and has occupied the honorable position of 1st Directress since 1863. It is with extreme sorrow that her resignation is accepted. They would much prefer her remaining at the head, but she wills it otherwise, she feels compelled, through ill-health, to sever her active connection from this, her labor of love, that, in justice to the Home, the position ought to be filled by one zealous and competent to advance its interests. She rejoices that the work has been blessed, and that to-day we have an institution worthy the name of Home. She hath done what she could, and when she is called to that Heavenly Home, may the joyful welcome be, "Enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

By a resolution of the Board at the monthly meeting Mrs. McCaul was unanimously made Honorary First Directress.

Dear friends, we have room for more workers and we cordially invite those who love the Master and who wish an opening to work in His

service, to join us in helping to send a ray of heaven's own sunshine into the dark and lonely paths of some of the weary ones, who have fallen by the way, and to obey the command which Christ gave to His disciples, "Be ye doers of the word, and not hearers only."

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY'S REPORT.

REPORT OF INDENTURE CHILDREN FOR 1893. There were 40 indentured children mentioned in report of 1892. Of these eight have been returned to the Home and two have attained the age of eighteen, and had their indenture fees paid to them.

Of the eight returned to the Home, three have been sent to friends, three have been re-indentured and two remain in the Home.

There have also been six children indentured during the year, making at present thirty-nine children indentured out. Of these, seventeen are in the city and suburbs; the remainder in Ontario. They seem happy and contented, as their letters attached to this report will show. They have also had good health throughout the year. As regards the two defaulters as to fees, one has paid and the other is being sued for the amount.

We have had to take one child from the people to whom she was indentured. In connection with this case, I must thank Mr. Kelso, the Superintendent of neglected children, who kindly aided me in recovering the child, and who has also assisted me in my work for the children in every possible way.

I must also take this occasion of thanking Messrs. Neville, McWhinney and Ridley, our Solicitors, for the great care and attention they have paid to some very troublesome cases they have lately had on hand for the Girls' Home.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING.

The Thirty-Seventh Annual Meeting was held at the Home, on Friday, January 26th, at 4 o'clock. His Honor, the Lieut.-Governor of Ontario, presiding.

As the Lieut.-Governor and Mrs. Kirkpatrick were being received, the children assembled in the hall, greeted them with the National Anthem and presented their Lady Patroness with a basket of choice flowers.

The meeting was then formally opened with prayer, by Dr. B. D. Thomas, who in earnest words, gave thanks for benefits received, asking guidance for the future and a blessing to rest upon the Christlike work engaged in.

The reading of the different reports by their respective officers followed, which were adopted on motion of the Honorable Mr. Blake, in an address full of encouragement, gratitude and hope, seconded by Mr. Cockburn, who had much pleasure and felt honored by being present to second their adoption.

Mr. R. S. Baird then read the list of officers and managers for the year 1894, who then with kindly remarks, moved their election, seconded by Dr. Carlyle, who thought, with such a list of names, just read, there need be no cause for anxiety in the future, and had pleasure in seconding the resolution. Carried unanimously.

The resolution of thanks to subscribers and friends, was very happily moved by Mr. S. F. McKinnon, who thought if more could be persuaded to leave their counting houses and stores to spend an hour in the Home and see for themselves the good accomplished, they would better appreciate what their gifts were doing. He would be only too pleased to follow the example of the Hon. Mr. Blake and double his subscription. Mr. Withrow, in seconding this vote of thanks, was very pleased to see that those who could afford it were increasing their donations, as he felt sure there was no greater work of charity than the Girls' Home. So much good can be done by them through this channel—saving these waifs—and preparing them for an independent position in life.

A vote of thanks was then tendered by Mr. A. M. Smith, to His Honor, the Lieut.-Governor, for his kindness in being present and for so ably occupying the chair, to which his Honor replied in a genial, happy manner, feeling it a privilege and an honor to be able to be present, and wished the Home every prosperity.

The benediction was pronounced by Mr. Skey, Curate of St. Peters.

All then adjourned to the dining-room, where the children had assembled for their New Year's tea. Mrs. Kirkpatrick, "Cutting the cake" to the delight of her young proteges. A dainty 5 o'clock tea was then served, by the ladies of the Board, to their many guests, which terminated one of the brightest annual meetings on record.

MEDICAL REPORT OF GIRLS' HOME.

The year which has just passed has been marked by an unusual amount of illness and by a somewhat larger number of deaths than is generally the case.

It will be noticed in reading the report that a number of the children have been sent to Victoria Hospital for Sick Children and to the Isolation Hospital for treatment.

This has been necessary where the illness threatened to assume so serious a character as to call for constant attendance and a special nurse, or the illness was infectious.

On March 16th diphtheria again made its appearance in the Home and there were in all fourteen cases of it.

These children thus attacked were at once sent to the Isolation Hospital, where one of them, Louie Robinson, died on July 20th.

Besides these, there was one case of scarlet fever sent to the Isolation Hospital, making fifteen cases in all treated there.

Ten children have been sent throughout the year to Victoria Hospital for sick children, and of these one died, Ellie Higginson, of cancrum oris, on September 27th. In addition to these there have been a number of the children treated in the Home.

The total number of sick children in the Home may be classified as follows: diphtheria, 14; pneumonia, 4; cancrum oris, 1; scarlet fever, 1; rheumatism, 1; tonsillitis, 1; convulsions, 1; laryngitis, 1; ringworm, 12; fracture, 1; other ailments, 15.

Total number of deaths, 3, viz.: Louie Robinson, diphtheria; Isabel Hardy, convulsions; Ellie Higginson, cancrum oris.

Our medical staff has been rendered still more efficient by the appointment of Dr. Garratt and Dr. Julia Thomas, these, with Dr. Boyle, undertaking the general medical work of the Home, while Dr. Wishart has charge of special work in eye, ear, nose and throat cases.

We should like here to tender our sincerest thanks to Mrs. Bright and her assistants, to whose constant care and watchfulness the children's good health is due.

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING, FEBRUARY 26TH,
AT 4 O'CLOCK P.M.

A very large attendance of friends and subscribers attended the 37th Anniversary of the Home, when the different Annual Reports were read by their respective officers.

His Honor the Lieut.-Governor presiding.

As our honored Chairman and Mrs. Kirkpatrick were being received, the children who were assembled in the Hall, welcomed them by singing the National Anthem and presenting their Lady Patroness with a basket of choice flowers—which courtesy and kindness were very much appreciated.

The meeting was formally opened with prayer by the Rev. B. D. Thomas.

The Hon. S. Blake moved the adoption of the reports in an address full of encouragement, gratitude, and hope for the work in which our hearts are so interested. He recalled the past when he and Mr. Clarkson Jones worked together for the Home. It was with regret that the familiar face of the 1st Directress was absent from her accustomed seat of honor. She had been identified with this good work as long as he could remember; he earnestly hoped the same zealous work which had characterized the past would characterize all future undertakings, and success would continue to crown the work. He regretted to hear from the Treasurer's Report that the collections had fallen off. He would be very pleased to double his subscription.

Mr. Cockburn had much pleasure in seconding the adoption of the reports, which was carried.

Mr. R. S. Baird read the list of Officers and Managers for the year 1894, and then moved their election, seconded by Dr. Carlyle, who thought with such a list of names as just read, there need be no cause for anxiety in the future of the Home, and had much pleasure in seconding the election. Carried (list as per book).

The resolution as follows:—

That the Officers and Managers of the "Girls' Home" desire to return their grateful thanks to those who have contributed to the support of the Home, and their sincere appreciation of the thoughtfulness and kindness of those who without solicitation have sent gifts of *money, clothing, and supplies*, was moved by Mr. S. F. McKinnon in a few kind remarks, and who thought if more business men could be persuaded to leave their offices to spend an hour within these walls, they could judge—and see for themselves—the good accomplished for these waifs of society, and better

appreciate what their gifts were doing. He would be only too pleased to follow the example of his honorable friend, Mr. Blake, and double his annual subscription.

Mr. Withrow, in seconding this resolution, said he felt sure the money donated could do far more good, going through this channel, than by personal application; he was very pleased to be present; he always took a warm interest in the welfare of the Home and wished it continued success.

A vote of thanks was then tendered His Honor by Mr. A. M. Smith, seconded by Mr. Cockburn, for so ably occupying the chair, which was responded to by the Lieut.-Governor, who expressed himself gratified with all he had seen and heard, and felt it a great privilege and an honor to be present. He wished the Home every prosperity.

The benediction was pronounced by the Rev. Mr. Skey, curate of St. Peter's.

The children who were assembled in the class-rooms sang some pretty hymns, and then walked in order to the dining hall (followed by the guests), where they enjoyed a New Year's tea, Mrs. Kirkpatrick "cutting the cake," to the delight of her young proteges.

A dainty five o'clock tea was then served by the ladies of the Board to their many visitors, which terminated one of the brightest Annual Meetings ever held in the Home.

CONSTITUTION OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. This Institution shall be called the "GIRLS' HOME," and have for its object the rescue from vice of young girls, and the bestowal of careful attention to their religious, moral, and temporal welfare; also the maintenance and support of girls from two to fourteen years of age.

2. Children are given out to parties furnishing suitable references, on payment of five dollars per annum till the child is fifteen, then ten, fifteen, and twenty dollars for the next three years respectively; these sums, except the first, to be invested for the said child's benefit and given to her at the expiration of her term of service.

3. The management shall be entrusted to a Committee of not more than forty-five ladies, chosen at the Annual Meeting, out of which shall be elected by ballot the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th Directresses, Treasurer, Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Secretary of Districts. All vacancies shall be filled by ballot, and a majority vote at a Monthly Meeting after at least one week's notice. Should it happen at any meeting that no Directress be present, then the ladies in attendance, if sufficient to form a quorum, may elect some one of their number to take the chair, the lady so appointed to have, for the time being, the same authority in all respects as Directress.

4. No alteration shall be made in this Constitution, except at the Annual Meeting; and notice of any proposed alteration must always be given to the Board, at least one month previous to such Annual Meeting.

RULES FOR THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. Regular meetings of the Board of Managers shall be held every Tuesday, at 10.30 a.m., the first Tuesday in the month being the day of the Monthly Meeting, for which all important business shall be deferred. Special meetings may be called by the Secretary, upon an order from the 1st Directress, or, in her absence, at the request of any three members.

2. All meetings shall be opened and closed with prayer, and be opened as soon after the appointed hour as a quorum shall be present, which shall consist of five members at a Monthly and three at a Weekly Meeting, being conducted in the following order:

1st. The Secretary shall read the minutes of the preceding meeting, which shall be signed, or, in case of a Monthly Meeting, all the meetings

during the past month; inform the meeting of any correspondence that has taken place, and read the general Reports of the condition of the Institution.

2d. The presiding Lady shall place all resolutions before the meeting, declare the decision to the Secretary, and, if an equality of votes occur, give the casting one, in addition to her vote as member of the Board.

3. As soon as the meeting is opened (when a quorum is formed) all conversation not addressed to the presiding Lady shall be pronounced by her to be out of order, and stopped.

4. Any lady allowing three months to pass without being present, or notifying her inability to attend to the Secretary, shall have her name struck off the list of the Managing Committee.

5. The Treasurer shall receive and take charge of all moneys belonging to the Institution, as well as the children's fees, keeping account of the same. All accounts shall be brought by her before the meeting of the Managers every month.

6. The Corresponding Secretary shall keep account of all children given out from the Home, and correspond with them at least once a year, and shall keep account of and read all correspondence respecting them, at the Board Meetings.

7. The Secretary of Districts shall arrange with the collectors all details of the districts to be visited, and take charge of the lists of subscriptions in the Annual Report.

8. The Secretary shall direct all the correspondence, keep account, as far as practicable, of all the children in the Institution—giving a general report thereof at the Monthly Meeting, at which she shall regularly attend, but never be called upon to preside, minute the proceedings, and take the names of the ladies present.

9. Two members of the Committee shall be appointed by the Secretary to visit the Home daily each week, ascertain from the Matron the behaviour of the children, as well as whatever may be requisite for them and for the house, and report the same at the Regular Weekly Meetings. The 1st Directress, Treasurer, Corresponding Secretary, and Secretary shall not be of the number of Daily Visitors.

10. Any three Managers, including a Directress, may admit applicants up to the age of fourteen, with the doctor's certificate insuring them to be free from disease.

RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR THE MATRON AND CHILDREN OF THE GIRLS' HOME.

1. The Matron shall be competent to take charge of all the children, as well as to conduct the household affairs generally, and also to instruct the girls between the ages of five and fourteen, in sewing, knitting, and household work.

2. She shall admit any applicant not younger than two years, or older than fourteen, upon the doctor's certificate; subject always to the approval of the Board.

3. The charge for each child of such parents or friends who are able to pay, shall be \$5 per month, unless an exceptional case should occur. If more than one child of the same parent or friend gain admittance, a reduction may be made as approved by the ladies of the Weekly Committee.

4. The Matron shall daily inspect the cleanliness of the children, see that they attend the day-school punctually and regularly; and every morning and evening conduct family prayers.

5. The children shall rise at 6 a.m. from May 1st to October 31st, and at 7 a.m. from November 1st to April 30th. The time for going to rest to be from 5 to 8 p.m.

Children under fourteen are not allowed to wash or scrub more than three hours a day.

6. Meals to be at regular hours. Breakfast at 8 a.m.; dinner at 12; tea at 5 p.m. Grace to be said before and after meals by the elder children. The Matron and one servant to be present.

7. All children of age to do so, shall regularly attend Sunday-school, and also Divine Service once every Sunday, in charge of the Matron, or some other competent person, and in the afternoon attend the Sunday-school in the Institution.

8. Parents or friends of the children shall be admitted to visit them on Wednesday and Friday afternoons, from 3 until 5 o'clock. Persons wishing to come at other hours must obtain a permit from the Board.

9. The Home shall be open to the public any afternoon during the week.
