

## WAREHOUSE FULL OF LARD MADE A SPECTACULAR FIRE

Blaze in a Pittsburg Packing KLAW & ERLANGER Plant Thought to Have Been Extinguished Burst Out Again Today — Rivers of Grease Flowed Over the

PITTSBURG, April 25—One of the most remarkable and spectacular fires seen in this vicinity started last night in the Wildam Sellar Packing Co.'s plants, Spring Garden Ave., Allepheny, opposite this city. Early today when the fire was thought to be under control, a large fire-proof warehouse, in which was stored 500,000 pounds of lard, suddenly burst into fiames. All efforts to extinguish the fire in this department were futile, and the firemen finally fastened the iron doors of the building, shutting in the burning lard. The interior of the building soon became a se thing furnace. Spurting from crevices, doors and windows, streams of hot grease ran into a sort of trench prepared in an endeavor to prevent the hot fluid from spreading over surrounding, territory. Danger was encountered at every turn by the firemen, who stood by in case the walls should collapse and allow the blazing lard to reach the adjacent property. A letter written by who should certainly receive prompt him to the American Geographical So- attention ciety in October last from some point on the Arctic coast of Alaska has just been published. It conveys the information that Mikkelsen and his little Arthur Guiterman in May St. Nicholas. party had intended spending the winter on their schooner, the Duchess of Bedford, at Flaxman Island, about 240 miles west of the McKenzle River Delta. The heavy ice which pressed on the Alaskan coast last summer prevented the party from reaching their proposed winter quarters at Minto Inlet. Mikkelsen's voyage has been undertaken principally for the purpose of locating land supposed to exist somewhere in the Arctic, north of Alaska. The only time that this land is believed to have been seen was some thirty or thirty-five years ago, when Capt. In the latter part of May the whales disappear from the neighborhood of Point Barrow. They head for the northeast and nobody knows where they go, unless they follow this lane of water which perhaps takes them to the north of the supposed land. They are next seen hundreds of miles to the eastward, between Banks Land and Cape Bathurst, where they appear regularly in the latter part of July coming from the northward. The only reasonable explanation why this pack ice should open year after year and supply the hales with a channel through which they can travel to the northeast, is that there is a land of some magnitude in the north from which the ice recedes in the spring. It is also a well known fact that millions of birds which pass Point Barrow in the spring travelling to the northeast breed elsewhere than on the mainland, for they do not live on the coast of Alaska but pass over it to the north and are not seen again until autumn, when they are travelling south. Geese go flying southward to Herschel Island as late as the middle of August, and this fact leads the whalers to believe that Mikkelsen will find land this spring not very far north of the Alaskan coast. Mikkelsen had intended to take a party of two or three men early this spring and strike out from Flaxman Island towards the north-north-east, following this direction for 150 miles, then travelling west for 100 miles, thence south to Cross Island. He will winter next year, if all goes well, in Banks Island, and in the spring of 1908 will start on another sledge trip towards the west from Cape Prince Alfred. These two sledge journies, it is believed, should slove the problem as to the existence



### AMERICA'S NAVAL FLEET IS WAITING

Every Type of Fighting Craft Ready for Friday's Review

Between the Little Texas and Big Connecticut

NORFOLK, Va., April 24—Every type of fighting craft in the United States navy is represented in the great fleet which is assembled tonight in Hampton Roads, spick and span in white paint, awaiting the visiting foreign war ships which are expected to take part in the celetration of the Jamestown Exposition. There are more than 300,000 tons of floating steel, and the whole fleet, anchored in a huge semi-circle off the shore of the exposition grounds, makes a sight to fill every American heart with pride. The first and the last of the new navy battle ships are here; the Texas, contemporary of the ill fated Maine, eight guns and 6,300 tons, and the giant Connecticut, 24 guns and 16,000 tons, are fitting examples by which the strides of twenty years may be measured.

The German cruiser Bremen is here

The German cruiser Bremen is here and the Roon, one of Emperor Williams' newest armored cruisers, is expected tonight. The British fleet will be here for the opening on Friday, and the fleets of Germany and Austria are also expected to be complete by that time. Admiral Evans has the Connecticut as his flagship.

CRUISERS ALL MODERN. The cruisers of the fleet are all modern craft, though the variance in size between the largest and the smallest is as great as that which marks the heavier vessels of the battle class. The armored cruisers Tennessee and Washington, each of 14,500 tons and mounting twenty guns aniece are the heaviington, each of 14,500 tons and mounting twenty guns aplece, are the heaviest of the cruisers. They can hurl a weight of metal almost equal to the first class battle ships, while at the same time they possess the fleetness of the ocean greyhound, the massive, throbbing engines in their holds being capable of the development of 20,000 horse power. The smallest cruisers are the Denver and the Cleveland—3,100 tons each—the third class of the pro-

the Denver and the Cleveland—3,100 tons each—the third class of the protected vessels of the navy. In the cruiser class the most interesting vessel is perhaps the Brooklyn, the flagship of Rear Admiral Schley in the battle with Cervera's squadron off Santiago, Cuba. The Brooklyn, bearing on her after turret the memorial plate simply and eloquently inscribed "July 3, 1898," will also remain a permanent naval exhibit during the seven months of the life of the exposition.

### TO MAKE DEMAND FOR BETTER RAILS

### Association Takes Up Matter and Will Present it to Manufacturers

Bad Steel is Gause of Many Accidents Because of Hurry in the

CHICAGO, Ill., April 24—The managements of American railroads are preparing to make a demand upon the manufacturers for a better quality of steel rails upon the ground that many railroad accidents are caused by a poor grade of steel. The demand is to be made through the medium of the Amer-

made through the medium of the American Railway Association, which is the most powerful organization of its kind in the world, now holding its spring meeting at the Auditorium.

It is charged by the railroad operating officials and by the presidents that investigation has shown that many of the wrecks which have been caused during the last few years are the rethe wrecks which have been caused during the last few years are the result of rails which failed to stand the strain they should and many of which are said to have shown flaws. The charge is not made that the rail manufacturers are deliberately manufacturing an inferior steel rail, but it is feared that owing to the great demand for rails the manufacturers may not have exercised the care they were wont to exercise in the past.

The association members have evin-

to exercise in the past.

The association members have evinced a willingness to go into the question of steel rails from all sides and from an unbiased standpoint. They admit that possibly changed operating conditions, such as heavier trains, greater speed and the introduction of electric motors, may have made it advisable that new rail specifications be adopted. Wherever the blame, however, they insist that there are too many broken rails with their terrible story of death and disaster and that a

many broken rails with their terrible story of death and disaster and that a rail should be manufactured upon which operating officials may depend with reasonable certainty.

Among the reports which have been prepared for presentation to the general meeting of the association today is one by the committee on standard rail and wheel sections. This committee took up the problem at the October meeting and held a session in New York in February. Among other things the report states:—

states:—
"The question of proper specifications for the manufacture of steel ralls which was referred to your committee at the October meeting has been given careful consideration, and the committee has called to its assistance a number of experts to prepare a draft of proposed specifications to form the basis of a discussion with the steel manufactures, and when this draft is ready it of a discussion with the steel manufactures, and when this draft is ready it is the purpose of your committee to take the matter up with all the American makers in an effort to improve the quality of material in steel rails. It is thought that something substantial can be accomplished in this direction, if the unanimous approval of the members of the association can be had to the reasonable suggestions of the committee."
