

The noble lord, who ranks as a master of back door intrigue evidently hopes by indulging in a bombastic panegyric to detach the Imperial person from that portion of the nation which realizes that Germany's only salvation is a strong and energetic foreign policy. Our Kaiser is a German through and through, and will not be misled by such unscrup-

Concurrently with the close of the British manufac turers tour through Canada, the timely announcement comes from the Old Country that the British Board of Trade has awakened to the importance of placing home gainst foreign competitors in the Overseas markets.
