When working back to the left, the chain must not cross itself, and no circle shall be drawn in a square which touches at right angles or obliquely any square which con-tains a circle that was drawn when going toward the right. By section is meant a series of three, four, or five circles in a straight line. The circle at the angle where the chain turns is to be regarded as the end of one section and the beginning of the next. This, however, does not mean that the numbers in these circles are to be counted twice, or that the circles themselves count two when adding up the number of points encircled or the number of circles which form the chain. The numbers in each square, where there are two figures, are to be regarded as double numbers, as ninety-nine, sixty-five, eighty-seven, &c.
