






Little Girl in France Devoured by Wild Animals on Her Way from School-Cold Becoming More Intense.

CAPTAIN HARNDON ILL.


CAPTAIN HARNDON ILL. Philadelphia, Jan. 23—Captain Harn-don, who commanded the British steamship Rappahannock, when the vessel went to the rescue of the steam-ship Volturna, afire in midocean, is in a hospital here suffering from a nervous breakdow. We have tested beers repeatedly in this direction, placing the bottles into direct sunlight, and testing the same after one two three and five minutes exposure.
