Preparing for Another Attempt to Get Through to the Coast, but are Guarding Secret of Where Next Attack is to be Made-Allies Ready to Meet Assault - Diplomats in Balkans Active and Rumors of Reorganization of Balkan League - Russians Back Again in Hungary - Reports from Russian Capital Claim Victory in Northern Poland Greater than Previously Reported.

London, Nov. 25.—While the Russian army headquarters remain silent, and the Germans claim to have checked attempts on the part of the Russians to take the offensive, the military party in Petrograd has shown its full confidence in the unofficial reports of a Russian victory in Northern Poland by celebrating the event.

It is even said in the Russian capital that the victory was greater than has been reported, and there is talk in Petrograd of an entire German army corps having been broken up. Reports received there say that trains have been ordered which will accommodate fifty thousand wounded and prisoners. Heretofore Grand Duke Nicholas, commander-in-chief of the Russian forces, has withheld his reports until the work he set about to do had been completed, so that the world may have to wait for some days yet for his official statement.

In East Prussia, and before Gracow, Galicia, the Germans claim to have brought the Russian advance to a stop. The other side is yet to be heard from in regard to this state-

RUSSIANS INVADE HUNGARY AGAIN.

Probably the most significant plece of news regarding the Russian operations comes from Budapost, where it is admitted that the Russian troops again have invaded Hungary, and have reached the county of Ung, which is about thirty-five miles south of the Carpathians, and the county of Zemplin, fifty miles to the south of these mountains. The troops which invaded Ung, according to this report, have been driven back to the frontier, while action is being taken against those in Zem-

Except to the northwest of Verdun, where the Germans made an attack, were repulsed and asked for an armistice which was refused, the lighting in the western theatre still consists, to a large extent, of artillery duels. There is evidence, however, that the Germans contemplate another desperate effort to get through to the French coast ports.

Every report from Belgium, by way of Holland, shows that the Germans are bringing up reinforcements and guns, but so closely is the secret guarded that there is no indication as to where the blow is to be delivered. It will doubtless be a heavy one, backed by all the men, guns and other machines of war, of which the Germans seem to have such unlimited supplies.

The Allies have made every preparation to meet this assault. At the same time, preparations have been completed for the defence of the east coast of England, for the opinion still holds here that if the Germans fall in their latest plans, they will attempt a raid on England with warships and transports, for which German submarines are trying to prepare the way.

It is considered in official circles here that with the Austrian army on her soil, Servia will be more likely to listen to the demand of Bulgaria for a slice of Macedonia as the price of her support. PAY FOR VOLUNTEERS

THE PERIOD OF ENLISTMENT is for the duration

THE RATE OF PAY is \$1.10 per day, which for seven days a week, means \$33.00 per month, and found.

IF DISABLED, soldiers will receive pensions at such rates as may be fixed by the government.

IF WOUNDED OR ILL, soldiers will be well cared for and sent back to their homes as soon as convenient. SOLDIERS MAY ASSIGN THEIR PAY or any portion of it, to their wives or other dependents, and such sums will be paid regularly to the persons so named.

will be paid regularly to the persons so named.

SHOULD ANY SOLDIERS BE KILLED, their wives and children will become wards of the Canadian Government, and generous provision will be made for them.

SEPARATION ALLOWANCE, Twenty Dollars per Month, in addition to the soldier's pay, will be paid to the wives of married volunteers, the widowed mothers of men going to the front, or other relatives who depend for their sole support upon the incomes of the men offering for service.

EVERY REASONABLE PROVISION is thus made for dependent relatives of volunteers and men contemplating offering for active service need have no anxiety regarding the welfare of those whom they may leave be-

THE PATRIOTIC FUND

THIS FUND has been created for the purpose of maintaining in reasonable comfort the wives, children or other dependent relatives of men who volunteer for service.

EACH INDIVIDUAL CASE will be dealt with on its merits, the facts being secured by local committies who shall consider all sources of income of relatives left behind.

THE SOLDIER'S WIFE will, if any such aid is required, receive thirty dollars per month, of which twenty dollars will be from the government and ten dollars from the Patriotic Fund.

PROVISION FOR CHILDREN is made according to a sliding scale. For instance, a wife with three children of the ages of three, seven and twelve, will be entitled to an income of forty-five dollars per month in addition to the soldier's pay.

THE SON OF A WIDOW, who is his mother's principal support, may assign his pay to her, and may on making the proper representations, have the twenty dollars separation allowance and amounts from the Patriotic Fund also made payable to his mother.
