BOLSHEVIK MISGOVERNMENT NOW NEARING ITS END

THE RUSSIAN MASSES ABOUT TO RISE IN ARMS AGAINST TYRANTS

Details of How Nicholas Was Officially Assassinated By the Reds-German Commander - in Chief in the Ukraine and His Adjutant Killed By Bomb.

London, July 31-Information reaching Stockholm, says the correspondent of the Times, shows that the Bolsheviki regime has come to the end of its tether and that the Russian masses-workmen and peasants-are about to rise in arms against Bolshevik tyranny.

Official representatives of the Social Revolutionary and Social Democratic parties in Russia have arrived in Stockholm, says the correspondent, and have issued a remarkable appeal to the Socialists of Europe. They call upon the Socialists to form an international commission, representing all Socialist parties to visit and ascertain whether the Russians Socialists are not right in declaring that the Bolsheviki have brought widespread evils on Russia, destroyed industry, caused universal starvation, despotically oppressed the people and are now concerned only in retaining power at all costs.

Amsterdam, July 30—A Moscow telegram to a Berlin paper says that the entire region from Tomsk, in West Siberia, to Udünsk, on the Uda, including Krasnoyarsk, capital of the government of Yeniseisk and Irkutsk, are under the control of General Alexieff, formerly commander-in-chief of the Russian armies.

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





UNITED STATES WAR EXPENSES **MUCH HIGHER**

They Are Running About Fifty Per Cent. Above Those of Great Britain.

Washington, July 31.—The United States war expenses now are running about fitty per cent, higher than those of Great Britain, it was shown today by comparison of treasury reports and a newly issued British financial statement. Owing to the shorter time the United States has been in the war, however, her national debt is only one-third as large as that of Great Britain, and the individual burden of taxation in this country now is only about one-half as much as it is in England.

The monthly cost of the war to the United States is about \$1,500,000,000, including loans to allies, while Great Britain's expenses are running in the neighborhood of \$1,000,000,000 a month. The United States is spening about \$50,000,000 a day or more than \$2,000,000 an hour. The nation's war debt is now a little more than \$12,500,000,000 as compared with Great Britain's \$38,675,000,000.
