Minutes of the Annual Meeting.

Dundas, 25th January, 1899.

The annual meeting of the congregation was held this evening at 8 o'clock, in the basement of the church, at which there was a fair attendance.

Mr. R. T. Wilson, the chairman of the Board of Managers, took the chair.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the pastor, Dr. Laing.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and on motion, adopted, as well as the following reports: The Session, Managers' and Auditors', Sabbath School and Librarians', Women's Foreign Missionary Society, and Young Peoples Society of Christian Endeavor.

The usual half hour was allowed for general conversation, when a discussion as to the finances took place which it is hoped will be of benefit to the church.

It was moved by Mr. Henry Bertram and seconded by Mr. Thomas Bain, that the retiring managers, Messrs Peter Laing, R. T. Wilson, J. J. Steele and J. W. Lawraon be re-elected.

Moved by Mr. Peter Burton and seconded by Dr. Laing, that Mr. R. T. Wilson, chairman; Mr. Peter Laing, treasurer and Mr. F. D. Suter, secretary, be re-elected and Mr. W. Lawraon be elected assistant secretary.

On motion of Mr. Joseph Boyle, seconded by Mr. T. D. Wardlaw, Messrs William Foote and Arthur More, were elected Auditors for the year.

It was moved by Mr. Thos. Bain and seconded by Mr. Wm. Clark, that the managers be asked to call on the members and adherents of the congregation to ascertain what each one will give per envelope towards the support of the ordinances of the church.

Moved by Mr. Thos. Bain and seconded by Mr. Andrew Sutherland, that the thanks of the congregation be given to the retiring Auditors, Messrs Alexander Bertram and H. W. Philp for the very efficient manner in which they have attended to their duties during the past two years.

On motion of Mr. William Clark, seconded by Mr. Chas. Boyle, a vote of thanks was unanimously passed to Mr. R. T. Wilson chairman, Mr. Peter Laing treasurer, and Mr. F. D. Suter, secretary, for their services.

A vote of thanks was also unanimously tendered to the Choir for their services during the past year, on motion of Mr. Peter B. Burton, seconded by Mr. F. A. Latahew.

There being no further business, Dr. Laing pronounced the benediction and the meeting dismissed.

Report of Managers

The managers have pleasure in submitting to the congregation the usual Auditor's Report and statements of account for the past year. From the figures presented it will be seen that sufficient has been subscribed by voluntary contribution to almost meet the current expenses. After deducting the balance in the Treasurer's hands at the end of the year, \$13 19, there is a balance of \$29.12 of accounts unpaid; this your managers feel should not be the case, each year, for if those who are in a position to do so would only make one half the effort to contribute a weekly sum, that is made by a number of the congregation who do not possess as large a share of this world's goods, the treasurer would always have sufficient in his hands to meet the current expenses of the year. So impressed have the managers become with this fact that they have decided to ask each of the members and adherents of the congregation to put down in writing what amount each one is willing to give per envelope either weekly, monthly or quarterly in advance, but the managers are of opinion that the weekly envelope payment is most satisfactory. As this will necessitate seeing every person personally, it will assist the managers very materially if those who are present will come forward this evening and enter their names and the amount they will subscribe during the usual half hour allowed for social intercourse and if those who are not present will call at the secretary's office for the purpose it will obviate the necessity of calling on them personally.

The following is a comparative statement of the receipts for the last five years, viz: 1894, \$1,980.04; 1895, \$2,134.97; 1896, \$2,122.19, 1897, \$2,330.69, including special collection \$176 for furnaces; 1898, \$2,094.43.

As intimated from the pulpit by the pastor, Dr. Laing, the managers, with the approval of the session, decided to procure a Pipe Organ for the church in lieu of the present one and they have been met by those of the congregation whom they have called on in a liberal manner. They have yet a number to call on and have no doubt will be received by them in the same spirit; if so the congregation may expect to see a good pipe organ in the church before very long.

The retiring managers are Messrs. Peter Laing, R. T. Wilson, J. W. Lawraon, J. J. Steele, who are eligible for re-election.

Report of Session.

During the past year there have been several additions to our numbers by families moving into our town, and the congregations have been somewhat larger than for three years past. The additions to the Roll of Communicants have been 7 to by profession and 8 by certificate, in all 18; 2 have died and 9 received certificates. There were 12 baptisms, 4 marriages and 8 funerals attended. The Roll of Members has been carefully revised and is appended. If there are any omissions or inaccuracies the Session will be pleased to make such changes as will ensure correctness. Last year there were on the roll 271 names, of which 237 were in good standing; this year begins with 293 on the roll and 250 in good standing, being a decrease in the latter of 4. While there is much to encourage, the Session is grieved to report that there have been comparatively few additions from among our young people, which seems to indicate a want of seriousness among them, which may be owing to indifference and neglect on the part of parents and a want of interest among the members of the church generally. The number attending public worship on the Lord's day is not what it should be; not a few are irregularly and even only occasionally in church; also

many of the communicants fail to partake in the Lord's Supper, only 70 per cent on an average of those whose names are on the roll being present. The Wednesday meeting also is poorly attended; too many make other engagements for that evening. The report of the Sabbath school will be given separately; here we may note that there has been no little difficulty experienced in finding a superintendent and teachers, particularly one to fill the place of Mrs. Steele. Nevertheless on the whole the school is doing well. Parents would greatly help the teachers by seeing that the children attend regularly, learn their lessons at home and are provided with bibles for use in the school. Rev. Mr. Hamilton has continued to teach the young men, but of these there are quite a number who do not attend. A class for Bible study was begun a few weeks ago on three Thursdays of the month, at 3 o'clock p.m., at which the attendance has been large and encouraging. In April last an assistant for the pastor was secured, Rev. J. A. Moir, who has been diligent and faithful in pastoral visiting as well as preaching once every week and generally conducting the Wednesday evening meeting. His services have been valuable and acceptable. He has also, since Mr. Groff resigned in July last, been the Superintendent of the Sabbath school. A young people's society has lately been again organized, the prospects of which are good, and the pastor still meets when able with a few young men in a class for mutual improvement. Since October the pastor's improved health has enabled him to preach once on the Lord's day and to visit among the people, especially attending to the sick and aged and to strangers. On the whole the spiritual interests of the congregation have not been neglected.

The Relief Fund has been administered with his usual care by Mr. P. Laing in concert with the other elders. A report of receipts and disbursements is given below. At the beginning of the year the balance on hand was \$2.13. There was received from the town \$337.72 and contributed by the congregation \$150.64. The money on hand on January 1st, was \$8.41, a balance due from the town has not been received owing to the sickness of the town clerk. The money contributed for Missions and the schemes of the church has been looked after in a most satisfactory way by Miss Connell, assisted by Miss Vassie. The amount received monthly in envelopes is within a few cents of what was given last year, but the increase which might reasonably have been expected owing to the return of more prosperous times has not been realized.

The Session affectionately urges on all the congregation the importance of all, young and old, giving each month what they are able, and doing so regularly. The advance in Foreign Mission work and the claims of our Home Field in the Northwest, Algoma, Nipissing, Parry Sound and Ottawa regions, as well as at the mining camps of British Columbia and in the Klondike and Yukon regions are rapidly increasing. Let every one then do something, and that every month, for the Lord's work both at home and abroad. "Freely we are receiving, freely let us give."

The average attendance of scholars during the year was 147, excluding the two Bible classes, which had an average of 20.

LIBRARIANS' REPORT

At the beginning of the year there were in the library 547 volumes. Since then 46 new books have been added, making a total of 593.

All the old books unfit for use were repaired and put in circulation.

During the year 3327 books were issued, making an average of 71 per Sunday. The largest number of books issued on one Sunday 107, the lowest number issued on one Sunday 35.

Report of W. F. T. S.

The first meeting of the year was held on January 6th, with an attendance of seventeen members.

Eleven monthly meetings have been held, the August meeting being omitted on account of heat and the absence of many of the members.

It was announced at the meeting in March that our Auxiliary was expected to provide clothing for two pupils in the Crowstun School, North West Territory, and donations of money and clothing were called for and responded to in a liberal manner. The goods were shipped early in September and were most satisfactory in quality as well as quantity. No extra meetings were held during the year but all the monthly meetings were fairly well attended, 14 being the average attendance.

The programmes have been willingly provided for each meeting, prepared papers, extracts from 'Reviews', letters from China and interesting selections being read by various members.

The Thank Offering meeting in October was well attended by members and friends. A most appropriate paper had been prepared by Miss Robertson, of Strathane, and we also had the pleasure of listening to a talk on 'Missions', by Mrs. Peleg Clarke, of Hamilton; these together with a liberal thank offering made a most enjoyable meeting.

Our membership was smaller than usual, 27 being the number of names on the roll, but we had several contributors who were not enrolled as active members.

The usual number of 'Leaflets' (70) was ordered and distributed monthly.
