RECIPROCITY DISCUSSED AT MONSTER MEETING

Hon. H. R. Emmerson of West-
morland, James Reid and Hon.
C. H. LaBillois Tell of Its Ad-
vantages.

The Campbellton Opera House was crowded to the doors, many having to stand, to hear Hon. H. R. Emmerson discuss Reciprocity and the policy of the Liberal govern- ment.

Long before the hour set for the meeting people began to assemble and although hundreds of seats had been provided, all were rapidly taken, until over a thousand were seated in the auditorium, among which were many ladies.

As the Ocean Limited was over an hour late Hon. Mr. Emmerson did not reach the platform until nearly 9.30. His appearance, with Mr. Jas. Reid, Hon. C. H. LaBillois and others was the signal for loud cheering and applause.

Mr. A. T. LeBlanc, Barrister, was chosen chairman, and in a few brief remarks introduced the speakers. He also apologized for the non appearance of Hon. Chas. Marcell, who was unable to be present, as he is at present touring Nova Scotia with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, but would at a later date address the electors.

JAMES REID, M. P.

In opening the meeting Mr. Reid thanked the electors for their attendance in such large numbers at the opening meeting of the campaign. He also thanked the electors for the confidence they had shown in him in again choosing him as their standard bearer. While he did not pose as an ideal representative nevertheless he had always endeavored to do his best in the interests of his country and of Campbellton. In the discharge of those duties the Conservatives of this constituency had no reason to complain as he had endeavored to look after their interests as well as those of his own party. The electors did not come to hear him and he would not try to discuss the question which takes pre- cedence in this campaign, Hon. Mr. Emmerson would do this. He wished to thank Mr. Emmerson for his appearance here. No man had done more for Campbellton; No man had done more for the intercolonial than Mr. Emmerson.

The first act of Mr. Emmerson when he became Member of Rail- ways and Canals was to come to Campbellton, and together with the speaker and Hon. Chas. Marcell, had proceeded to Metapedia where he approved of the plan to use the old I. C. R. bridge as a highway bridge between New Brunswick and Quebec, and this important work has been com- pleted. He complimented the citizens of Campbellton on the remarkable progress of their city, a city of which all should be proud. He hoped the day would come when the good people would look back upon the conflagration of last year as a blessing in dis- guise. He concluded his remarks by asking the audience to give the speaker of the evening, Hon. Mr. Emmerson, an attentive hear- ing—Applause.

HON. C. H. LABILLOIS

Hon. C. H. LaBillois was the next speaker introduced and was warmly greeted.

He thanked the citizens for their greeting and reminded them that in the twenty-five years he had been their local representative he had always been well treated as their hands. He complimented the citizens of Campbellton on the wonderful progress this town had made in the past year. It was nearly the citizens of Camp-

ton who wished to see the town rebuilt, but the people of the surrounding country were just as anxious for its rebuilding as all recognized that its geographical position was such that the town was bound to prosper and increase until it would become a city of at least twenty-five thousand in- habitants. And in the rebuilding of the town you had the generous assistance of the Dominion govern- ment. Was it not fortunate that you had Mr. Jas. Reid as a re- presentative, a man who was friendly to and held the respect and confidence of the ministry; a man who, immediately after the fire, came to Campbellton and consulted with the citizens and then proceeded to Ottawa to lay their claims before the government. The town of Campbellton was in sore straits and her needs were many but everything that the citizens then asked for was granted, and as of this hour is due to Mr. Reid's indefatigable work and his persistent standing with the ministers of the different depart- ments. Mr. Reid has done as much for Campbellton as if he had been a resident of the town and citizens should not allow the little differ- ences which have entered the party to turn him down at this day. The present time is a very important one for Campbellton. There was before parliament when it dissolved an important measure, the Branch Line bill. When this bill becomes law the government would take over the International Railway, as well as other railways in N. B. But it is the I. N. R. we are most deeply interested in. This new road which opens up a new country will connect the Bay Chaleur country with that ninety million market we are now hear- ing so much about. He wished to ask the electors if this was the time to strike down the man who had done so much for the town and country and who could, when the next parliament meets do so much more for his constituents. He advised the citizens of Camp- bellton to stand by Mr. Reid, and return him with a larger majority than in the past—Applause.

The chairman then introduced Hon. H. R. Emmerson of Moncton. Mr. Emmerson in rising was greeted with prolonged cheering. He thanked the audience for their kind reception and the chairman for his flattering remarks in in- troducing him. He was here for two reasons, and two reasons only. First—Because of the high regard in which he held the esteemed re- presentative for Restigouche, Mr. Jas. Reid. THE CARICATURE

Its Influence on the Public Mind

A correspondent makes a timely suggestion as to the influence of caricature in turning boys from the farm. It cannot be questioned that false representations of any class have an effect on the public mind. People accept the distorted, personality in order to enjoy the joke. Those who create caricatures and make jokes have consequently a wide influence. If we leave out the important element of mirth they spread abroad, a too serious world they have a bad influence, for they give false views of classes of people and of institutions. The farmer, the Irishman, the Dutchman, the Jew, the mother-in-law, the old maid, the suffragette, the small boy, all have afforded and still afford themes for the caricaturist and the joke-maker. These draw false pictures to excite mirth, and the more clever they are, the more they give false impressions. The farmer of the melodrama, the cartoon, and the joke column has no real existence. The language of the farmer and of his family is quite as grammatical as that of the average city dweller. There is no farming type, and just as much individuality and diversity among farmers as among any other class. The virtues, the graces, the accomplishments, and the mental acquirements are quite as prominent among the rural as among the urban population. The stage Irishman and the stage Dutchman are equally non-existent, but people accept them for the jokes that can be made at their expense. They are raw material for the joke-writer and cartoonist. When a joke with the semblance of novelty comes forth it is distorted by many professional writers and applied to each every class with which the humorist takes liberties. The Jew is now a favorite peg on which jokes are hung, and he is quite as false a picture as any of the other creations. The character attributed to him is entirely misleading. While most Jews have been of inestimable value to me, the first, some advice given to me by an old gentleman who had been a teacher in the early part of the nineteenth century, was: "Be very careful what command you give, but be sure if you give one that your words are always obeyed. Be gentle but firm." Secondly, this motto has always been my guide: "Let the punishment fit the crime." If his behaviour away from home has not been satisfactory, dear him from going anywhere "until he is sure that he can be trusted by people of whom his mother may be proud." On the other hand, if his manners are pleasing allow him some special privilege, "because you were so proud of him the last time he accompanied you," etc.

TRAINING THE CHILD
"Let the Punishment Fit the Crime" I have had a large and varied experience in dealing with children, both as a teacher and as a mother. Two rules, which I have followed closely have been of inestimable value to me. The first, some advice given to me by an old gentleman who had been a teacher in the early part of the nineteenth century, was: "Be very careful what command you give, but be sure if you give one that your words are always obeyed. Be gentle but firm." Secondly, this motto has always been my guide: "Let the punishment fit the crime." A punishment a child deserves and feels as a direct consequence of his actions is always more effective than one he feels is an injustice to him. Vice versa, the same system should be carried out in regard to rewards for good conduct. If he is angry let him stay by himself until he is in a peaceful state of mind and to associate with other people. If his behaviour away from home has not been satisfactory, dear him from going anywhere "until he is sure that he can be trusted by people of whom his mother may be proud." On the other hand, if his manners are pleasing allow him some special privilege, "because you were so proud of him the last time he accompanied you," etc.

Catching Monkeys

When he once gets inside, he gets his hands full of delicious, dainty meat, and his hand is naturally wider in this act than when it entered. Finding his hand will not come out, the monkey chatters and scolds, plainly showing his indignation at the way he has been trapped, but never thinks of loosening his hold on the coconut and withdrawing his hand as easily as he puts it in. There he stands, an angry monkey, until the man who set the coconut trap comes and takes him captive.
