## CONVENTION AT DALHOUSIE, N. B.

Plans Made for Entertainment of American Press Men Here in June.

Dalhousie, Feb. 18.—Your correspondent is now in a position to state that as a result of correspondence between C. B. Allen, Secretary of the New Brunswick Tourist Association, St. John, N. B., the Campbellton Board of Trade, Mr. R. H. Desj., of the Inch Arran Hotel, Dalhousie and with the Vice President for the County of Restigouche for the "All New Brunswick" Tourist, Game and Resources Association, the date for the meeting of the convention has been changed, to give an opportunity to entertain for a few hours at the Inch Arran Hotel, the party which will consist of over two hundred Representatives of the National Press Association, representing eleven thousand publications, in this country in June. The party will arrive in Campbellton on the 16th June, will see the great progress the town is making, and the Campbellton people will provide the automobiles to take the party to Dalhousie, where the convention of the "All New Brunswick" Tourist, Game and Resources Association, will be in session.

It is proposed to give the visitors an entertainment in the way of a "Clambake" or something of that kind. Mr. W. H. Allen has volunteered to supply all the fresh salmon necessary for the crowd.

As a great many ladies will accompany their husbands to the Inch Arran Hotel, during the two days convention, the guests can be entertained the first evening to a dance. After the departure of the Representatives of the National Press Association, the convention will settle down to business, closing with a banquet to take place on the evening of June 17th, when His Honor the Lieutenant Governor of N. B., Premier Foster, leader of the opposition, Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works and other prominent men will be present.

This will be an opportunity and we should be able to make quite an event of the convention, to get a large amount of publicity for New Brunswick.

Speaking with the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town Council of Dalhousie, your correspondent is able to say that the town of Dalhousie will co-operate in every way possible with Campbellton and the rest of the county to make the convention a success. One member of the council said it will furnish a good reason to order a thorough clean up of the town early in the spring, the benefit of a permanent system of sidewalks etc.

Apart from the fact that this year will see a great number of prominent people assemble in the town of Restigouche Co., on the 16th and 17th of June, and that this exceptional event will see the beginning of an era of good understanding among our citizens for the reconstruction of our town following the great war, and the prominent part Dalhousie took in it, we must also look forward to the celebration of the hundredth anniversary of the town of Dalhousie, which according to date given by Margaret Grant MacWhirter in her book "Treasure Trove in Gaspe" The Bledes Chaleurs should be celebrated in 1926. During the year 1826 the town was named after its founder, Lord Dalhousie, and laid out in town lots.


## JACQUET RIVER.

## SALVAGE CORPS NOW AUTHORIZED

Will Form Necessary Corps At Once—More Salary Increases Granted

A meeting of the town council was held last evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Councillors Campbell, McKay, Dickie, Ingram, Devereaux, Jamieson, Matthews.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Reports of different departments were read and accounts ordered paid. A communication was read from the manager of the Electric Light recommending that Jas. Robb's salary be increased to \$120.00, and Ben Larsen's be increased to \$105.00.

Coun. McKay moved that each of the employees of electric light station be given an increase of \$10.00 per month. This gives Jas. Robinson \$115.00, Ben Larsen \$100.00, J. Nelson, \$100.00 and F. Dolman, \$100.00 per month.

The matter of increasing the number of firemen was taken up. A discussion on the necessity for a salvage corps resulted from the above. Coun. Matthews moved that the necessity of such a corps, but he thought the need of eleven more firemen for the brigade was more urgent.

Coun. Matthews moved that the Fire Brigade be increased by eleven men, and that the grant be increased to \$1300 per year.—Carried.

Coun. McKay moved that the Chief of the Fire Department be authorized to organize a salvage corps in connection of the Fire Department and when completed submit a list of the men and the equipment required.—Carried.

The matter of the taking over of the Carquet & Gulf Shore railway by the Canadian National Railways was taken up.

Coun. Devereaux favored the project. Coun. Dickie said that any one who has ever passed through the section served by this railway would realize the need of a good service to help develop the country. He would favor passing a resolution in favor of the taking over of the railway.—Carried.

Coun. Devereaux moved that the Council be authorized to draft and pass a resolution favoring the taking over of the Carquet & Gulf Shore railway.—Carried.

## BATHURST WINS BONSPIEL CUP

Made Largest Score and Won Three Times—The Scores.

The Seventh Annual North Shore Curling Bonspiel was held here last Thursday and Friday and created much interest. Bathurst was the winner, and it being the third win for that club they carried home the handsome cup with them.

The First North Shore Bonspiel was held in Chatham in Feb. 1914, between Campbellton, Bathurst, Newcastle and Chatham Curling Clubs, and was won by Campbellton.

The Second Bonspiel was held in Campbellton in Feb. 1915. This year the Dalhousie Curling club was represented. The Bonspiel was won by Campbellton.

The Third Bonspiel was held in Newcastle in Feb. 1916, between the same 4 clubs, and was again won by Campbellton. It was decided that commencing with the 1919 Bonspiel the club gaining the Bonspiel Trophy three times should own it. Campbellton agreed that her victories of 1914 and 1915 would not count in the Trophy contest.

The Fourth Bonspiel was held in Dalhousie in Feb. 1917. This year the "Wood" Schedule of play was adopted for the first time. Campbellton won the Bonspiel with a score of 228 Points.

The Fifth Bonspiel was held in Bathurst in 1918. It was also played on the "Wood" Schedule and was won by Bathurst with a score of 210 Points.

The Sixth Bonspiel was held at Chatham in 1919, Bathurst again winning with a score of 202.

The Seventh Bonspiel at Campbellton, Bathurst winning by a score of 255.

## DELEGATION WILL GO TO OTTAWA

Will Press Necessity for Bridge on Quebec and Dominion Governments.

One of the most enthusiastic meetings held here in recent years was that of Tuesday evening. Besides a large attendance of local members there were many visitors from the County of Bonaventure.

The committee having in charge the matter of the proposed bridge reported and their report was received, adopted and the committee discharged.

A hearty vote of thanks was unanimously passed in recognition of a highway bridge connecting Cross Point with Campbellton.

After some further discussion it was decided to send a delegation of five from the Campbellton Board of Trade to act in conjunction with a delegation from the County of Bonaventure, to proceed to Quebec and Ottawa to interview the Quebec and Ottawa governments and press for the erection of a bridge to connect the County of Bonaventure at Cross Point with Campbellton.

## CHURCHES DRIVE WAS SUCCESSFUL

All Churches in Forward Movement Drive Show Generous Response.

The Forward Movement drive for funds which came to an end last Saturday night was very successful. St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church about doubled its objective, which was \$4000.00. The amount reported Sunday was \$7500.00 with some pledges yet to come in.

The Methodist objective for the church debt was \$4150.00. While this amount was not quite reached Saturday evening, \$3300 having been pledged for this purpose and the Forward Movement, it is confidently expected that the balance will be pledged in the course of the next week or two.

The members of the Baptist congregation who in November last raised sufficient money to pay off the debt on their Church, contributed to the Forward Movement up to Sunday night \$2440.50. This Church allotment for the Forward Movement was \$2900.

The members of the Anglican Church have also oversubscribed their allotment which was \$1500, having raised up until Monday night \$1611, and this amount will be increased somewhat by Sunday next.

**BRIDGE PROSPECTS LOOK BRIGHTER**

Assurance That New Brunswick Government Will Assist.

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Previous to the meeting Hon. Mr. Veniot met the members of the committee which has charge of the bridge matter and discussed the matter very thoroughly, getting all the information possible.

When the meeting was called to order by President D. Murray of the Board of Trade, Mr. M. A. Kelly introduced Hon. Mr. Veniot.

Mr. Veniot said he was very glad to meet so many citizens of Campbellton and talk over the matter of a bridge connecting Campbellton with the Quebec county of Bonaventure. He realized this was a very important undertaking and it had his full interest and would have his co-operation.

He pointed out that the united efforts of all should be to impress the Dominion government with the necessity for the construction of this bridge, and felt sure that when the Dominion government gave its answer and if it was favorable, New Brunswick would do what was right.

Mr. A. T. LeBlanc, M. P. P., brought up the matter of a proposed highway from Keddieville to Campbellton.

Hon. Mr. Veniot said that his department had just prepared a map showing this road, and said that it had been forwarded to Ottawa for the approval of the Dominion government. If it is approved and forty per cent of Dominion money is available a standard grade highway will be completed.

Other matters were discussed and the meeting adjourned. Citizens who attended are very enthusiastic and are taking steps to set the matter before the Dominion government, and interest the Quebec government.

Advice from Federal Agricultural Dept.

Prime red clover seed was quoted at \$38.50 and, because of exchange contact of the 6th instant, Toronto prices then ranged about \$3.00 per bushel in advance of Toledo prices. Clover seed that would grade "Prime" on the Toledo market could be bought in Toronto at \$38.50 and, because of exchange conditions, delivered to United States ports at approximately \$33.00 per bushel or about \$2.50 less than the Toledo price. The money situation, short supplies, and an earlier demand in the United States will explain the heavy exports of clover seed.

A GOOD SUGGESTION.  
At the Curlers banquet held last Thursday night Mr. E. P. McKay of Bathurst made the remark that if the business interests of the North Shore would only get together and fraternize as the curlers did each year, what a power it would be for the business advancement of this section of New Brunswick. Other speakers followed in the lead and the suggestion was made that a North Shore Board of Trade Commercial Club or some other organization be formed having for its object the promotion of North Shore interests.

The suggestion is a good one and should not be thrown in the discard.

The average Canadian citizen who is shrewdly attending to his own business and sticking to his job need not worry a great deal about the intricacies of exchange. This perplexing condition is bound to right itself in time, if only good common sense is used and some care taken to patronize home production.

For the large bulk of Canadian manufactured goods the raw materials are to be found at home. In fact, we own a surplus of raw materials—such as pulpwood—that the United States would be only too glad to get. If "the shoemaker sticks to his last" and production in Canada is given the boost it requires; and if Canadians buy home-made goods, it may not be so long till the exchange shoe is on the other foot—invested, in the Canadian Courier.

HIGH ENTHUSIASM ON LOW PAY.  
More pay for teachers is inevitable—or there will soon be no teachers. Men and women don't go into teaching merely for the love of it. As a rule they are willing to put up with the discipline and the nervous strain of trying to straighten out the kinds of heredity and home environment because they believe in their work as a mission. But the missionary must be paid. The teacher has to be a citizen. The teacher who has to dress poorly, live in inferior boarding houses and abstain from amusements is in no frame of mind to love her work, without which success is impossible. Of all vocations in the world teaching requires the most constant enthusiasm. A teacher can't be enthusiastic very long on less pay than is given to the average mechanic. Paying teachers less than mechanical wages will soon produce mechanical teaching or none at all. If the teachers strike, God help us. We might worry along without luxuries and pay high prices for necessities, but if we have to get along without good teaching we may as well shut up the parliament shops and the churches—Canadian Courier.

JUST WHAT WAS SAID 54 YEARS AGO

The Girl of One Period Quite Like That of Any Other Period.

A London correspondent discovers a rollicking satire upon people of to-day, that is those of us who gravely shake our heads as we contemplate the manners and dress of many young folk of the day. The correspondent finds that in The Saturday Review of fifty years ago the following article was printed: "The girl of the period is a creature who dyes her hair and paints her face as the first articles of her personal religion—a creature whose sole idea of life is fun, whose sole aim is unbounded luxury, and whose dress is the chief object of such thought and intellect as she possesses. Her main endeavor is to outlive her neighbors in the 'extravagance of fashion.' If a sensible fashion lifts the gown out of the mud she raises hers.

"All men whose opinion is worth having prefer the simple and genuine girl of the past, with her tender little ways and pretty bashful modesties, to this loud and rampant modernization, with her false red hair and painted skin, talking slang as glibly as a man, and by preference leading the conversation to doubtful subjects. All we can do is to wait patiently until the national madness has passed out and women have come back again to the old English idea."

Not a few writers and private talkers have said things to the same effect as the foregoing. We hear it every day and hearing it we may accept it as a scathing indictment of the new girl, just as our forbears accepted the foregoing article as a just indictment of the girls of a half century ago.





Deceased is survived by his parents, six brothers and four sisters all being present at the funeral except Andrew in Vancouver and Mrs. Wm. England in Ontario.


The remains were brought here from Fort William for interment at Escumac and the funeral which was held on the 13th instant, was largely attended.
