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CONVENTION AT DALHOUSIE, N. B.

Plans Made for Entertainment of American Press Men Here in June.

Dalhousie, Feb. 18.—Your correspondent is now in a position to state that as a result of correspondence between C. B. Allen, Secretary of "The New Brunswick Tourist Association", St. John, N. B., the Campbellton Board of Trade, Mr. R. H. Dean, of The Inch Arran Hotel, Dalhousie and with the Vice President for the County of Restigouche for the "All New Brunswick" Tourist, Game and Resources Association, the date for the meeting of the convention has been changed, to give an opportunity to entertain for a few hours at the Inch Arran House, the party which will consist of over two hundred Representatives of the National Press Association, representing eleven thousand publications, to this country in June. The party will arrive in Campbellton on the 16th June, will see the great progress the town is making, and after the convention people will provide the automobiles to take the party to Dalhousie, where the convention of the "All New Brunswick" Tourist, Game and Resources Association, will be in session.

It is proposed to give the visitors an entertainment in the way of a "Clambake" something of that kind.

Mr. W. H. Allen has volunteered to supply all the fresh salmon necessary for the crowd.

As a great many ladies will accompany their husbands to the Inch Arran House, during the two days convention, the guests can be entertained the first evening to a dance. After the departure of the Representatives of the National Press Association, the convention will settle down to business, closing with a banquet to take place on the evening of June 17th at which His Honor the Lieutenant Governor of N. B., Premier Foster, leader of the opposition, Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works, and other prominent men will be present.

This will be an opportunity and we should be able to make quite an event of the convention to get a large amount of publicity for New Brunswick.

Speaking with the Mayor and Aldermen of the Town Council of Dalhousie, your correspondent is able to say that the town of Dalhousie will co-operate in every way possible with Campbellton and the rest of the county to make the convention a success. One member of the council said it will furnish a good reason to order a thorough clean up of the town early in the spring, the beginning of a permanent system of sidewalks etc.

Apart from the fact that this year will see a great number of prominent people assemble in the shiretown of Restigouche Co., on the 16th and 17th of June, and that this exceptional event will see the beginning of an era of good understanding among citizens for the reconstruction of our town following the great war, and the prominent part Dalhousie took in it, we must also look forward to the celebration of the hundredth anniversary of the town of Dalhousie, which according to date given by Margaret Grant MacWhirter in her book "Treasure Trove in Gaspe" The Buis des Chaleurs should be celebrated in 1926. During the year 1826 the town was named after its founder, Lord Dalhousie, and laid out in town lots.

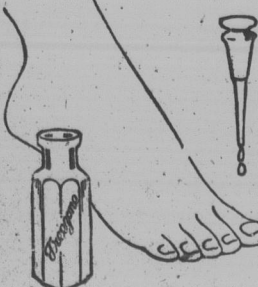
JACQUET RIVER.

SALVAGE CORPS NOW AUTHORIZED

Will Form Necessary Corps At Once—More Salary Increases Granted

A meeting of the town council was held last evening. His Worship Mayor Murray presiding. There were present Councillors Campbell, McKay, Dickie, Ingram, Devereaux, Jamieson, Matthews.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Reports of different departments were read and accounts ordered paid.

A communication was read from the manager of the Electric Light recommending that Jas. Roby's salary be increased to \$120.00, and Ben Larsen's be increased to \$105.00.

Coun. McKay moved that each of the employees of electric light station be given an increase of \$10.00 per month. This gives Jas. Robinson \$115.00, Ben Larsen \$100.00, J. Nelson \$100.00 and F. Delman \$100.00 per month.

The matter of increasing the number of firemen was taken up.

A discussion on the necessity for a salvage corps resulted from the above.

Coun. Matthews moved that the necessity of such a corps, but he thought the need of eleven more firemen for the brigade was more urgent.

Coun. McKay moved that the Fire Brigade be increased by eleven men, and that the grant be increased to \$1300 per year—Carried.

Coun. Matthews moved that the Chief of the Fire Department be authorized to organize a salvage corps in connection of the Fire Department and when completed submit a list of the men and the equipment required.

The matter of the taking over of the Carleton Place railway by the Canadian National Railways was taken up.

Coun. Devereaux favored the project. Coun. Dickie said that any one who has ever passed through the section served by this railway would realize the need of a good service to help develop the country. He would favor passing a resolution in favor of the taking over of the railway.

Coun. Devereaux moved that the Council be authorized to draft and pass a resolution favoring the taking over of the Carleton Place railway—Carried.

Coun. Ingram asked that the usual resolution in reference to overdraft be passed, and that the Fire Department bonds be printed and deposited with the bank as collateral security.

The council passed the necessary motion.

Coun. Dickie said that the motor was shipped on the 12th and the pump on the 14th by express and should be here any day now.

Coun. McKay moved that His Worship be the official delegate of the Town on the delegation which is going to Quebec and Ottawa in reference to the pressing of bridge matter—Carried.

Coun. McKay spoke of the necessity of a change in legislation in reference to exemptions granted to industries.

He favored a vote of the people on all such matters. He also thought that a change in the time of civic elections should be made. As it was now the retiring council had control of the expenditure four months of the year. He favored the election early in January.

Coun. McKay gave notice that he would bring this matter up at the next meeting.

The council then adjourned.

BATHURST WINS BONSPIEL CUP

Made Largest Score and Won Three Times—The Scores.

The Seventh Annual North Shore Curling Bonspiel was held here last Thursday and Friday and created much interest. Bathurst was the winner, and it being the third win for that club they carried home the handsome cup with them.

The First North Shore Bonspiel was held in Chatham in Feb. 1914, between Campbellton, Bathurst, Newcastle and Chatham Curling Clubs, and was won by Campbellton.

The Second Bonspiel was held in Campbellton in Feb. 1915. This year the Dalhousie Curling club was represented. The Bonspiel was won by Campbellton.

The Third Bonspiel was held in Newcastle in Feb. 1916, between the same 5 clubs, and was again won by Campbellton. It was decided that commencing with the 1919 Bonspiel the club gaining the Bonspiel Trophy three times should own it. Campbellton agreed that her victories of 1914 and 1915 would not count in the Trophy contest.

The Fourth Bonspiel was held in Dalhousie in Feb. 1917. This year the "Wood" Schedule of play was adopted for the first time. Campbellton won the Bonspiel with a score of 228 Points.

The Fifth Bonspiel was held in Bathurst in 1918. It was also played on the "Wood" Schedule and was won by Bathurst with a score of 210 Points.

The Sixth Bonspiel was held at Chatham in 1919, Bathurst again winning with a score of 202.

The Seventh Bonspiel at Campbellton, Bathurst winning by a score of 255.

Thursday evening the visiting curlers and friends were entertained by the Campbellton citizens to a banquet in the Oddfellows hall. The banquet was served by the Ladies Aid of the Soldiers Memorial Hospital and was a most enjoyable one. After a short programme of music, speeches, etc., was rendered.

Bathurst's big lead in the first day's bonspiel was very little cut down by Campbellton in the second day though there were great tussles, whenever their rinks met or when they attempted to increase their score at the expense of some other club. Among the noteworthy features of the first day was Bathurst's record score of 32 to 4 over Dalhousie and Wran's win of 24 to 5 over the same club.

In the second day McKnight of Newcastle downed Wran to 5 Wran beat McKay 17 to 5 and McKay beat McKnight 13 to 8. A. B. McKinnon's rink held down McKay 11 to 1, showing what fine curling the Dalhousie rinks were doing the second day.

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DELEGATION WILL GO TO OTTAWA

Will Press Necessity for Bridge on Quebec and Dominion Governments.

One of the most enthusiastic meetings held here in recent years was that of Tuesday evening. Besides a large attendance of local members there were many visitors from the County of Bonaventure.

The committee having in charge the matter of the proposed bridge reported and their report was received and adopted and the committee discharged. A hearty vote of thanks was unanimously passed in recognition of the manner in which they had successfully performed their duties.

A number of the visitors from Bonaventure spoke of the necessity for a highway bridge connecting Gros Point with Campbellton.

After some further discussion it was decided to send a delegation of five from the Campbellton Board of Trade to act in conjunction with a delegation from the County of Bonaventure, proceed to Quebec and Ottawa to interview the Quebec and Ottawa governments and press for the erection of a bridge to connect the County of Bonaventure at Gros Point with Campbellton.

The delegates were to represent as far as possible the different organizations and interests of the district and is made up as follows:

D. Champoux, W. H. Miller, Coun. W. D. Duncan, D. A. Stewart and Mayor Murray.

The Town Council was invited to send a delegation as was any other organization interested.

The meeting then adjourned.

BRIDGE PROSPECTS LOOK BRIGHTER

Assurance That New Brunswick Government Will Assist.

An important conference with Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works for the Province of New Brunswick was held at the St. Louis Hotel, Friday evening at which were a very representative number of citizens.

Previous to the meeting Hon. Mr. Veniot met the members of the committee which has charge of the bridge matter and discussed the matter very thoroughly, getting all the information possible.

When the meeting was called to order by President D. Murray of the Board of Trade, Mr. M. A. Kelly introduced Hon. Mr. Veniot.

Mr. Veniot said he was very glad to meet so many citizens of Campbellton and talk over the matter of a bridge connecting Campbellton with the Quebec county of Bonaventure. He realized this was a very important undertaking and it had his full attention and would have his co-operation.

He pointed out that the united efforts of all should be to impress the Dominion government with the necessity for the construction of this bridge, and felt sure that when the Dominion government gave its answer and if it was favorable, New Brunswick would do what was right.

Mr. A. T. LeBlanc, M. P. P., brought up the matter of a proposed highway from Keddieville to Campbellton.

Hon. Mr. Veniot said that his department had just prepared a map showing this road, and had been forwarded to Ottawa for the approval of the Dominion government.

If it is approved and forty per cent of Dominion money is available a standard grade highway will be commenced.

Other matters were discussed and the meeting adjourned. Citizens who attended are very enthusiastic and are taking steps to set the matter before the Dominion government and interest the Quebec government.

CHURCHILL STANCES HIS STATEMENT
Repeats That Labor is Unfit to Govern

DUNDEE, Scotland, Feb. 16.—Winston Churchill, the secretary of war, in addressing his constituents, declared that labor was unfit to govern the nation. This was a repetition of the statement he made recently which aroused a furor in the press and a storm of indignation among the labor interests.

In referring to his policy toward Russia, which has been the object of strong criticism, Mr. Churchill said: "I never believed in sending British troops to Russia, but I have done everything in my power to help the local anti-Bolshevik forces. It was a matter of honor that we supply them with arms and equipment, but each and all of the great allied powers will rue the fact that they could not take more decided united action to crush the Bolshevik peril at its heart before it had grown too strong."

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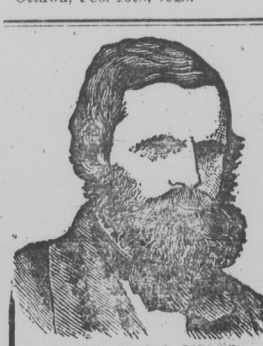
BUY RED CLOVER SEED EARLY

Advice from Federal Agricultural Dept.

Prime red clover seed was quoted at \$38.50 and, because of exchange contract of the 6th instant, Toronto prices then ranged about \$3.00 per bushel in advance of Toledo prices. Clover seed that would grade "Prime" on the Toledo market could be bought in Toronto at \$38.50 and, because of exchange conditions, delivered to United States ports at approximately \$38.00 per bushel or about \$2.50 less than the Toledo price. The money situation, short supplies, and an earlier demand in the United States will explain the heavy exports of clover seed.

The price of red clover seed has advanced almost \$14.00 per bushel on the Toledo market since May last. The world supply will not be sufficient to meet normal requirements. In these circumstances, Canadian farmers who delay the purchase of their red clover seed requirements until seeding time may be unable to obtain supplies at any price.

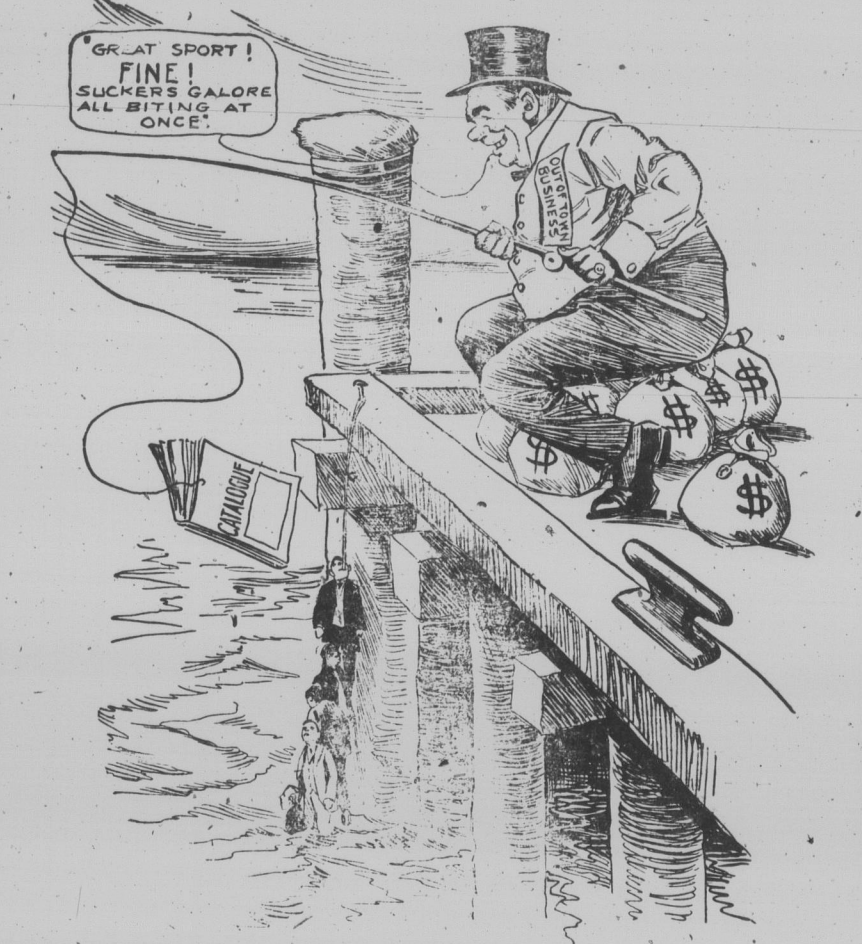

JUST WHAT WAS

SAID 50 YEARS AGO

The correspondent finds that in The Saturday Review of fifty years ago the following article was printed: "The girl of the period is a creature who dyes her hair and paints her face as the first articles of her personal religion—a creature whose sole idea of life is fun, whose sole aim is unbounded luxury, and whose dress is the chief object of such thought and intellect as she possesses. Her main endeavor is to outlive her neighbors in the extravagance of fashion. If a sensible fashion lifts the gown out of the mud she raises hers."

"All men whose opinion is worth having prefer the simple and genuine girl of the past, with her tender little ways and pretty bashful modesties, to this loud and rampant modernization, with her false red hair and painted skin, talking along as glibly as a man, and by preference leading the conversation to doubtful subjects. 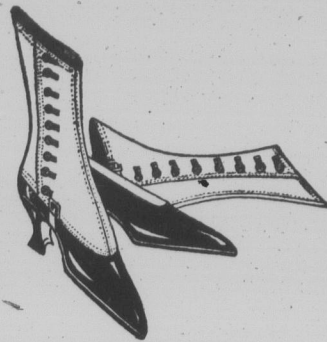

Fabien Bugeand, M. L. A. Asks That Export be Prohibited.

Quebec, Feb. 14.—Fabien Bugeand, member for Bonaventure, moved in the assembly last night that the government prohibit the export of manufactured pulpwood to the other provinces, and if this was not done to place a royalty or a duty on such export. The motion was supported by W. R. McDonald, member for Pontiac.

Hon. Honore Mercier, minister of crown lands, said that many other provinces were supplied with raw materials by the Province of Quebec. He was not ready to say what would be done in the future in this connection, but after a careful survey and study of the situation the government would take proper action to protect the interests of this province.
