Words cannot express my feelings towards you, for I value it more than you can imagine. I feel very proud of it, for anything from or with Canada on it is almost beyond value over here. It is nice to know that my old friends and schoolmates still remember me. It is also nice to realize that our good friends back home are so thoughtful, and in so many different ways doing their utmost to make our time pass quickly and make us as happy as possible during our many trials.

I do not think that a good many realize fully what is taking place over here, but you would be surprised if you were to drop into our camp and see the good spirits of the boys. There are many hundreds who now have been laid low and many more who will never again see our old Canadian shores, but they all take it as a matter of course, and through all that I have been I have never heard a soldier nummer or complain.

But our great desire is for the war to cease and to be back once more in Canada with our so many proven friends.





Along that route arms and ammunition were carried to the Turks defending the Dardanelles
