WINTERING BEES OUTSIDE.

Experiments Show Advantages Over Cellar Wintering.

Experiments in wintering bees outside, placing four colonies together in a case, were started at the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, in the winter of 1912-13, and have been continued every year since. Compared with bees wintered in the cellar, the outdoor-wintered bees have, on the average, come out in spring in better condition, judged by the proportion of colonies found to be living in the spring and the number of combs in each hive found to be covered by bees at the first examination, made towards the end of April.



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
