The NewSoundland Dispute.

PARIS, Nov. 4.—In an interview in regard to the dispute between France and Freat Britain concerning the NewFoundland fisheries M. Deloncle, a member of the Chamber of Downlies, suggested as a basic suggested. Chamber of Deputies, suggested as a basis for a settlement of the dispute that Eng-land should pay an indemnity to the French land should pay an indemnity to the French fishermen and recognize the rights of French fishermen on the Grand Banks to buy and sell bate in all the ports of Newfoundland. He also suggested that England should give France territorial compensation in Africa in return for the surrender by France of her rights on the French shore of Newfoundland, France retaining only her privileges on the Grand Banks, which privileges are held in convenue.

IN BIRCHALL'S BEHALF.

The Efforts Making to Save the Doomed Man.

Text of the English Petition-A Suggest

Woodstock, Nov. 4.—Mrs. Birchall and Mrs. West-Jones leave for Toronto and Ottawa to-day, and on Wednesday the petition for the commutation of Birchall's entence will be presented. Mr. Dugall MacMurchy, who has returned from Montreal, reports that there is a strong feeling there in favor of commutation.

THE JAIL REQUILATIONS.

Notwithstanding the direction of the Inspector of Prisons that Birchall's mail should pass through the hands of the Crown sttorney instead of the jailer, the prisoner's lettere are still put in the jail box. The postmaster declares that so long as Birchall's letters are directed to the jail he has no power to do otherwise, until he receives instructions from the Postoffice Department at Ottawa.

HEARD THE EVIDENCE BY TELEPHONE. A local paper publishes a statement to the effect that Alice Smith and Ellen Fallon, two important witnesses at the trial, heard a portion of the evidence by telephone before being called. The steek fought badly for the fighters, and while Seccato was attempting to kill the third bull he was caught on its horns, spun as though he was a top, and tossed in the air. He fell to the ground, and was again gored by the infuriated animal. He was taken from the arena. Later he entered the ring, but was not permitted to fight, and while restiring dropped in a fair. It was found he had three deep wounds, which it is believed will be fatal.

Five more bulls were let in the arena, but none lought well. The spectators became enraged and fights were attred among the spectators. Pieces of furniture were thrown into the ring, which started a general demolition of the plaza. After all the chairs had been pitohed into the arena the railings were wrenched off and thrown on the hands of the police. The bull fighters escaped and sought safety in the street. The police endeavored to quiet the tunnile and used their clubs freely, but their efforts proved tutile.

At the commencement of the disorder, women, children and men pushed into the passageways to escape to the street, choking them and causing a partial panie, in which, fortunately, nobody was lurt. An American tourist ran over the heads of the others shouting there was another revolution in Mexico, to the great amusement of the natives. American ladies were carried out in a fainting condition. The cry went up, "Give back out money, we won't be swindled!" The judges present promised to return the money, and to-day it is being refunded. The plaza was completely wrecked.



VOICES OF THE PEOPLE.

The Ball Company's Taxes.

To the Editor of the Adventures:

My attention has been called to a letter in your issue of Saturday last, signed "Taxpayer," in reference to the electric light question and the Ball Company, which is incorrect and misleading. It is true that the Ball Company appealed to the Court of Revision against their assessment for the year on personal property, but there was no sworn valuation of their plant by the company or any of its officers. They were assessed this year on personal property for \$6,000 more than in the year 1889, and the only addition since their former assessment was for extensions which the city asked for on a short contract, and the declaration made on behalf of the company was that the addition to personal property on the streets for extending public lighting did not cost a sum exceeding \$1,600, and the court reduced the amount on personal property \$5,000. In addition to this, I will say that the public lights of the Ball Company only amounted to 77, while the offer of that company lately made to the city is for 184 lights, which requires a large extension to buildings, plant, power and circuits. I am also informed that the Ball Company (like all other companies) have a patrol to look after the lights during the night time, but they do not employ or require three or four men for that purpose as stated in Taxpayer's letter, and in their offer they propose to agree to run the lights for a certain sum per annum, which shows a large saving to the city of about \$8,600 per year, which is worth considering.
