Perils of the Czar.

St. Petersburg, April 26.—Many rumors are current regarding the cause of the sudden stopping of the imperial train while one route to the Crimea and the resulting fright by which the Czar was made ill. One rumor is to the effect that thousands of peasants living in villages near Charkoff laid themselves upon the railway track in order to stop the Czar's train and thus have an opportunity to present to the Czar a petition against certain local abuses. A conflict ensued, it is said, between the train guards and the peasants, and the general result was that 42 peasants and 15 soldiers were killed in the fight or crushed by the train.

SWEPT BY FIRE.

Destruction of the Knitting Mill at Merritton.

MERRITTON, April 26.—The Merritton knitting mill was discovered on fire about 3 o'clock, and the building and contents were destroyed. Flying cinders crossed the old Welland Canal, and the large frame residence of James Hamilton was badly damaged by fire and water. The knitting mill and contents are a total loss. The mill was owned by the Bank of Toronte, who lose \$18,000 on the building and machinery and have \$8,200 insurance. It was operated by S. Taylor & Son, who lose 50 tons of machinery and about \$3,000 on raw material and manufactured goods; partially insured. About 50 hands are thrown out of employment.

Cyclones, Hail Storms and a Water-

Do Dreadful Damage Across the Border.

Scores of Persons Fall Victims to the Fury of the Gales—The Damage to Property Beyond

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 26.—A terrific cyclone almost wiped out of existence the little town of Jenson, in Sebastian county, last night. Nine buildings were demolshed, four freight cars were blown from the track and a portion of the Frisco depot was carried away. One man and a child were seriously injured.

MOGRES, O. T., April 26.—The country west and southwest of here was swept by a terrible cyclone at 7:30 last evening. Though the cyclone lasted but a minute or two, the wreck left in its wake was terrible, A path half a mile in width and eight miles long was laid waste.

Business is suspended, and everybody able to render any assistance to the poor unfortunates or towards removing the dead are out searching along the track of the cyclone. People are frenzied, and cannot give any estimate of their loss, and knowing nothing except to care for the dead and injured.

A FAMILY WIPED OUT.

CLADSTONE SHOT AT!

Sensational Story in the Pall Mall Gazette.

Its Accuracy Doubted, However-Probable Explanation of the Report

London, April 27.—The Pall Mall Gazette to-day contains a most sensational article headed "Rumors of an attempt to shoot Gladstone." The paper states that the alleged attempt upon the Prime Minister's life was made while Mr. Gladstone was walking through St. James' Park at midnight last night on his way to his home in Downing strest. The accuracy of the report of the Pall Mall Gazette is doubted. It is probable the story is based upon the fact that a man who is now in custody on the charge of firing a revolver on a thoroughfare, had in one of his pockets a note book containing a number of entries detailing the recent movements of Mr. Gladstone. The prisoner will be arrafgned shortly, and his object in making these entries will be learned, if possible. He spoke for two consecutive hours with all the vigor of youthful manhood before one of the most distinguished audiences that ever assembled in the House of Commons.

He has no standing armies to enforce his mandates like temperal sovereigns. He has no police or civil magistrates to coerce refractory subjects. He has no prisons in which to confine the violators of the law. He has recourse only to moral suasion and spiritual penaltics for the maintenance of the Gospel dispensation. The only weapon that he wields it the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. Leo XIII. can say what Gregory XVI. said long before him, that nowhere is his authority more respected than in the his authority more respected than in the United States."

OTTAWA Trades and Labor Council at its monthly meeting last night adopted a resolution declaring strongly in favor of the abolition of the present protective system. and of raising the revenues needed by the Government by direct taxation upon land values. Toronto, Hamilton and Ottawa representative workingmen have thus been heard in opposition to the high tax policy. The large majority of the farmers are opposed to it. TRADE OF THE WEEK

The universal complaint among whole sale men in this city is that business is backward because of the late spring and cold, raw weather. While these conditions continue, that briskness in trade which is necessary to set the wheels of industry humming is wanting. This is especially the case with drygoods, the movement in which is so much controlled by the weather. One feature in the drygoods business worthy of note is that relating to cotton. The short crop of this commodity last year enabled all who grew cotton to get a fair price for it, and a better price for the seed. Those prices stimulated planters, and in Louisiana they are at work with a will. The acreage along the Mississippi River, Yazoo River and the Louisville and New Orleans Railroad will be fully 60 per cent. greater than last season and about 10 per cent. greater than the season of 1891-92. The lands along the Mississippi River and portions of the Yazoo and the railroad named, which were overflowed last season, will go to cotton this year. These indications are of less importance to us in Canada than they are to the people of Great Britain or the United The cotton output of Canada being under the control of a combine is little influenced by the condition of the crop over the border, and the price charged to wholesalers remains pretty much the same whether the supply of raw cotton is large or small.

The Canadian wool market has not presented a very encouraging aspect for several years, and from present indications this season will be no better than its prede-It will be June before the new clip will be on the market. Prices are stationary, 16 and 17 cents per pound being realized on fleece wool. The decrease in price in wool has been general in this part of the country, and is attributed by some dealers to the fact of so many farmers going out of sheep raising in avor of the dairying industry, thus causing a lack of variety in the supplies; but probably the chief cause is the failure of the farmers to get their output placed upon the United States market, where the prices are considerably higher than here, without paying a high enstoms tax. In the British markets the price of wool has advanced 10 per cent. on the low grades and 5 per cent. on the fine grades.

The most important news in hardward circles is the announcement that the binder twine manufacturers, at their meeting on Wednesday, resolved to fix the price of their commodity for the ensuing season at 25 per cent, less than last year. This is a great object lesson. The reduction is attributable to three prime causes: (1), the competition from the manufactory in the Central Prison, set up for the relief of the farming community from the combine; (2) the successful running of the Patron of Industry factory at Brantford; and (3) the reduction of the tariff on the commodity by $12\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. There is no change in the iron market since the decline of \$1 a ton ten days ago, but there is a brisk demand for fence wire, the late storms, which destroyed so many fences throughout the country, having verified the old saw that "it's an ill wind that blows nobody good."

The outlook is not so bright in the grocery trade as was predicted at the beginning of the month. Collections are comparatively slow, in fact they are posi-tively dull. This may possibly be accounted for on the ground that farmers are busy get ting in seed. A like dullness prevails all over the country, very little goods being on the move. April has not so far come up to the expectations that the satisfactory trade of January, February and March portended. Dull trade always causes prices to recede somewhat, and this is most notable in canned goods and soaps. Raw sugar has advanced very materially during the month, and will go higher. One-half cent is the raise so far.

Cold weather has considerably retarded the seed business during the past three weeks. The cold and damp have affected great deal of the grain now in the ground, causing it to rot. Reseeding will have to be done to a considerable extent, especially in oats and barley. The staples, clover and timothy, barley. The staples, clover and timothy, are both easier and somewhat slower. The bulk of the jobbing and wholesale trade in this rection is now about over. There is a good deal of inquiry for seed corn, and some difficulty will be experienced in securing a first-class stock. A great deal caution will be necessary in the selection of reliable seed, owing to the fact that the severe winter has killed the germinating properties of any corn not sufficiently

GREEN goods men are always trying to get the money of Canadians gullible enough to respond to their circulars which promise big return for small investment. providing of course that the season proves favorable. It hinges entirely on good pasturage, with no extended spell of dry

already signified their intention to a prominent dealer of putting in winter dairying outfits.

The backwardness of pastures has kept up the price of butter. In this market, it has been meeting with good demand at from 20 cents to 25 cents, but in New York as high as from 30 cents to 35 cents has been paid for good creamery. The result is that supplies are brought from as far off regions as the grassy slopes of California, and still the price remains high. Eggs, however, are selling at low prices, and are not likely to ad-Business in cheese is confined to small jobbing lots, the new stock offering not being of sufficient importance to indicate what the position of the market will be when the season opens next month.

The Deputy Minister of Marine, who has been on a visit to Montreal, says the shippers expect large consignments of fat cattle to arrive shortly for shipment to England. He found the cattle men very anxious that the slaughter of these animals in British ports should be done separate and apart from cargoes of cattle arriving simultaneously from the United States. As the removal of the schedule restriction from Canada cattle depends upon the estab lishment of veterinary examination of the freedom from pleuro-pneumonia, the Canadian shippers think that every precaution should be taken to prevent the lungs of the United States cattle, possibly affected with pleuro-pneumonia, being examined in mistake for those of cattle from Canada. It is to be hoped that the authorities and cattle importers will co-operate in this expect to secure the lifting of the embarge against Canadian "stockers." So far, sales of cattle in the West are slow, be cause of the absence of a strong demand for animals for shipment.

Consignments of Canadian horses hav this week been disposed of in New York at fairly remunerative prices, despite the fact that the Canadian dealers had to pay a heavy duty at the border before the animals were admitted. But the horses were well bred and in excellent condition If they had been scrubs, there would have been little or no demand for them. The British Live Stock Journal, alluding to the demand for horses in London, shows that almost the same conditions govern the trade there. It says: "Common cheap cab horses, even though they be genuin and useful, are not wanted, because the paying public give preference to a smart turnout, which must naturally include a good-looking, well-bred horse. The wearand-tear on London cab horses is enormous, and there is generally a demand for a neat, well-bred animal, even though he be blemished a little, or have an eccentricity of manner which would unsuit him for private use." Our farmers must produce good animals if they are to find any remuneration for labor in horse-breeding.

The drought on the European continent aused a flurry in the grain trade early in the week, and prices advanced in some markets, but cable advices say that whatever damage has so far resulted from the drought had been simply to the pasturage and not to the wheat crop. This view seems to be generally entertained, as prices, though fluctuating, have not materially ad-The aggregate stocks of wheat are still large, and unless the reports from wheat-growing countries get steadily worse there is not much hope of any advance in the present prices.



THE L. AND P. S. R. INSPECTION | IMMIGRATION AND ANNEXATION.

Cut Short by the Interference of the Lessees.

Engineer Jennings and Ald. Coo Have to Proceed on Foot After Reaching Maitland Street on a Hand-Car — Text of the Correspondence Between Mr. Ivey and the Mayor.

Engineer Jennings, of Toronto, Ald. Coo and four corporation laborers proceeded on a hand-car as far as Maitland street on the London and Southeastern Railway yesterday afternoon, and they purposed continuing their trip along the London and Port Stanley, with the object of inspecting the road as instructed by the L. and P. S. R. Company, but at Maitland street their explorations were suddenly interrupted. The hand-car had been procured from the Grand Trunk authorities after a request from the mayor had been refused by the L. and P. S. R. lessees. Permission was also retused to the proposed inspectors until such request had been put in writing and the lessees relieved of all responsibility in case of accident.

The mayor then sent the following letter:
"To the lessees of the London and Port

"On behalf of the Corporation of the City of London I undertake and agree that you will not be responsible for any accident or injury to Mr. Jennings or his hand-car crew in Mr. Jennings' inspection, on behalf of the city, of the London and Port Stanley Railway Line.

When the passengers on the hand-car had reached Maitiand street the receipt of the following letter put a sudden stop to their travels in that way:

Genial Gathering of the Brotherhood-Interesting Addresses and a Pleasing Programme.

There are many good citizens among us who watch the influx of large numbers of immigrants, especially those coming from the south and east of Europe, with serious alam. They think that these people having grown up under the influence of political and social institutions, customs, ways of thinking and habits of life widely different from ours, are not only utterly ignorant of the nature and working of our system of government, but presumably incapable of understand and appreciating it; that they threaten to remain an unassailable element in our population, calculated to deteriorate our social condition, and that it will, therefore be a highly dangerous experiment to endow them with political rights enabling them to take part in governing the republic, It will, indeed, hardly be denied that many of the new comers, especially those of the Latin and Slavic races, appear at first sight in a hight degree unfitted for the enjoyment and exercise of the rights and privileges of American citizenship, and that not a few of them will remain a distinctly foreign element among us as long as they live. But no candid observer will fail to recognize the fact however intractable the original immigrants may be, the process of assimilation in a large majority of cases tells very forcibly upon their children, and that the third generation is likely to be but little. If at all, distinguishable in their habits, intelligence, ways of thinking, and fitness for American citizenship from other members of the community in the same walks of life. This is the general rule. There are exceptions no doubt, but certainly not enough to put out institutions to any dangerous strain.

The assimilating is facilitated by an interesting combination of influences. The

Our people are accustomed to the use of self-government, and to the habits of order and law-abiding self-restraint, which make self-government possible. Free institutions, the protection of individual rights, submission to the legally expressed will of the majority, and government by public opinion have been found by our people to be a necessity of their existence, and as to the maintenance of these fine institutions they are naturally and instinctively conservative. A society so occupied and animated has great power of assimilation and absorption, for it is a great educator. If it does not wholly assimilate those of the original immigrants who are of the very ignorant or stupid or perverse kind, it is at least very apt to make their children, who grow up under its influence, its own. That after the absorption of foreign elements on a large scale the character of the population will not remain the same as it was before is undoubtedly true. But in the crossing of of nationalities those elements that have the greatest vitality under the surrounding circumstances, and are the most congenial to the conditions under the influences in which they live, will be the most potent force. 
