An educational campaign should be instituted, and the local physician in each district speak in turn to men and women, advising that the children in their households receive proper instruction when they have reached an age consistent with such teaching. Publicity is the great element in its prevention. Physicians should be employed to lecture in schools to boys and girls of mature age, just as they are now employed to inspect schools, and advising as to the health of the child. Courses of lectures are the best means of educating the young, and physicians are most competent to do this.

I sincerely trust that the authorities will not hesitate to formulate a mode of procedure and follow with the necessary legislation to effect a cure.

This position he has always held to be that of British Liberalism, viz., to stand for individual freedom and toleration, but to avoid a conflict of church and state. When the Church in Quebec has seemed intolerant, or inclined to exert un due influence upon the votor, or too interfering with secular affairs, Laurier has

> To quote from Mr. Skelton: "The understanding and the tolerance and good-will which understanding brings, were destined to abide for life. It was not without reason that the ruling motive of the young schoolboy's future career was to be the awakening of sympathy and harmony between the two races." (p. 6.)

Laurier is still striving to hold Canada together. He fought in 1911 and fights in 1917 Lgainst those who would disrupt the Dominion built by Sir John Macdonald and himself. Mr Skelton says again (p. 11) of Laurier's valedictors address on his graduation in law at McGill University (1864), that it stated "the need of racial harmony, the true meaning of liberty, the call for straightforward justice."
