GERMAN GOVT. MERE PUPPETS

That Monarchist Reaction is Growing.

London, March 17 .- Special dispatches om Berlin report that the suppression recent Spartacan outbreak there shown that a military and monarch-eaction is growing and overshadow-the new government. The Berlin correspondent of the Mail, who on February 27 sent a dispatch outlining plans for a monarchist uprising in Germany, has arrived in London, having left Berlin on March 14 after a residence there of three months. He reiterates the statements made in his dispatch, saying that President Ebert. Chancellor Scheidemann and Minister of War Noske are merely puppets. He declares that for the purpose of retaining power they have allowed members of the military easts to reare nembers of the military caste to reap ear as organizers of the new republi can armies.
"These men are the real governors of Germany," he says. "They make the edicts and Chancellor Scheidemann and his colleagues willingly sign them."

Destroying Spartacans.

Similar testimony is given by other correspondents in telegraphing from Berlin, some stating that the capture of the suburb of Lichtenberg has been intentionally prolonged, with a view to exterminating the Spartacans, whose treatment at the hands of government troops is said to be sharply condemned. While alleged atrocities are attributed to the Spartacans, details which are given are doubted.

Ottawa, March 17.—That the Government will meet the demands of the West for tariff reductions by a promise of a complete revision of the tariff within the next year, is a suggestion heard here this morning. A promise along these lines, it is thought by some, will be made at the caucus to be held on Thursday, at which tariff matters will be exclusively discussed. Amendments Would Rob the Municipalities of Control.







LABOR CONFERENCE **NEARLY ENDS IN ROW**

One Big Union" Idea Not Unanimous: Even Called a "Pipe-Dream."

CALGARY, March 16. The concluding stage of the inter-provincial conference was thrown into great turmoil Satur-day morning by the deliberate attempt day morning by the deliberate attempt on the part of a section of the delegates to throw "a monkey wrench" into the machinery with the object of showing that there was not by any means an unanimous opinion as to the formation of "the one big union" idea.

The fat was in the fire when one of the delegates stated that he overheard certain remarks that others of the delegates had purposely refrained from voting and were going back to their unions with the avowed intention of telling their respective members that the whole thing was but a "pipe dream."

How is the shortage of 140 millions to be made up?

At the very moment when Canada is struggling with this problem the Western Grain Growers come forward with insistent demands for:

(1) "An immediate and substantial all-round reduction of the customs tariff."

(2) Free trade with Great Britain inside of five years.

(3) Reciprocity now, and free trade later, with the United States.

These demands are apparently made in the hope and belief that, if they are granted, those making them will be relieved of a large part of what they call the "Burden of Taxation" which the tariff imposes upon them. That expectation can only be realized if the revenue raised by means of the tariff is substantially reduced. They may argue that under a lower tariff the volume of goods imported will increase, and consequently there will be no decrease in the revenue. But mark this—they want the duty removed entirely from implements, lumber, cement, oil and other articles of which they are large consumers. If the revenue is to be maintained under such a rearrangement of the tariff schedules, other classes of the people must pay what the Grain Growers will escape.

Passing to the next point, how would the Grain Growers provide for the probable shortage of 140 million dollars this year? They ask the Dominion Government to impose the following taxes:- A direct tax on unimproved lands, increased taxation on personal incomes, increased inheritance taxes and increased taxation on corporations.

Vacant land now pays taxes to the Municipalities and, in some Provinces, additional taxes to the Provincial Government. Income taxes are now paid by individuals to the Municipalities and also to the Dominion Government. Inheritance taxes are now imposed by all the Provinces, ranging in Ontario, for example, from one to twenty per cent. Corporations are now taxed as persons by Municipal Governments, Provincial Governments and the Dominion Government, and also pay special taxes to every Province for the privilege of being corporations.

Last year the tariff collected sixty-one per cent. of the total Dominion Government Revenue. Does anyone believe that the forms of taxation advocated by the Grain Growers can be increased sufficiently this year to obtain the revenue which would be lost by tariff reduction, and also the additional 140 million dollars required, without crippling industry, stifling business and throwing thousands of workers out of employment?

The United States has all the forms of taxation advocated by the Grain Growers, but still finds it necessary to maintain its customs tariff.

If the Grain Growers are to escape almost all taxation, including the great increase caused by the war, what will happen to the people who will be driven out of business through having to pay not only their own taxes but also those of the Grain Growers? Will they try to grow grain? It is more likely that they will go to the United States to get work, as other Canadians went fifty years ago, and leave a population, chiefly farmers, ever growing smaller, to bear all the taxes, ever growing greater.

Again we ask where is the extra revenue coming from?

These things should help greatly to restore economic sanity to the world at large and remove an unrest that borders dangerously on disorder in countries hitherto untouched by anarchy. A world back on the job will be too busy to follow he mischief-makers. Grave social problems must be settled, it is true, problems that reach to the roots of national life; but under conditions of normal industrial and commercial activities there will be less temptation to employ violent methods n securing that greater happiness which the masses are determined to achieve.

Much will depend on the conditions of the eague of nations which President Wilson says vill be a part of the peace agreement. It is cerain to be faulty in parts. To imagine it a sort of eaven-made constitution of the millennium is to invite a great disappointment when the detailed covenant is made public. If, however, in the nain, broad principles of the pact it is clear that unselfish desire to end strife and promote general appiness is the intention, we believe the people cill overlook the weak spots and give it heartiest upport at least until it has received a fair trial.

A statue that materializes a noble sentiment of heroism is good to look upon. The South African statue in Victoria Park is one of the best, yet when the spirit of comradeship may be crystallized and kept alive among thousands of men who served side by side, it is infinitely better that they should meet in a hall worthy of their service and the service of those who remain in France. Let memorial halls be built first! The statues will follow as a matter of course.

Save Time Money Labor

WHATEVER speeds up traffic must be a real economy. Whatever delays traffic must always involve waste of time and effort. He sold at his wayside booth last summer among other fruits, 700 baskets of cherries at an average price of \$4.60 per basket, a total of \$1,120, for cherries alone. Had he shipped those 700 baskets to Toronto (as he had to do before the highway was built), he would have had to reckon with the following items:

Commission to commission house (121/2 Cartage at city end (1c. per basket)... Hauling from farm to railroad.....

The \$189 which he saved by selling his cherries at his wayside booth represents an extra profit of \$189 on cherries alone.
