Col. Matheson's First Budget.

One criticism that may fairly be passed upon Col. Matheson's budget address is that facts and logic have been sacrificed to a false idea of consistency. The attempt to reconcile the former position of Col. Matheson, as financial critic of the Opposition, with his present position as Provincial Treasurer, was ingenious enough, but the Province is less to be congratulated upon the performance than the colonel The Liberal Government included in the list of assets the funds held in trust for the Province by the Dominion Government, aggregating \$3,375,624, and in addition the Dominion subsidy of 1884. capitalized at \$2,848,289. Col. Matheson refuses to consider these as assets. on the ground that the income from these sources must be applied to specific purposes, principally education. By this simple process Col. Matheson eliminates \$6,223,313 from the capital of the Province, or what the Liberal administration chose to describe as capital, a claim confirmed by the royal commission, composed of financial experts, who audited the public accounts in 1900. The financial position of the Province is misrepresented when these assets are ignored, and there is a grave danger that the public credit may be prejudiced by the deliberate policy of disparaging its monetary resources. The only assets which Col. Matheson

will admit as realities are \$3,011,960 in

cash and debentures; a balance of \$1 .-354,686 available for the construction of the Temiskaming Railway; and miscellaneous sums, which bring the total up to \$4,609,000. Against this are the following liabilities: The Temiskaming Railway loan, \$5,840,004; the Soo guarantee, \$2,000,000; Niagara Falls Park bonds, \$600,000; railway and annuity certificates, \$4,124,763, making, with the smaller items, an aggregate of \$11,-709,000. In this manner, Col. Mathesor figures out a net debt of \$7,100,000. which is regarded by the Government as a matter for rejoicing. The completed portion of the Temiskaming Railway, upon which over \$4,000,000 has been spent, is wholly ignored in the list of assets, though the Provincial Treasurer concedes that it will prove a profitable venture. Again, he debits the Province with \$2,000,000, the amount of the Soo guarantee, but confesses that there is every reason to believe the Province will be relieved of the obligation on May 1, 1906. Togo's weakened fleet. Rojestvensky has already shown nimself a magnificent naval strategist, and the British naval authorities are willing to admit that he is capable of attempting the heroic coup here indicated.

At the same time it is certain that the present invisibility of Togo and his ability to deal suddenly and effectivey with the Enquist division in ample time to hunt down and engage Rojestvensky, are factors that must be counted with, and that may upset completely the Rojestvensky tactics.






