TAFT WANTS AN ARMISTICE

Palma Will Concede All To Rebels And Liberals

TEXT OF THE TERMS

Havana, Sept. 25.—It was rumored late yesterday afternoon that the Government and the moderates had tactlly decided to concede practically every thing to the Liberals and rebels.

Terms of Armistice. The following are the terms of the armistice agreed upon by the opposing forces:
"1. No movement of troops shall

take place on either side without a notification to the opposing authorities, viz., the secretary of the interior of Cuba; Alfred Zayas, representing the Liberal party, and the American peace

commission.

"2. This peace shall be effective throughout Cuba.

"3. If either party violates any of the expressed conditions the opposing party shall not take hostile action until after a complaint notification to the pace commission.

"4. Hostilities shall not be resumed for at least 24 hours after notification to the peace commission."

The Cuban Secretary of State agreed, upon the condition that he should notify Secretary Taft instead of Senator Zayas (president of the Liberal party), if the Government desired to move troops.



Eskimo Throwing Sticks

A "threwing stick," "throwing-board" or "spear thrower," as it is sometimes called, is a contrivance for casting a javelin or harpoon, which is employed by various savage races, such as the Australians, some South American tribes and especially by the Eskimos, among whom its use is almost universal. Roughly speaking, it is a narrow grooved board a foot or so long, with one end cut into a handle and the other provided with a stud or spur for the butt of the spear to rest against. It is used thus: Grasping the handle as he would a sword, the man fits the shaft of the spear into the groove, with the butt resting against the stud, steadying the spear with the finger. Then, extending his arm and finger. Then, extending his arm and bending back his hand till the spear lies horizontal, he aims at the mark-and propels the weapon by a quick-forward jerk of the stick. In this way I have seen Eskimo boys casting their forked javelins at wounded waterfowl.


