For Uniting the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, into One Domi: nion, under the name of OANADA.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed on the twenty-ninth day of March, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, in the thirtieth year of Our reign, initialed: "An Act for the Union of Canads, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and the Government "thereof, and for purposes connected therewith," after divers recitals, it is enacted that: "it shall be lawful for the Queen, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Most Honor-"able Privy Council, to declare, by Proclamation, that on and after a day therein appointed, "not being more than six months after the passing of this Act, the Provinces of Canada, "Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, shall form and be One Dominion, under the name of "Oanaday and on and after that day those Three Provinces shall form and be One Dominion "under that name, accordingly"; and it is thereby further enacted that "Such Persons "shall be first summoned to the Senate as the Queen, by Warrant under Her Majesty's "Proclamation of Union": We, therefore, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, have thought fit to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, and We do ordain, declare and command that, on and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, shall form and be One Domimion, under the name of Canada :

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:

The House of Commons have elected me as their Speaker, though I am but little able to fulfil the important duties thus assigned to me.

If, in the performance of those duties, I should at any time fall into error, I pray that the fault may be imputed to me, and not to the Commons, whose servant I am, and who through me, the better to enable them to discharge their duty to their Queen and Country, humbly claim all their undoubted rights and privileges, especially, that they may have freedom of speech in their debates, access to Your Excellency's person at all seasonable times, and that their proceedings may receive from Your Excellency the most favorable interpretation.

The Honorable the Speaker of this House then said :---

MR. SPEAKER,

I am commanded by His Excellency the Governor General to declare to you that he freely confides in the duty and attachment of the House of Commons to Her Majesty's Person and Government, and not doubting that their proceedings will be conducted with

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wisdom, temper, and prudence, he grants, and upon all occasions will recognize and allow, their constitutional privileges.

I am commanded also to assure you, that the Commons shall have ready access to His Excellency upon all seasonable occasions, and that their proceedings as well as your words and actions, will constantly receive from him the most favorable construction.

His Excellency the Governor General was then pleased to open the Session by a gracious speech to both Houses:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

In addressing for the first time the Parliamentary Representatives of the Dominion of *Cunada*, I desire to give expression to my own deep feeling of gratification that it has been my high privilege to occupy an official position which has made it my duty to assist at every step taken in the creation of this Great Confederation.

¹ I congratulate you on the Legislative sanction which has been given by the Imperial Parliament to the Act of Union, under the provisions of which we are now assembled, and which has laid the foundation of a new Nationality that I trust and believe will, ere long, extend its bounds from the *Atlantic* to the *Pacific* Ocean.

In the discussions which preceded the introduction of this measure in the Imperial Parliament, between the Members of Her Majesty's Government on the one side, and the Delegates who represented the Provinces now united on the other,—it was apparent to all those who took part in those conferences, that, while Her Majesty's Ministers considered and pressed the principle of Union as a subject of great Imperial interest, they allowed the Provincial Representatives every freedom in arranging the mode in which that principle should be applied.

In a similar spirit of respect for your privileges, as a free and self-governing people, the Act of Union, as adopted by the Imperial Parliament, imposes the duty and confers upon you the right of reducing to practice the system of Government, which it has called into existence, of consolidating its institutions, harmonizing its administrative details, and of making such legislative provisions as will secure to a constitution, in some respects novel, a full, fair, and unprejudiced trial.

With the design of effecting these objects, measures will be laid before you for the amendment and assimilation of the laws now existing in the several Provinces relating to Currency, Customs, Excise, and Revenue generally,—for the adoption of a uniform Postal System,—for the proper management and maintenance of the Public Works and Properties of the Dominion,—for the adoption of a well considered scheme of Militia Organization and Defence, for the proper administration of Indian affairs,—for the introduction of uniform Laws respecting Patents of Invention and Discovery,—the naturalization of Aliens,—and the assimilation of the Criminal Law, and the Laws relating to Barkruptcy and Insolvency.

A measure will also be submitted to you, for the performance of the duty imposed upon *Canada*, under the terms of the Union Act, of immediately constructing the Intercolonial Railway.

This great work will add a practical and physical connection to the legislative bond which now unites the Provinces comprising the Dominion, and the liberality with which the guarantee for the cost of its construction was given by the Imperial Parliament is a new proof of the hearty interest felt by the British people in your presenting

new proof of the hearty interest felt by the British people in your prosperity. Your consideration will also be invited to the important subject of Western Territorial extension, and your attention will be called to the best means for the protection and development of our Fisheries and Marine Interests.

You will also be asked to consider measures defining the privileges of Parliament and for the establishment of uniform laws relating to Elections, and the trial of Controverted Elections.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,-

The circumstances under which the Act of Union came into operation, rendered it

impossible to obtain the assent of the Legislature to the expenditure necessary for carrying on the ordinary business of the Government.

The expenditure since the first of July has therefore been incurred on the responsibility of Ministers of the Crown.

The details of that expenditure will be laid before you, and submitted for your sanction.

I have directed that the estimates for the current and succeeding Financial Year shall be laid before you. You will find that they have been framed with all the attention to economy which is compatible with the maintenance of efficiency in the different branches of the public service.

Honorable Gentlemen and Gentlemen,-

The general organization and efficiency of the Volunteers and Militia have been greatly improved within the last Year, and the whole Volunteer Force of Ontario and Quebcc is already, by the liberality of the Imperial Government, armed with the Breech-loading Rifle.

I am happy to be able to congratulate you on the abundant harvest with which it has pleased Providence to bless you, and on the general prosperity of the Dominion.

Your new nationality enters on its course backed by the moral support—the material aid—and the most ardent good wishes of the Mother Country. Within your own borders peace, security and prosperity prevail, and I fervently pray that your aspirations may be directed to such high and patriotic objects, and that you may be endowed with such a spirit of moderation and wisdom as will cause you to render the great work of Union which has been achieved, a blessing to yourselves and your posterity, and a fresh starting point in the moral, political and material advancement of the people of *Canada*.

His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to retire, and the House of Commons withdrew.

The Honorable Mr. Campbell, presented to the Sonate a Bill entitled "An Act relating "to Railways."

The said Bill was read for the first time pro forma.

The Honorable the Speaker reported His Excellency's Speech from the Throne, and The same was then read by the Clerk.

Ordered, That a Select Committee, composed of the Honorable Messieurs Fergusson Blair, McCully, Botsford, Christie, Tessier, Sanborn and the mover, be appointed to frame Rules, Orders and Regulations for the guidance and government of this House, and of the several Officers and Servants connected therewith.

Ordered, That pending the Report of the Scleet Committee just appointed to frame Rules and Regulations for the Government of this House, the Rules and Orders in force in the Legislative Council of the late Province of Canada, in the Session held in the year 1866, be followed by this House.

The Honorable the Speaker acquainted the House that the Clerk of the Senate had laid upon the Table the Certificate of one of the Commissioners, setting forth that the Honorable Messieurs Douald McDonald, John Sewall Sanborn and George William Allan Members of the Senate, had made and subscribed the Declaration of Qualification required by the British North America Act, 1867.

The same was then read by the Clerk and is as follows :

TO THE HONORABLE THE SENATE OF THE DOMINION OF CANADA IN PARLIAMENT ASSEMBLED,

THE REPORT OF THE LIBRARIAN ON THE STATE OF THE LIBRARY OF PARLIAMENT RESPECTFULLY SHEWETH.

That the inadequate accommodation for the Library in the temporary apartments wherein it is now placed, to which your Librarian adverted in his last Report, has not been

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remedied, and occasions serious and increasing inconvenience. The valuable collection of works on French Law, hitherto in use by the Commissioners for codifying the Laws of *Lower Canada*, and which remained at *Quebec*, in the hands of the Commissioners, on the removal of the Seat of Government to *Ottawa*, is now ready to be returned to the Library; but there is no space available for its reception. The want of a suitable apartment for the custody and display of Maps and Charts is also continually felt; the more so as the Library possesses a good collection of Maps, that only require to be properly exhibited to be of great service.

Aware of the impossibility of obtaining additional apartments for the Library contiguous to the rooms now occupied, your Librarian would respectfully urge upon your Honorable House the necessity of completing the spacious building designed for the reception of the books, with as little delay as possible.

And he would vanture to add, as a further reason for speedy action in this behalf, that day by day the classification of the books upon the shelves is deranged, and the system intended to insure immediate reference to any volume required materially disturbed, by visitors helping themselves to books and then putting them upon a wrong shelf. This objectionable practice cannot be prevented until, by a railing or otherwise, the general public are deburred from direct access to the books, and an attendant of the Library, or other privileged person, alone permitted to resort to the shelves. Some such a plan is adopted in all similar institutions of any considerable extent, and should, it is submitted, be introduced into this Library whenever it is transferred to the building intended for its permanent occupation.

A complete index to all the books in the Library has been prepared, and is now in the printer's hands. Your Librarian had hoped to have had this volume ready for distribution to Members before the opening of Parliament, but in the uncertainty which prevailed up to a very recent period, as to whether or not any portion of the Library would be transferred to the Local Legislatures of *Quebec* and *Ontario*, it was deemed imprudent to incur the expense of printing a new Catalogue.

The defective arrangements under which the Library is now suffering, together with the crowded state of the shelves in the various apartments wherein it is distributed, have prevented an exact enumeration of the number of volumes of which it now consists, but they may be estimated at about 60,000.

Appended to this Report will be found lists of the books received by way of donations since last session, and of those deposited under the Copyright Act.

That we thankfully receive His Excellency's congratulations on the Legislative sanction which has been given by the Imperial Parliament to the Act of Union, under the provisions of which we are now assembled, and which has latd the foundation of a new Nationality which we trust and believe with His Excellency, will, ere long, extend its bounds from the *Atlantic* to the *Pacific* Ocean.

That we shall give our attentive consideration to any communication His Excellency may see fit to make to us on the important subject of Western Territorial extension, and the best means to be adopted for the protection and development of our Fisheries and Marine Interests.

That we shall respectfully consider any measures defining the privileges of Parliament, and for the establishment of uniform laws relating to Elections, and the trial of Controverted Elections, which His Excellency may cause to be laid before us.

That we learn, with great pleasure, that the general organization and efficiency of the Volunteers and Militia have been greatly improved within the last year, and that the whole Volunteer Force of *Ontario* and *Quebec* is already, by the liberality of the Imperial Government, armed with the breech-loading Rifle.

That we rejoice that His Excellency is able to congratulate us on the abundant harvest with which it has pleased Providence to bless the Country, and on the general prosperity of the Dominion.

Extract from the Royal Instructions to the Governor General of Canada, dated at Balmoral, on the 1st June, 1867.

VII. And for the execution of so much of the Powers vested in you by virtue of "The "British North America Act, 1867,", as relates to the Declaring either that you Assent in Our Name to Bills passed by the Houses of the Parliament, or that you withhold Our Assent therefrom, or that you reserve such Bills for the signification of Our Pleasure thereon, it is Our Will and Pleasure that when any Bill is presented to you for Our Assent, of either of the classes hereinafter specified, you shall (unless you shall think proper to withhold Our assent from the same) reserve the same for the signification of Our pleasure thereon; subject, nevertheless, to your discretion, in case you should be of opinion that an urgent necessity exists, requiring that such Bill be brought into immediate operation, in which case you are authorized to assent to such Bill in Our name, transmitting to Us, by the earliest opportunity, the Bill so assented to, together with your reasons for assenting thereto, that is to say:—

1. Any Bill for the divorce of persons joined together in Holy Matrimony;

2. Any Bill whereby any grant of land or money, or other donation or gratuity, may be made to yourself;

3. Any Bill whereby any paper or other currency may be made a legal tender, except the coin of the Realm, or other gold or silver coin ;

4. Any Bill imposing differential duties ;

5. Any Bill, the provisions of which shall appear inconsistent with obligations imposed upon Us by Treaty;

6. Any Bill interfering with the discipline or control of Our Forces, in Our said Dominion, by land and sea;

7. Any Bill of an extraordinary nature and importance, whereby Our prerogative, or the rights and property of Our Subjects not residing in Our said Dominiou, or the trade and shipping of the United Kingdom and its Dependencies may be prejudiced;

8. Any Bill containing provisions to which Our Assent has been once refused, or which has been disallowed by Us.

To the Chairman and Members of the Joint Committee on Printing :

GENTLEMEN,-The accounts for Printing, Binding, and Printing Paper are now ready to be submitted to the Committee, as well as the Vouchers for their verification, for the year ending the 31st December, 1866, they are numbered, those of the Honorable the

Legislative Council, from 1 to 865; and those of the Legislative Assembly from 1 to 1391, inclusively. By the annexed Balance Sheet, marked A, the cost of those services is shown to be \$30,859.72.

For the six months ending the 30th June, 1867, the Vouchers are numbered from 1 to 13, the cost being shown by the Balance Sheet, also annexed, and marked B., to be \$14,738.32.

In accordance with the Sixth Report of the Committee of last Session, I have had a sufficient number of the Departmental Reports printed for the use of the Parliament of the Dominion, as well as for those of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec. Also, under the authority of the same Report, the General Index to the Journals of the Legislative Assembly from the year 1852 to the close of the last Parliament, has been printed. The distribution of the Volumes has to be directed by His Honor the Speaker, and the Printing Committee.

This Work had to be most carefully printed, and reflects great credit on the Parliamentary Printers, not only for their mechanical execution of the work, but also for the dispatch with which it was issued from the Press, being within the time prescribed.

The Sub-Committee appointed to make inquiry as to the best mode of obtaining an efficient report of the Debates in Parliament, beg leave to submit the following as the result of their inquiries :---

The Sub-Committee deem it most desirable that a correct Official record of the Debates in Parliament should be had and kept; in furtherance of this view, they consulted with several of the Reporters, and have received from one of them an offer to undertake to report *verbatim* all Debates, and to extend his notes with that degree of fulness which may be prescribed, on the same terms as to payment as were allowed for the Official Reports of the Confederation Debates, viz: \$4 per column of 1,400 words, to be charged on the amount of matter written out and printed.

The Committee have also received an offer from the Parliamentary Printers to print the Debates of Parliament under their contract, and at their contract prices, in Royal Quarto form, to be delivered the succeeding afternoon after the Speeches have been delivered. They are also willing to retain the same in type for thirty-six hours, to allow Members an opportunity to revise their own speeches, and make what verbal corrections are necessary, and then re-arrange the matter, with the corrections, in octave book form for binding, under that provision in their contract which provides for the changing the Minutes of the Senate into Journal form.

The cost of publishing the Debates will depend very much on the system to be adopted. There are but two methods, viz: That of publishing in the language in which the speeches are spoken; and the other, of having the speeches spoken in French translated into the English language, and all the English speeches translated and printed in the French language. By the latter method the cost of translation and the publishing in two languages must add very seriously to the cost.

The cost of publishing the speeches as delivered, say 2,000 copies in sheets, and 500 copies bound, containing matter equal to a daily issue of fourteen columns of the <i>Globe</i> newspaper, for a clear

SENATE COMMITTEE ROOM, 11th December, 1867.

The Select Committee appointed to examine and report upon the Contingent Accounts of the Senate for the present Session, beg leave to make their Second Report :

In accordance with the recommendation contained in their first Report, your Committee have, after much deliberation, and with an anxious desire to secure an efficient staff of Officers, Clerks and Servants, and at the same time to avail themselves of the services of persons experienced in the discharge of the several duties to be assigned to them, respectfully recommend for the consideration of the Senate, that the salaries of the Officers, Clerks, and Servants of the Senate, and the names of those in their appointment be as in the schedule annexed.

Your Committee have had brought under their consideration the fact that many of the persons recommended as Clerks and Servants of the Senate have been employed in similar capacities in the late Legislative Council of *Canada*, and their salaries paid out of the funds of the Dominion from the date of the Union up to the first day of January, 1868. With regard to such persons so employed, your Committee beg leave to suggest:

1st. That those Officers and Servants of the former Legislative Council of the Province of *Canada*, who are to be retained in the Service of the Senate of the Dominion, but at salaries less than those formerly enjoyed by them, be paid sums equal to six months' pay at the difference between the rates now recommended and those formerly enjoyed by them.

2nd. That the permanent Officers and Servants of the said Legislative Council not retained in the Service of the Senate be paid each one year's Salary at the rates they have hitherto received.

8rd. That the amounts thus to be paid to both classes should be surcharged by the Dominion against the late Province of Canada.

4th. That subject to the above conditions, the various sums named be paid out of the Contingencies of the Senate.

5th. That the above shall not include Sessional Officers and Servants who may no longer be employed; but that these shall be paid for the present Session out of the Contingencies of the Senate. The two Sessional Clerks, Messrs. Garon and LePage, to be paid the usual per diem allowance to the adjournment, and a gratuity of one hundred dollars each, and the Sessional Messengers not appointed to be paid their full Sessional allowances, and to be notified that their services will be no longer required.

Your Committee recommend that the English and French Clerks should be under the direction of John F. Taylor, Esquire, Chief Clerk, and Robert Lemoine, Esquire.

Your Committee also recommend that, subject to the supervision of the Chief Clerk, Samuel Skinner, the House Keeper, have the control of the Messengers and other Servants.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

We, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal subjects, the

Commons of the Dominion of Canada, in Parliament assembled, humbly approach Your Majesty for the purpose of representing :--

That it would promote the prosperity of the Canadian people, and conduce to the advantage of the whole Empire, if the Dominion of Canada, constituted under the provisions of the British North America Act of 1867, were extended westward, to the shores of the Pacific Ocean.

That the colonization of the fertile lands of the Saskatchewan, the Assiniboine, and the Red River Districts,-the development of the mineral wealth which abounds in the regions of the North-West,-and the extension of commercial intercourse, through the British Possessions in America, from the Atlantic to the Pacific,-are alike dependent upon the establishment of a stable government, for the maintenance of law and order in the North-Western Territories.

That the welfare of a sparse and widely scattered population of British subjects, of European origin, already inhabiting these remote and unorganized territories, would be materially enhanced by the formation therein of political institutions bearing analogy, as far as circumstances will admit, to those which exist in the several provinces of this Dominion.

That the 146th section of the British North America Act of 1867, provides for the admission of Rupert's Land and the North-Western Territory, or either of them, into Union with Canada, upon the terms and conditions to be expressed in Addresses from the Houses of Parliament of this Dominion, to Your Majesty, and which shall be approved of by Your Majesty in Council.

That we do therefore most humbly pray, that Your Majesty will be graciously pleased, by and with the advice of Your Most Honorable Privy Council, to unite Rupert's Land and the North-Western Territory with this Dominion, and to grant to the Parliament of Canada authority to legislate for their future welfare and good government, and we most humbly beg to express to Your Majesty that we are willing to assume the duties and obligations of Government as regards those Territories.

That in the event of Your Majesty's Government agreeing to transfer to Canada the jurisdiction and control over the said region, the Government and Parliament of Canada will be ready to provide that the legal rights of any Corporation, Company, or individual within the same, shall be respected and placed under the protection of Courts of competent jurisdiction.

And furthermore, that upon the transference of the Territories in question to the Canadian Government, the claims of the Indian Tribes to compensation for lands required for purposes of settlement, will be considered and settled in conformity with the equitable principles which have uniformly governed the British Crown in its dealings with the Aborigines.

All which we humbly pray Your Majesty to take into Your Majesty's most gracious and favorable consideration.

That it is accordingly expedient to address Her Majesty that she would be graciously pleased, by and with the advice of Her Most Honorable Privy Council, to unite *Rupert's Land* and the North-Western Territory, with the Dominion of *Canada*, and to grant to the Parliament of *Canada*, authority to legislate for their future welfare and good government, and expressing the willingness of *Canada* to assume the duties and obligations of Government and Legislation.

6. That in the event of the Imperial Government agreeing to transfer to Canada the jurisdiction and control over this region, it would be expedient to provide that the legal rights of any Corporation, Company or individual shall be respected, and placed under the protection of Courts of competent jurisdiction.

7. That upon the transference of the Territories in question to the Canadian Government, the claims of the Indian Tribes to compensation for lands required for purposes of settlement, would be considered and settled in conformity with the equitable principles which have uniformly governed the Crown in its dealings with the Aborigines.

8. Resolved also, That in case any negotiation between the Canadian Government and the Hudson's Bay Company for the termination of the rights of the latter entered into in accordance with the Despatch of the 17th June, 1865, from the then Secretary of State for the Colonies to His Excellency the Governor General, should result in an agreement between them, it is hereby declared that such agreement must be submitted to, and sanctioned by the Parliament of Canada before the same shall have any force or effect whatever.

The Clerk of this House did thereupon say-

The Select Committee appointed to examine and report upon the contingent accounts of the Senate for the present Session, to whom was referred back their Second Report, beg leave to report the same amended, as follows :

In accordance with the recommendation contained in their First Report, Your Committee have, after much deliberation and with an anxious desire to secure an efficient staff of officers, clerks and servants, and at the same time to avail themselves of the services of persons experienced in the discharge of the several duties to be assigned to them, respectfully recommend for the consideration of the Senate, that the salaries of the officers, clerks and servants of the Senate and the names of those in their appointment be as in the Schedule annexed.

Your Committee have had brought under their consideration the fact that many of the persons recommended as clorks and servants of the Senate, have been employed in similar capacities in the late Legislative Council of *Canada*, and their salaries paid out of the funds of the Dominion from the date of the Union up to the first of January, 1868. With regard to such persons so employed, Your Committee bog leave to recommend :

lst. That those officers and servants of the former Legislative Council of the Province of *Canada*, who are to be retained in the service of the Senate of the Dominion, but at salaries less than those formerly enjoyed by them be paid sums equal to twelve months' salary from the first July next of the difference between the rate now recommended and those formerly enjoyed by them. 2nd. That the permanent officers and servants of the said Legislative Council not retained in the service of the Senate, be paid each one year's salary at the rates they have hitherto received, if they have served less than twenty years; if more than twenty years, then two year's salary,—in either case from the 1st of July, 1868.

3rd. That the amounts thus to be paid to both classes should be surcharged by the Dominion against the late Province of Canada.

4th. That subject to the above conditions the various sums named be paid out of the Contingencies of the Senate.

5th. That the above shall not include sessional officers and servants who may no longer be employed; but that these shall be paid for the present Session out of the Contingencies of the Senate.

The two Sessional Clerks, Messieurs Garon and Lepage, to be paid the usual per diem allowance to the 21st December last and a gratuity of one hundred dollars each, and the Sessional Messengers not appointed to be paid their full Sessional allowances, and to be notified that their services will be no longer required.

The Committee have carefully examined the following documents, and recommend that they be printed, viz:---

Return to Address of the House of Commons for copies of all documents in relation to the Extradition of Lamirande.

Return to Address of the House of Commons for Statement shewing the quantity of water leased on Lachine Canal, and the St. Lawrence Canals, &c.

Return to Address, Correspondence respecting North-West Territory.

The Committee beg also to submit the following Resolution as a Recommendation :

Resolved, That for the purpose of efficiency, as well as economy in the management of the printing services of Parliament, it is recommended that as the Committee is a Joint one, from which all orders in reference to those services emanate, it is advisable for the practical carrying into effect thereof, there should be a Joint Room, equally accessible to both Houses, for the reception and distribution of all printed matter in equal proportion to the Members of each. Downing Street, 11th December, 1867.

SIR,—Recent circumstances have directed my attention to the expediency of assimilating, as far as possible, the Law of the different Colonies respecting Treasonable Offences to the Law of the United Kingdom.

There can, I think, be no doubt but that on a subject thus concerning the interests of the whole Empire, the Law of the Empire ought, if possible, to be uniform; and with this view I desire to call your attention to the provisions of the Imperial Act 11 Vic., c. 12, intituled, "An Act for the better security of the Crown and Government of the United Kingdom," by which, as you are no doubt aware, the offence of Treason (except in the case of offence against the person of Her Majesty) is made a felony, and may be tried as such. This Act has been for some time in operation here, and has been found to work well, and I am anxious that enactments similar to that Act should be passed by the several Legislatur's of Her Majesty's Colonial Possessions.

I desire therefore that you will cause this Circular Despatch to be brought under the notice of your Legislature, with a view to procure the passing of such a measure.

I take this opportunity of reminding you, that if any person commit an overt Act of Treason in the Colony under your Government and escape from the Colony, it would be your duty to avail yourself of the provisions of the Act for the better apprehension of certain offenders (6 & 7 Vict., c. 34, as extended by 16 & 17 Vict., c. 118), so as to secure the apprehension of such offender, in that part of Her Majesty's Dominions in which he may have taken refuge, and his reconveyance to the Colony for trial.

Page 6, line 47.-Leave out "Receiver General" and insert "Treasurer."

Page 7, line 49.—After "thereof," insert "and provided further, that all the powers and duties by this section vested in the Secretary of State shall be deemed to have been so vested from and after the first day of July, now last past, and may be by him exercised with reference to any act or thing done or performed since that date, in connection with Ordnance or Indian Lands."

The said amendments being read a second time, and the question of concurrence put thereon, they were agreed to.

On motion of the Honorable Mr. Mitchell, seconded by the Honorable Mr. Chapais, it was

Prince Edward's Island, 14th April, 1868.

The Legislative Council of *Prince Edward's Island* having learned by recent telegrams that the Honorable *Thomas D'Arcy McGee*, a Member of the Parliament of the Dominion of *Canada*, was assassinated, on the morning of the seventh of April, when returning to his lodgings from the House of Commons,

Therefore, *Resolved*, That this Council takes the earliest opportunity of expressing its horror and detestation of the atrocious crime, which has thus suddenly deprived the people of *Canada* of an able and patriotic Statesman, and a wife and family of their natural protector,-To the Parliament and people of Canada, and to the bereaved Widow and Children of the deceased, the Council desires to express its heartfelt sympathy on this melancholy occasion.

An unsuccessful attempt was made at Sydney to shoot the Duke of Edinburgh, by ono O'Farrell. His Royal Highness was wounded, but is going on well, and hoped shortly to resume his duties and sail for *England* in the next week. The assassin was arrested, avowed himself a Fenian, and is under trial.

COMMITTEE ROOM, 27th April, 1868.

The Joint Committee of the Senate and House of Commons on the Printing of Parliament beg leave to submit the following as their Thirteenth Report:

The Committee for the purpose of carrying into effect the recommendations as contained in their Ninth Report, (which has been adopted by both Houses,) as well as those in the second recommendation of the Third Report of the Committee on Contingencies of the House of Commons, also adopted, have agreed to several Resolutions, which are based on the Report of their Sub-Committee, hereto annexed, in which the details of the proposed arrangements are clearly set forth,—

1. That there shall be a Department, to be called "The Department for the Printing of Parliament," to be worked under the direction of a Joint Committee of both Houses, by the Clerk of the Committee—a distributor of printed papers—an assistant—and two messengers, to be taken from the present staff,—

2. That there be a distinct appropriation for the Printing of Parliament, sessionally, to be lodged in the hands of the Accountant of the House of Commons, in such sums as may be required; and be disbursed by him under the certificate of the Clerk of the Committee; and accounted for in the Annual Balance Sheet, which shall include all expenses of management, so as to show the whole cost of the Printing services, directly and indirectly; and should any balance of the appropriation remain unexpended, it shall be carried to the credit of Printing for the succeeding Session; or, in case of deficiency, to be likewise shown. Said Balance Sheet and the Accounts connected therewith to be audited Sessionally by the Joint Committee.

3. That the said Accountant do open an account for the "Printing of Parliament," and transfer to it all the charges connected with printing since the 1st July last, as well as those now recommended, which are to take effect from the same date; that the cost of the Printing of the Parliament of the Dominion may be clearly shown from the time of its inauguration.

COMMITTEE ROOM, Friday, 24th April, 1868.

The Sub Committee of the Joint Committee on Printing beg leave to submit the following as, in their opinion, the best method of carrying into effect the recommendations as contained in their Ninth Report :--

The Sub-Committee, after maturely considering the subject in all its bearings, have unanimously came to the conclusion that the more the Printing Services can be concentrated, and the fewer hands, consistent with efficiency, that are employed, the better those services will be performed.

Under Confederation, the Printing Services cover a larger sphere, and the distribution of printed papers is much more extensive than formerly, as for instance, the despatching of all printed matter to every Member of the Local Legislatures; still, the Sub-Committee conceive that, under proper methodical arrangements, as recommended

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ъм, London. hereafter, the whole service can be performed for both Houses with a staff no larger than that at present employed in that service of the House of Commons.

The Sub-Committee recommend that,—for the reception and distribution of Printed Papers, the room at present occupied by the Department of Routine and Records, House of Commons, should be set apart for that purpose, it being as nearly as possible equally accessible to the Members and Officers of both Houses.

This room to be under the charge of a "Distributor" and an "Assistant," whose duties shall be as their name signifies, as well as the keeping of fyles of all printed matter, so arranged and indexed as to be of immediate access for reference.

This room also to be the Depôt for all copy, proofs and messages, to be sent to or received from the Printers, thus avoiding their delivery at wrong offices, with the consequent delay and danger of loss. Two of the Messengers will be required to be detailed specially to perform this service.

The Sub-Committee conceive that by this arrangement not only will efficiency be obtained, but great economy; as the service which is now spread over the Messengers of both Houses will thus be performed by two. Occasional assistance may be required, but so slight as not in any manner to affect the working arrangements of the Department.

The whole Printing Services would thus be performed by one Chief Clerk, one Distributor, and his Assistant, and two Messengers; and the Sub-Committee would recommend that for the purpose of shewing the whole cost of the Printing Services, directly and indirectly, in the Annual Balance sheet, the cost of the above should be charged to the Printing Account, and audited with it, as follows:—

The Clerk, at an annual salary of	300	00
The Distributor, at an annual salary of	600	00
The Assistant, " "	500	00
Two Messengers, at a per diem rate of	2	00

The above to be named from the present staff.

The Sub-Committee would also recommend that but one Joint Printing Account be kept under the head of

" EXPENDITURE FOR THE PRINTING OF PARLIAMENT,"

and that an amount, as estimated, be appropriated for that purpose, and deposited in such sums as may be required in the hands of the Accountant, House of Commons, to be disbursed under certificate of the Clerk of the Committee, as the work progresses, from time to time, and to be accounted for in the Annual Balance Sheet,—and as the period at which the printing work can be finished, must entirely depend upon the time at which Parliament is called together, and the duration of the Session,—there can be no specified limit for the closing of the accounts; but it is recommended they be closed annually, as practicable, saving only that such accounts must be finally settled and ready for audit by the succeeding Session ; and as it is most desirable the cost of the Printing Services of the Parliament of the Dominion should be shown from the commencement of that era, the Subcommittee recommend that the Accountant do transfer to the above account all sums paid, or to be paid, for printing purposes, as well as the charges consequent on the working of the Printing Department, as recommended above,—the whole payments, costs and charges to be computed from the first day of July, 1867, the date of the Inauguration of the Dominion.—

The Sub-committee would also recommend that in the Annual Balance Sheet the Clerk of the Committee do show the whole cost of the Printing of Parliament, and also the proportionate cost of either House.—

PRAYERS:

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the following petitions were severally read :

Of the Honorable J. Elie Gingras and others, of Quebec, Shipbuilders and Merchants, praying for aid towards the encouragement of the building of composite ships at the Port of Quebec.

Of the Corporation of the Town of Sorel; praying for a deduction of the compounded interest accruing on the amount of their debt to the Consolidated Municipal Loan Fund.

Of Joseph A. Woodruff and others, of the Town of St. Catherines, and elsewhere, in the Province of Ontario, praying to be incorporated as "The Merchants' Express Com-" pany of the Dominion of Canada."

Of John Shaw, of the City of Kingston, praying for the passing of an Act to provide that all Canals in the Dominion shall be closed from Saturday at midnight until Sunday at midnight, and that Railway trains or engines be not permitted to run from Saturday at midnight until Sunday at midnight.

Of the Board of Trade of the City of London, Ontario, praying that in any change in the Tariff the Importor and Refiner of Sugar may be placed on an equal footing.

The Honorable Mr. Macpherson, from the Select Committee appointed to enquire into and report upon the causes of the recent Financial crisis in the Province of Ontario, presented their second Report.

Ordered, That it be received, and

The same was then read by the Clerk, as follows :

SENATE, COMMITTEE ROOM. 28th April, 1868.

The Select Committee appointed to enquire into and report upon the causes of the recent financial crisis in the Province of Ontario, beg leave to submit the following as their SECOND REPORT :-

That in the first Report, your Committee had the honor to submit to your Honorable House they presented much valuable evidence bearing upon the subject referred to them. That they now submit that of Mr. E. H. King, General Manager of the Bank of

Montreal.

That the Gentlemen connected with the management of Banks in Ontario, who have given evidence, with the exception of Mr. Paton, of the Bank of British North America, are unanimous in stating :--

That general prosperity prevailed in Ontario in October hast, when the financial crisis

unexpectedly occurred in that Province. That while it continued, it was severe and alarming; and that the best interests of the Province were placed in serious peril.

That it was attended with public distrust in the Bank Note Currency of the country, as evidenced by a run upon several of the Banks, and general and great depreciation in the value of the staple products of that Province.

That this state of things continued until the Government announced that the Notes of all the Banks, except those of the Bank of Upper Canada, and the Commercial Bank, would be received in payment of public dues.

That the primary cause of the crisis was the suspension of the Commercial Bank of Canada.

That, in their opinion, the crisis was aggravated by the course pursued by the Bank of Montreal, in refusing to receive, in certain cases, the Notes of other specie-paying Banks, except on collection. Mr. Paton of the Bank of British North America, and Mr. Cassells of the Gore Bank, express opinions different from the majority of the Bankers upon this point-which will be particularly seen on reference to their evidence.

That under the Provisions of the Provincial Note Act of 1866, the Bank of Montreal, having withdrawn its own Notes from circulation and substituted for them the Notes of the Province, it was no longer interested, in common with the other kindred institutions, in maintaining unimpaired, the credit of all ; and that the effect of that Act was to place the

interests of the Bank of *Montreal*, the most powerful monied Institution in *Canada* and the Fiscal Agent of the Government, in antagonism to those of the other Banks.

That Mr. King's explanation respecting the refusal, by some of the Agents of the Bank of *Montreal*, to receive the notes of other specie-paying Banks, is contained in his evidence, answer No. 4.

That your Committee further submit, that much valuable information on the important subject of Currency and Banking, will be found in the answers to questions Nos. 16, 17 and 18, in the evidence presented with their First Report.

That it will there be seen that the Bankers are almost unanimous in condemning the existing Provincial Note Act, giving their reasons therefor, very fully.

That they are equally unanimous in stating, that in their opinion it would be for the general interests of the country, to return to the banking system as it existed before the passing of the Provincial Note Act, with additional guarantees for the certain redemption of bank-notes on demand; limiting the issue of the same; providing greater security to depositors; recommending that an improved Form of Return be made by the Banks; suggesting a Government inspection, and other amendments.

That your Committee recognize it as one of the first duties of Government, to provide a secure currency—one that will command the largest measure of public confidence, and be convertible into coin on demand.

That your Committee are of opinion that the extension of the Bank of issue system, now partially in operation, would be unsuited to the requirements of the country, and injurious to its best interests.

That your Committee venture to express the hope that the Government may recommend to Parliament, a return to the system which formerly existed (improved as suggested in the evidence submitted, and already referred to herein), and under which *Canada* attained to great prosperity.

That if the financial requirements of the Dominion should induce the Government to desire the introduction of a new system, including the taking possession of the currency of the country (which your Committee would strongly deprecate), then your Committee would recommend that the issue of the paper currency be based upon the deposit with the Government of public securities of the Dominion, under a system somewhat analogous to that of the National Bank system of the neighbouring United States, but redeemable on demand—the Government regulating the issue under the authority of Parliament; the Banks through which the notes are issued, being responsible for their instant redemption.

That your Committee beg leave to express the opinion, that in view of the early expiration of the Bank Charters, it is highly desirable that the Government policy on Currency and Banking should be settled and announced as speedily as possible.

That should any material change in the system be proposed, your Committee suggest that it be introduced very gradually and with great caution, in order to afford opportunity for observing its effects upon the interests of the country, and time to interpose by legislation, should they prove prejudicial.

In conclusion, your Committee being of opinion, that the Returns, as at present required from the Banks are not as full and particular as the interests of the public and shareholders require, beg respectfully to recommend that the annexed form be substantially adopted for the Returns of all the Banks of the Dominion; and that in consideration of the importance of the matter, an Act be passed during the present Session, requiring them to adopt it.

The Committee on Standing Orders and Private Bills have the honor to present the following as their ninth Report.

Your Committee have examined the following Petitions, and find that sufficient notice has been given in each case, viz.: from R. L. Denison and others, of Toronto, praying for an Act to incorporate them under the name of the Canadian Mutual Life Insurance Company; from the Stratford Board of Trade, praying for an Act of Incorporation; from John McBean, of the Town of Sarnia, praying for an Act to amend a certain Patent issued by him, and to confirm the privileges therein granted; and from George Gott and others, of the County of Essex, praying for an Act to incorporate the Sorghum Growers' Association, of the County of Essex.

Your Committee have also examined the Petitions from the Trust and Loan Company of Upper Canada, praying for an Act to amend an Act passed in 25th Victoria, chap. 72, by providing for the execution of conveyances by a single Commissioner, and declaring the validity of conveyances so executed; and from William Dow and others, of Montreal, praying to be incorporated as a Shipping Company, and find that, though regular, the notices have not yet been published for the full length of time required by the Rule, but whereas it will be competent for them, as Committee on Private Bills, to provide that no injury to any party shall arise therefrom, they recommend that the notice be considered sufficient in each case.

The Address to Her Majesty just communicated by Message from the House of Commons, was then read by the Clerk as follows :---

To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty :

Most Gracious Sovereign :

We, Your Majesty's dutiful and loyal subjects, the Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled, desire to approach Your Majesty with the expression of our horror and indignation at the recent atrocious attempt to assassinate His Royal Highness the Duke of *Edinburgh*, and to convey our deep sympathy with Your Majesty in the distress and anxiety which the endeavor to take the life of one so justly dear to You, at such a distant part of Your Empire must have occasioned.

In uniting with Your Majesty in thanksgiving to Almighty God, that it has pleased Him to save the life of His Royal Highness, so recklessly and wickedly assailed,—and in fervent prayer that it may please God to restore him speedily to health and strength,—we beg to assure Your Majesty that the high personal esteem with which His Royal Highness is regarded throughout this Dominion—from a lively recollection of his gracious demeanor amongst us during his visit to this country in the year 1861, has if possible heightened our abhorrence of this detestable act. We take this opportunity of renewing to Your Majesty our assurance of our devotion and attachment to Your Majesty's Throne and Person.

The Members, on behalf of the Senate, of the Joint Committee of both Houses on The Library of Parliament, beg leave to present a First Report :---

The following Petitions have been referred to the consideration of the Committee, during the present Session :

(1) The Petition of Augustin Laperrière, Clerk in the Library of Parliament, for aid to enable him to publish a work he has recently compiled, entitled, "Canadian Parlia-"mentary Precedents; or, Decisions of the Speakers of the Legislative Assembly upon "points of Order."

(2) The Petition of Arthur Harvey, Statistical Clerk to the Finance Department, that the House will subscribe for copies of a work written by him, entitled, "A Statistical "Account of British Columbia."

(3) The Petition of John Gooch, that the House will subscribe for copies of a work written by him, entitled, a "Manual of the Constitution of Canada."

(4) The Petition of H. J. Morgan, that the House will purchase copies of a book compiled by him, entitled, "Bibliotheca Canadensis."

Before proceeding to consider the merits of these several applications, the Committee

deliberated upon the expediency of their continuing to advise the Houses in regard to Petitions of this description.

Ever since the year 1852, the Committee have acted as a "Board for the encourage-"ment of Literary undertakings" in *Canada*; and have, from time to time, recommended that the patronage of the Legislature should be extended to various native Authors, whose works, in their judgment, merited some degree of pecuniary assistance out of the public funds. But they have arrived at the conclusion that it is, for divers reasons, inexpedient that they should continue any longer to act in this capacity; and that hereafter it would be more advisable that they should abstain from any particular recommendations of this kind. They would, nevertheless, venture to express their opinion, that the fostering hand of Parliament should not be wholly withdrawn from the endeavor to promote the development of Literature and Art in this Dominion; but that the Executive Government should themselves assume the responsibility of recommending to Parliament grants of money in aid of any publication appertaining to Science, History, general Literature, or Art, in *Canada*, that they may deem to be specially deserving of public encouragement.

The Committee have further agreed to recommend the modification of the existing Rules of the Senate in relation to borrowing Books from the Library, by the adoption of the following Resolutions :---

First, That in future no Books shall be removed from the City of Ottawa, unless under special circumstances, and upon special application for a particular work not easy of access elsewhere, and for a limited time; and then only when recommended by the Librarian, and sanctioned by the Speaker of either House.

Second, That no Books of reference be removed from the Library at any time, unless under the same circumstances, and on the same authority, as in the preceding Resolution.

That in consideration of the additional duty and responsibility thus imposed upon the existing staff in the Library of Parliament, allowances be made, out of the Contingencies of the Senate, to the several officers, as follows:---

To Mr. Alpheus Todd, the Principal Librarian, with the understanding that he shall render to Members of your Honorable House similar services in relation to Constitutional and Parliamentary inquiries, to those he now fulfils towards Members of the House of Commons,—the sum of four hundred dollars, per annum;

To Mr. Gérin-Lajoie, the Assistant Librarian, the sum of three hundred dollars, per annum;

The Select Committee appointed to consider and report whether by any alteration in the Forms and Proceedings of this House the Despatch of public business can be more effectually promoted, beg leave to report :---

That the Committee have met and considered the subject referred to them.

The Committee are of opinion that the forms and practice of the Senate are well calculated to prevent delay in the passing of bills, or in the transaction of other business; but bills will, according to the present practice be sent up by the other House of Parliament, at so late a period of the Session, as to render it impossible to give them that full consideration which the public interests require. This complaint has been constantly made in the House of Lords, and in the Upper Branches of the several Colonial Legislatures, and has formed the subject of repeated discussions, but no sufficient remedy has been suggested.

The Committee have had under their notice, the modes of remedying the evil in question suggested by the Committee of the House of Lords in a report of the 7th May, 1861. These modes were either that some portion of the legislation which originated in the House of Commons should commence in the House of Lords, or that some alteration should be made in the forms and proceedings of the Commons which would enable it to devote more time and attention to legislative measures during the early part of the Session.

The Committee would observe that independently of financial measures which begin as of course in the House of Commons, the representative character of that House, and the system of responsible Government, render it expedient that some other classes of important Bills should be first discussed there : the Committee are, nevertheless, of opinion that it would be quite possible to originate a much larger number of bills in the Senate than has hitherto been the practice in the Legislative Councils of any of the Provinces of the Dominion. It appears to the Committee that it must rest chiefly with the Government of the Day to accomplish this; the business of Parliament will hereafter, the Committee believe, be principally in connection with public measures, and in the hands of the Government, and it will depend upon Ministers themselves in which House of Parliament many of these measures shall originate. The Committee think that the public interest in the more thorough consideration of Legislative measures, as well as in the despatch of business would be much served by a persistent effort on the part of the Government of the Day to originate in the Senate as many of their measures as the law and usage of Parliament will permit.

The Committee would further remark that the Constitution, in establishing an Upper House of Parliament composed of life Members, contemplates on the part of that Branch a supervision, undisturbed by temporary political currents and partizan warfare of the legislation of the day. It is impossible, the Committee believe, that the Senate shall adequately fill its place in the Constitution and discharge those functions upon which its usefulness to the Country so much depends, unless ample opportunity is given for the discussion in that House of all measures submitted for its consideration. In the absence of any other remedy, it might become necessary to secure this, even by the extreme measure of declining to consider bills, with certain exceptions, brought up from the Commons within a fixed period of the end of a Session, but the Committee trust that other remedies may be found. The forms and proceedings of the Senate, the Committee think, are well adapted for the despatch of public business: whether any change could advantageously be made in this connection in those of the House of Commons must be left to the wisdom of that House to decide.

(3.) That no Books of Reference, or Books of special cost and value may be removed from the Seat of Government, under any circumstances.

(4.) That at the first meeting of the Joint Library Committee at every Session of Parliament the Librarian shall report a list of the Books absent at the commencement of the Session, specifying the names of any persons who have retained the same, in contravention of either of the foregoing Rules.

To these Bills the Royal Assent was severally pronounced by the Clerk of this House in the words following :

"In Her Majesty's name His Excellency the Governor General doth assent to this "Bill."

Then the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery read the titles of three Bills to be passed, as follows, viz. :--

An Act respecting the Treaty between Her Majesty and the United States of America, for the apprehension and surrender of certain Offenders.

An Act to fix the Salary of the Governor General.

An Act for the relief of Joseph Frederick Whiteaves.

To each of these Bills the Clerk of this House, by His Excellency's command, did thereupon say:

"His Excellency the Governor General doth reserve this Bill for the signification of "Her Majesty's pleasure thereon."

Then the Honorable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Excellency the Governor General, as followeth :---

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :---

The Commons of *Canada* have voted the Supplies required to enable Our Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service :

In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency a Bill, intituled: "An "Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying certain "expenses of the Public Service, for the Financial years ending respectively the thirtieth "day of June, 1868, and the thirtieth day of June, 1869; and for other purposes relating to "the Public Service," to which I humbly request Your Excellency's Assent.

To this Bill the Clerk of this House by His Excellency's command did thereupon say:

"His Excellency the Governor General thanks Her Majesty's dutiful and loyal "subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill in Her Majesty's name." Then His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to deliver the following speech:

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate, Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I am glad to be enabled to release you from further attendance to your duties in Parliament.

The Acts which you have passed for remodelling the Militia Force of the Dominion, and securing the defence of your territory, will, I trust, accomplish the objects which you desire to obtain.

I hope the measures which have been adopted for regulating the fiscal system of the Dominion will tend to the promotion of Commercial Enterprize, and to the stability of the public credit.

I congratulate you on the passage of the Acts by which the Executive Departments of the Dominion have been organized, and their efficiency provided for.

I must express my regret that the measures for the Assimilation of the Criminal Law of the several Provinces of the Dominion which were submitted by my directions to Parliament, have not been presented for the sangeion of the Crown.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I thank you for the provision you have made far the public service, and I am satisfied it will be applied with a due regard to efficiency and economy.

Honorable Gentlemen, and Gentlemen:

I rejoice that I am in a position to congratulate you on the general prosperity which prevails through the Dominion, and I feel assured that on your return to your homes you will exert yourselves in promoting obedience to the Laws and inculcating attachment to the free institutions under which it is your happiness to live.

The Speaker of the Senate then said :

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate, and Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

It is His Excellency the Governor General's will and pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogued until Wednesday, the First day of July next, to be here held, and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued until Wednesday, the First day of July next.

9. Is a larger proportion necessary now, and why?

10. What proportion of their capital are the banks required to hold in Provincial Debentures?

11. Do the banks hold Provincial notes (legal tenders) under any arrangement which precludes their using them as the equivalent of specie in their ordinary business; and, if so, what amount is held by —— Bank, and why?

12. State the terms and conditions on which the Canadian banks adjust their balances with each other?

13. What was the effect upon the prices of commodities and upon trade generally, produced by the suspension of the Commercial Bank, and the panic that ensued in respect to other banks in Ontario?

14. What were the weekly quotations during October for bank and other leading stocks?

15. What were the weekly quotations during October for bank and first-class merchants' exchange on London at sixty days' sight?

16. What was the condition of our money market, and what were the rates of interest during the same period?

17. What, in your opinion, has been the effect of the act of last session, providing for the issue of Provincial notes, upon the banking and general interests of the country?

18. What legislation, in your opinion, would be best calculated to prevent a recurrence of similar crises, and to give to the country sound systems of currency and banking adapted to the requirements of its trade and commerce?

Answers by Mr. Fisher, Cashier of the Ontario Bank.

Ques.-Condition of trade and commerce in Ontario before the crisis of October last?

Ans.—The prospects of the country in October last were good for a safe, sound and prosperous trade; and although the crops in Ontario were by no means so large as anticipated, still the effects of good harvests for the two or three preceding years, together with the high prices which prevailed, made money plentiful. The country merchants were prompt in remitting, and the demind for the fall's business was satisfactory.

Ques.---Condition of same now?

Ans.—I believe that the effect of the crisis has been prejudicial to the interests of the trade of the country by exciting in the public mind a feeling of distrust and a want of public confidence.

Ques.—Causes of crisis? Was it aggravated or allayed by special causes? If yea, what were they?

Ans.—The suspension of the Commercial Bank following so soon that of the Bank of Upper Canada, was, no doubt, the primary cause of the crisis. Those at all acquainted with the affairs of the Commercial for the last few years, could not have been surprised at the final result. The want of confidence in its ability to meet engagements culminated 31 Victoria.

when it became known that it was obliged to give special security to some of its largest depositors, and having had to part with a large portion of its most available assets for money borrowed from another institution. In further referring to the cause of the crisis, it is needless to assert that its effects were greatly aggravated by the injudicious instructions issued by the Bank of Montreal to its Managers and Agents throughout the country.

 $Q_{ues.}$ What has been the effect upon the policy or business of banks as evidenced by the amount of discounts before and since the crisis?

Ans.—The effects of the orisis upon the policy or business of the western banks has compelled them, in a great measure, to withhold accommodation and narrow their operations to a very large extent.

Ques.-What has been the effect upon their deposits and circulation?

Ans.—The effect of the crisis, with the general feeling of distrust occasioned thereby, has had a serious effect upon the circulation of the western banks—in forcing it back for redemption, much faster than usual, the deposits of some of them have not been effected to the same extent. The bank with which I am connected, namely, the "Ontario," has suffered very little in this respect; in fact, at all its western offices they have increased. The only point that shows any diminution is at Montreal, which has been caused by an unwillingness on our part to pay as high a rate of interest as some of the other banks.

Ques.-Is public confidence being restored?

Ans.—I think it would be imprudent to admit that confidence is fully restored, as is evidenced from the unsettled state of feeling that prevails in the country, arising, I am satisfied, from the power which the Bank of Montreal has over the other banks and monied interests of the country.

Ques.-Will the effect of the crisis extend injuriously to the approaching winter's trade ?

Ans.—As it is impossible to predicate, with any degree of certainty, what action the Legislature will take during the present session on the subject of banking and currency, the western banks are, in justice to themselves, bound to be exceedingly circumspect in granting facilities for winter operations. These must necessarily be curtailed owing to the uncertainty referred to, and will continue so until this uncertainty is removed.

Ques.—What proportion of circulation and deposits was deemed sufficient to be held in specie in former years, and what now?

Ans.—Specie to the extent of one-fifth of the circulation and deposits is considered to be sufficient, but from the existing state of affairs a much larger reserve is considered necessary.

Ques.—What proportion of capital are Banks required to hold in Provincial Debentures, and what, if any, in Provincial Notes (legal tender) and upon what condition?

Ans.—Ten per cent. of the paid up capital of the Banks is required by their charters to be held in Provincial Debentures; but I am not aware if it is necessary to keep a dollar of Provincial Notes on hand. I can scarcely imagine that Government requires such a sacrifice, as it would be so much dead weight for which no return can be made. After the passing of the Act of last session, when Government handed over to the Bank of Montreal legal tenders in payment of their indebtedness, it was for the interest of the latter to get as much of the issue into circulation as possible. One mode adopted was by coercing all the banks to keep a large amount of these notes as a reserve in Toronto and Montreal, for the privilege of having their exchanges made at these points. Our Bank has been compelled to hold intact \$200,000, or ten per cent. of its capital in these notes, for which it receives no interest or consideration whatever, other than the trifling privilege of exchanges referred to. The facts which no doubt will be elicited from the evidence on this subject, will prove that from the passing of the unjust Legal Tender Act, the power of coercion has been, and still continues to be, in direct opposition to the welfare of the country, so far as the Banking interests are concerned.

 $Q_{ues.}$ What are the terms and conditions on which Canadian Banks exchange their balances with each other ?

Ans.—Exchanges between the Banks are made at two points, vir., Toronto and Montreal. At Toronto the balances are settled by cheque on Montreal. Gold or legal tender notes, usually at the option of the debtor Bank. At Montreal the balances are settled daily by gold or legal tenders.

Ques .-- What in your opinion, has been the effect of the Act of last session, providing

for the issue of Provincial Notes, upon the Banking and general interests of the country, --especially Ontario?

Ans.-As to the effect of the Act itself, any inconvenience occasioned by it hitherto. seems to have arisen from its privileges having been confined to one large institution. giving it a power of dictation and control as regards other institutions, capable of being very injuriously exercised. Had it been generally accepted by the Banks, it would have been open to the very serious objection of making no provisions for the periodical expansion of the currency. The Banks could not afford to keep a large amount of capital lying idle for a considerable part of the year, in order to meet the wants of the country at other seasons, and it would be very inexpedient to render the Western Banks dependent at such seasons, upon the Eastern for the needful supply of currency, besides even if that course were adopted, there would be no certainty that the supply would equal the demand. It is well known that any material Legislative interference with the currency of a country undertaken unnecessarily must produce a feeling of uncertainty in the minds of those in charge of Banking Institutions, and lead them to adopt a more than usual cautious policy. It must also impair the confidence of the public in the currency it proposed to supersede. In both these respects, the mere fact of legislation on the subject last session was, in my opinion, very injurious—especially in Ontario, where by far the larger part of the Bank Notes are circulated in moving the crops to market and getting out timber from the forest.

Ques.—What legislation would you suggest as calculated to prevent a recurrence of similar crisis, and to give to the country sound systems of currency and banking, adapted to the requirements of its trade and commerce?

Ans.—This important subject is one which presents the greatest difficulty in grappling with "to give to the country sound system of Currency and Banking, adapted to the requirements of its Trade and Commerce." It is my own impression, and doubtless shared by many, that a Government Bank of Issue seems to be open to the insuperable objection of its being liable to become a political and dominant machine in the hands of the ruling party of the day. To compel all the Banks to use legal tenders on the principle of the recent Act, would subject the country to the grave difficulty referred to, namely, the look up of a large amount of capital. I would suggest that as there is no reason to suppose that the public are dissatisfied with the present Banking system, and believing, as I do, that it meets the present requirements of the country in furnishing it with an elastic currency better than any other system that can be devised, that the OBanks still continue to issue their own notes, and a concession be made of circulation, being the first charge in case of suspension against their assets. I would also suggest that the character of the Banks' Statements be improved, and provision made for suitable Government action in cess of weakness on the part of any Bank. It might also be advisable that periodical inspections be made by proper officers appointed by Government.

Answers by Mr. Hague, Cashier of the Bank of Toronto.

1. The condition of trade in Ontario at the time named was sound and satisfactory on the whole, though some depression existed in the lumber and timber trades, in consequence of over production. Money was very plentiful. The crop of 1867 was being rapidly moved to market. Little or no speculation prevailed in any branch of business. Oredits for some time back had been carefully guarded, and there was every appearance of continued prosperity. This was the condition of business up to 28rd October.

2. For about ten days succeeding that date business in certain districts was almost paralized. Produce fell considerably in value, and, for a time, money could not be obtained to buy it on any terms. After it became apparent that no further monetary disturbance was probable, there was a gradual recovery of confidence.

8. The failure of the Commercial Bank was the proximate cause of the disturbance. Following upon this was the run upon several of the Banks of Untario, which commenced on Thursday, the 24th October, increased on Friday, the 25th, and was continued on Saturday, the 26th, with decided symptoms of abatement, so far as the public was concerned, on the afternoon of that day.

On the same afternoon reports became prevalent of the discrediting of the bills of one Bank at the counter of the fiscal Agent of the Province and at several Custom Houses and Post Offices.

This revived and intensified the apprehensions which were felt, and the uneasiness increased until the announcement was made that the Government would receive the bills of all chartered banks, except the Commercial and Upper Canada.

On this becoming known the alarm rapidly subsided.

4 & 5. The effect on the policy of the banks, having their Head Offices in Ontario, up to the present time, can best be ascertained from their statements, as published in the Canada Gazette.

Taking the returns of the Gore Bank, the Optario, the Bank of Toronto, the Royal Canadian, the Bank of Commerce, and the Niagara District, for the month of the disturbance, for the month preceeding, and for two months succeeding, we find the following results in the leading items of their operations:—

Of the first item, circulation, the redemption amounted in November to \$720,000. This is probably \$300,000 in excess of what would have taken place, had there been no monetary disturbance.

Deposits, taking the six Banks as a whole, remained unaffected.

This seems to indicate that the run on the Banks was principally confined to the ignorant and the poorer classes of the community.

The discounts of the Banks show a considerable increase in October, and an equal decrease in November.

This last is the natural movement of the season, and cannot be attributed to measures of active curtailment which would not have had time to operate at so early a date.

6. That the confidence of the monied and commercial class was never seriously impaired, is evident by the fact that no general withdrawal of deposits took place.

The action of Government officials and the Bank of Moutreal on a particular day, gave rise to serious apprehensions. These, however, were allayed as soon as the announcement before referred to was made public. There is now every appearance that confidence is restored.

7. The Banks, as far as I am acquainted with them, will pursue a restrictive policy in granting long credits during the ensuing winter.

I consider it probable that the effect of the late derangement will mainly be felt in the restriction of the time for which loans are granted, and in rigid attention to transactions being based on produce or other merchantable property.

There is no reason, I believe, to apprehend that loans will not be obtainable for the purpose of moving the crops to market, or for the manufacture, to a limited extent, of square timber and lumber.

Had the crisis continued, as it would have doue in all probability but for the judicious use of its power by the Government, there would have been, beyond a doubt, an entire prostration of trade in every department, and withdrawal of credits for winter operations.

8. In the report of the proceedings of a Committee on Banking and Currency, published in 1859, there are recorded opinions of leading officers of the Banks as to the proper reserve to be retained by a Bank in proportion to its liabilities.

Mr. Davidson, of the Bank of Montreal, placed it at one-fourth of the circulation and one-seventh of the deposits.

Mr. Paton, of the Bank of British North America, at one-third of the circulation and one-sixth of the deposits. The banks for some years back have had far heavier reserves than was enstomary in former years, and on several occasions the returns of the *Oanada Gazette* have shown Western Banks as holders of nearly their whole capital in the shape of specie.

The following statement shows the reserve retained by the Banks of Ontario, (not including the Commercial) for the year ending September, 1807.

The item termed Available Assets includes specie and legal tenders, Notes of other Banks, and Balances due from other Banks payable on demand.

The reserve requisite to be kept in specie depends largely on the nature of a banker's business.

A Bank which has a large amount out on long oredits, or such as are of a standing character, will find it prudent to maintain a much larger reserve than another Bank which has a considerable amount of discounts in the shape of short loans.

Many of the discounts of the Western Banks in the fall of the year are almost equivalent to loans at call, as the property on which they are based is rapidly moved to market, and funds are remitted in payment at once.

The great Joint Stock Banks of London, as a rule, keep a smaller per centage of cash on hand than is shown in any of the months comprised in the above statement; and for this reason, that many of their loans and securities are in such an available shape that in case of difficulty they can be turned into cash at very short notice.

The lowest reserve of specie in the above statement, in proportion to total liabilities, was 17 per cent.; and of available assets convertible into gold in one or two days, 81 per cent.

Of the various "runs" that have been made on the banks in Oanada, the larger number resulted in a drain of not more than *three* per cent. of their total liabilities. The heaviest run which has been experienced by any one Bank resulted, I believe, in a demand for not more than *ten* per cent. of its total liabilities.

Neither of the Banks which failed during the last two years were brought into suspension by a run. They both succumbed to the effects of a steady and long continued drain of deposits, which resulted from a knowledge on the part of their oreditors of losses which considerably impaired their capital.

9. I have already remarked that the effect of the late crisis will probably be felt in a restriction of the length of credits and a more rigid attention to the quality of paper discounted than heretofore.

This will be a more valuable result than a mere increase in the amount of available assets, which may take place, as experience has shown, at the same time that a bank is becoming intrinsically weaker by incautious loans or discounts. It is probable, however, that a larger amount of actual cash may be kept on hand in future, and smaller reserves in the shape of bank balances.

10. Ten per cent.

11. Some of them held a certain amount of Provincial notes, which cannot be presented for redemption without fifteen days' notice.

The Bank of Toronto holds \$100,000 in this manner. The Bank consented to do this mainly because it was represented that the financial interests of the Government would be promoted thereby. Another reason was that favorable arrangements were secured with the Bank of Montreal as to settlement of balances, employment of spare funds, &c., the old system of settlements having been broken up after the passing of the Provincial Currency Act.

12. The Banks in the City of Montreal settle daily in gold or legal tenders. This Bank settles daily in gold or legal tenders at its head office, and by drafts on Toronto or Montreal at its branches in Ontario.

The rest of the Western Banks settle daily, either by gold or legal tenders, or by draft on Montreal.

13. Prices of produce fell considerably in some parts of the country, but there was a recovery on confidence being restored.

14. A complete answer to this question can be best obtained from a stock broker, but generally, I believe, there was a considerable fall in the value of Western Bank stocks after the crisis.

15. The rate for exchange in the Montreal market during last October varied from 6 to 8 per cent. premium for private, and from 8 to 9 for bank. In the early part of October there was considerable stringency in the money market of Montreal, and bills on London were pressed on the market at rates considerably below those current in New York. Exohange during the orisis was almost impossible to sell at any price, but afterwards the market recovered firmness.

16. During the early part of October the Banks in Montreal charged on some transactions from 10 to 14 per cent.

The searcity rather increased as the month progressed, and 14 per cent. became a usual rate in that city.

I have already observed that during the disturbance money could searcely be had at any price.

17. The effect of the Act of last session, directly, has been little felt, for the reason apparently that no Bank but the Bank of Montreal, which was a large creditor of the Government, came under its provisions.

Had the Bank of Montreal not been a creditor of the Government, the consequence must have been a large curtailment of its commercial discounts for the purpose of obtaining means to reduce its circulation. Being a creditor of the Government, the Bank was enabled to obtain circulating notes of the Province to replace its own as fast as they were required; an operation which was further facilitated by its being constituted the Agent of the Government for the management of its circulation.

Previous to the passing of the Act, the Bank of Montreal had curtailed its discounts very largely in the West; but the curtailment appears to have been for reasons unconnected with the Act, as the total of its advances was unaffected.

Indirectly the passing of the Act led to a suspension of the relations which had subsisted between the Bank of Montreal and the rest of the Banks of the country. These relations led to the greatest economy of funds, and were not less for the advantage of the Banks than for the public convenience. It resulted also in the locking up of a considerable amount of unproductive funds by the Banks, as referred to in my answer to question No. 11.

When the position of a Bank has become impaired, such a lock-up, unless its effects were counteracted, might be productive of disastrous consequences. In this case the interests of the public would suffer to a serious extent.

I believe also, that if soparate returns were required of the amount of Provincial notes and gold held by each Bank, it would be found that there is a considerably less average of gold in the Province than there was before the passing of the Act.

Judging from the returns in the Canada Gazette, I do not think the Provincial notes have displaced to any extent the issues of the Banks which still retain their circulation.

18. In answer to this question I may observe at the outset, that it is important to estimate accurately what the powers of legislation are in the matter.

No legislation has hitherto been devised, and in my opinion it would be impossible to devise any, by which the failure of banking establishments would be entirely prevented.

The experience of Scotland, England, and the United States, proves that under every

system of banking which has been known, whether private or public, whether with guaranteed circulation, restricted circulation, free circulation, or no circulation at all, there may be such bad management, that failure is the inevitable consequence.

It does not seem possible to prevent had management by legislation, and it is certainly impossible by any legislation whatever to prevent had management from producing its natural results.

In speaking of bad management, I refer wholly to the management of a Bank's funds in the way of discounts and loans, including the purchase of foreign bills.

So far as I am aware, there is no instance on record of a Bank suspending or failing, except from bad management of this description, that is either in the way of locking up the funds of the Bank in inconvertible securities, or in the way of loans or discounts to parties who became insolvent.

I give it therefore as my opinion, with due deference to the wisdom of the Senate, that it is vain to expect that monetary disturbances resulting from the failure of banking institutions can be wholly prevented by legislation.

While clearly perceiving, however, that the powers of legislation in this direction are limited, I am equally clear that measures may be devised, which, though they cannot wholly preventreckless management, will exert a powerful restraining influence on those who might otherwise fall into it. (Remarks on this branch of the subject will be made further on.)

In considering the subject of banking and currency in Canada, it is to be observed that the question cannot be considered simply in the light of an abstract proposition, and as if a system had to be inaugurated *de novo*.

We have in existence a number of chartered institutions with whom are inextricably associated all the financial interests of the country; the commerce, both foreign and domestic, the agricultural, the manufactures, the fisheries, the mining, the shipping, the railways of the Dominion, all stand in such intimate connection with our existing chartered Banks, that no measure can be taken either to enlarge or restrict their functions, either to jeopardize or benefit their interests, but must tell through numerous channels upon every department of business, and act at once on the revenues of the government itself.

These considerations, while they should not operate to prevent measures being taken for the improvement and reformation in the constitution and charters of our banking corporations, so as to give greater security to the public, should undoubtedly lead to caution, lest in endeavouring to remedy evils in one direction, others of a graver and more dangerous character are not brought to pass.

In such an important matter it seems the part of prudence to proceed cautiously, and guided by the light of experience, in the way of modification and improvement, rather than in that of revolution and fundamental change, seeking to remedy proved evils, and to guard against known dangers, rather than to give effect to untried theories; following the wise example of Great Britain in having a due regard to existing interests, considering well whether it is within the power of legislation to accomplish what is proposed, weighing the pecularities and circumstances of this, as distinguished from other countries, and those of each portion of it as distinguished from the rest.

Approaching this grave and important question in this spirit, it may be well to inquire at the beginning whether the system of Banking and Currency now in operation in Canada, has been proved in its main essentials not to be a sound and satisfactory one?

I am aware that it may be said that a system cannot be called sound and satisfactory under which two large institutions have failed within two years.

Allowing this argument its full weight in the determination of the question, we may estimate what that weight is on considering that these are the only two failures of any importance which have taken place for more than twenty years: that in one case every obligation is now being paid in full with a large surplus for the Stockholders, while in the other there has never been a depreciation in the value of claims to the extent of more than 10s. in the \pounds , while ultimately payment is certain beyond a doubt.

It is essential, also, to remember that during this period Canada passed through two severe commercial revulsions : one principally oppressing the East and the other the West, and both producing effects which were protracted with most depressing effect through many subsequent years.

It is all important to remember, when considering whether the system is responsible for

these failures, that during the same period there were numerous failures of bankers and banking institutions in Scotland, England, and the United States, of a far more disastrous character than these in Canada, and this under every kind of banking system; and that both the Bank of England and the Bank of France, during the same period, have been saved from suspending specie payments only by the direct interference of the Government.

Such considerations and comparisons are essential to a fair estimate of the importance to be attached to these failures; and, in view of them, the question may be fairly considered whether failures at least equal in extent would not have taken place under any other system?

Considering how severe and protracted the revulsions of 1847 and 1857 were, and how every interest of the East in one case, and the West in the other, was deranged for years, I ask whether the small extent of bank disaster, in the midst of such mercantile derangement, does not prove the system in its essential features to have been sound.

And when the small amount of loss sustained by note holders is placed against the important public interest that have been served by the Bank circulation through a long course of years, I respectfully submit whether a case has been made out for the inauguration of a radical and fundamental change.

The banking system of Canada is like that of Scotland and Ireland, and unlike that of England and the United States.

It consists of a small number of institutions with a large capital in proportion to their liabilities and business, the country districts being served by means of branches. This system has generally had the preference with practical and experienced bankers over one of small Banks, each serving its own district or neighborhood, and being in a state of isolation.

The system of large Banks with branches leads to the greatest possible economy of capital; a matter of paramount importance in a country like Canada.

It gives to country districts the security of large institutions, and renders possible a far better style of management.

Much as has been said of the failure of two banks during the last two years, I am convinced that the consequences have been of the most trifling character compared with what would have been the case in 1847 and 1857, had Canada been covered with Banks of small capital.

Such Banks, in this country, could neither make their depositors secure, nor give accommodation to the public. They could not carry on their business without constant re-discounting; they would generally be in a state of uneasy dependence; they would not make adequate returns to their stockholders, and the ultimate result would be that bank failures would be as common as the failures of merchants.

Such a condition of the banking interest is the most undesirable possible, even were the note holders ultimately protected, for depositors would be constantly exposed to losses, men of business to interruption of their discounts, and commerce to unnecessary fluctuations, while backing charges would necessarily be higher.

No one who is acquainted with the working of Canadian Banking for the last quarter of a century would wish to exchange it for a system like this.

Such a system might give the Banks with large capital a considerable power of control and surveillance over those small local institutions; but it does not follow that such control and surveillance would be a public benefit.

Approaching now the important subject of a circulating currency, I must again take the liberty of calling attention to the position in which the country is placed. At present nearly all the Banks of Canada circulate their own notes. The only important exception is that of the Bank which receives the Government deposits, and transacts the Government business, including the agency for issuing and redeeming Provincial currency. This institution ceased to issue its own notes about eighteen months ago, and since then has been issuing only the notes of the Government.

I have already pointed out that the position in which this institution stood with the Government, enabled this change to be carried out without disturbance to its general business.

It would, however, be far different with the other Banks which have a large circulation. On this circulation is founded a large amount of the banking business of the Province of Ontario, and to destroy it would necessitate so large a curtailment of business facilities, that a repetition of the revulsion of 1857 would be inevitable.

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On this subject I may quote from that able and practical banker, Mr. Gilbart, and I do so the more readily, because every person of reflection, and especially every practical banker will at once perceive the justness of the observations made.

Giving evidence before a Committee of the House of Commons, he observes :

"I speak the opinions of the Joint-Stock Banks when I say that the abolition of the country circulation would cause very considerable distress; would limit the 'power of the country Banks to grant the same accommodation to their customers; would compel many of their customers to sell their property, thus lessening the value of real property; that country bankers would be compelled to increase their charges to their customers; and, in some cases, that those banking establishments would be altogether abolished, in consequence of not being able to supply sufficient profit for carrying them on; that, in some other cases, however, the country circulation would be substituted or superseded by a bill circulation, nevertheless considerable distress would exist throughout the country Banks themselves, but their customers and the public in general, would be subject to very considerable loss and inconvenience."

Those Banks in Canada whose circulation is much larger than the amount they have invested in Government Securities, cannot redeem that circulation without calling in loans and discounts from the customers to a sufficiently large extent to enable them to do so.

and discounts from the customers to a sufficiently large extent to enable them to do so. From my knowledge of the business of the Province of Ontario, I should estimate that the facilities afforded to its merchants and men of business would require to be curtailed nearly one-third; a measure, or series of measures, which could not be undertaken without proudeing the result above referred to, and leaving every interest in the country prostrate.

Considering, therefore, what must be the certain consequences of the abolition of Bank circulation, it is well to reflect what benefits are proposed to be sought at the risk of such certain dangers. If it is stated that the principal benefits sought are certain convertibility, and ultimate security, it should be remembered that all experience shows that it is impossible to prevent Bank notes being sometimes inconvertible.

The Bank Act of Sir Robert Peel, in 1844, had for its principal object the securing, at all times, the instant redemption of the Bank of England note. Yet on three several occasions since the passing of that Act, intensity of panie was so great, that had it not been for the interference of the Executive, the Bank note must have become inconvertible within twenty four hours.

It is well known that in May of last year, the Joint Stock Banks of London had it in their power to make the Bank note inconvertible by withdrawing their deposits, and that they threatened to do so if the operation of Sir Robert Peel's Act was not suspended.

In two cases the Bank notes of Canada have been inconvertible within twenty or thirty years, and this when the mercantile system of the country, its credit, capital and trade were beyond all comparison, weaker and more full of unsoundness than those of the mother country. Yet so stable has been our Banking system, that we have had a far smaller average of Banking disasters, and losses by Bank notes.

To attempt to secure absolute inconvertibility will result, in my opinion, in entire failure, while it is certain that in making the attempt losses and disasters will be brought about, compared with which the losses by the Banks which have failed are not to be mentioned.

In endeavoring to provide for 'the ultimate security of the note circulation, the Legislature proposes to itself an object which it is undoubtedly in its power to accomplish.

The Legislature of the United Kingdom provides for safety of the creditors of Banks of Issue, by rendering every stockholder liable for the full amount of his property.

In Canada the same object has been sought, by providing that stockholders shall be liable for the debts of the Corporation to an amount equal to double their shares.

This provision, in my opinion, together with others to be found in the Bank Charters, and some, which may be incorporated therein, will make every provision for the security of note holders and depositors which can be required. It is essential, however, that a mode be devised of making the double liability operative.

Under such an arrangement, the ultimate security of Note holders will be as great, as is likely to be attained, even under a system of Government issues, or issues based on Governmental securities. For under the former, there is nothing to prevent the Government, in a time of pressure, from relieving itself by suspending specie payments.

The Note in this case will immediately decline in value, precisely as the Notes of our suspended institutions have done.

Under the latter, the fluctuations in the value of Government Securities, especially in times of political disturbance, may render that security most imperfect.

I consider, then, that our present system, with certain improvements to be named hereafter, is capable of fulfilling every reasonable demand, both of convertibility and security. It is free from certain objections which lie against other systems of circulation, and its continuance would save the country from a protracted financial revulsion. It produces the greatest economy of capital; it enables the largest amount of facilities to be given to trade and commerce; and it provides, naturally and easily for those expansions and contractions which periodically occur in agricultural communities. It is sound in principle, being based on redemption in gold on demand; and the certainty that excessive issues must immediately return, is an efficient check on irregularity.

A Government issue of circulating notes, even if it could be substituted for our Bank circulation without disturbance, is open to grave financial and political objections. Of the former the gravest, in my judgment, is that in a period of pressure the Government could, at pleasure, suspend payment of its notes in specie. A Bank cannot suspend payment of its notes in specie without ruin. Its very existence therefore, is bound up in maintaining specie payments inviolate; but no such pressure would weigh upon the Government, whose operations under suspension of specie payments would go on undisturbed.

The political objections to such a system are perhaps graver still.

With regard to a system by which the Bank circulations is based on Government securities, I may observe that it is in every respect preferable to the foregoing.

It would still be open however, to the grave objection, that its substitution for the present system would inevitably produce a financial revulsion; and when in operation, it would be without any facility of expansion required by the incidents of our seasons; it would be far more difficult to work; be exposed to greater risk of inconvertibility; give less security to depositors; and provide no better ultimate security to note holders.

If it led to the establishment of small Local Banks, these would be exposed to all the evils previously referred to.

If the experience of the National Banks of the United States is pointed at in this connection, I may observe—and it is a fundamental point in the question—that the currency of that country is not now on a specie basis, and has not been since the National Bank Act was passed.

No argument can, therefore, be drawn which is applicable to the circumstances of Canada.

After a careful study of the causes which have led to the failure of our Banking Institutions, and of the course of action which those failures suggest, both for the public interest and the safety of creditors and stockholders, I have come to the conclusion that, while it would be most inexpedient to introduce any radical and fundamental changes in our Banking system, it would be highly desirable were improvements and modifications introduced in the following important particulars, to which I humbly crave the attention of the Honorable Senate:

First.—As to the qualification of Directors. I begin with this, because it is in the Directorate that the essential power and character of the Corporation consists.

It is obvious that it is a matter of fundamental importance to secure for the governing body of the Corporation those who have a large pecuniary interest in its prosperity. It is, I think, further obvious that the qualification for the control and government of a corporation with large capital should be greater than that required for the government and control of a corporation with a small capital.

I respectfully suggest, therefore, as the first measure of amendment, that to remedy the evils which have been found to arise from a weak Directorate, the future qualification for a Director of a Chartered Bank be the possession, in his own name and right, of a least one per cent. of the capital stock.

Secondly.-I conceive it to be a point of fundamental importance in the management of a Joint Stock Bank to accumulate and maintain a considerable rest or guarantee fund. The Banks of Canada, until recent years, all fell into the serious mistake at various times of dividing nearly the whole of their reserve fund amongst the shareholders, in the shape of bonuses.

Calculation will shew, that, had the various sums which were thus injudiciously and improperly divided in the case of the two Banks which have failed, been retained and invested, a sufficient sum would have accumulated to have saved them both from suspension.

I recommend, therefore, that a Bank be prohibited from distributing to its stockholders in any one year more than 8 per cent. of its profits, until its rest or reserved fund reaches 25 per cent. of its paid up capital, after all bad and doubtful debts have been provided for; and that, should this reserve be infringed on for the purpose of keeping up the dividend, the amount be again made good.

Third.—I would prohibit the reduction of the capital of a Bank under any circumstances.

The reduction of the capital of the Banks in Canada has been proved to be productive of great evils.

Instead, therefore, of allowing such a measure, when the capital has been impaired by losses, I would give powers to the Directors, and make it imperative to call upon the stockholders for a sufficient amount to restore the capital to the original amount.

One effect of a provision of this kind in all probability would be, that stockholders would take a deeper interest in the affairs of their corporations than they appear generally to have done, at all events, when affairs scemed prosperous.

Fourth.—The returns required from the Banks have undoubtedly exercised, to a certain degree, a corrective and and restaining influence. This might, I conceive, be considerably increased, and it would be of great benefit to the public and to the customers and stockholders of the Banks if it were so.

The returns of the Bank of France, I submit, might be adopted with advantage as a model upon which to frame the returns of the Banks of Canada.

I make no further suggestion in detail, but submit that had the Banks for the past ten years been required to state separately the amount of their loans to merchants, and men of business; their loans to Railway or other corporations; their loans on security of Railway bonds; Debentures, Stock, &c., and their loans to the Government; distinguishing such as were due and over due; and such as were secured by real estate. If in addition, the Banks had been required to show what they owed the Government, as distinguished from other depositors, and what their foreign agents, as distinguished from other bankers, it is certain that much mischief would have been checked in its beginning, and more would have been prevented (through fear of the returns) altogether.

Fifthly.—The privilege of circulation ought certainly to be continued, but it might be an advantage to restrict it to the amount of Capital and Government Securities.

Sixthly.—The Banks should be required to hold 20 per cent. of their demand liabilities in specie or legal tenders, and so long as they do this to prevent public interests suffering by any Bank jealousies or hostilities, they should be bound to receive all current notes on deposit, provided the same were daily redeemed.

Seventhly.—In case of its becoming necessary to wind up the affairs of a Bank, the interests of creditors should be paramount, and the stockholders be called on to make good any deficiency to the extent of their liability without delay.

The above amendments are all I would suggest with regard to existing corporations; but as respects any to be created in future, I submit that the following regulations as to capital might be adopted in addition.

Let no Bank be chartered in the Cities of Montreal, Quebec, Toronto, St. John or Halifax, having a smaller capital than one million dollars, and let the maximum capital for any such Bank at no time exceed four million dollars.

Any Bank located at any other town or city in the Dominion, should have a capital of not less than one million dollars, but this should be the maximum as well as the minimum.

But if the population of any such town or city increase to 40,000, the maximum might be enlarged. No new Bank to commence business until 20 per cent. of its capital is actually paid up and deposited in some chartered Bank, to be approved by the Government. I do not suggest that the power of circulation should be bestowed on any new Bank at once, as no vested interest would be disturbed by withholding it for a time, and circulation does not necessarily expand with the progress of the country. A new Bank could without difficulty make arrangements with an older one, whereby its issues could be used to mutual advantage, in the same manner that many country Banks in England, now arrange with the Bank of England. After its stability was proved, the privilege of circulation might be granted.

If the foregoing suggestious are carried out, any circulation, other than that of the Banks, will be unnecessary, as the country will possess a well secured system of issues, perfectly adapted to its circumstances, and a banking system as carefully guarded against abuse as it is possible to compass.

Answers by Mr. Dallas, Cashier of the Canadian Bank of Commerce.

THE CANADIAN BANK OF COMMERCE, Toronto, 24th March, 1868.

In compliance with the request of the Committee of the Honorable the Senate of the Dominion of Canada, on the recent financial crisis, I beg to submit the following, in reply to Queries Nos. 17 and 18; and I have requested the President of this Bank,—the Hon. Wm. McMaster,—now in Ottawa, to be good enough to reply to Query No. 11, as I understand that the arrangement with the Bank of Montreal, for the Canadian Bank of Commerce holding a certain specified amount of Provincial notes, was effected by that gentleman, previous to my assuming the management of this Bank.

Upon reflection, I have thought it better not to offer any reply to the remaining queries, Nos. 1 to 16 inclusive, for the reason that at the period of the crisis to which these queries relate, I was not—and for more than two years previous I had not been—a resident of the present Province of Ontario, and in consequence do not feel qualified to give, as of my own direct knowledge, any information of value upon the subject.

In Query No. 17 you enquire as to the effect of the recent legislation authorizing the issue of Provincial notes—first upon the Banks, and secondly upon the general interests of the country.

I reply to the first.

The effect upon the Banks—other than the Bank of Montreal—I conceive to have been prejudicial, although in an indirect rather than direct manner.

Under the provisions of the Provincial Note Act, the largest Bank in the Dominion has succeeded in relieving itself, almost entirely, of its liability for its circulating notes; and in so doing has attained a position in which it can, with comparative impunity, disregard the effect of those elements of distrust which in periods of panic affect, more or less injuriously, the circulation of all Banks. Without charging that the Bank of Montreal, during the recent panic, availed itself of the vantage ground thus obtained; its ability to do so, if disposed, must be admitted by all bankers in Ontario to be an element of anxiety, and as such prejudicial to the interests of our Banks.

As to the second.

Considering the very extended and intimate relations which the Banks of Ontario sustain to the general interests of the country, I consider that the effect of the Provincial Note Act upon those interests must be in almost direct proportion to its effect upon the Banks, which I have stated above to have been prejudicial.

 \dot{A} further injury I consider that the general interests of the country have sustained, is the very serious depletion of specie which has undoubtedly resulted from the operation of the Act.

The present Monthly Bank Returns required by Government do not afford any information as to the amount of specie held, as distinguished from Provincial notes; but I confidently hazard the opinion, that this amount is not more than one-half of the amount held by them previous to the enactment of the Provincial Note Act.

In one manner alone, there is reason to suppose that these notes have taken the place

of gold to the extent of fully one million dollars. The comparatively independent position, already referred to, as having been attained by the Bank of Montreal, enabled that institution to urge upon the Bank of Ontario the holding of a certain amount of Provincial notes, on terms which precluded their being employed as eash, until notice had been given for a fixed time. Of course specie was given by these Banks to the Bank of Montreal in exchange for the Provincial notes so held, and the amount of specie so paid, I believe to have been fully \$1,000,000. Had the Banks refused to comply with the proposal of the Government Bank, it is impossible to say whether the latter might not have resorted to the expedient of refusing the notes of all Banks declining to comply with its proposition. I am, of course, not prepared to say that this course would have been followed; but the fact of the Government Bank having been in a position to adopt such a measure, in my opinion, influenced several Banks to comply with their request, in regard to the holding of Provincial notes.

The course of settlement of balances between the Bank of Montreal and the other Banks, subsequent to the passing of the Provincial Note Act, must also have inevitably tended to withdraw specie from the country. In the ordinary course of business, the daily balances between Banks are constantly fluctuating, and in this way the Bank of Montreal will doubtless owe other Banks one day, while the next, it may be a large creditor of other Banks.

Now, when the Bank of Montreal owes other Banks, it will invariably, (except when some special and rare interest affects its policy) pay in Legal Tender notes, but when any other Bank owes the Bank of Montreal, it must pay the latter in Legal Tenders or gold, and it must be apparent that for some time subsequent to the passing of the Legal Tender Act, the other Banks could have had no Legal Tenders to pay with, and as a consequence, must have paid the Bank of Montreal in gold, which gold however could never have been regained from the Bank of Montreal except at its own option.

If it is urged that the position attained by the Bank of Montreal, by its adoption of the Legal Tender Act, could easily have been secured by any or all of the other Banks, I reply that while theoretically this is true, practically it would have been impossible of attainment.

At the period of the adoption of the Legal Tender system by the Bank of Montreal, the Government of Canada was indebted to that institution in one way or another, to an amount about equal to its circulation, and consequently no curtailment of loans to the public was required to be made by the Bank, to enable it to provide gold to pay the Government for their Legal Tender notes.

But it is to be remarked that in order to enable that Bank to make the advances to the Government now referred to, it had previously curtailed very largely its loans to the public in the present Province of Ontario.

Had the other Banks attempted to adopt the Legal Tender system, the curtailment of their loans to the public which it would have been necessary to effect in order to procure the gold to pay the Government for these notes, would, in my opinion, have induced very general ruin upon the Province of Ontario.

In reply to query No. 18, I consider that, while no legislation can be devised to prevent entirely the recurrence, under a combination of unfavorable circumstances, of what is known as a commercial crisis, still the security of the holders of Bank notes can be rendered sufficiently valid, if not absolutely perfect, by requiring the Banks to retain a certain proportion of their circulation in specie or its equivalent; and by further requiring them to publish so explicit an analysis of their assets and liabilities as shall clearly indicate the general soundness or unsoundness of their position from time to time. I consider that such an improved return would have saved the late Commercial Bank from suspension, and in the case of the Bank of Upper Canada, if the same result had not been attained, the stoppage of that Bank would have been effected at an earlier date, and before its assets had been so ruinously impaired as they were at the date of its stoppage.

My objections to the adoption by the Banks of a Government circulation—whether in the form of a simple Legal Tender note, or a Bank note based upon Government bonds, which the Banks would be compelled to hold to an amount at least equal to their circulation, are two. First,—That in order to obtain the money to pay the Government, in the one case for their Legal Tender notes, or in the other for their bonds or debentures, it would be necessary to contract the loans of the Banks in Ontario to the public, to an extent equivalent to the amount required to be paid to the Government for such notes or debentures. This amount I estimate at about seven millions of dollars for Ontario, and I consider the withdrawal of this amount of eash capital from this Province would be productive of little short of universal ruin to the manufacturing and commercial community; while the prices of produce would certainly be materially reduced. And secondly,—Supposing the ohange from a Bank to a Government circulation once effected, the latter would unavoidably lack that power of periodical expansion which the industries of this country demand; while the only mode of providing for such expansion of a government circulation—namely, by periodical credits from the Government, or the Government Bank, I consider in the highest degree objectionable, as placing the interests of the Banks, and through them, of the business community, at the disposal of the Government of the day, and in all probability, practically of one man.

Answers by Mr. Woodside, Cashier of the Royal Canadian Bank.

To Question 1.—The condition of trade in Ontario between the first of September and the fiftcenth of October last was most satisfactory. Mechanics were fully employed, Farmers were disposing freely of their produce and obtaining good prices for the same, and the Banks were discounting freely in order that the produce might be forwarded : and trade generally, I considered, as in a sounder condition than for many years previous.

To Question 2.—Immediately on the breaking out of the panic, the Banks began to call in their loans—refusing new discounts. The prices of produce fell, a general stringency in money matters took place, and the business of the country suffered greatly in consequence.

 T_O Question 8.—The immediate cause of the crisis, was, the suspension of the Commercial Bank of Cauada, which event might have been averted had the Directors of that institution made earlier application to the Banks of Ontario for assistance; but, their application was delayed till the day of its suspension, and even then it was made in Montreal where three only of the Western Banks were represented, and then there was not time to lay the application for assistance properly before the several Boards of the Western Banks. Had there been sufficient time given to consider the application and proper security offered, I feel assured that the requisite assistance would have been given. The suspension of the Commercial had the effect, also, of somewhat shaking the confidence of the public in all paper money, and this feeling was increased by the action of the Bank of Montreal, in telegraphing to their Agents at various points what they term a "confidential caution." This confidential caution was in effect, if not in words, an order to refuse the bills of certain Banks. As an instance of the injurious way in which this operated to increase and intensify the panie, I may state that a Rail Road Company in making their usual deposit at one of the Agencies of the Bank of Montreal, had a fews Bills picked out of the deposit and returned to them. At once the Manager of the Rail Road Company telegraphed to all the stations upon his line of road, to refuse the bills of this Bank, which was accordingly done. This action, with others of a similar kind, aggravated very much the feeling of distrust which was caused by the suspension of the Commercial, as the telegraph wires were freely used to spread the feeling of distrust. This feeling was however almost put an end to when Sir John A. Macdonald announced that the Government would receive the bills of all the chartered Banks except the Commercial and the Upper Canada.

To Question 4.—The effect upon the policy of the Banks generally, has, I think, been to cause them to refuse accomodation to many parties who would otherwise have received it, and as these parties cannot get the necessary discounts from the Banks, they are driven to borrow from private parties, who charge much higher rates than the Banks.

To Question 5.—The effect upon the deposits has been very trifling, but the circulation has been considerably reduced.

To Question 6.- I do not think that, among the great body of the public, confidence

was at all shaken as to the stability of the Banks, and many of those who brought bills for gold refused to take Provincial notes for them, taking away again the bills they had brought for gold ;—others again paid one and two per cent. to get gold for Provincial notes.

To Question 7.—I think it will; I do not think that the Banks generally will grant the usual facilities for getting out lumber, or indeed, for any other purpose; and I fear that a good many laborers and others will, in consequence, be thrown out of employment.

being a little less than one-eighth in specie against circulation and deposits. In the same statement I find that the Bank of Montreal held \$628,902 against \$4,535,385 of circulation and deposits, or a little less than one-seventh.

To Question 9.—I think a larger portion ought now to be kept, because of the uncertainty that there is with regard to the action both of the Government and the Bank of Montreal. There is no assurance that another "pressure" may not be brought to bear upon the Banks, and I think they ought to keep very strong in order to be prepared for the worst.

To Question 10.—The Banks are by law required to hold ten per cent of their paidup capital in Government securities. By arrangement with the Bank of Montreal, which was entered into very shortly after the issue of the Legal Tenders, the Bank with which I am connected hold fifty thousand dollars in Legal Tenders without interest. This arrangement I look upon as a most unjust one, and would not have been entered into but for the power of coercion granted to the Bank of Montreal. This fifty thousand dollars is beyond the amount of Legal Tenders received in the ordinary course of business from day to day, and which likewise are held without interest.

To Question 11.—Most of the Banks hold Legal Tenders under arrangement with the Bank of Montreal, which preclude their using them as the equivelent of specie in their ordinary business. The amount held by the Royal Canadian Bank is fifty thousand dollars without interest. They are held because of coercion.

To Question 12.—There is no uniformity in their mode of settlement with each other —the ordinary way is to make exchanges daily, and to settle either by paying gold or Legal Tenders, or by draft on their Head Offices or on Montreal.

To Question 13.—The effect of the panic caused by the failure of the Commercial Bank, in connection with the action of the Bank of Montreal, was to lessen the value of all commodities, and to prostrate trade generally. To Question 14.—I herewith hand you the quotations from the Canadian Monetary

To Question 14.—I herewith hand you the quotations from the Canadian Monetary Times and Insurance Chronicle, both before and after the panic, from which you will see that there is a considerable reduction in values.

To Question 15.—Same as to fourteen.

To Question 16.—The condition of the money market in the early part of October was easy, but in November it was very tight.

To Question 17.—At the time of its introduction it created almost a financial erisis, and the business, both of the country and of the banks, suffered serious injury for a time, and but for its operation there would have been, in my opinion, no crisis or panic in October last; for had the Bank of Montreal been on the same footing as the other banks of the Province it would not have dared to cast discredit on the bills of other banks just as solvent as itself; but, having the control of the Government issue, it was placed beyond injury by a run—and as it is paid by the Government not only for its own circulation but it is paid a percentage upon the Government circulation, it is manifestly its interest to drive in the circulation of the other Banks in order that this may be got out. This, I suppose, may be called "such pressure as the Government might properly employ upon the financial institutions of the country"—(Vide statement of Hon. Mr. Galt in reference to Commercial Bank failure). If so, it is most injurious to trade generally, and to the public at large.

To Question 18.—It is not possible for legislation to prevent panics. I believe that the present Bank circulation is undoubtedly sound, for it is based on the paid-up capital of the Banks, beside which each stockholder is liable to pay as much more should it be required. Such a currency is, in my opinion, much more safer than the issues of any Govornment which is based upon its indebtedness. The one must be paid to the uttermost farthing, the other is evaded by an Order in Council or in some other way when it is not convenient to redeem.

For the requirements of this country the present system has worked well, perhaps better than any other would have done, and I look upon it as a dangerous thing to experiment with what has answered such a good pnrpose, and run the risk of getting something not so good.

The very fact of the Government issuing its Legal Tenders in Montreal, which are redeemable only in Toronto, and issuing in Toronto those payable in Montreal, shews that it does not wish to be called upon to redeem them.

As a proof that the Banks are not overpaid, I think it may with truth be said that taking them altogether since they commenced, they have not paid their shareholders, on an average, six per cent.

Let the Legislature use proper care in granting charters, place all Banks on an equal footing, and, if they think necessary, exact further security, and they will have done enough. No Bank should be placed or allowed to remain in such a position as to enable it at the caprice of its manager to derange the currency and so possibly paralize the trade and commerce of the country.

Mr. George Walker says, "The proposition to create a Government circulation, and thus to borrow money from the people without interest is no new one. It has suggested itself to every civilized nation in the seasons of their extremity. It has been taken up and considered by the most eminent statesmen of all countries and uniformly regretted by them as impracticable. There is no recorded instance of a solvent nation adopting such a currency except under circumstances of such overruling necessity as have for a time suspended its ability to pay in ready money. Though there is a constant progress in the machinery of commerce in some directions the (considerations on which the expedient of a Government circulation has been rejected) have not been overcome by time and are in their nature insurmountable."

Alexander Hamilton, in his report on the subject of a National Bank, says: "The emitting of paper money by the authority of Government is wisely prohibited to the States by the national Constitution; and the spirit of that Constitution ought not to be disregarded by the Government of the United States. Though paper emissions, under a general authority, might have some advantages not applicable, and be free from some advantages which are applicable to the like emissions by the States, separately, yet they are of a nature so liable to abuse, that the wisdom of Government will be shown in never trusting itself with the use of so seducing and dangerous an expedient. In times of tranguillity it might have no ill consequences; it might even, perhaps, be managed in a way to be productive of good; but, in great and trying emergencies, there is almost a moral certainty of its becoming mischievous. The stamping of paper is an operation so much easier than the levying of taxes, that a Government, in the practice of paper emissions, would rarely fail, in every such emergency, to indulge itself too far in the employment of that resource to avoid as much as possible one less auspicious to present popularity. If it should not be carried so far as to be rendered an absolute bubble, it would, at least, be likely to be extended to a degree which would occasion an inflated and artificial state of things, incompatible with the regular and prosperous course of the political economy. Among other material differences between a paper currency issued by the mere authority of the Government and one issued by a Bank, and payable in coin, is this : That, in the first case, there is no standard, to which an appeal can be made, as to the quantity which will only justify, or which will surcharge, the circulation; in the last, the standard results from the demand, whence it is evident that there is a limitation in the nature of the thing, while the discretion of the Government is the only measure of the extent of emissions by its own authority."

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Sir Robert Peel says: "Another point for consideration is, whether the profits which must necessarily be derived from the circulating medium of the country should be reserved by Government, or should be allowed to remain in private hands? Now, Sir, the advantages, the only advantages, which I have been enabled to discover in a Government Bank, as compared with a private company, are those which result from having responsible persons to manage the concern, the public deriving the benefit of it; but, then, on the other hand, I think these benefits are much more than counterbalanced by the political evils which would inevitably result from having this Bank under the control of the Government. I think that the effect of the State having the control of the circulating medium in its own hands would be most mischievous."

Answers by Mr. Cassels, Cashier of the Gore Bank.

1. During the period mentioned trade, generally, in Ontario was in a sound and satisfactory condition. The harvest of the past year was unquestionably a very satisfactory one, and good prices were obtained for all kinds of farm produce.

2. During the latter part of October the great demand for money occasioned a temporary stringency. This, and the unfavorable state of the English markets, checked operations in produce, and although towards the middle of November the Banks were again discounting freely—the demand for produce being restricted—business, generally, for a time, was in a dull and depressed condition.

3. The chief causes of the monetary derangement and consequent depression in business, during the period referred to in Query No. 2, were the suspension of the Commercial Bank of Canada, for which event the public were not prepared, and the very general feeling of distrust occusioned thereby in the minds of the farmers in the other Banking Institutions in Ontario, and which led to a "run" on several of them. It was asserted at the time that the then existing distrust in the Banks was aggravated by the action of the Bank of Montreal, before and after the suspension of the Commercial Bank. This was subsequently refuted, (see Minutes of the Directors,) and it must now be admitted that, but for the timely and liberal aid offered by that Bank, the distrust would have extended and produced the most serious consequences.

4. The "Statement of Banks" published in the Canada Gazette does not enable me to state the effect produced on the business of the Banks in Ontario. But, by comparing the statements of Banks in Ontario and Quebec for the months of September, October and November, the following result will be seen:—The September statement shews the Notes and Bills Discounted to amount to \$53,522,981.84; the October statement \$55,560,282.11, being an increase of \$2,037,800.27 in October; the November statement \$52,728,298.09, shewing a decrease, as compared with September, of \$799,688.75, and with the October statement of \$2,836,989.02. The largest increase during the period above-mentioned was in the notes and bills discounted by the Bank of Montreal, the amount being \$1,304,183.22. Since November there has been a decrease in the aggregate of notes and bills discounted by the Banks in Ontario and Quebec. 5. The denosits in September amounted to \$20,002, 208, 28

6. Public confidence has been restored.

7. I think not:

Banks' reserves.

8. About one-third of demand liabilities. Circulation and current account balances. 9. I think not, but there may be special reasons at certain seasons for increasing the 10. One-tenth part of the paid-up capital.

11. Several of the Banks, I understand, hold Provincial notes under an arrangement which precludes their using them as the equivalent of specie in their ordinary business, but to what extent each Bank holds these notes, I am not informed. This Bank (the Gore) agreed to hold a considerable portion of its reserves in Provincial notes, but no agreement was entered into by which the Bank was precluded from using them in the ordinary course of business. The amount to be held was not fixed, but since the arrangement was made with the Bank of Montreal, the average has been \$172,902.00.

In October, 1866, the Bank of Montreal issued orders requiring, after a short notice, a settlement at points where each Bank had agencies, in specie, or its equivalent, instead of by cheque on the Head Office of the Bank, as formerly. On representing to the General Manager of that Bank the serious consequences that might ensue, and the loss that would accrue from being under the necessity of retaining a much larger amount of specie, and consequent inability to do the same amount of business as formerly, in the event of the instructions being carried into effect, that officer at once consented to withdraw the orders recently issued. For this concession, the Gore Bank agreed to hold Provincial notes as above stated.

12. The Gore Bank settles for balances, with the other Banks in Hamilton every day. The agreements are as follow :---With the Bank of Montreal and Bank of British North America---settlement in specie or legel tenders ; with the other Banks, settlement by cheques on Toronto or Montreal. These agreements do not prevent other modes of settlement when advantageous to both Banks, such as by draft on New York, Sterling Bills, &c.

13. The events referred to in question 13 had the effect of paralyzing trade and causing a decline in the price of grain; but this, owing to the restoration of confidence, was only of short duration.

14. This can be ascertained by reference to Toronto and Montreal Brokers' Circulars. In Hamilton there is no market for Stocks, and no report of Canadian securities is published.

15. The weekly quotations during October last, for Bank Exchange on London at sixty days' sight were, respectively, 9 ($0.9\frac{1}{2}$, $9\frac{1}{4}$ ($0.9\frac{1}{2}$, $9\frac{1}{2}$ ($0.9\frac{3}{4}$, and 8 ($0.8\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. These were the Montreal quotations. In Upper Canada the rates are generally higher.

Merchants' Exchange is seldom seen here.

16. During the month of October there was a great demand for money. The rate of interest in Upper Canada was generally 7 per cent.; in Lower Canada the rates were higher.

17. The Act of last Session providing for the issue of Provincial notes, has not had, so far as I can see, any effect upon the banking and general interests of the country. The Provincial notes in circulation have merely replaced those of the Bank of Montreal, which have been withdrawn.

18. Commercial orises will occasionally happen under any system of business. Legistion cannot avert the ill consequences of reckless or unsuccessful banking, nor can it provide for safe and prudent management, but, as regards the currency, it is the especial province of the Legislature to place it upon a sure and sound basis. The public will demand this, and it is only right and reasonable that it should be granted. I may here state that the opinion is gaining ground that the currency should be secured by the resources of the Dominion. The present system might be continued with advantage to the Banks and the country, and the object in view attained, by restricting the circulation and compelling the Banks to invest a large amount—say one-half—of their capital in Government Debentures, these to be lodged with the Government as security for the note holders. There is, however, this serious objection to the adoption of such a plan, viz., that it would compel the Banks to reduce their business, which cannot be done without inflicting injury upon the commerce of the country.

Answers by Mr. Arnold, Cashier of the Niagara District Bank.

1. Satisfactory.

2. Considerably crippled by the inability of monied institutions to afford the means necessary for its legitimate requirements.

3. To some extent the failure of the Bank of Upper Canada, but directly by the closing of the Commercial Bank, aggravated by the course rumoured as having been pursued by the Bank of Montreal, in refusing to receive the notes of Banks in good repute, except on collection, which rumour, whether founded on truth or not, obtained credence in Ontario.

4. The effect upon the policy of the Banks has been the withholding of the usual accommodation hitherto afforded, and required by the public at this period of the year.

5. The withdrawal of considerable sums from the Ontario Banks, and the deposit of same with the Bank of Montreal; also the hearding of silver and gold in place of Bank notes previously held.

6. Yes, and very materially assisted by the favorable published reports of the condition of the Commercial Bank.

7. I think it will. The Banks generally are under the impression that some legislative enactment with regard to them will take place. Until satisfied in this respect, and until they are placed upon an equality with the Bank of Montreal, as regards their circulation, a restrictive course is likely to be pursued.

8. This varies according to the views of the different Banks. In the country Banks experience has proved that a steadier proportion of line of deposits and circulation may be relied on than in citics; consequently a smaller reserve of specie is required in the latter. From 15 to 20 per cent. was formerly held.

9. I do not think a higher per centage is necessary now. Formerly a large proportion of the gold held by the Banks was withdrawn by brokers from the United States and in Canada in the redemption of circulation there. This has of late years entirely ceased; the average circulation considerably diminished from former years, and used in this country, and the gold required is only that needed for the settlement of balances between Banks.

10. Ten per cent. of its capital or not less than ten thousand pounds currency. I do not know that any Bank is required to hold Provincial Notes, although I have heard it stated that some of them do, upon what conditions I do not know.

11. As far as my experience goes, by the payment of gold, by gold draft on New York, or draft on money centres, such as Montreal or Toronto.

12. The effect has been injurious, because it has worked partially in giving an undue preponderance of power to one Bank; had all the Banks adopted the scheme, I think it would have been a measure advantageous to them and the general interests of the country.

18. This question I feel incompetent to answer satisfactorily. I would suggest, however, that were some scheme adopted whereby the circulating notes of Banks would be secured, either by the pledge of Government Stock or making such Circulation a first lien upon the assets of the Banks, a recurrence of similar crisies would not occur. It rarely happens that a panic is created or a run precipitated by depositors; the note-holders are the first to take the alarm; therefore I think by securing a uniform unquestionably secured note, the primary cause of panic is removed. Any legislation, however, to withdraw or lessen the expansive power the currency possesses under the present Banking system, would, in my opinion, operate unfavorably to the country as regards its trade and commerce.

Answer by Mr. Morton, Secretary to the Trustees of the Bank of Upper Canada.

1. Trade was in a sound and satisfactory condition at the period named.

The crops were more evenly distributed over all districts of the country than usual, and there was no failure of any single product. They were rather under average as to quantity, but more than average in quality. Prices were high, business brisk, and farmers were rapidly realizing, in cash, the fruits of the season's industry.

Importations had not been excessive in Ontario, and the business of the mercantile community was on the whole in a perfectly healthy and safe state also.

There was no over speculation of any kind, and everything betokened a prosperous Fall and Winter trade to the permanent wealth of the country.

2. The Banks were suddenly compelled to decline their usual advances to produce buyers; and other capitalists were not prepared to step into their places, without a moment's warning, and supply the necessary means for the transaction of this class of business, especially in the then very unsettled state of monetary affairs. In addition to this, the farmers for some time looked with extreme suspicion on everything in the shape of a note. Operations in produce accordingly became dull and languid, and for a brief period ceased almost altogether. This, occurring at a time when such business is usually at its fullest activity, reacted in a most injurious manner on mercantile houses, who were already considerably affected by the Banks being forced to husband their resources. The result was a general stagnation of trade and very considerable alarm.

3. I believe the causes of the derangement were these :---The suspension of the Commercial Bank; the imputations cast upon the Royal Canadian, and a feeling of uncertainty in the public mind as to the policy the Bank of Montreal was likely to pursue. The alarm was very much aggravated by various flying rumors of barsh intentions on the part of the last named institution.

4. The only sources of information to which I have access are the monthly statements of Banks published in the *Canada Gaeette*, and I do not consider these a sufficiently reliable guide for the formation of an exact opinion.

5. So far as I can judge from these, the Banks in Ontario decreased their discounts, circulation and deposits, between the 30th Sept. and 30th November last, indicating a very unusual contraction of their business at that period. The restrictive policy then inaugurated would still seem to be pursued.

6. In so far as public confidence in the stability of the Banks was impaired, it has been restored.

The confidence which business men lost was not with regard to their stability powers, but with regard to their power to sustain mercantile credit as well as their own in case of need. In this respect, public confidence has not been completely restored, and, in my judgment, it cannot be until the future Backing policy of the Dominion is fully and permanently ascertained.

7. It will.

8. From one-fourth to one-tenth, varying according to circumstances, such as the state of trade, the probable demands for specie, the amount available on call in England or elsewhere, &c.

Attempts have occessionally been made by bankers to follow rigid rules that a certain fixed proportion of specie should be held against circulation and deposits at all times and under all circumstances; but so far as I am aware, such rigid rules have not been found to mark successful Banking administration in Canada. The amount to be held invariably resolves itself into a question of prudence and foresight on the part of a good banker, having in view the profit as well as the safety of his Bank.

9. Yes; because of the relations which subsist between the Bank of Montreal and the Government respecting Provincial notes.

10. Ten per cent. of their paid-up capital.

11. I am not in a position to say.

12. I cannot say. Up to the passage of the Provincial Note Act of 1866, all points drew by mutual agreement on Montreal, where settlements took place in specie.

13. It lowered the prices of all commodities, more particularly of produce; and it caused a general stagnation of trade in the Province of Ontario.

14. I cannot give the weekly quotations asked for. As a general answer, however, I may say that Bank Stock fell, some, of course, more than others. Government Debentures, together with Building Society Stocks, and other securities of a similar nature, rose in much the same proportion as Bank Stock fell.

15. I am not in a position to answer this question.

16. Moncy was plentiful, but the rates of interest varied extremely, according to the fears or necessities of the hour; so that practically it was inaccessible to the fair trader when excitement ran high.

17. I believe the Provincial Note Act has been highly prejudicial to the true interests of the country. Any profits derived by Government, from the circulation of these notes, has, in my opinion, been far more than counterbalanced by the injury the Act has caused to the trade and general banking interests of the country, more especially of the Province of Ontario.

Amongst other evils, its operation places one Bank in antagonism with the others by a difference of interests, responsibilities, and position. These differences are so great as to intensify the danger of crises in all periods of financial depression.

18. I consider the present laws affecting Banking and the Currency defective in soveral important elements.

1. Inasmuch as the Banks are allowed to create Currency practically without restriction, and are not required to give any security whatsoever to the note holder; the various safeguards introduced into the Bank Charters for the protection of note holders being utterly unavailing for any such purpose.

2. In that the Banks derive all or almost all the profits of the circulating medium used by taxpayers; which profits legitimately belong to the taxpayers themselves, or in other words, to the Government.

3. Because of exceptional legislation touching the Currency, regarding which but one invariable rule should, as far as possible, prevail; the exceptional legislation being that which places "legal tenders" in competition with bank notes.

(a.) Having due regard to the position of the Banks, (and especially the Western Banks) and what may be called their "vested rights;"

(b.) The securing of the note holder, who cannot be expected to exercise judgment as to the stability of the Banks, but must take as Currency that which is the only representative of Currency;

(c.) The requirements of trade in a young country, where a certain expansive power in the circulation seems necessary for its due development;

(d.) And the necessities of Government, which demand an economical administration of all the public affairs for the proper protection of the taxpayer;

I believe the following amendments in the present laws might be made with much advantage to the Banks and to the Government, without abruptly interfering with the general trade and banking of the country to any serious extent.

1. Place all the Banks on an equal footing by abrogating the Provincial Note Act.

2. Abolish the "Circulation Tax," and cancel the rule which compels Banks to hold 10 per cent. of their paid-up Capital Stock in Government securities.

3. Compel all Banks issuing notes to hold Government securities (say for a convenient name, "Exchequer Bills") not bearing interest, equal in amount at all times to say one-half their circulation.

4. The circulation to be a first charge against the Bank's estate in case of suspension, and the exchequer bills to be applied at once to its redemption; care being taken to prevent a conversion of deposits into circulation during the period of suspension.

5. The double liability of shareholders to be enforced within a certain limited period.

6. All existing Bank charters to be renewed for eight or ten years on these conditions. new charters to be subject to the same provisions.

7. The exchequer bills to be made payable to the bank applying for and buying the same. These documents not to be transferable, and to be made re-payable in specie at such points as may be deemed advisable.

8. The cash received by Government for these exchequer bills to be applied in paying off the floating debt, and in reedeming interest-bearing debentures.

9. The Minister of Finance to hold the following available for the redemption of these exchequer bills, viz :---

(a.) Say for the first \$5,000,000 Government debentures redcemed, including the floating debt transformed into that shape.

(b.) For the next \$1,000,000, not less than one-fourth in specie; the balance not held in specie to be held in Government debentures to be redeemed. (c.) For all over \$6,000,000 not less than one-half in specie, the balance in Government debentures to be redeemed.

10. The Minister of Finance to sell Government debentures so redemed for the purpose of keeping up the quota of specie or of meeting probable demands, when such a course shall be deemed advisable by the Governor in Council.

11. The Governor in Council, in case of any sudden or unexpected emergency, to be authorized to lend Government debentures to any of the chartered banks to an extent not exceeding per cent. of their paid-up capital, on certain specified securities of an undoubted character; the amount so loaned to be published weekly in the Canada Gazette until repaid.

I would further suggest that a few alterations should be made in the "Statement of Banks" published monthly in the *Gazette*, if it is considered desirable to continue their publication at all.

(1.) They should each be required to furnish a balance sheet on a given day of the month. According to the present system of an "Average" statement, probably no two Banks follow the same rule.

(2.) Many, if not all of the Banks, charge sterling Bills of Exchange to their English correspondents the moment they are purchased or sent off by mail, although they may have 60, 90, or even 120 days to run before maturity. By doing so, these bills disappear from the balance sheet of the bank, notwithstanding its liability for their endorsement. These ought in all cases to appear amongst the "Assets" of the Banks until paid; being as much "Bills discounted" as any other bills cashed by them.

(3.) Many of the Banks include amongst their "Notes and Bills discounted" not only ourrent mercantile bills, but also overdue bills, bills in suit, judgments, cash credits, and debts considered irrecoverable. This item of "Notes and Bills discounted" should be amplified to a certain extent, so as to render the position of the Banks somewhat intelligible; and especially should this heading distinguish between loans effected and maturing in Cannda, from those maturing in the United States and England.

(4.) Balances due to and by Banks cover not only Canadian but also English and United States Banks. It would be well to have the Canadian and Foreign Balances given separately.

(5.) If the Provincial Note Act is either extended or continued, it would be very desirable for the public information to have the Provincial notes in the hands of Banks distinguished from the specie.

All which is most respectfully submitted.

Answers by Mr. Stevenson, Cashier of the Quebec Bank.

1. During the period referred to business in Ontario appeared in a healthy state, with the exception of the Dry Goods trade, in regard to which importers could not but feel the effects of the great decline in cotton and other staples. Excessive importations throughout Canada obviously resulted in sales being made without profit, and in many cases at loss.

2. After the suspension of the Commercial Bank, the Banks refused to advance money for the purchase of produce or any other operations, the consequence was that there were no buyers, and prices fell from 10 to 20 cents per bushel. Sales at the declined rates were limited, as there were no buyers at any figures excepting for the supply of the retail trade. Farmers fortunately could afford to hold their grain. A great stringency in money in the United States prevented American buyers coming forward.

3. The causes that produced the monetary panic were :--The fear that in consequence of the sudden suspension of the Commercial Bank, note holders and depositors of the several Banks would be seized with panic and demand payment of a large proportion of the liabilities of Banks to them. Second,-The apprehension that if the public lost confidence, the Government Bank would become exigent, and thus increase the panic.

4. The Banks in Ontario being in a position, as a general rule, to meet their engagements to the public by withholding accomodation for a time, made fresh advances the moment the panic ceased, principally on cargoes of grain for the United States, such advances being convertible into gold within three weeks from the time they are made.

5. Except in one or two instances, the people of Ontario appear to have had confidence in their Banks, and the demand for gold and transfor of deposits from other Banks to the Government Bank were but trifling.

6. Confidence has been restored, but the Directors of Banks, apprehensive of changes in the system of banking being introduced by the Legislature, feel uneasy and operate with caution.

7. Until the policy of the Government in relation to the renewal of the charters of existing Banks is known, trade will be inactive.

8. Upon the amount in circulation and ordinary deposits, one-fifth. Upon deposits bearing interest, one-seventh.

9. The amounts stated in the previous answer ought to suffice, but if the Directors of any one of the chartered Banks were to allow its business to become too extended or overtraded in relation to its capital, the Directors of other Banks if they could not control the operations of such Bank, would have to look to their reserves. It is essential that the business of banking should be conducted upon sound principles, and a departure from these by any one Bank must affect more or less the policy of others working under a similar system of banking. A demand for settlement in gold or legal tenders at all the agencies of an extended Bank, would require that Bank to keep at least one-fourth of the amount of its notes in circulation, and of its ordinary deposits, as a reserve.

10. One tenth.

11. Some of the Banks voluntarily entered into an agreement with the Government Bank to hold Provincial Legal Tender Notes under a special arrangement. It is stated that they felt they were obliged to make this arrangement because the Government Bank intimated that they would otherwise demand gold or legal tenders, as stated in the last part of No. 9. The Quebec Bank declined to enter into any arrangement.

12. Settlement daily or whenever required, in gold or legal tender notes.

13. See answer to No. 2.

14. The operations in Bank Shares and other stocks were limited. Holders were not needy nor apprehensive, and sales were not pressed.

15. Sales of round amounts of Exchange could not be made excepting at rates equal to one per cent. below those of New York. Banks therefore preferred selling in that market rather than submit to lower rates in Montreal.

16. Money, before the suspension of the Commercial Bank, was easy at seven per cent.; for some time afterwards it could scarcely be had, and very high rates could be obtained.

17. I am not of opinion, as many allege, that the failure of the Commercial Bank and the monotary difficulties that followed are traceable to that Act. I think some portion of the commercial suffering is due to it; and I am of opinion that its effects have not been favorable to the general interests of the country.

18. The system under which all the Banks, excepting the Bank of Montreal, are con-ducted in virtue of their charters, is one that has been tested by many generations, and experience has proved that it has not been found wanting in adaptation to the requirements of trade and commerce. It has been urged by some that it is a system applicable to a people proverbial for caution, such as the Scottish, that to them only the working of Banks under it may safely be entrusted; but investigation will satisfy every ordinary inquirer that the banking system of Scotland has largely contributed to the education of the people in business caution ; and long experience and observation in the practical working of banking business in these Provinces convince me that much of the comfort and prosperity enjoyed, and intelligence manisfested in the management of business, is due to that judicious system of banking having been early introduced in this country-a system, the principles of which being observed and faithfully adhered to in practice, provides safety to the public for accumulating wealth, admits the nominal expansion of paper money, and that elasticity in monetary matters so essential to a producing country such as Canada. I am aware that a list of eminent men may be identified with views favorable to an issue of (fovernment paper money : but another list of equal if not greater eminence may be cited on the side of the system under which the Banks in Canada, with one exception, are conducted. Spencer, in reference to the issue of State paper money, writes: "The truth is, that the bugbear of depreciation is one that would have been unknown but for the sins of governments. In the case of America, where there has been occasinal depreciations, the sin has been the sin of omission; the State has not enforced the fulfilment of contracts has not forthwith bankrupted those who failed to cash their notes. In all other cases, the sin has been a sin of commission. The depreciated paper currency in France during the revolution was a State-currency. The depreciated paper currency we have known has been, to all intents and purposes, a State currency. It was the State which, in 1795-6 forced upon the Bank of England that excessive issue of notes which led to the suspension of cash payments. It was the State which, in 1802, forbade the resumption of cash payments, when the Bank of England what a uppension of cash payments from which the excessive multiplication and depreciation of notes resulted. The entire corruption was entailed by State expenditure and established by State warrant."

Sir,—I have the honor to reply as follows, to the series of qustions from a Committee appointed by the Honorable the Senate of the Dominion of Canada, which you sent me in December last :—

1. What was the condition of trade generally in Ontario, between the first of September and first of October last?

Answer.—I have no reason to think, that from the third of September last to the fifteenth of October following, the condition of trade generally was bad in the Province of Ontario.

2. What was the condition of same during the remainder of October, and down to the middle of November.

Answer.—Between the end of October and middle of November last, the state of commercial affairs in Ontario underwent a change of a nature to occasion fears for the future.

8. What were the causes which combined to produce the general monetary derangement and great depression in business, which existed during the period referred to in query No. 2, and were they aggravated or allayed by any, and what, special causes ?

Answer.—The principal cause, which produced at that time a general emubarrassment in monotary affairs in the Province of Ontario, was, according to all appearance, the suspension of the Commercial Bank of Canada, at Kingston.

4. What has been the effect produced upon the policy or business of the Banks in Ontario, as evidenced by the amount of their discounts, before and since the crisis?

Answer.—In consequence of the failure of the Commercial Bank, it became expedient for the Banks in Ontario to put themselves on their guard. They had greatly to restrict their discounts, and in many cases to compel the payment of their bills receivable, in order to protect their circulation and deposits. This course of proceeding must have been considerably embarrassing to commerce.

5. What has been the effect npon their deposits and circulation?

Answer.—The effect of the crisis was to create a considerable diminution in the deposits and in the circulation of bank notes in Ontario.

6. Is public confidence being restored?

Answer.—Towards the end of November the crisis had disappeared; and towards the 20th of December, public confidence was nearly restored.

7. Will the effect of the crisis extend injuriously to the approaching winter trade?

Answer.—Notwithstanding the diminution of capital caused by the suspension of the Commercial Bank, there was no reason at that time to apprehend any bad results for the then approaching winter, because it might have the effect of restraining excessive importations for 1868—of inducing greater prudence in the transaction of affairs, and probably greater care in the management of the banking institutions of the Province.

8. What proportion of the circulation and deposits were deemed sufficient to be held in specie in former years.

Answer.—Experience has always shown that it is prudent for banks to keep specie in hand to the amount of about one fourth of their circulation, and one seventh of their deposits. They ought to be obliged to do so by the law respecting Banks in general.

9. Is a larger proportion necessary now, and why?

Answer.—I do not see why it should be necessary to keep a larger sum now, provided the cash in hand consist of such coins as would be a legal tender for the redemption of circulation, and the re-payment of deposits.

10. What proportion of their capital are the Banks required to hold in Provincial Debentures?

Answer.—The Banks are required to keep a tenth part of their capital invested in Provincial Debentures.

11. Do the Banks hold Provincial notes (legal tenders) under any arrangement which precludes their using them as the equivalent of specie in their ordinary business; and if so, what amount is held by the "National Bank," and why?

Answer.—I think there has been a special arrangement between certain Banks and the financial agent of the Government under which they have held a certain amount of Provincial notes, which, however, they could not use, as equivalent to specie, in their ordinary business. The National Bank never entered into such an arrangement.

12. State the terms and conditions on which the Canadian Banks adjust their balances with each other?

Answer.—The terms and conditions of the arrangement between the Canadian Banks are to the effect, that balances due shall be paid in American or English gold coins, the former being required by law to be of denominations not less than five dollars. Balances are settled also at Quebec by Provincial notes, of any denomination whatever. The Banks generally settled their balances but twice in each month, except with the Bank of Montreal, which always exacts a daily settlement when the balance is in its favor.

13. What was the effect upon the price of commodities, and upon trade generally, produced by the suspension of the Commercial Bank and the panic that ensued in respect to other Banks in Ontario?

Ans.—The suspension of the Commercial Bank, and the panic with respect to the other Banks in Ontario, which was consequent upon it, had a very bad effect upon the prices of commodities and merchandize, by forcing the sale thereof in a very prejudicial manner.

14. What were the weekly quotations during October for Bank and other leading stocks?

Ans.—In the first week in October no movement of consequence took place in the sale of stocks, and prices did not change. In the second week there was a great demand for stocks, and large amounts were sold without any change in the price. In the third week, on account of the great demand for money, a large amount of stock was offered on the market, and prices fell. In the fourth week, in consequence of the suspension of the Commercial Bank, the price of almost all Bank stocks fell.

15. What were the weekly quotations during October for Bank and first-class Merchants' Exchange on London, at sixty days' sight?

First-class private exchange was about one per cent lower than bank exchange at the same period.

16. What was the condition of the money market, and what were the rates of interest during the same period?

Ans.-In the first week in October the demand for money was somewhat considerable. It increased until the third week of the same month, when interest rose to more than seven per cent, paid.

17. What, in your opinion, has been the effect of the Act of last Session, providing for the issue of Provincial notes, upon the banking and general interests of the country?

Ans.-In my opinion, the effect produced by the Act passed in the month of August. 1866, providing for the issue of Provincial notes, is far from being a favorable one to the monetary institutions and general interests of the country. That Act has had the effect of conferring too great powers upon one single institution, to the detriment of the other banks of the country. It has also had the direct effect of causing to disappear from the country a large amount of gold, the best basis of currency, to be replaced partly by foreign silver coins, which are a general nuisance and a cause of considerable loss to institutions and individuals, and partly Government paper-money which is subject to depreciation. and which is already depreciated, in places, other than Montreal and Toronto, where the financial agent of the Government is not bound to redeem these notes with gold coins. Such a measure may have dangerous consequences in future, by affording to the Government too great facilities for raising money.

18. What legislation, in your opinion, would be best calculated to prevent a recurrence of similar crises, and to give to the country sound systems of currency and banking, adapted to the requirements of its trade and commerce?

Answer.-It is very difficult to prevent the regular or irregular crises which happen everywhere at certain periods, and which must necessarily take place in consequence either of the contraction or of the displacement of circulation, or owing to political causes. And the Government, in its wisdom, will never be able to stop a crisis like that created by the suspension of the Bank of Upper Canada and the Commercial Bank, when institutions of the same kind shall exceed in a similar manner the limits prescribed to them by law, and disregard its requirements, enacted for their protection. Nevertheless, the Legislature may, so far as it is practically possible to do so, obviate the frequent repetition of such crises as those of which we had to deplore the sad effects, by amending our present laws-regulating the system of currency and banking-so as to provide for something like the following things, namely :

1st. Bona fide subscription of a not less than a million of dollars.

2nd. That the shareholders be solvent, so that their double liability may be easily enforced, in case of need, in a legal manner.

3rd. Above all, that the Directors be solvent, and that their qualification be in propor tion to the importance of the affairs of the institution they are called upon to conduct.

4th. That a reserve fund in due proportion to the capital be created, of which one-tenth should be invested in Government debentures.

5th. That there be a specie reserve equal to about one-fourth of the amount of the notes in circulation, and one-seventh of the amount of deposits.

6th. That there be a periodical inspection either of the organization of the Banks or of their daily action, or of the preparation and publication of their financial statements.

7th. That there be as equal a distribution as possible of the public funds between the monetary institutions of the different localities, in order that the means of accomodation to trade be not lessened at any time by the collection of duties.

8th. Lastly, that the currency be so arranged as to facilitate the redemption of notes in circulation and the re-payment of deposits.

Because Banks of Issues spread all over the country, always adapting themselves better to the wants of trade and commerce than a single Bank or State Bank, the management of those establishments will be more active, more able, and more free than that of branches of a State Bank, and it will always have a tendency to adapt the rules of each Bank to the usages of the locality in which it is established.

Questions submitted to Mr. King, General Manager of the Bank of Montreal, not yet answered by him.

1. What was the condition of trade generally, in Ontario, between the 1st September and 15th October last?

2. What was the condition of same during the remainder of October, and down to the middle of November?

8. What were the causes which combined to produce the general monetary derangement and great depression in business, which existed during the period referred to in Query No. 2, and were they aggravated or allayed by any, and what, special causes ?

4. Did any of the Agents of the Bank of Montreal, during the period above referred to, refuse to receive, except in collection, the notes of any of the specie-paying Banks in Ontario ?

5. Furnish the Committee with copies of all communications instructing Agents or Officers of the Bank of Montreal, or which were understood by them, or any of them, instructing them to refuse the notes of other specie-paying Banks, except in collection.

6. How did the condition of affairs during the months of October and November, affect the discounts and deposits of the Bank of Montreal in Ontario?

7. State the amount of each—discounts and deposits—of the Bank of Montreal, in Ontario, on the 15th and 31st October, and 15th November last.

8. What amount of specie was held by the Bank of Montreal on the first days of January and July in each of the last five years, and what proportion did it bear to the sirculation and deposits of the Bank at the same period.

9. What are the terms and conditions on which the Banks adjust their balances with each other?

10. What, in your opinion, has been the effect of the Act of last Session, providing for the issue of Provincial notes, upon the banking and general interests of the country?

11. What legislation, in your opinion, would be best calculated to prevent a recurrence of similar orises, and give to the countrya sound system of Currency and Banking adapted to the requirements of its Trade and Commerce?

Answers by Mr. Paton, General Manager of the Bank of British North America.

No. 1. What was the condition of trade generally in Ontario, between 1st of September and 15th October last?

Ans. Trade generally was not satisfactory. Importations, especially of dry goods, were in excess, and a serious fall in the prices of dry goods had taken place. Speculators in breadstuffs had lost heavily, and the demand for manufactured lumber from the United States had almost ceased, leaving a large stock of that article in the manufacturers' hands, or stored in the United States. The farmers were on the whole prosperous, the high prices obtained by them for wheat and barley, and the superior quality of the grain compensating them for the unexpected shortcoming in the yield, which in many districts was not an average one.

No. 2. What was the condition of same during the remainder of October and down to the middle of November?

Ans. From the 15th October to the middle of November there was much depression in trade, and in some quarters considerable financial embarrassment.

No. 3. What were the causes which combined to produce the general monetary derangement and great deprezsion in business which existed during the period referred to in Query No. 2, and were they aggravated or allayed by any, and what, special causes?

Ans. The failure of the Commercial Bank, the sudden withdrawal of banking facilities from its numerous customers, and the disturbance in the financial arrangements of those having accounts with that Bank, or holding its notes, were causes in themselves sufficient to produce much depression in the business of the country and great monetary derangement. These causes were aggravated by the failure of several commercial firms, by the fall in the price of breadstuffs in England, and more especially by the temporary excitement produced by the suspension of the Commercial Bank, resulting in a run on some of the Banks in Ontario, whose liabilities were disproportioned to their available resources, and who in self defence, and as a measure of precaution, required to curtail their discounts and increase their assets. The excitement was allayed by the Banks meeting the run upon them, and also by the action of the Government in publicly announcing that the notes of all the Banks in the Province, with the exception of those of the Bank of Upper Canada and the Commercial Bank, would be received in payment of duties.

No. 4. What has been the effect produced upon the policy or business of the Banks in Ontario, as evidenced by the amount of their discounts before and since the crises ?

Ans. The effects produced upon the Banks in Ontario have been salutary. Larger reserves are now deemed necessary, and greater discretion is exercised in making loans. The discounts of the Banks between 31st October and 30th November were considerably reduced.

No. 5. What has been the effect upon the deposits and circulation?

Ans. The deposits of the Banks, between the 31st Oct. and 30th Nov., as appearing from their public statement, was very little changed, but their circulation was reduced.

No. 6. Is public confidence being restored ?

Ans. Yes, in a great measure.

No. 7. Will the effect of the crises extend injuriously to the approaching winter trade?

Ans. There is great depression in nearly every department of trade, but I do not think that this ought to be altogether attributed to the failure of the Commercial Bank. The principal causes are excessive importations and depression in one of the principal branches of trade, viz., that of manufactured lumber. The effect of the so called crises may not be altogether injurious, as it will check importations for 1868, induce greater caution in business transactions, and probably greater circumspection in the management of the Banking Institutions of the Province.

No. 8. What proportion of the circulation and deposits was deemed sufficient to be hold in specie in former years?

Ans. Not less than one third of immediate liabilities ought to be held in specie and Legal Tender notes. This is the proportion of specie returned against Circulation and Current Deposit Accounts by the Bank of British North America, in addition to a large reserve in New York, available at any time when required.

No. 9. Is a larger proportion necessary now, and why?

Ans. Not larger than that stated in my answer, No. 8, unless in the event of any actual or apprehended excitement or panic. In consequence of the excitement caused by the failure of the Commercial Bank, the Bank of British North America considered it necessary to increase the specie reserve to an amount equal to about one half of its immediate liabilities.

No. 10. What proportion of their capital are the Banks required to hold in Provincial Debentures?

Ans. All the Banks in Canada, with the exception of the Bank of British North America, are required by their charters to hold an amount equal to one-tenth of their capital in Provincial Debentures. The Bank of British North America requires only to hold in Provincial Debentures an amount equal to its small note circulation, which at present is \$112,089, but the Bank holds now \$867.440 and has held for many years a much larger sum in Provincial Debentures, equal to about one-sixth of its capital.

No. 11. Do the Banks hold Provincial notes (legal tenders) under any arrangement which precludes their using them as an equivalent for specie in their ordinary business, and, if so, what amount is held by the Bank of British North America, and why?

Ans. The Bank of British North America, under an arrangement with the Fiscal Agents of the Government, holds \$200,000 in Legai Tender notes, as part of its reserve, and as the equivalent of specie, and these notes are at all times if required available for ordinary business transactions; but it has been agreed that if so used an equal amount shall be obtained from the Agents within twenty four hours, and paid for as may be arranged, either by exchange, gold drafts on New York, or specie. This arrangement was entered into because it was agreeable to Government, because it facilitated the settlement of balances, throughout Canada, with the Financial Agents of the Government, and because it was neither an inconvenience nor a loss to the Bank. The arrangement can be terminated by either Bank giving seven days' notice.

No. 12. State the terms and conditions on which the Canadian Banks adjust their balances with each other.

Ans. The Bank of British North America adjusts its balances with all the Banks in Montreal by a daily settlement in gold or legal tender notes. At its branches in Ontario, and at Quebec, settlements are made daily with Banks whose head offices are in Montreal, by the branches giving or receiving settlement cheques. payable on demand in Montreal, In Toronto, Hamilton and Quebec the branches settle daily in specie or legal tender notes with Banks whose head offices are in these places. With branches of these Banks, this Bank settles daily by giving or receiving cheques in Toronto, Hamilton, Montreal or Quebec in accordance with arrangements entered into to meet the convenience of the respective Banks.

No. 13. What were the weekly quotations during October for bank and first-class Merchants' Exchange on London, at 60 days' sight ?

Ans. The rates of Exchange were :

The selling rate, for credit, was 1 to 1 per cent. higher than the above.

No. 14. What was the condition of the money market, and what were the rates of interest during the same period?

Ans. No changes took place in the ordinary advances of the Bank of British North America, and the usual rate of seven per cent. was charged.

No. 15. What, in your opinion, has been the effect of the Act of last Session providing for the issue of Provincial notes upon the banking and general interests of the country?

Ans. I do not consider that the Legal Tender Act of last Session has had any other effect on the banking and general interest of the country than that of replacing the circulation of the Bank of Montreal, which is being withdrawn, by a like amount of Legal Tender Notes, and of giving the Government the use of four-fifths of the amount of the circulation of these notes. It merely involves the substitution of Government notes for the circulation of the Bank of Montreal.

No. 16. What legislation, in your opinion, would be best calculated to prevent a recurrence of similar orises, and give to the country sound systems of currency and banking, adapted to the requirements of its trade and commerce?

Ans. The Government, by granting charters only to Banks with sufficient paid-up capital, say not less than \$1,000,000, by taking measures to ascertain that the capital has been paid up before the Bank commences business, by limiting the number of Branches in proportion to the paid-up capital, by restricting the amount of liabilities in proportion to paidup capital, the specie, and Government securities held, and by requiring the specie reserves to be maintained in prudent proportion to the liabilities of each Bank, may aid greatly in giving the country a sound system of banking, and one adapted to its trade and commerce, but no Government legislation can prevent the recurrence of such events as have unhappily taken place within the past two years in Canada, viz., the failure of the Bank of Upper Canada and of the Commercial Bank. Such events can only be prevented by the circumspect, cautious and intelligent management of these who have the direction and charge of the Banking Institutions of the country.

SECOND REPORT OF THE SELECT COMMITTEE.

OF THE HONORABLE THE SENATE,

UPON THE

CAUSES OF THE RECENT FINANCIAL CRISIS

IN THE

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

The Select Committee appointed to enquire into and report upon the causes of the recent financial crisis in the Province of Ontario, beg leave to submit the following as their SECOND REPORT: —

That in their first Report, your Committee had the honor to submit to your Honorable House they presented much valuable evidence bearing upon the subject referred to them.

That they now submit that of Mr. E. H. King, General Manager of the Bank of Montreal.

That the Gentlemen connected with the management of Banks in Ontario, who have given evidence, with the exception of Mr. Paton, of the Bank of British North America, are unanimous in stating :---

That general prosperity prevailed in Ontario in October last when the financial crisis unexpectedly occurred in that Province.

That while it continued, it was severe and alarming; and that the best interests of the Province were placed in serious peril.

That it was attended with public distrust in the Bank Note Currency of the country, as evidenced by a run upon several of the Banks, and general and great depreciation in the value of the staple products of that Province.

That this state of things continued until the Government announced that the Notes of all the Banks, except those of the Bank of Upper Canada, and the Commercial Bank, would be received in payment of public dues.

That the primary cause of the crisis was the suspension of the Commercial Bank of Canada.

That, in their opinion, the orisis was aggravated by the course pursued by the Bank of Montreal, in refusing to receive, in certain cases, the Notes of other specie-paying Banks, except on collection. (Mr. Paton of the Bank of British North America, and Mr. Cassells of the Gore Bank, express opinions different from the majority of the Bankers upon this point—which will be particularly seen on reference to their evidence.)

That under the Provisions of the Provincial Note Act of 1866, the Bank of Montreal, having withdrawn its own Notes from circulation and substituted for them the Notes of the Province, it was no longer interested, in common with the other kindred institutions, in maintaining unimpaired, the credit of all; and that the effect of that Act was to place the interests of the Bank of Montreal, the most powerful monied Institution in Canada and the Fiscal agent of the Government, in antagonism to those of the other Banks. That Mr. King's explanation respecting the refusal, by some of the Agents of the Bank of Montreal, to receive the notes of other specie paying Banks, is contained in his evidence, answer No. 4.

That your Committee further submit, that much valuable information on the important subject of Currency and Banking, will be found in the answers to questions Nos. 16, 17 and 18, in the evidence presented with their First Report.

That it will there be seen that the Bankers are almost unanimous in condemning the existing Provincial Note Act, giving their reasons therefor, very fully.

That they are equally unanimous in stating, that in their opinion it would be for the general interests of the country, to return to the banking system as it existed before the passing of the Provincial Note Act, with additional guarantees for the certain redemption of bank-notes on demand; limiting the issue of the same; providing greater security to depositors; recommending that an improved Form of Return be made by the Banks; suggesting a Government inspection, and other amendments.

That your Committee recognize it as one of the first duties of Government, to provide a secure currency—one that will command the largest measure of public confidence, and be convertible into coin on demand.

That your Committee are of opinion that the extension of the Bank of issue system, now partially in operation, would be unsuited to the requirements of the country, and injurious to its best interests.

That your Committee venture to express the hope that the Government may recommend to Parliament, a return to the system which formerly existed (improved as suggested in the evidence submitted, and already referred to herein), and under which Canada attained to great prosperity.

That if the financial requirements of the Dominion should induce the Government to desire the introduction of a new system, including the taking possession of the currency of the country (which your Committee would strongly deprecate), then your Committee would recommend that the issue of the paper currency be based upon the deposit with the Government of public securities of the Dominion, under a system somewhat analogous to that of the National Bank system of the neighbouring United States, but redeemable on demand—the Government regulating the issue under the authority of Parliament; the Banks through which the notes are issued, being responsible for their instant redemption.

That Your Committee bcg leave to express the opinion, that in view of the early expiration of the Bank Charters, it is highly desirable that the Government policy on Currency and Banking should be settled and announced as speedily as possible.

That should any material change in the system be proposed, your Committee suggest that it be introduced very gradually and with great caution, in order to afford opportunity for observing its effects upon the interests of the country, and time to interpose by legislation, should they prove prejudicial.

lation, should they prove prejudicial. In conclusion, your Committee being of opinion, that the Returns, as at present required from the Banks are not as full and particular as the interests of the public and shareholders require, beg respectfully to recommend that the annexed form be substantially adopted for the Returns of all the Banks of the Dominion; and that in consideration of the importance of the matter, an Act be passed during the present Session, requiring them to adopt it.

All which is respectfully submitted.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS OF THE SENATE, OTTAWA, IN REFERENCE TO THE RECENT FINANCIAL CRISIS IN THE PROVINCE OF ONTARIO.

No. 1. What was the condition of trade generally in Ontario, between the 1st September and 15th October last?

I was absent from the country during the period, but I have reason to believe that trade was moderately prosperous.

No. 2. What was the condition of the same during the remainder of October, and down to the middle of November?

From the middle of October to the middle of November, those branches of trade depending upon Bank advances, were considerably depressed.

No. 3. What were the causes which combined to produce the general monetary derangement and great depression in business, which existed during the period referred to in query No. 2, and were they aggravated or allayed by any, and what special causes ?

The monetary derangement was a consequence of the suspension of the Commercial Bank, and was felt more severely, owing to the season of the year at which it occurred. This monetary derangement was aggravated by a severe run upon several of the Banks in Ontario, and was allayed when the public became assured that the Government and its Fiscal Agents would continue to receive their Notes.

No. 4. Did any of the Agents of the Bank of Montreal, during the period above referred to, refuse to receive, except on collection, the notes of any of the specie-paying Banks in Ontario?

I am not aware that any of the Agents of the Bank refused to receive the notes of any of the Ontario Banks (except those that had suspended) where they were paying specie, or where they had Agencies, with the exception of our Kingston Manager, who acted under a misapprehension, and was immediately corrected by selegram from the Head Office. Two or three of the Agents of the Bank did decline to receive, except on collection, the notes of the Royal Canadian Bank at places where that Bank had no office.

No. 5. Furnish the Committee with copies of all communications, instructing Agents or officers of the Bank of Montreal, or which were understood by them, or any of them, as instructing them to refuse the notes of other specie paying Banks, except on collection.

These communications contained the impressions felt from day to day relative to the strength or weakness of different Banks, the probability of their suspension, the assistance they obtained, and the degrees of confidence to be placed in their good or bad management, &c. I may be permitted to say that these communications had reference to the exercise of a discretion which this Bank possesses, in common with the whole community, in discriminating between the risks involved in the acceptance of the promises of one Bank, as compared with another. I trust, therefore, that the Committee will not consider it necessary to press for the production of communications, between the Bank and its own servants, of a private and confidential character, respecting the management of the Institution, and which, I fear, might prove to be prejudicial to other interests.

No. 6. How did the condition of affairs between the months of October and November affect the discounts and deposits of the Bank of Montreal in Ontario?

The discounts and deposits were both increased.

No. 7. State the amount of each-discounts and deposits-of the Bank of Montreal in Ontario, on the 15th and 31st October, and 15th November last.

This information I do not feel at liberty to give, unless required, in the manner provided by the Charter, viz.:—To the Governor in Council, in confidence. I subjoin, however, a statement shewing the increase or decrease of the Banks deposits and discounts in Ontario, upon the dates named, which will enable the Committee to judge of the effect of the suspension of the Commercial Bank, upon this Institution, for which purpose, it is presumed, the information is desired.

This, added to the average amount of specie and Provincial notes, will make the statement stand as follows :---

No. 9 What are the terms and conditions on which the Banks adjust their balances with each other?

The settlement generally between the Banks at Branches and Agencies, is by draft upon their Montreal office, or their Head office, where the ultimate settlement is made in gold or legal tenders.

No. 10. What, in your opinion has been the effect of the Act of last Session providing for the issue of Provincial Notes, upon the Banking and general interests of the Country?

The effect of the Provincial Note Act, so far, upon the Banking circulation of the country has been little more than to replace the Notes of the Bank of Montreal, with those of the Government. The effect upon the general interests of the Country has been to transfer from the Bank of Montreal to the general public a portion of the floating indebtedness of the Government.

No. 11. What legislation, in your opinion, would be best calculated to prevent a recurrence of similar crises, and to give to the country sound systems of currency and Banking, adapted to the requirements of its trade and commerce?

I think it is quite beyond the reach of legislation to prevent the recurrence of monetary derangement, caused by imprudent management, or excessive competition in Banking. The Legislature may mitigate the effects of such monetary derangement by an improvement in the Banking system, and by providing greater security for the note issues permitted in the country.
