Aims and Objects of the Order

The aims of the Order shall be:

1. To stimulate, and give expression to the sentiment of patriotism which binds the women and children of the Empire around the Throne and person of their Gracious and Beloved Sovereign.

2. To supply and foster a bond of union amongst the daughters and children of the Empire.

3. To provide an efficient organization by which prompt and united action may be taken by the women and children of the Empire when such action may be desired.

4. To promote in the Motherland and in the Colonies the study of the history of the Empire and of current Imperial questions; to celebrate patriotic anniversaries; to cherish the memory of brave and heroic deeds and last resting places of our heroes and heroines, especially such as are in distant and solitary places; to erect memorial stones on spots that have become sacred to the Nation, either through great struggles for freedom, battles against ignorance, or events of heroic and patriotic self-sacrifice.

5. To care for the widows and orphans and dependents of British soldiers or sailors and heroes during war, in time of peace, or under sickness, accident or reverses of fortune.

6. Members are pledged to promote unity between the Motherland, the sister colonies, and themselves; to promote loyalty to King and Country; to forward every good work for the betterment of their country and people; to assist in the progress of art and literature, to draw women's influence to the bettering of all things connected with our great Empire, and to instil into the youth of their country patriotism in its fullest sense.

EGARDING the origin of the "Daughters of the Empire," the following is the story, in Mrs. Murray's own words. Speaking at the Annual Meeting of the , National Chapter of Canada, held in Winnipeg, 1913, Mrs. Murray said-"Being in London during the winter of 1899-1900, when the war in South Africa was at its height, I had many opportunities of realizing the thrill that flashed through the British Empire at that time All were eager to work, but no organization existed, and without organization, concerted and expeditious action was impossible.

"The services of the men had long been organized, but those of women and children had been overlooked. Now was the time, it seemed to me, to utilize these hitherto neglected forces of a People; and I then sketched out the federation of the " Daughters of the Empire," with junior branches for children, to be known as " The Children of the Empire "-to prepare them to take our place in the future."

Though Mrs. Murray remained in office only one year, she had laid a basis of organization, and a foundation, not only in Canada, but in many parts of the Empire, upon which those who have had the honor to follow her in office have reared the splendid superstructure of the Order to-day; and though the constitution has been twice revised—in 1911 and 1915-it has been mainly for the purpose of clearing up obscurities; the original form, as drafted by the Foundress, has been retained.

Her comprehensive idea of a bond of unity between the women and children of the Overseas Dominions of the Empire, conceived in a dark and trying hour of our history, has borne abundant fruit; it has appealed to women all over the British Empire, and has resulted in a world-wide organization which, during the intervening years of peace, has done valiant service, in bringing the various units of the Empire in closer touch; leading women to think imperially, and implanting in the mind of youth patriotic ideals; but since the outbreak of war it has certainly provided that broad, patriotic platform upon which all women in Canada, irrespective of race, creed, or class, have joined in varied demonstrations of practical patriotism, in the hour of national emergency.

The Imperial Order Daughters of the British Empire U.S.A. was founded 1909, with the object of stimulating social and intellectual intercourse among women of British birth. Members must be British born. Since the war the work of the Daughters of the Empire in the U.S.A. has been important, both in the furnishing of war relief and also in influencing public opinion.

It is indeed fortunate that the I.O.D.E. should be holding this Peace meeting after four strenuous years of war work in the City of Montreal, where the order originated, and that Mrs. Murray will have the satisfaction of realizing by reports that the order has fulfilled its destiny and justified its existence.

It will also be a great gratification for some of the more recent members to meet Mrs. Murray, whom they have enshrined in their hearts as the woman whose vision and sympathy have shown us an effective means of living up to our motto-

"One Flag, One Throne, One Empire."

The National Chapter of Canada comprises four Provincial Chapters: New Brunswick, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia. 23 Municipal Chapters: 637 Primary Chapters: 81 Junior Chapters. There were 225 Chapters in 1914. 520 Chapters have been formed since 1914.

\$4,000,000 was reported at the Annual Meeting, 1918, to have been raised for Patriotic purposes since the war The Order has a membership of from 40,000 to 45,000.

Mrs. Gooderham was made a Lady of Grace of the Order of the Hospital of St. John of Jerusalem in August, 1913.

Mrs. Gooderham has been a member of the National Executive of the I.O.D.E. since 1901, filling several offices until she became President 1911.

Two outstanding I.O.D.E. institutions will always be identified with her name, the Preventorium, Toronto, built and equipped by Col. A. E. Gooderham, with the provision that the Municipal Chapter, Toronto, raise an endowment fund and the Daughters of the Empire Hospital for officers, at No. I Hyde Park Place, London. This institution was also equipped by Col. Gooderham and though maintained by the Canadian Red Cross has been generously supported by the Chapters of the I.O.D.E. The organized knitting of the field comforts was initiated by Mrs. Macintosh at a meeting at her own house, August 15, 1914, when, in response to a request in the Gazetter, fifty ladies reported for work.

On August 30th the Municipal Chapter established headquarters in the Southam Building, the generous and patriotic gift of Mr. F. N. Southam.

These rooms have never been closed since the war, and thousands of articles have been shipped direct to trenches and hospitals, all plainly marked with the crest of the Order.

Illustrating the promptness with which the work was organized, before the troops left Valcartier, the Montreal Municipal Chapter were able to send them 7,178 Balaclava caps and 5,000 other articles.

The Montreal Municipal Chapter has the unique record of being the only branch of the Order which has shipped its "Field Comforts " direct to regiments and hospitals.

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

This Free Wool Fund was started by a splendid donation of 1,000 lbs. of wool from the Paton Manufacturing Company, Sherbrooke, Que. 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

When, in October, 1918, the Spanish Influenza attacked Montreal, bringing in its wake great want and suffering, an emergency fund was opened by the I.O.D.E. with Mrs. Marler as Convenor and Treasurer. The substantial sum of \$3,110 was promptly raised, largely from the Chapters of the city. Relief in every form was given to the sufferers, and when later it developed that the greatest need existed for some means of caring for children who, though not yet infected themselves, were being neglected in homes where the parents were too ill to care for them, the I.O.D.E. Emergency Home was opened in the basement of Knox Church. During the epidemic forty-seven children were cared for and furnished with clean clothing upon leaving the home.

Many expressions of appreciation were received from other organizations and also from the parents of the children. To quote from the letter of a clergyman: " This is only one of many splendid and timely services rendered by the I.O.D.E."

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



The War Work of the Montreal Municipal Chapter and the Primary hapters under its Inrisdiction

The record of the growth and accomplishment of the Montreal Municipal Chapter since August, 1914, is but a demonstration of what may be attained by organization and co-operation. From being to the minds of most people merely a name, the 1.O.D.E., in Montreal, at the outbreak of war, became a reality, taking its place beside the Patriotic Fund, and Red Cross, in the patriotic work of providing field comforts for the soldiers, and saliors on active service, and relief for their families at home. The Order, in August, 1914, in Montreal, comprised five Chapters, viz.: "The Mount Royal," "Victoria Rifles," "Wolfe & Montreal, Chapter of Montreal.

The Regent of the Municipal Chapter, Mrs. Preble Macintosh, grasped the opportunity and rose splendidly to the emergency, and on August 15th, Central Headquarters were opened in a fine suite of rooms in the Southam Building, Bleury Street, the partoits gift of Mr. F. N. Southam. Here, under the convenorship of Mrs. W. J. Lewis, free wool was distributed all over the Province, the parcels being handled free by the Dominion Express Company. It was decided to ship all soldier comforts direct to trenches and hospitals, and these Headquarters became the center of an activity which has never abated up to the present. A Secretary is in charge from 9.30 A.M. till 5.00 P.M., and here the different Chapters come to work one day each week.

The I.O.D.E. "Tag." bearing the name "Canada " in large letters originated in Montreal. and was afterwards taken up nationally by the Order, all articles from the first month of the war. in Montreal, having been marked with the creat of the Order and also thus carried the name of "Canada " far and wide. Before the close of the first year, Mrs. A. W. McDougald, Honorary Organizing, Secretary, Montreal had organized fifteen Chapters in the city and Province, all working under the guidance of the Municipal Chapter and shipping through them. The organization of new Chapters has gone on ever since and to-day the Montreal Municipal Chapter has thirty-five Chapters under its jurisdiction. The reports show that during the first year, forty thousand articles were shipped overseas and ten thousand pairs of socks.

How splendid was the response in the Province is demonstrated by the fact that when it was decided to send a pair of socks, as a Christmas gift, to every man from the Province of Quebec then at Salisbury Plain, to the number of five thousand pairs, offers to knit them came in by letter and telegram in one day, to the extent of three thousand pairs, offers to knit them came in this, much local relief work was undertaken. In fact every appeal was met and every emergency covered, in a spirit of sacrifice and service which should prove an inspiring war time record. This has only been possible because of the hearty co-operation of the Chapters, and the fine leadership of their Regents. This is particularly true of the out of town Chapters whose splendid contributions have been, during these years, an unfailing source of admiration to those who have received and shipped them overseas. Besides the actual war time activities, educational work has been carried on through the public schools and McGill Settlement, and a fine portrait of His Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught, painted by one of Montrel's well-known artists. Miss Gertrude Des Clays, A.R.C.A., was presented to the Art Gallery, where it hangs in the permanent collection. Princess Patricia, who is a Life Member of the Order, graciously officiated at the unveiling in September, 1916. A house to house collection for the Red Cross and Patriotic Fund, was made of the City districts West of Bleury, by a Committee of the 1.O.D.E. Victory Bonds also were sold, and in May, 1918, an 1.O.D.E. "T ag Day " for Soldiers' comforts was organized, covering the whole city. This was the only public appeal for money made by the Order in Montreal during the war.

The oldest Chapter in Montreal; a small group of workers who raise a large amount of money by a sale of fine needlework held each year at Christmas time. They have made many soldiers' comforts and generously supported national appeals and local charities, and have also helped the Boy Scouts.

THE VICTORIA RIFLES CHAPTER

Regent Mrs. George Starke (1914-19)

This is our only military Chapter and has since the war provided the soldiers' comforts for the 14th Battalion. They have also visited the families of the men and provided cheer and entertainment for them during the four dark years of sacrifice, and are now entertaining the returned men.

THE WOLFE & MONTCALM CHAPTER

Regent Mrs. Henry Joseph (1911-19)

Besides field comforts and hospital supplies the activities of this Chapter are along educational lines. Prizes for essays are presented to school children; a kindergarten teacher is maintained at the McGill Settlement: The amount of \$2,754.37 was recently raised by a Ball in aid of the McGill Settlement. This Chapter also organized the collection of the waste paper of the City, and has supported the Honor League.

THE LADY SCOTT CHAPTER

Regent Mrs. J. H. M. Robertson (1913-19)

This large and active Chapter has done a large soldiers' comfort work, made many hospital supplies and co-operated most heartily in all the local activities of the Municipal Chapter and responded generously to all national appeals. They also support a cot in the Memorial Hospital.

THE ROBERT LOUIS STEVENSON CHAPTER

Regent Mrs. B. B. Stevenson (1913-17)

Regent Mrs. Dakers Paterson (1918-19)

This Chapter, besides soldiers' comforts and hospital supplies, took as its special work at the outpeak of war supplying Baby Trousseau for the "wee new-comers" to soldiers' families, to be distributed by the Patroitic Fund. They also have supplied a worker to the Travellers' Aid

THE KITCHENER CHAPTER

Regent Mrs. R. Kerry (1914-19)

This Chapter has the unique distinction of being the first of the "Khaki Chapters", having been organized almost immediately after the outbreak of war. Its first enthusiasm has never abated and has carried the Chapter through four years of an inspiring record of work, its specialty being hospital supplies.

THE ALDERSON CHAPTER

Regent Mrs. Donald Macnaughton (1914-19)

The activities of this Chapter have been varied. They have made a large quantity of soldiers' comforts, Red Cross work, and supplies for the Navy League. They have also done educational work and organized the collection of the waste paper of Notre Dame de Grace, and have given hearty support to all Municipal Chapters' committees and activities, besides generously answering all national and local appeals.

THE JULIUS RICHARDSON CHAPTER (CHATEAUGUAY BASIN, P.Q.) Regent Mrs. Weston (1919)

This Chapter, named in memory of a fallen hero, is conducting a Soldiers' Convalescent Home at this beautiful resort during the summer.

THE LONGFELLOW CHAPTER (WATERLOO, P.Q.) Regent Mrs. Gardiner Stevens (1914–19)

THE ECCLES HILL CHAPTER (COWANSVILLE, P.Q.) Regent Miss Nesbitt (1914–19)

THE SIR JOHN FISHER CHAPTER (KNOWLTON, P.Q.) Regent Mrs. Frank Williams (1914–19)

This Chapter is situated some miles distant in the Province but is under the jurisdiction of the Montreal Municipal Chapter and has given great assistance, their specialty being hospital supplies.

THE EDITH CAVELL CHAPTER

Regent Miss Hersey (1915-19)

This Chapter is composed of the graduate nurses of the city, and was the first Memorial in Canada to the great heroine. It has been a means of bringing the nurses of various hospitals together for a united purpose, and though all very busy women their reports show a record of astonishing achievement and generosity. They have made quantities of soldiers' comforts and hospital supplies and contributed to all national appeals and local charities.


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THE CAPTAIN GUY DRUMMOND CHAPTER Regent Mrs. H. Joyce (1916-19) Regent Mrs. Enright (1919)

This was the first Memorial Chapter to a well-known Montreal Highlander who fell at Ypres and is one of the largest and most active Chapters "carrying on " through the four years in soldiers' comforts and every phase of patriotic activity, both through overseas and local channels.

THE GRACE AGULAR CHAPTER

Regent Miss Joseph (1917-19)

This Chapter is composed of the Jewish ladies of this city. This is a large and active Chapter and has worked to supply comforts for the Jewish Battalion and also done a great deal of local relief work; has co-operated in all patriotic projects of the Municipal Chapter and contributed generously to all national appeals.

THE CAPTAIN FRYATT CHAPTER

Regent Mrs. De Jersey White (1918-19)

As the name would suggest, this Chapter was organized to work for the Navy; they have made 700 shirts for the Navy League and sent Christmas parcels direct to the crew of the "M.L. 62"; they have also made soldiers' comforts for the 24th Battalion, clothing for soldiers' children at Osborne House and have conducted "Ye Old English Tea Rooms."

THE BIRKS CHAPTER

Regent Mrs. Sloan (1917)

This is our only junior Chapter, and though composed entirely of little girls, has raised money by individual effort, and has done a large quantity of knitting for the soldiers and sewing for refugees.

THE FRANKLIN HALL CHAPTER

Regent Mrs. Coombs (1918)

This is a Memorial Chapter with a small membership. Its activities have been largely soldiers' comforts.

THE MAJOR BISHOP, V.C., CHAPTER

Regent Mrs. McGill (1918-19)

As the name might suggest, this Chapter was organized to work for the R.A.F. It has besides a record of activity in all patriotic work. The members have co-operated heartily with all activities and committees of the Municipal and contributed to all national appeals.

THE ALEXANDRE & LAMBERT DUMONT LAVIOLETTE CHAPTER

Regent Mme Dumont Laviolette (1918-19)

This is a Memorial Chapter to two brothers, French-Canadian heroes of the great war. It is a large chapter whose membership is entirely French, and besides doing a large soldiers' comfort work, they have done much local relief and visiting among soldiers' families, and have generously supported all national appeals and co-operated in all projects organized by the Municipal Chapter.

THE WILFRID WALLACE CHAPTER


THE LACHINE SOLDIERS' MEMORIAL CHAPTER Regent Mrs. Haskill (1919)
