## REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

OF THE

## Dominion of Cañàda Rifle Associàtion.

1. In presenting their Eighth Annual Report, the Council desire to draw attention to the increase in the number of Affiliated Associations, of which there were twenty-three in 1874, and twenty-five in 1875.
2. The Government continued the support previously given and granted aid in the following sums to :-

Ontario Provincial Rifle Association............. 1,800

New Brunswick " " ............ 1,300
Manitoba " " "........... 400

Prince Edward Island " " ............ 400
$\$ 17,500$
3. All the P'rovincial Rifle Associations affiliated with the Dominion Association this year.
4. Grants in aid of County and other local Rifle Associations, for the year ending June 30th, 1875, were made through the Department of Militia and Defence.
5. It will be observed, on reforence to the Secretary's Report, that the Annual Prize Meeting of the Association took place for the third time, at the Rideau Rifle Range, Ottawa, commencing on the 7th September-the proceedings being formally opened by the Adjutant-General, (Cclonel Powell,) who fired the flrst shot.
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8. His Excellency the Governor General again presented three medals-Gold, Silver and Bronze.

The President, Lt.-Colonel Gzowski presented money prizes to the value of 8250 .

The Vice-President, Lt.-Colonel A. Gilmour, Ottawa, presented the sum of $\$ 100$.
E. Jenkins, Esq., M. P. also presented a sum of $\$ 100$ for competition as the Agent-Gelieral's Prize ; and Mr. J. H. Steward, the London Optician, again presented a Telescope and Field Glass as prizes.

The Concil appropriated the sum of 83,140 , in meney prizes, and prizes in kind to the value of $\$ 132850$, including the Merchants' of London Vase, the McDougall Challenge Cup, the Telescope and Field Glass, the gift of Mr. J. H. Steward, Optician, and the Silver and Bronze Medals of the Association.

The above sum of $\$ 3,140$ includes the prizes in the second stage of the "Wimbledon Match," which, under the regulations are not payable until the winners report at Quebec, en route for Wimbledon, as accepted members of the Canadian Team for 1876 .

9 The Council records with satisfaction that the meeting passed off without an aceident.
10. Details of the Matches will be found in the appendix.
11. In accordance with a resolution passed at a meeting of the Council, on the 25th February last, the Prize list for the annual matches of 1875 , was arranged with a view to the selection of the Wimbledon Team for 1876, and a special Competition was provided, under the head of "Wimbledon Match," the conditions of which will be found in the appendix.

Representatives were present from Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick.

The details of this competition will afford information as to the scores of the competitors from among whom the Wimbledon Team for $\mathbf{1} 876$ may be selected.

The Martini-Henry Rifles used in this competition, as well B
as in the preliminary practice of the Team selected in 1875, were kindly loaned by the Militia Department.
12. The Council, acting on the recommendation of the Association, at the last annual meeting amended the 7th Rule of the Regulations for the Amual Matches, in so far as to admit Rifles of bona fide Government pattern, and when not issued by Government, bearing the Government Viewer's m:rrk ; this modification allowed the use of Steel barvelled Snider Rifles. Many of these Rifles were ascertained to be in possession of members of the Association, and, in order to afford other members an opportunity for obtaining them at cost, the Council deemel it advisable to purchase from the London Armory Company, twenty-five steel barrels of that pattern, bearing the Imperial Government Viewer's stamp, for issue at cost price to members of the Association. A Statement under this head will be found annexed to the Treasurer's Report.
13. The marking at the Butts this year was carried out by non-commissioned officers and men, selected from the Governor General's Foot Guards, and Garrison Artillery, under charge of Captain Wetherley, assisted by Sergeant-Major Keating, of the former corps,

The duty was performed most effiectively, and gave general satisfaction.
14. The thanks of the Association are due to Colonel Powell, Adjutant-General, and the officers commanding the G. G. Foot Guards and Artillery, for placing at the disposal of the Association, the services of markers from these corps, and to Captain Wetherley, who had charge of them.

Thanks are also due to the Executive Committee, under whose direction the matches were carried out; and to Lt.-Col. Jackson, D.A.G., as Executive Officer and commandint of camp, Major White, G. G. Foot Guards as chief Range officer, Lt.-Colonel Bacon as statistical officer, and Captain Grant, camp Quartermaster, for valuable assistance rendered by them, and also to Surgeon Malloch, of the G. G. Foot Guards, and Surgeon Bentley of the Artillery, for their attendance during the competition.
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To Lt.-Colonel Wily, Director of Stores, the thanks of the Association are due, for facilitics afforded by him in the issue of Camp Equipage and Stores, on all occasions, when required by the Association.
15. The Council have much pleasure in recording the liberality shewn by Railway and Steamboat Companies, in conveying Competitors to and from their homes at reduced rates.
16. The Report of Lt.-Colonel MacKinlay, the officer commanding the Team for 1875, is annexed.

In submitting that officer's Report, the Council note with great satisfaction, the excellent behaviour of the members comprising the Team; a detail of their shooting will be found iu his report.

The Council have much pleasure in recording the satisfactory manner in which Lt.-Colonel MacKinlay as officer commanding, and Major Cotton as second officer, discharged the several duties assigned to them.

The Council record with the greatest sati-faction, that the "Kolapore Cups" were again won by the Canadian Marksmen, in addition to the other prizes won at Wimbledon, as detailed in Lt.-Colonel MacKinlay's report, and they now congratulate the Association on the very marked success of the representation at Wimbledon.

The presence of the President, Lt.-Colonel Gzowski, in the Canadian Camp at Wimbledon, again, this year, lent additional interest to the proceedings of the Canadian Team.
17. The Council gratefully acknowledge the liberal support and encouragement extended to them by the Dominion Government, through the Honorable The Minister of Militia and Defence, in aiding the funds of the Association, and for the money granted to the Provincial and Local Rifle Associations.
18. The Council record with pleasure the continued sup. port extended to the Association by His Excellency the Governor General.

His Excellency's liberality in presenting prizes for competi-

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tion, and the encouragement given by his presence at the Canadian Camp at Wimbledon, is gratefully acknowlegded.
19. The Council have to acknowledge the services rendered by the Treasurer and Secretary.

## FINANCE.

For a full account of the Finances of the Association, the Council refer to the Treasurer's Statement, to which is attached the Auditors' Report, for the period from the 10th February, 1875 to the 10th February, 1876.

The Balance Sheet exhibits the total receipts from all sources for that period to have been $\$ 13,16400$ while the expenditure amountad to $\$ 12,33342$, showing a balance of $\$ 83058$ which, with the balance of $\$ 194883$, carried forward from last year's financial statement, leaves a total balance of $\$ 2,77941$, in favor of the Association.

Taking the Credit side of the account, it will be found that there is a slight increase in the Affiliation fees from Rifle Associations, the receipts being $\$ 640$ as against $\$ 580^{\prime}$ in 1874 ,-the number of associations being as follows, viz.:-

In "Special Donations" for prizes, the receipts are 8450 as against $\$ 350 \mathrm{in} 1875$-an increase of $\$ 100^{\circ}$

The "Entrance fees," including sighting shots and pool target, have been well maintained, the amount received from this source being $\$ 101037$ as against $\$ 61275$ in 1874-an increase of 839762 .

The sum of $\$ 25675$ was received from the Department of Militia and Defence, being a refund on account of expenditure incurred by the Association in permanent work on the Rideau Rifle Range in 1874.

A detailed statement of disbursements made by Lt.Colonel MacKinlay, in connection with the Wimbledon Team of 1875 will be found in the appendix.
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The Team having proceeded to England a week earlier this year, in order to afford ample time for practice at the Altcar Rifle Ranges near Liverpool, the cost of the expedition is consequently in excess of laxt year, the time spent at Altcar being ten days, necessitating additional expense for subsistence and ammunition, whilst at Wimbledon the entrance fees were almost double as compared with last year.

An extra allowance of one shilling per diem was paid to the members of the Team for subsistence in camp at Wimbledon. This increase was found to be necessary for the comfort of the Team.

An inventory of plant in store at Laprairis, Fredericton, Ottawa, and London, England, will be found in the appendix, the value of which may be estimated as follows:-

## REPORT OF THE SECRETARY

OF THE

## dominion or canada rifle associaiton.

The Annual Prize Meeting for the year 1875 took place at the Rideau Ranges, Ottawa, commencing on the 7 th and continuing to the 13th of September.

The arrangements for the meeting were carried out under the supervision of a local Committee of the Council.

The Circular Targ ${ }^{\text {t }}$ adapted by Lt.-Colonel Brunel from the Wimbledon principle having given such general satisfaction in 1874, eight more of the same description were brought into use during the meeting, giving unqualified satisfaction.

The three medals presented by His Excellency the Governor General for competition this year were won:-
The Gold Medal, by Lieut. Macnachtan, Cobourg Gar. Artillery The Silver ". Bombr. Crowe, Wellington Fd. Batt'ry The Bronze " Capt. Anderson, 10th (Royal) Battalion

The MacDougall Challenge Cup, competed for the seventh time, was won by Sergeant Mitchell, 13th Battalion, with a score of 42 points.

The Provincial Match, with the London Merchants Cup as the principal prize, was won by the team from the Province of Nova Scotia.

The Agent-General's prize, being the sum of $\$ 100$, presented by E. Jenkins, Esq., M.P., late Agent-General for the Dominion of Canada, formed a new source of competion this year.

Mr. Steward, the London Optician, repeated his liberal gift and presented two valuable Telescopes as prizes.

At this meeting the competition for the selection of a team to represent the Dominion at Wimbledon in 1876 took place, commencing on Saturday the 11th and finishing on Monday the 13th September. The scores, with the names of those frem whom a team can be selected, will be found with the results of other matches in the appendix.

The four Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick wero well represented at the meeting.

The weather throughout the meeting was remarkably fine, whlch, being taken into consideration with the ease and rapidity of marking under the new target system, enabled the meeting, which considerably exceeded in numbers that of last year, to be brought to a close in six days.

The arrangements for marking were conducted by men selected from Corps of the local active militia, under supervision of an officer and the Sergt.-Major of the Governor General's Foot Guards, and gave general satisfaction.

No accident occurred at this meeting.

## LT.-COL. BRUNEL'S TARGETS.

After the experience had with these Targets and with the system of marking used with them, it may be asserted that they possess many advantages over the old system. So far as could be ascertained, the competitors at the last Dominion competition were entirely satisfied both with the Targets and the signaling. Their general advantages may be briefly stated as follows:-

1. The markers were perfectly safe in the open trenches; there were no splashes of lead whatever.
2. The construction of the trench cost less than the pit or mantlet heretofore in use.
3. The whols of the markers on a line of targets were placed under the direct supervision of an officer.
4. The marking was therefore much better done.
5. The work of marking was much easier to the men, as they were relieved from the constant strain of watchfulness. The passage of the bullet through the canvas was as distinctly heard in the open trench as the hit on the iron target can be heard in the covered pit or mantlet. When the hit is heard the marker pulls down the target, and has it at once in a convenient position for inspection.
6. The signaling was much more satisfactory than the old system. The exact position of the hit was shewn on the target itself and remained there until another hit was made.
7. Firing can be carried on in weather which renders it impossible on the iron targets. A very heavy driving rain would, of course, wash off the paper, but during ordinary showers, such as wash the paint off the iron, and in light drizzling mists, that obscure the plate glass, and make it ditficult or impossible to see he shot marks, the work goes on without interruption on the new targets. This was satisfactorily shewn at the last Dominion competition.
8. With the most ordinary attention and intelligence there can be no erroneous signaling, for there can be only one shot hole uncovered at the same time. During the shooting at these targets no signal was questioned, nor was a serious doubt expressed as to the correctness of any signal made.
9. The markers were much more comfortable while in the performance of their duties than in the old covered pits or mantlets; they were, therefore, both able and willing to do their work effectually. There was a free circulation of air, and they vere sheltered from the weather whether it was the heat of the sun or rain.
10. The whole of the working and expensive parts of the target are protected from the missiles, and are therefore safe from the damage from that source to which the old targets are so much exposed.
11. The marking on the whole was much quicker. The time required for changing the targets from one class to another does not necessarily exceed one minute. It can be effected by one man if necessary, though, of course, more easily by two.

## Signaling.

The following method of signaling the hits was used at Ottawa last September :

A supply of discs, made in sets, of common pasteboard, coverod with paper of the proper colour, were given to each marker. Those for the small targets were about six inches in diameter; those for the large targets about ten inches. To the centre of, and at the back of each disc. there was fastened a common wire hook-large wire curtain hooks were used-by means of which the dise representing the value of the shot to be signalled was hooked into the hole in the target made by it, where it-the disc-remained until another hit was made; the proper signal was then placed on the new hit, and a patch pasted over the previous one.

In this way the disc, by its colour, signalled the value of the hit, and at the same time shewed, approximately, the place hit. The dises were very little damaged by being hit by shots

and could be used after being pierced a dozen times. By recovering the face of the dise it may be used almost indefinitely.

A telegraph was used for communicating with the officer in charge of the markers from each range. This arrangement effected a great saving of time, as compared with the old method of bugle calls, which are very liable to be misunderstood, and therefore the cause of many blunders. A single insulated wire was laid underground, from a small telegraph station in the markers' trench, along the ranges. At each range the wire is brought to the surface alongside a small table on which the operator places his portable instrument, and completes the circuit in the usual manner, while the firing is going on at that range. When the firing party moves from that range, the operator disconnects his instrument and moves to the next range where he again connects his instrument. In this way the range officer is in constant communication with the officer in command of the markers.

## . Explanations of the Drawings.

Figure 1. This is a transverse section through the trench and marker's shelter hut, shewing a side view of the target when elevated. In this figure, (a) (a) are wooden handles, of convenient size, placed so as to suit the markers, by which th, targets are moved up or down. It is found that the targets when properly counterbalanced can in this way be moved without the intervention of any lévers or pulleys, which only tend uselessly to increase the friction.

The ground on which the frame of the target is placed should be carefully levelled and well beaten down. Stone or other weights may be placed on the platform of the frame to steady the target.

The rectaugular frame which forms the base of the target will be besi if made of oak ; but when cheapness is an object, pine or other soft wood may be substituted.

The slopes of the embankments should be made to suit the soil in which they are formed: generally a slope of one and a half horizontal to one perpendicular will answer best. They should be neatly sodded. When turf or sods can be easily
obtained the embankment may be built up with them at a much steeper slope; or when the targets are placed where the rock comes near the surface, or on a soil difficult to excavate, two bulk heads may be constructed of posts and plank, as shewn by the faint lines on the drawing. These being tied together by bolts or by wooden ties, and the space between filled in with earth well rammed down, will form a sufficient protection to the markers and others in rear of them. It is, however, an objection to this method of construction that the targets are raised too much above the natural surface of the ground.

The shelter hut should be about eight feet long in front of the target. At the back there should be a catch-water drain of 2 -inch plank.

It may be convenient to form a footway on the joists in rear of the targets extending along the whole length of the trench, so that the officers in charge of the markers and the telegraph messengers may pass along the rear without interrupting the markers; but it will cost less to construct a footway about two feet wide between the markers' huts. It should be two steps, or about sixteen inches, below the floor of the huts.

Figure 2. This gives a front view of the target. The iron hoop on which the canvas is stretched for the 70 -inch target is to be half an inch thick and two inches wide; for the 40 -inch target the hoop is one quarter of an inch by two inches. The front edges of both must be chamfered as shewn in Figures 7 and 9,80 as to present an edge of not more than one-sixteenth of an inch to the front. The front edges of the upright straps are to besimilarly chamfered, as also must all surfaces presented to the front above the top of the embankment. The section at (b) where the vertical straps are rivetted to the hoops is shewn at Figure 8.

The hoops are to be pierced all round by holes one quarter of an inch diameter, two inches apart from centre to centre, and counter-sunk on both sides to prevent cutting the lacings.

straps, as shewn in the enlarged details, Figs. 3 and 4. The horizontal straps pass around the ends of the wood and form sockets into which the straps will slip freely. The horizontal strap keeps the target at the proper height, and the only other fastening necessary is the pin shewn at $(f)$. This pin pasces through the upright strap into the wood, and thus prevents the strap being pulled out of its socket when the target is lifted up by the upper handle (a); it should be attachcd to the frame by a small chain, so that it cannot be lost or mislaid.

The upright straps for the small target must be of such length as will bring the centre of the small target to the same height as the centre of the large target.

Figure 6. Enlarged details. The weight C is to be made sufficiently heavy to counter-balance the target, and should be of several pieces, so that it may be readily adjusted to the weight of the target in use.

Figure 10. This is a map or plan of ten targets, indicating the firing points and the position of the telegraph. There is a table for the telegraph operator at each range, and the ends of the insulated wire are brought up to the top of the table, but the instrument is to be moved with the firing party from range to range. When the instrument is moved the ends of the wire are connected to each other by a clamp. A large umbrella will fform sufficient protection to the operator in bad weather or from the sun, and may be easily attached to his seat.

The targets are formed by stretching stout cotton canvas (such as is used for sails, and the stoutest is the best, though not the cheapest) on the iron hoops above described. The canvas is cut to a true circle and hemmed, the diameter being about three-fourths of an inch greater than the diameter of the hoops. Around the circumference and close to the hem, there are inserted metal "eyelets" to correspond with the holes pierced in the hoops.

The canvas is stretched over the front or thin edge of the hoops, and laced with either stout cord or leather thongs, the same piece of lacing should not reach over more than two or
three holes, and each piece must be separately secured, so that if one piece is cut by a shot, the rest will not be loosened.

Paper in sheets-each sheet forming a quadrant of the circle, and having a quarter of the black bull's cye, as also a quadrant of the circles bounding the "inner," "centre" and "outer" divisions of the target printed on them, is pasted on the canvas, this paper covering may be renewed as often as is found necessary, daily will be quite sufficient if the patches are carefully put on.

The circles forming the divisions of the target, may be in quite thin lines. The thinner the better, so that the markers can see them, there is then less chance of a dispute as to which side of the division the shot should be given on.

# REPORT OF LT.-COLONEL MACKINLAY. 

## WIMBLEDON TEAM OF 1875.

## Sir,-

Having been appointed by Lt.-Colonel Gzowski, President of the Dominion of Canada Rifie Association, to the command of the Canadiam Team to Wimbledon, I, in accordance with his instructions, proceeded to Quebec, and on the 18th of June was joined by Majo Cotton, the second officer in command.

The Team, twenty in number, reported to me on the same day and signed the rules and regulations issued for their guidance.

On the 19th day of June I embarked with my command on board the steamship "Nova Scotian," and after a very pleasant passage landed in Liverpool on the 30th day of the same month. Immediately on my arrival I proceeded to Altcar, the range having been placed at my disposal by the officer in charge, and put the Team into practice.

Having handed over the command of the Team to Major Cotton, I proceeded to London and waited upon Capt. St. John Mildmay, the Secretary to the National Rifle Association, who kindly afforded me every facility for entering the Team without the extra payment for post entries. I append a list of the entries made, which will be found to be larger than usual, but I deemed it advisable to give the members of the Tea ${ }^{\circ}$ every opportunity for carrying away as many prizes as possible. This action I trust will meet with the approval of the Association. On my return to Altcar, I found the Team busily engaged at their practice, a return of which will be found appended. Whilst at Altcar, matches were arranged with the 1st Lancashire, 5th Lancashire, and 1st Cheshire, the Team losing the two first and winning the last.

On Saturday the 10th of July, we returned to Liverpool, and from thence proceeded direct to Putney, arriving in Wimbledon camp at 7 p. m. On our arrival I found the camp, (through the kindness of Lt.Col. Gzowski,) in order; and in a very short time the men were comfortably quartered under canvas.

On Monday the 12th July, the 1875 Wimbledon meeting opened.
During our stay in camp we had a succession of very wet weather,

but the firing was carried on without interruption. Taken as a whole, the scores made by the Team were good, and our Canadian marksmen have great reason to be proud of the high position they have attained as shots at the competition of 1875 .

In the Queen's Prize, the number of competitors was largely in excess of previous years; yet with all odds against the 1 am , it was so far successful as to have the honor of sending two men to compete in the second stage or first sixty.

Having entered the Team for all the matches open to Military Breech-loading Rifles, I considered it important that the men should have the best available weapon. I therefore hired five rifles from Mr. Gibbs, of Bristol, and placed the same at the disposal of the men for use at Wimbledon.

On the morning set apart for the Kolapore match I ordered the Team to parade at the firing puint at $9 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$., and on arrival at the ground was surprised to find the Home Team not represented. After some delay, the officer in charge of the range ordered the firing to commence. On completing the firing at each range, the Canadian Team was declared the winner. To have taken the cups under such circumstances would not have been I felt crediteble to Canada or to the Team. I decided therefore to return the prize to the Council of the National Rifle Association, with a request that if compatible with their rules, the prize might be shot for again, when the Canadians hoped the Home Team would be in attendance. This request was granted, and in the afternoon of the same day we met the Home Team, and fought the battle man to man, resulting in a complete victory for the Canadians. (See score attached.) Tlianks are due to H. E. Montgomerie, Esq., of London, who kindly presented ten pounds for the highest aggregate score in this match, which was won by Pte. Mills, 10th Royals, Ontario.

During the meeting the camp was visited by very many of the nobility and gentry, and all expressed their great pleasure in meeting the Canadians in England.

On Tuesdey, July 20th, the President of the Association, Lt.-Col. Gzowski, held a reception at the camp, details of which were reported in the papers of that date; hundreds were present. H. R. H. the Duke of Cambridge having honored the camp with his presence wa* pleased to inspect the Team, and addressed them in a few remarks. Lord Carnarvon, Sir Richard Airey, Earl Dufferin, Sir Hastings Doyle, General McMurdo and others also inspected the Team. Lord Carnarvon expressed himself pleased and delighted to see Canala once mote so ably represented, and the fact of the team coming over year atter year, was
the surest indication of the loyalty and devotedness of the Dominion to Great Britain.

To Lt.-Col. Gzowski, the President, are due the thanks not only of the Association, but also of the whole Dominion, ior the manner in which he has, for two successive years, brought our marksmen so prominently before the British people; and to his untiring efforts is the success of the Team largely attributable. I only trust that he may again be induced to accept the position of head of our organization, that his efforts to foster the good feeling between our riflemen and those of the mother country, and in bringing our land and its resources so prominently before the British public may not be lost.

You will notice by my accounts that I allowed the Team one shilling per man more whilst in camp than formerly; this I found to be necessary for their comtort.

I would recommend for the future guidance of the officer in command, that an extra marquee be provided as a mess tent, in which the whole Team might be accommodated. By this arrangement the members of the Team would be better provided with rations and at a less expense.

To Major Cotton, the second officer in command, I am much indebted for his attention to the details. From his previous knowledge of the working of all the competitions he was an invaluable assistant.

I must congratulate the Association on the selection of the Team; the steadiness, good behaviour and general deportment of the men was all that could be desired. My orders were cheerfully obeyed and each member of the Team is entitled to my warmest thanks for his ready obedience and assistance in carrying out my wishes.

Whilst in camp at Wimbledon, the officer in charge of the London Irish, (Capt. Tully,) kindly invited the officers and members of the Canadian Team to make use of their tents, which invitation was gladly accepted ; and to Capt. Tully I feel much indebted for his kindness and attention during our stay.

To the Civil Service corps I am also largely indebted, they having placed at our disposal a mess tent which was used by the Team during the meeting,

I cannot conclude this report without returning thanks to the Mayor of Liverpool, the officers of the several regiments there, and Mr. Heigh, Canadian Emigration Agent, for their great kindness and attention to us whilst quartered at Altcar, as everything on the rence was placed at our disposal, and nearly all the ammunition used at practice was fur-

nished free of cost. I think some mark of appreciation from the Dominion Asciciation is due to our brother volunteers of that city. I have the honor to be,

## DOMINION OF CANADA RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

## We, the undersigned, agree to the following Regulations:

1. The Officers, Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates selected by the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association from the Active Militia of the Dominion of Canada to represent the said Dominion at the meeting of the National Rifle Association, to be held at Wimbledon in July 1875 are, from the date of signing of this agreement, until discharged from duty at Wimbledon, to be under the immediate command of Lieut.Colonel A. K. McKinlay of Halifax, Canada; and to be subject to such orders and regulations as he may, from time to time, issue for their guidance.
2. No Member of the Team to be absent from the Headquarters of the Team from the day of landing in England, and until released from duty, after the conclusion of the matches at Wimbledon, on any pretence whatever, without the permission of the officer in command.
3. Any member of the Team disobeying the order of the officer commanding, or contravening any of the orders made for the regulation of the force assembled at Wimbledon, or be under the influence of drink, shall forfeit his return tickets.
4. The Members of the Team shall have their steamship and railway fares paid, as well as their ordinary board on the steamship, and at such places after landing in England, and until the couclusion of the matches at Wimbledon, as the officer commanding may select. All such allowance to be stopped from any member of the Team guilty of a breach of this agreement.
5. No Member of the Team shall send communications to the Press for publication with respect to the shooting or any other matter connected with the Team.
6. The Officer Commanding will provide the necessary ammunition, pay entrance fees and sighting shots for the matches open to the Team

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as a Team, or as individuals; and all prizes in money won by the Team, or by individuals, in such matches, shall be divided equally among the Members of the Team.
7. Prizes in Kind won by the Team as a Team, or by the aggregate shooting of the whole or any number of the Team, are not to be considered the property of the Team collectively or individually; but, such prizes are to be handed over to the Dominion of Canada Rifle Association, for such subsequent disposition as the Council of that Association may determine upon.
8. Prizes in Kind won by any member of the Team, individually, in matches open to individual competition, to become the property of the winner, if not inconsistent with the Wimbledon conditions, under which such competition is held.
9. At the conclusion of the matches at Wimbledon, and when relieved from duty by the officer in command, Return Tickets will be furnished to each member of the Team from Wimbledon to the port of embarkation, thence by the Allan Line of Steamships to Canada. Such members, after being so discharged from duty, may suit their own convenience as to the time for returning to Canada; but, no expenses will be paid on account of any member of the Team beyond the period necessary to complete the duty at Wimbledon, and the time of sailing of the first steamer of the Allan Line from Liverpool to Quebec, after discharge.
10. The Officer commanding will make requisite arrangements for the transport of the members of the Team, on their return, from Quebec to their homes.
11. Should any members of the Team from the Provinces of Nova Scotia or New Brunswick elect to return direct to Halifax, and in the event of any of the Allan Line Steamships salling from Liverpool to that port about the time, the officer commanding may authorize such arrangement, provided no further charge is made for the passage by the steamship company than that included in the Return Tickets to Quebec.
12. Each Member of the Team, on his being released from duty at Wimbledon, will sign an Acquittance Roll, to the effect that he has been properly settled with in accordance with these regulations.
13. The Officer in command will, on the completion of the duty, forward a report to the President of the Dominion of Canada Rifle

Association on the manner in which the same has been carried out, accompanied by the Acquittance Roll and Statement of Accounts of all expenditure connected therewith, full details of shooting and conduct 0 . the members of the Team.

## MEDICAL REPORT.

Slight wounds which have occurred on former meetings both here and at Wimbledon from splashing of lead, have been rendered impossible by the adoption of the "Brunel" target, the merits of which will no doubt be described in another report.

As absence in Manitoba rendered it doubtful that I should be present during the annual meeting, the Council solicited the services of Surgeon F. B. Bentley, Ottawa Field Battery, to whom I beg here to accord my obligations.

1.-That this Association be denominated "The Dominion of Canada Rifle Assoclation."
2.-Any person being a suberiber of $\$ 2.00$ per annum shall become a member of the Association.

5.-There shall be a Patron and Vice-Patrons named by the Council.
(The Governor-General of the Dominion of Canada for the time being shall be

6.-There shall be a President.
7.-There shall be two Vice-Presidents.
8.-There shall be a Council of Fifty-two Members, who shall be elected in the following proportions:

9.-The Council shall choose from the members elected the President of the Association.
10.-There shall be a Vice-President from each Province, selected from among the Members of the Association, and who shall be elected by the Council.
11.-The Presidents of the varions Provincial Associations in connection with this Association, and the Militia Staff Officers in charge of the several Militia Distriets of the Dominion, being members thereof, shall be ex-officio Vice-Presidents, and all Vice-Presidents shall be members of the Council.
12.-There shall be a Treasurer, and there shall be a paid Secretary at Ottawa, both to be appointed by the Council, and holding office during pleasure.
13.-The Council shall have the sole management of the income and funds of the Association, rendering an account to the yearly meeting, such account having been previously audited by a person or persons not members of the Council, who shall be annually named by the Council, for that purpose. The Council shall also have the entire management and superintendance of all the affairs and concerns of the Association, and shall or may do, all such acts and deeds as shall appear to them necessary or essential to be done for the purpose of carrying into effect the object and views of the Association.
14.-The Council shall be regulated in their proceedings by such Bylaws as may from time to time be enacted by them;-no By-law being in any case altered, or new one proposed, without at least one month's notice of such intention being given to each member of Council.
15.-The Annual Prize Meetings shall be held at Ottawa at such times as may be determined on by the Council.
16. The Prizes shall be competed for in accordance with such Ragulations as may be passed by the Council from time to time.
17.-An Annual Report, embracing the audited account of the Finances, shall be drawn up by the Secretary, and shall (having been previously submitted to the Council) be published as soon after the Prize Meeting as may be found practicable.
18.-There shall be an Annual Meeting, to be held at such time as shall be selected by the Council.

## BY-LAWS.

Annual Meeting.

Meetings of Council.

The Annual Meeting of the Association shall be held at Ottawa on the third Wednesday after the assembling of the General Session of the Parliament of the Dominion.

There shall be two Ordinary Meetings of the Council. The first of which shall be held on the day after the Annual Meeting of the Association, and the second at such other time as the Council may then determine upon.

Extraordinary Meetings shall be summoned by the

Extraordi-
nary
Meetings. Secretary, if required by any six of the members of the Council, - notification being sent to each member of the Council at least fifteen days previous to such Meeting,-and the requisition for the Meeting, and the notices to the members, must state the object or objects of such Extraordinary Meeting.
The Council to keep minutes of
all proceedall proceeding. purpose by the Secretary, -and open to the inspection of any member of the Council.

Finance Committee.

There shall be a Finance Committee, consisting of three of the Council.

The Treasurer is anthorized to deposit from time to

received in time, in the Savings Department of the Ontario Bank, all Sarings sums of money paid over to him on behalf of the Association. Bank.

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## Regralainiss for tite Ammal Prize Meteting of 1875.

## 1.-GENERAL REGULATIONS.

I.-The Meeting shall be conducted under the direction of an Executive Committee of five to be nominated by the Council.
II.-In the conduct of the Meeting the following Regulations are to be observed, together with such directions as may be given from time to time by the Executive Committee.
III.-All members of Active Militia Corps competing for Prizes restricted to Active Militia shall appear in the authorized full dress or undress uniform of their Corps, with the regulation belt and pouch.
IV.-Competitors shall submit their rifles and ammunition for inspection when required.
V.-No hair triggers shall be allowed.
VI.-No fixed artificial rests shall be allowed, the fore-arm and hand being clear of all support.
VII.-Competitors may wipe out or clean their rifles during any competition, provided they do not deiay their squad by so doing.
VIII.-No two competitors shall shoot with the same rifle in the same match.
IX.-No post entries shall be made for any competition after the firing for such competition has commenced.
X.-Every Competitor shall enter and shoot under his own name, and, unless otherwise specified, not oftener than once for any Prize.

XI-No one shall be allowed to join a squad after the commencement of the second competitive round.

## 2.-DISQUALIFICATIONS AND FINES.

XII.-Should any Competitor lose his firing ticket, omit to take it to the firing point, or fail to attend at the hour detailed by the Executive Officer, and so by his own neglect miss the opportunity given to him of competing for the Prize for which his ticket was issued, his claim on the Association in regard to snch competition shall be cancelled.
XIII.-Any Competitor who shall be detected in any evasion of the conditions prescribed for the conduct of any Prize shall be disqualified from further competition during the meeting, and forfeit his entrance fees; and in case of such conduct being considered by the Executive Committee as "discreditable," he shall be disqualified from ever again competing at the Dominion Rifle Association Prize Meeting.
XIV.-Any Competitor who has once joined his squad, and shall leave it to fire a shot from any other firing point before the squad has completed its shooting, shall be disqualified in that competition.

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XV-Any person firing when the danger flag or dise is shown at the target or tiring point, or discharging his rifle except at a target to which he has been told off, or into the pit provided for that purpose, shall be debarred from all further competitions during the Meeting, and shall forfeit his entrance fee. This shall not apply to a Competitor accidentally firing at the wrong target when no danger flag is up.
XVI.-Any Competitor "snapping a cap" or "firing off" a charge without going close up and pointing his rifle in the direction named for that purpose, shall be fined $\$ 2$.

XVII--In Active Militia and Enfield All-Comers' Competitions any Competitor using any ammunition other than that provided by the Dominion Rifle Association Magazine, or in any way tampering with the ammunition so used, shall be disqualified.

## 3.-RETURN OF ENTRANCE FEES.

XVIII.-1. Competitors who are prevented from being present at the Meeting shall have the entrance fees they have paid returned after the Meeting, provided they send their tickets and give written notice to the Secretary before the day on which the Prize for which they have entered has been announced for competition.
2. Competitors prevent drom competing by illness will receive back their entrance fees in full, on production of a medical certificate and their entry tickets.

## PRIZE WINNERS.

XIX.-All winners of Prizes shall apply to the Chief of the Statistical Department for a certificate, which must be countersigned by the Secretary before any Price can be delivered.
XX.-Winners of Prizes who have the option of taking them either in money or in kind, shall make known their decision to the Secretary before the close of the Meeting.
XXI.-All prizes, pool and sweepstakes moneys, not claimed before the 1st of October, shall be forfeited to the Association.

## 5.-DISTANCES AND TARGETS.

XXII.-There shall be seven distances, viz:-


1. The size of the targets shall be-
a. At 200 and 300 yards : A circle of 40 inches diameter.
b. At 500 and 600 yards :

A cricle of 70 inches diameter.
c. At 800 and 1,000 yards, 6 ft . by 12 ft .
2. The divisions on the face of the target shall be-
a. At 200 yards:

b. At 500 and 600 yards: Bull's-eye Circular 22 inches in diameter.

In all cases bull's-eyes shall count 5 , centre 4, inner 3 , outer 2 .
Marking will be as follows : $a$. Bull's-eye, white disc ; $b$. Centre, red dise ; $c$. Inner, black cross; d, Outer, black dise ; e. Ricochet, R.
7.-RIFLES.

The rifles shall be classified as follows:
CLASS I.
Rifles of bona file Government pattern, and when not issued by the Government bearing the Government viewer's mark. The words "Government pattern" will be construed as applying to the stock and lock as well as to the barrel and breech block.

1. Minimum pull of trigger, 6 lbs .
2. Sight strictly in accordance with Government pattern.
(a) Backsight.

The sliding bar may be reversed. One fine line only may be drawn down the centre; this line may be either of platina, or scratched or made with a pencil.
(b) Foresight.

May be blackened, but any other colouring matter will not be allowed.

3, Any pad or shoe for the heel-plate of the butt admitting of removal, and thereby allowing of vasiations at pleasure in the length of the stock, shall be disallowed.

CLASS II.
Any rifle, maximum weight, 10 lbs .

1. Sights as allowed by Wimbledon regulation of 1874.
2. Minimum pull of trigger, 3 lbs .
N.B.-Sights may be blackened, but white, red, or other colouring matter shall not be allowed.

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## 8.-AMMUNITION.

1. In all competitions restricted to Active Militia and Enfield AllComers', none but Government ammunition purchased from the Association on the ground shall be used. The ammunition so issued shall in no way be tampered with.

In All-Comers' any R1fle Competitions, unless otherwise specified, any ammunition may be used

For Active Militia Prizes, the shooting at 200 yards shall be off the houlder. At distances above 200 yards it shall be in any position provided the rifle has no rest or support other than the person of the competitor.
B.-In All-Comers Competitions,

For All-Comers' Prizes, the shooting shall, unless otherwise specified, be in any position.

> C.-In Sighting.

Sighting shots may be fired in any position.

## 10.-SIGHTING.

Each Competitor will be allowed two sighting-shots at each range and in each competition.
2.-Tickets for sighting-shots, price 10 cents each, will be sold at the office provided for that purpose. They will be delivered up to the Squad Commander when a shot is taken. Such tickets to hold good in any match during the continuance of the meeting.
3.-Any Competitor joining the Squad when the first round of sighting-shots has been fired, shall be restricted to one sighting-shot.
4.-Competitors who at gun-fire have not completed the number of rounds prescribed by the conditions of a competition shall be allowed one sighting-shot when such competition is resumed.
11.-TIES.

The names of Competitors who have to shoot off ties, shall be posted up daily at $9 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and $2.45 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$., on the Ties Notice Board.

Ties shall be decided as follows :-
1.-When the firing shall take place at more than one distance :-
$a$. By the score made at the longest distance in the competition, and if still a tie and there be three distances in the competition, by the score at the second distance.
b. If still a tie, $\bar{b} y$ the fewest .misses.
$c$. If still a tie, by the fewest outers.
d. If still a tie, by the inverse order of shots, counting by twos from the last shot to the first.
$e$. If still a tie, by inverse order of shots, counting singly from the last to the first.
$f$. If still a tie, by firing shot for shot at the longest distance.
2.-When firing takes place at one distance only :-
a. By the fewest $\qquad$ .misses.
b. If still a tie by the fewest. outers.
c. If still a tie by the inverse order of shots, counting by two from the last shot to the first.
$d$. If still a tie, by the inverse order of shots, counting singly from the last shot to the first.
e. If still a tie, by firing shot for shot at the longest distance.

## In Matches.

a. By the aggregate scores made at the longest distance in the competition.
$b$. If stil a tie, by the fewest. $\qquad$ .misses.
$c$. If still a tie, by the fewest $\qquad$ outers.
d. If still a tie, by the Competitors who have made the highest score on each side, firing five rounds at the longest distance in the competition.

## 12.-ENTRIES.

1.-All entries must be made by Tuesday, the 7th of September, by $10 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$.
2.-Post entries, subject to an additional charge of 25 per cent. may be made up to the time of squading the competitors.
3.- No entries shall be made for any competition after the firmg for such competition has commenced.

> Issue of Firing Tickets.

Firing tickets shall be issued under the following conditions:-
1.-That any erasure or substitution of one name for another shall render the ticket invalid.
2.-Competitions for the second stage of any prize shall $b^{e}$ considered as matches.

## 13.-POST ENTRIES.

1.-Post entries will not be squaded until the regular entries have been provided for.
2.-They will be detailed to fire according to the number on the ticket issued, but the Council cannot hold themselves responsible should the holders of such tickets find it impossible to shoot betore the close of the competition ; in such case the entrance fee will be returned.

## 14.-INSTRUCTION TO COMPETITORS.

1.-All the Competitors in Camp will be subject to Police regulations.
2.-Blankets will be issued to all Competitors cermping.
3.-The Bugle calls will be as follows :-

Markers-G, and Non-Com. Officers' call. Call.

Squad, Commanders and Register-Keepers G G,-and Officers'
Compteitors.-G G G, and Assembly.
4.-The competition will be conducted strictly in accordance with the regulations, as published. The matches will take place, if possible, in the order of publication. Any deviations from the rule will be published on the board at the Secretary's Tent. Temporary discontinuance on account of bad weather, will be at the dicretion of the Council.
5.-No member of a squad or firing party must absent himself without leave during firing. Any Competitor delaying the squad will be passed by. Independent loading is permitted with muzzle-loaders.
6.-Any competitor protesting against any ruling of the Officer of the squad, or feeling himself aggrieved in any way, must make a statement of his grievance in writing, giving the names of two or more members of his squad who can bear him out in his statements, and hand it in to an Executive Officer, who will lay the matter before the Council. No exception will be allowed, however, to the marker's signal, or the decision of the umpire.
7.-Unless otherwise ordered, the shooting shall begin daily at 8.30 a. $m$., and shall cease when the mid-day gun is fired at 12 , noon. It shall be resumed at $1 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$., and cease at $6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.
8.-A Pool Target at 200 yards shall be open every day through
meeting. the meeting.

## 15.-REGULATIONS FOR THE POOL. TARGETS.

1.-Pool Tickets may be obtained of the officer in charge of the Pool Targets. Enfield, ten cents per shot; Small-bores, fifteen cents per shot.
2.-Competitors will fire in rotation, handing their tickets to the Squad Commander.
3.-Firing will be from any position.
4. - Ammunition will be sold to the competitors at three cents per round when required.
5.-Tickets will be given by the Squad Commander to all scoring bull's-eyes.
6.-One-third amount of the Entrance-money will be retained by the Association; the remaining two-thirds will be divided equally among those who score bull's-eyes, and will be paid on the production of a bull's-eye ticket, at the close of the day's proceedings.
7.-Bull's-eyes shall be round, four inches and a half in diameter for Snider-Enfields, and three inches for Small-bores.

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## 16.-DECISIONS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE..

The decision of the Executive Committee, or any three of them, upon the award of Prizes or on any point of dispute between Competitors, shall be final and binding on all parties, subject to appeal to Council, if considered desirable by Executive Committee.
