NEWS IN BRIEF.

NOVA SCOTIA.—Turo opens a fine skating rink.—The last English steamer brings a case of small-pox to Halifax. The patient was landed at Quarantine grounds.—A grab of salmon was seized and made off with an officer's watch and chain.—John Dobson of Westville died very suddenly last week after complaining only a few minutes; also Mr. George Gilroy, of apoplexy at Oxford.

SALMON were caught at Port Medway last week. This is unusually early.—The Railway is to be pushed to Halifax from Richmond.—The Boston steamer to Halifax has ceased running for the winter.—An old-fashioned snow-storm swept over the eastern part of Nova Scotia on Wednesday last.—The New Episcopal Church, Moncton held a meeting last Monday, Mr. Lewis Carvell in the chair, and passed resolutions, formally separating from the Episcopal Church of New Brunswick and uniting with Bishop Cummins.—A Mrs. Cady of Halifax is said to have fallen heir to a fortune of £26,000 sterling.—Rosanna Chisholm daughter of Colin Chisholm Esq., of Sydney, was drowned crossing the River on the 9th inst.—A company has been organized of £26,000 sterling, to build steamers for carrying coal from Nova Scotia. The ship Salado of London has been stranded near Yarmouth.

THE C. B. News of the Week, says:—On New Year's evening there was a "country frolic," with a fatal ending, at McIntosh's Mountain, near West Bay. Both men and women seem to have been drinking freely during the day, and when they met in the evening were intoxicated generally. A row occurred at McIntosh's in regard to dancing there, one or two of the assembled party beating with bludgeons a man named Donald Campbell. After a while the fight became general, male and female alike joining in the fray, and using promiscuously scythes, hatchets, and other weapons. Several were severely wounded. Donald Campbell received such injuries that he died on Friday afternoon last. Coroner Dr. Wilson held a coroner's inquest yesterday to hold an inquest. Four or five are at present confined to their beds, amongst them one woman who received a severe cut across the face. A verdict of manslaughter against John McIntosh, William's son, was unanimously rendered.

NEW BRUNSWICK.—Governor Tully has been entertained by his friends at Antigonish, St. John, A. A. Stockton Esq., Rev. G. M. Carey and Rev. Howard Sprague, N. Y., were among the speakers at one of these. Rev. Robert Wilson lectured at Fredericton on "Britain among the Nations." The Reporter says "the lecture was well received by a large and intelligent audience."—Business on New Brunswick Railroad is increasing.—A "Lith Pressing Dress Manufacturing Company" is to be organized, with a capital of \$12,000. Headquarters at Canterbury, York Co.—Serious illness is reported to have appeared among the lumbermen of Miramichi woods. It is in the form of Scary or erysipelas.—Rev. R. O. B. Johnson has been presented with an address and a purse of \$45.—The Sackville Methodists have begun to take active measures toward construction of their new church. Success to them!—Rev. H. McKee was presented by his Bible class with some valuable silver ware.—Mr. Kate Stanton lectured in St. John on Wednesday evening, subject "Abolition of Poverty." Miss Stanton has a special talent for platform address and is a lady of prepossessing appearance.—Miss Wall, aged 17, was drowned on the 13th while crossing the Riverview River.—Mr. Snowball is to oppose Mr. Mitchell in Miramichi election.—A young man attempted last week to impose upon Post Office by pretending to send money in a registered letter and afterward accusing the office of abstracting the contents. He was arrested, but afterwards escaped and left the country.

MISCELLANEOUS.—The homeward-bound English Steamer reached St. John, N. B., at 6 a.m., Friday, and sailed at 9 a.m. for England.—The Prince and Princess of Wales being in Russia. Great demonstrations over the projected wedding.—Twice has young Grant nominated a man for Chief Justice and both have been rejected.—A heavy fire in Fortmouth consumed, consumed quantities of stores intended for the Ashantee expedition.—A fire in Brooklyn, N. Y., destroyed over \$600,000 worth of property.—The Pacific Mail Steamers are missing. There is ground to fear they are lost.—They are mining for iron at Galles Point, near Charlottetown, P. E. I.—The next World's Exhibition is to be held at Berlin.—Cardinal Antonelli, the Pope's chief counsellor, is dying.—Yellow fever continues to rage about its main base, the Tiberine case is about as close. A nobleman who has been giving largely to sustain the claimant's case has abandoned him.—It is contemplated to open a route from Georgetown, P. E. I., to Island, on which steamers will continue to run much later than by the present arrangement.—Rev. D. D. D. preached a sermon on the first Sunday in the year at Charlottetown, which one of the City Papers gives to its readers.—Subject: "Nebuchadnezzar's Feast."—A steamer, the Charlotte, was wrecked at Halifax, reached Charlottetown, via Cape Tormentine, on the 20th.

News and papers report that a woman named Mary Cahill was found dead in her house at the South Side River Head, and that a coroner's jury found a verdict of willful murder against her husband, Richard Cahill. Building on Parliament Grounds, formerly Barrack, occupied for some time past by Pacific Railway Survey Staff, was burned to-night at 8 o'clock. The plans of the surveys, maps, and whole labor in connection with Fleming's surveys destroyed, with building. One million dollars worth of labor lost in 30 minutes. Fire supposed to be of incendiary origin. The first telegram respecting losses by last night's fire more than confirmed by interview with General Fleming. All the plans of the Pacific Railway Survey are burned, except few on British Columbia. Intercolonial Records, and Plans and Surveys of entire line were also destroyed. Total loss estimated at one million and a half of dollars. All of Mr. Fleming's private and official correspondence for 15 years is burned.—Ottawa Telegram, Saturday.

Despatch from New Mexico states that fifty desperadoes attacked the house where a bride party was being held, and killed four women and three men. The ruffians also attacked another house in the same district, and brutally murdered several other persons. After committing these deprecations they fled retreat to a strong position which they still hold and defy the authorities.—The fund collected in New York for the relief of the families of Messrs Carrara and Frances, members of the Evangelical Alliance, amounts to \$4,325.—The Sumner's Journal says:—The Wesleyan Tea and Bazaar, which was held at Centreville, on New Year's evening, was a success beyond expectation. The day and roads were beautiful. All the arrangements of both the Tea and Bazaar showed tact and ability, on the part of the projectors. The estates were substantial and delicious. We are no judge as to the quality of their articles offered for sale, but from appearance, them good. And didn't the ladies know how to sell their wares—perhaps not.
