Town Council.

The regular meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening with Mayor Harvey and Councillors Hales, Haycock, Starr and Regan present. A written report was presented by the Finance Committee showing receipts for the month \$21,744, and expenditures, \$20,007. The bank overdraft at the end of August was \$220.75—less than half what it was at the same time last year.

Mr. N. M. Sinclair tendered his resignation as auditor of the town accounts which on motion was accepted.

Mr. S. C. West presented a written application for the position of auditor which on motion was laid on the table.

A communication was read from Hilsley & Harvey Co., of Port Williams, asking for a license to do plumbing work in the town of Wolfville, and enclosing the required bond. On motion the matter was referred to the Sewer Committee.

When 'Prohibition' Is Not Prohibition.

A vitally important point which is often overlooked by opponents of prohibition is thus described by Dan R. Sheen, in his recent debate with May or Rose of Millwaukee:

"The trouble with a great many is that they do not understand Prohibitionists or Prohibition. I know my opponent is one of that kind. He does not understand what Prohibition is. I am going to tell him and incidentally would like to have you listen. Prohibition consists of two things, a Prohibitory Law and its Enforcement. A great many people think that a prohibitory law is prohibition. The Prohibitionists have got too much sense to think anything of that kind. We have a prohibitory law right here in the city of Peoria, prohibiting the selling of intoxicating liquors on Sunday, and there is more liquor sold in Peoria on Sunday than on any other day of the week. We have a prohibitory law that says that liquor shall not be sold to minors and drunks, and yet that is all we have.

"What is wanting? It is to have the law enforced. Because we have the Prohibitory Law and they have turned the law over to the enemies of the law to enforce, and it is not enforced. You might as well try and convict Satan of sin by trying him in his own name before twelve of his imps, as to try to have a prohibitory law enforced in the hands of its enemies."

Institution for the Deaf and Dumb, Sept. 2nd, 1910.

The school will reopen after the summer holidays on Monday, September 19th, when it is hoped all pupils will arrive promptly. At this school all pupils are taught to speak and to understand speech by reading and the movements of the lips. There are throughout the Maritime provinces many children, not actually deaf and dumb, but deaf enough to prevent their taking advantage of the ordinary public school instruction. Such children are eligible for admission to this school and should be sent, as their speech would be greatly improved as well as their powers of lip-reading. Parents are only called upon to pay travelling expenses and furnish clothing, the institution providing board, education, etc. Pupils may be admitted between the ages of six and eighteen years.

Doctors, teachers and clergymen are earnestly requested to communicate with Principal Pearson if they know of any deaf or partially deaf children in their neighborhood.

The D. A. R.

A Montreal despatch says: "Extensive improvements are being contemplated on the Dominion Atlantic as soon as the C. P. R. get possession in May next. Boston building a telegraph line from Toronto to Vancouver, the Canadian Pacific will spend a round million on the road bed and bridges."

This report is probably correct. The C. P. R. always does what it decides upon in adequate terms. It has the money to do it. The C. P. R. can therefore be depended upon to do big things with the D. A. R.

The death of Dr. Herbert C. Creed, which occurred on Wednesday of last week at his home at Fredericton, N. B., removes one of the best known educationalists of the Maritime Provinces. Dr. Creed was for over thirty years Professor of English in the New Brunswick Normal School, resigning that position about a year ago, on account of failing health. He was for many years Secretary of the Baptist Convention and Editor of the Baptist Year Book. He was in attendance at the Baptist Convention at Woodstock last month. Dr. Creed's death was occasioned by a cerebral hemorrhage. He leaves a widow and three sons, all residents in Fredericton.

THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

The parents of Nova Scotia will breathe more freely when they have learned that general if not radical efforts will be made by the government of the province to place our public schools on a footing worthy of our province, and upon lines successfully applied in some of the other provinces of the Dominion.

Too long have our public schools been embarrassed with frills and fustles, and too little attention given to the real necessities of a common school education and a life of activity in our democracy. Too long, also, have our public schools been regarded by many educationists as recruiting grounds for our academies and colleges, and too long has the test of efficiency of our public school teachers been the number of pupils they get ready for the grade which gives entrance to some college. The true test of the public school is its power to qualify its pupils for work in the democracy, and the test of a teacher's efficiency is his power to call out and to fit for life's higher service the pupils committed to his charge.

There has been a widespread revolt against making an examination the test of a pupil's fitness, and there is much that is sane in this revolt. But while this is true, we wonder how a better test can be applied. Many teachers only give serious attention to the pupils who are preparing for some special test. This is a grave cause for complaint, and teachers thus betray their profession. In that way many boys and girls are being deprived of the culture and training that the school alone can furnish.

And for this state of affairs it is claimed by the educational office at Halifax our public school inspectors are responsible and must take a share of the blame. The inspector is the official appointed to see that each pupil gets a fair deal. It is to be regretted that this work is not more efficiently done in many districts, as failure means a loss that is simply incalculable. In this district where Inspector Roscoe has for so many years held sway, there could not possibly be any cause for complaint. He has vitalized all that came within the touch of his official duties. A man of blameless life, singleness of purpose, who has inspired, guided and educated not only the teachers but all who came under his inspectorate.

The fact remains that the present school system as used in the public schools of Nova Scotia, is about as bad as it could be, but while conditions are what they are, and while the educational system is being dominated by a faculty who has long since outlived his usefulness, and who have been for the time being, so to speak, and fills that are of no possible use to the 90 per cent. of the pupils of our public schools who will never see a college, or perhaps not even a county academy or high school—while these conditions exist the duties of the inspector should be plainly understood.

Upon the public school inspector, more than upon any other man, outside the office of the big chief at Halifax and the government whose servant he is, devolves the duty and upon him rests the responsibility of making the public schools take some kind of a worthy place in our country's life. Men who for any reason prove themselves unequal, or who fail because of a constitutional lack of alertness, should be brought up with a round turn, no matter how such or how under, no matter how such or how little we pay for our school or test books, no matter how fine the equipment of the school, an inefficient inspector will go far towards nullifying the best educational scheme ever devised by the mind of man. The public schools are of far greater vital interest to our country than all the colleges combined.

Is McBride the Coming Leader.

A Wrecked Family.
A teacher writes: "The death of a young man in this country a few weeks ago, has made me more than ever realize the enormity of the crimes arising from the use of strong drink. From excessive drinking this young man had spent about all his money, and in a state of despondency left his wife and children, and was heard of no more until a notice in the paper informed his friends that he was found dead in bed with empty laudanum bottles by his side."

"The grandfather of this young man was a moderate drinker, who left seven sons with about \$10,000 each. The first son went early to a drunkard's tremens; the second died of delirium tremens, and was found next morning dead in bed; the fourth was found dead in a barn, where, not worth a dollar, he had shot himself; the fifth had spent his patrimony, and is now a day-laborer; the sixth has spent his own property and that of his wife, and is now a farm-laborer; and the seventh has disappeared from the community. Some of the grandsons were hot, outwitting the innate influence, a few of the grandsons have, by God's help, been able to withstand the terrible temptation, and are living usefully and Christian lives. I give you the above to show the effects of moderate drinking by one man. Far be it from me to wound the feelings of the family, but I write with the hope that it may be a warning to my fellow-men. All this can be testified to by hundreds of living witnesses, for the family was widely known and much respected."—The Safeguard.

His Badge.
"Freckles" was his nickname. He had no mother. He had a drunkard for a father. But he had a Sunday school, and there he learned about temperance and decent living and the fight against evil. Freckles served salt at people's back doors, but he had the steady spirit of a crusader, young as he was. But Freckles—well, Freckles went round serving milk the next morning, still with his badge on. "The Saloon Must Go." Why, you haven't taken off your badge yet," said one of his customers.

"What should I do that for?" was Freckles' reply. "It was the men that voted yesterday; but it won't be long before we Sunday school boys will be doing the voting—and then the saloons are going to go!"

It was an answer that caused every temperance worker in town to take courage. It is the answer to many problems—the answer of the boy, who is the future embodied. The Sunday school boy and his ideals are the hope
