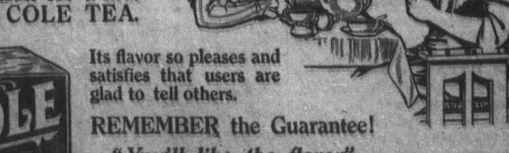

Hundred Years Ago.

While the boundaries of Europe today are trembling in the balance of war, says a statement issued by the National Geographical Society, it is interesting to contrast the Europe of April, 1815, with the Europe of April, 1915. Then Europe was at war just as it is now. Then one great nation, France, was standing off a host of allies just as today the brunt of the present war falls on one great power against a field of allies. The same five great European nations that are now fighting then. Only the line up was different. Then it was Europe—Great Britain, Prussia, Austria and Russia—against France and Napoleon. Then as now, the vast armies of the allies were making ready for a spring campaign of invasion, and, much as it is the case today, the fields within present Belgium were first choice for a war theatre. Moreover, a century of politics and diplomacy have made little change in the questions about which wars are waged in Europe. One important difference was that the Europe of April 1, 1815, had advanced through a score of years of trouble, to a state of dissatisfied, pent-up exhaustion. Napoleon made his Waterloo campaign in the spring of 1815, and, by June 18, it had been decided in the favor of the allies.

Good Counsel.

Boston, Mass., April 17, 1915.—The Boston Post, in an editorial entitled 'A Good Summer Promised,' says: 'The people who know pretty well what prosperity means and whether it is just ahead or not are the proprietors of summer hotels. They can sense the coming conditions in a way and they furthermore have advance bookings as a sure means of information. They say—or at least, here in New England they say it—that the summer season of 1915 is to be one of the best on record. The greatest hotel men in Maine, the directors of four famous houses, declare the demands for accommodation at their resorts are far more numerous than ever before noted in March and April. Others report in like manner. 'The summer hotel business is not conclusive evidence of prosperity or lack of it, but it is a very good barometer. It now indicates fair weather.' This opinion appears to be generally shared by the railroad and steamship officials of this part of the country, including the representatives of the lines running between New England and the Maritime Provinces. That there will be a normal summer tourist traffic over the lines reaching Nova Scotia, despite the war, is the opinion of the transportation officials interested in this business. Some of those who have been most active in promoting the prosperity of Nova Scotia as a summer resort are, however, beginning to feel disturbed over some of the criticisms of the 'high cost of living' in the Land of Evangeline that from time to time are expressed by returning tourists. In commenting on this Mr. Thomas F. Anderson, of Boston, who for more than 30 years has been a persistent advocate of the vacation charms of his native province, said recently: 'I am sorry to say that we nowadays hear more or less complaint about the excessive rates that are charged for hotel and boarding house accommodations in Nova Scotia, and also about the lack of amusements for guests at some of the better known resorts. There is, in my opinion, too much truth in both of these criticisms, and the sooner our tourist catering friends in Nova Scotia wake up to the fact, the better for them. Too many of them are charging 'all that the traffic will bear,' and this with the relatively long steamship or rail journey from the United States, makes Nova Scotia today one of the most expensive vacation countries on the continent. Moreover the indifference displayed by the hotel people in some of the largest resorts in the matter of both outdoor and indoor facilities for amusement and recreation is nothing less than a reproach. No summer vacation resort in the United States of the size and reputation of Digby, for example, is without its golf course or casino; and the hotel proprietors are the most liberal contributors to their upkeep; while in some of our Nova Scotia resorts, I am ashamed to say, when a subscription paper for a regatta or other public event is passed around, the hotel men, in some instances either in the smallest subscriptions or refuse to subscribe at all.'

Arbour Day

OBSERVANCE SHOULD BE GENERAL. THE OBJECTS FOR WHICH IT STANDS ARE TO THE GENERAL ADVANTAGE OF CANADA. Arbour Day is not observed in Canada to the extent which its importance warrants. The people of Canada must ever keep in mind their dependence upon her forests. With large areas suitable only for forestry purposes, it is essential that the value of trees and their protection should be thoroughly impressed upon Canadians. While Arbour Day is observed in the rural schools, and in some city schools, its recognition by the general public is not as general as it should be. In the province of Nova Scotia Arbour Day is celebrated to a limited extent in the schools. This is not sufficient, however. The observance of Arbour Day should be general. There is need in every part of Canada for the education and instruction which Arbour Day represents. The day should be observed as a public holiday, at a time most suitable to the climatic conditions of the local ity. Public recognition should be given to Arbour Day, and the planting and protection of shade trees, the preparation of flower and vegetable gardens, and the thorough cleaning up of homes and surroundings should be advocated as special duties for the day. Arbour Day has its justification in the value of trees, from whatever point of view they may be considered. Nothing contributes so much to make the world a pleasant place to live in as its trees. The true home feeling is not satisfied without the presence of the trees, with their shelter and shade, their beauty of form and leaf, their blossoms and fruit, their varying shades with the passing of the seasons, and their fullness of colour in the autumn days. They also afford homes and shelter for our feathered friends—the birds—during their annual visits to us. There is nothing which will add beauty and value to a home or the schoolhouse more than the presence of trees; there is likewise nothing which adds more to the comfort of the pedestrians than shade trees on the roadside. The way may be long and dusty, but under the cool shade of the trees relief is found. It is to be hoped, therefore, that the celebration of Arbour Day will become more general, that the planting and care of trees and shrubs around the school houses, homes, public spaces and by road sides may have the effect of developing a keen appreciation of the value and beauty of trees; and that in thus enlarging the field of Arbour Day activities, greater interest may be created in the protection of our Canadian forests from the reckless destruction of fire and the axe with which they are threatened.

A Fine Entertainment.

The music loving people of Wolfville and vicinity enjoyed a real treat last Friday evening when a program of music of such quality as we are not often privileged to hear was furnished at the Opera House by the Halifax Concert Orchestra, assisted by Mrs. G. D. Roberts, soprano; Miss Naomi Chatcouver, violin; and Mr. H. D. Newcombe, baritone. The work of the orchestra was of an especially high order and reflected great credit upon Mrs. Bullock who conducted the program as a master piece in the matter of selection, the most refined music predominating with here and there at catchy air, and a final medley, which finished with the National Anthem and brought the entertainment to a close. Of the scheduled numbers 'Tobani's Fata Morgana' was particularly well received. The rhythmic, almost breezy piece, was splendidly interpreted, Coleridge Taylor's 'Valse Bohemiene' was another number which received a very enthusiastic reception. The playlets by Miss Chateaubert of 'Vieuxtemps' 'Appassionata,' was followed by most excited applause. The music is difficult and staccato and requires, if full justice is done to it, an accomplished player, and that is what Miss Chateaubert is. What she played as an encore was less difficult but of fine music, and was rendered with the same combination of technique and feeling that made her first number such a brilliant success. Mrs. Roberts sang many songs and charmed her hearers with every number. Ronald's dreamy 'A Lovely Night' was given in her very best manner and voice, while 'Sympathy' captivated the audience. From Mad in Butterfly she sang 'Un bel di,' which requires considerable range of voice. Mr. Newcombe has a most musical and also powerful voice and his song, Verdi's 'Celeste Aida' was one of the best and most appreciated numbers of the evening. He also was encored. Mr. Black deserves the best thanks of our citizens for the opportunity afforded of hearing such high class music.

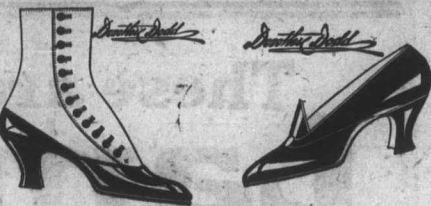

Not long ago there was a time when parents could leave any American periodical upon the sitting room table without misgiving. That time has passed. The periodicals that you do not need to examine with some care before you put them where your girls may see them are not few. Under on-specious pretext or another, those who control them are printing—stories and articles that are far from paying that deference to modesty and decency upon which our literature used justly to pride itself.
This is a matter for very great regret. Periodicals intended for general reading seek to enter the home—and the plea always that they bring whole new recreation if not more solid benefits. Thus they rest under a peculiar obligation to be careful what they print. That obligation they are now disregarding, to the injury of our youth.

In respect of these matters, there is a right time and a wrong in which to impart the new knowledge; there is a right mood and a wrong in which to receive it. 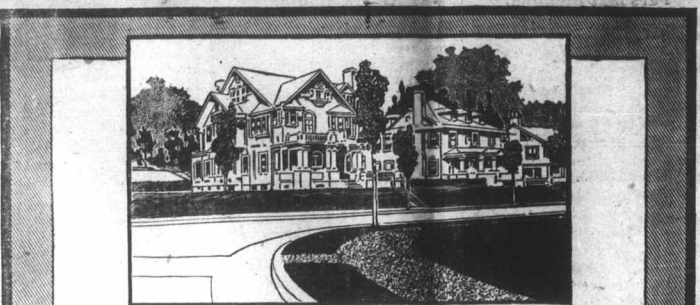
