Third Notice.

The Testimony of the Rocks; or, Geology in its bearings on the Two Theologies—Natural and Revealed. By Hugh Miller. Boston: Gould & Lincoln. Charlotte: W. G. Hazard, 1857.

Last week we were obliged to break off a very interesting quotation from the fourth Lecture, illustrative of the view he takes of the Mosaic account of Creation. Having treated of the first and second day's work, he passes on to the third.

"The third day's vision seems to be more purely geological in its character than either of the previous two. Extensive tracts of dry land appear, and there springs up over them, at the Divine command, a rank vegetation. And we know that what seems to be the corresponding Cassiopeian period, unlike what is called upon to render them conspicuous objects in a distant prospect, appear in the Mosaic drama; and we still find an over-credence of the existence of extensive, though apparently very flat lands, and the remains of a wonderfully gigantic and abundant vegetation, in what appear to be the rocks of this period. The vision of the fourth day, like that of the second, pertained not to the earth, but to the heavens; the sun, moon, and stars become visible, and from the sole subjects of the prophetic description. And just as, during the second period, the earth would in all probability have failed to furnish any feature of mark enough to divert a human eye placed on a commanding station from the conspicuous atmospheric phenomena of the time, so it seems equally probable that during this fourth period it would have failed to furnish any feature of mark enough to divert a human eye from the still more conspicuous celestial phenomena of the time. As has been already incidentally remarked, this Persian and Chinese periods were 'epochs'—to employ the language of the late Professor Edward Forbes—of great variety of production of generic types." On the other hand, the appearance for the first time of sun, moon, and stars, must have formed a scene well suited to divert the attention of the seer from every other. Nor (as has been somewhat rashly argued by Dr. Kitto, and several others) does it seem irrational to hold that three very extended periods should have elapsed ere the celestial heavens became visible on earth. Addison's popular illustration, drawn from one of the calculations of Newton, made in an essay upon the rainbow, is the singularly classical and apt, "the comet that made its appearance in 1680 imbibed so much heat by its approaches to the sun, that it would have been two thousand times hotter than red-hot iron had it been at that distance; and that, supposing it as big as the earth, and at the same distance from the sun, it would be fifty thousand years in cooling before it recovered its natural temper."

As to the plausibility of this scheme, we must leave our readers to judge. To our mind there is something not poetical merely, but truthful about it. The first chapter of Genesis is just what would have been expected admitting Miller's hypotheses to be true. The difficulty of reconciling the Mosaic day with the Geologic periods is got over in a most masterly manner; and should this theory be accepted as the true one, the war between the Theologian and the Geologist will cease, on this point at least. If this is not accepted, there remains the most unsatisfactory thought that the discordant remains of Geology can prove its facts beyond the possibility of a doubt. Its facts are revelations, in a sense, from God. These the Bible-Interpreter, if he be an honest man, is bound to take into account.

We take occasion from a remark dropped by a person signing himself "A Young Man," in a letter to the Editor of the Examiner, to correct a mistake into which he has fallen and into which he might perhaps mislead others. DECAY OF IRON RAILINGS.

TO PRESERVE FLOWERS IN WATER. Mix a little carbonate of soda with the water, and it will preserve flowers for a fortnight, but the water in flower-pots should be changed every day in summer, or it will become offensive and unhealthy, even if there is salt in it.

AIR IN BEDROOMS. It is said that a bird suspended from the top of a curtained bedstead in which people sleep will generally be found dead in the morning, from impure air. Small, close rooms, in habitations of the poor, are ill-ventilated as the curtained bedstead.

CHINESE WALL. Dr. Bowring, in a recent lecture on China, said, speaking of the great wall, that if all the bricks, stone and masonry of Great Britain were gathered together, they would not furnish enough material for such a structure.

POSTAGE ENVELOPES. M. Firon tells us that the idea of a post-paid envelope originated early in the reign of Henry VIII. with M. de Velayor, who in 1658 established (with royal approbation), a private penny-post, placing boxes at the corners of streets for the reception of letters wrapped up in envelopes, which were to be bought at offices established for that purpose.

It is important to have the pork well cooled before salting, and it should not remain unsalted very long after cooling. It should never be allowed to freeze. It should always have a great supply of salt, and of the strongest quality, and brine should be made and poured into the barrels. For if nothing but water is put in with the salt, the pork may be injured before the salt is melted enough to make good brine.
