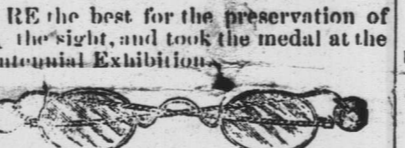

### IVANHOE.

Whether from indecision or some other motive of hesitation, the clamor of the day remained motionless for more than a minute, while the eyes of the silent audience were riveted upon his actions; and then, gradually and gracefully sinking the point of his lance, he deposited the coronet which it supported at the feet of lady Rowena.

The trumpets instantly sounded, while the heralds proclaimed her the Queen of Beauty and of Love for the ensuing day, menacing with suitable penalties those who should prove disobedient to her authority. They then repeated their former cry of "Largesse," to which Cedric, in the height of his joy, replied by an ample donative, and to which Athelstane, though less promptly, added one equally large.

There was murmuring among the damsels of Norman descent, who were as much unused to see the preference given to a Saxon beauty as the Norman Nobles were to sustain defeat in the games of chivalry which they themselves had introduced. But these sounds of disaffection were drowned by popular shouts of "Long live the Lady Rowena, the chosen and lawful Queen of Beauty and Love!" However unaccepted these cries might be to Prince John and those around him, he saw himself obliged to confirm the nomination of the victor, and accordingly calling to order, he left his throne; and then mounting his jennet, accompanied by his train, he again entered the lists. The Prince paused a moment beneath the gallery of Lady Alicia to whom he paid his compliments, observing at the same time, "By my halidome, sir! If the Knight's feats in arms have shown that he hath limbs and sinews, his choice hath no less proved that his eyes are none of the clearest."

It was on this occasion, as during his whole life, John's mistaking not to understand the characters of those he wished to conciliate. Waldemar Fitzurse was offended rather than pleased at the Prince stating thus broadly an opinion that his daughter had been slighted.

"I know no right of chivalry," he said, "more precious than that of each free knight to choose his lady-love by his own judgment. My daughter courts distinction from none; and in her own sphere, will never fail to receive the full proportion of that which is her due."

Prince John replied not; but, spurring his horse, as if to give vent to his vexation, he made the animal bound forward towards the gallery where Rowena was seated, with the crown at her feet.

The Knight, speaking for the first time, in low and hurried tones, excused himself by pleading fatigue and the necessity of preparing for to-morrow's encounter.

A strong guard of men-at-arms renewed at intervals, from two hours to two hours, surrounded the lists, and kept watch during the night.

**THE ABOLITION OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.**

We should like to know what policy the Government is going to pursue next winter relative to the abolition of this body of men. We wrote last winter that the Council ought to be abolished, and we cited dozens of reasons why it should. We had the pleasure of seeing the Government put in the Speech, as one of the measures on which they stood before the country that the Council should fall. But we had the extreme mortification of seeing that the project ended in talk.

We have no reason to doubt the sincerity of the Government when they brought in the motion; but it seems to us that they might have faced the question more squarely than what they did. A number of Opposition members inveighed against disturbing the precious roost, and a number of them were strongly of the opinion that they ought to be hauled down regardless of age or sex. There were a goodly number, too, who had no mind of their own on the matter, but waited to see whether it was popular or not; that when it came to pass they might severally, tell their constituents, like the fly on the wheel: "Behold what a dust I raise."

But in the arguments we heard in favor of maintaining this body—if indeed they might have been called arguments—we observed that sympathy was the strongest plank. It was a dreadful thing to the philanthropic mind of Mr. Elder to annihilate the old men, and at this time of their lives to sweep them out on the cold world. They first tried to tell of *senectus* that might come when the House of Assembly, beset by the people, would be forced into disastrous legislation, when ruin would be wrought without a restraining power upstairs. But this showed as we think to be the very reason why they should be blotted out. Since the time Responsible Government has been granted England up till now, or in other words since the power has been transferred from the crown to the people, the people have ruled. In olden times the maxim was, and we presume the maxim is not rusty yet, "The king can do no wrong;" but it was equally true when the people ruled, that the people could do no wrong. And if the people can do no wrong why is it necessary to set a lot of men in their dotage to care over the laws their representatives make? It would take more than a paper like the *Telegraph* to answer this. At least this is what we understand by Responsible Government, though it may be said there is a seasoning of Republicanism through it. We may be told the Commons may be said to be the Secretary that draws up the laws for the assent of the supreme power, which is either represented by the Sovereign or in the person of a Viceroy or by a Lieutenant Governor. This is truly so, but since so, why the necessity of submitting it to the spectacles of an intermediate concern that has not the power to make it law? The argument viewed even from the Cavalier's standpoint is un-sound, and unworthy him who uses it.

But though it might be held, as Blackstone holds, that the time was when such a body was necessary to preserve the balance between the King and the Commons, we can't see, for the life of us the necessity of it under the Confederation of Canada. All matters of National concern, such as Customs Laws, Trade and Defense are referred to the Dominion Parliament. It is only on such questions as these, taking the ground of those who are wedded to a mock House of Lords, that the jurisdiction of a Legislative Council could, if ever of any benefit, be turned into national use. We should like to know who argued so eloquently last winter to tell us one disastrous thing the Commons might find itself impelled to do, but which the Council might checkmate? Would it be anything of a rebellious nature? O no, for if the people rose in rebellion, they would do as Englishmen "have done" before; made short work of both the Lords and the Commons, "as represented" in Assembly and Council. In fact Mr. Elder or Mr. Lytton cannot point to any possible state of affairs to maintain their theory. It was a mere scare crow, a something used to frighten those who knew no better. This article our readers will please consider the opening of the campaign against the Legislative Council.

**A DARK PICTURE.**

Russia has a dark and horrible way of doing everything. Yet she pretends to be the champion of Freedom; and stepped in to preserve the Christians from the "hateful tyranny" of the Turks. But while she told Europe and the world that the ink that wrote the woes of Poland was not dry, nor had the sympathetic eye of Christendom ceased to swim for the fate of that unhappy land—

A writer in a French newspaper gives a dark picture of the manner in which Russia is going to work now to pacify the Caucasus. He states that all attempts to organize the country having failed, it has been decided to depopulate it, and orders have been given for the inhabitants to be driven from their hamlets and villages and transplanted to other climes. The mode of operation, he says, is simple: "During the darkness of night a Cossack regiment surrounds a village, and when morning breaks all the inhabitants, without exception, are disarmed, clothed in the grey convict dress and marched away thousands of miles—some to the frozen shores of Arhangel, others to Siberia. The idea of peopling the immense tracts of Asiatic Russia with Caucasians has haunted several ill regulated minds at St. Petersburg, but these mountaineers of the south soon become homesick and die in the melancholy waste of Siberia. It is colonization "backwards." In the sixteenth century there were 8,000,000 inhabitants in Siberia, and now there are only 4,000,000, although there is an influx of 120,000 convicts every year. After alluding to the sanguinary scenes enacted during the Turkish war, the writer says that 2,000 Caucasians have just been transported, and the remains of the population will very quickly follow.

**The Hand of Russia.**

The *Pull Mall Gazette*, some days ago hinted at the third great danger which threatens the British Cabinet. It asserts that the buried treasure that Yakoub Khan, recently recovered at Cabul, was all in Russian gold, and that some of the Afghan regulars were possessed in Russian uniforms, which in many cases had the Russian eagle on the buttons. [Yakoub pretended that he had plundered seventy lakhs of rupees from the mother of Abdulla Jan Sher Ali's favorite son, and offered to surrender them. A party of soldiers were accordingly sent to dig them up. Eight lakhs of treasure were found in gold. There was also a mine of gold coin in bags and boxes, with silver silks, brocades and precious stones. Experts asserted that the value of all this property could not be less than eighty lakhs. Many other boxes were left unopened and put in charge of Major Moriarty, the officer in charge of the treasure chest, and of Lieutenant Colville, the Chamberlain, Assistant Paymaster, and by them transferred to General Roberts. It was one of the richest prizes ever taken by a victorious army in India. It was also the more accessible to the British, as their treasure chest had been much reduced by the enormous purchases of the Commissariat. Carriage had been so scarce when they worked up from Ali Khyel that only a few lakhs were brought with them. Poverty stared them in the face. Bills upon India were given to merchants of Cabul and Kizil Basti. Tributes were levied on Sindharis and fines imposed. Most of these payments were made in grain. But it is reported that all the coin received by General Roberts was either in Bokhara gold tellais (worth \$5 each), or in Russian five-rupee pieces (accepted in the Bazaar at the entire, fictitious value of \$5 each). As the currency of Afghanistan is more closely assimilated to that of Persia than that of British India the fact occasioned little comment at the time.]

**The African Verdict.**  
[Translated from the German.]

Alexander, the Macedonian, once came into a distant but very rich province of Africa. The inhabitants went to meet him, and brought to him dishes full of golden apples and fruit. "Do you eat these fruit in your country?" said Alexander. "I am not come to see your dishes, but to learn your customs." They then conducted him to the market place where their king was administering justice. Just at that time a citizen stepped forth and said: "I purchased, O King, of this man, a sack of chaff, and have found in it a considerable treasure. The chaff is mine, but not the gold; and this man will not take it back. Speak to him, O King, for it is his." The other party, also a citizen of this place, answered, "Thou shalt not keep anything unjustly, and shall not I be afraid to take such a thing from thee; I have sold thee the sack with all that was in it; keep thy own speak to him, O King." The King asked the first if he had a son. He answered, "Yes." He asked the other if he had a daughter, and received for answer, "Yes." "Well," said the King, "You are both honest people; let your children be married together and give the found treasure to them for a wedding portion; that is my decision." Alexander was astonished, when he heard the sentence. "Have I judged unjustly," said the King of the distant land, "that thou appearst so astonished?" "By no means," answered Alexander; "but in our country a different judgment would have been given." "And how then?" asked the African King. "Both litigants," said Alexander, "would have lost their heads, and the treasure would have come into the hands of the King." Then the African King clasped his hands together, and said: "Shines there upon you the sun, and does the heavens send down upon you the rain?" Alexander replied, "Yes." "Then it must be," continued he, "for the sake of the innocent brute beasts that live in your country; for upon such men should no sun shine—no heaven rain."

**Cetewayo at Capetown.**  
[Times.]

A private letter from Cape Town contains the following: "Sir Barth Freer in his interview with the Zulul King, asked him if there was anything he wished for, and Cetewayo, after a slight demur, said that he should like to have the floor of his room cleaner. He has distinguished his enemies not a little by his courteous manner and cleanliness. I have often heard people say, 'Why, one

can't imagine he is such a monster of wickedness and cruelty to look at his face? I understand that Cetewayo has said that it was his distinct orders that no officer should be killed, and that when his army returned from Isandula were, and they said they could not distinguish the officers from the men. I must not forget to tell you that Cetewayo takes an interest in illustrated papers, and when he was shown one of them with a picture of them, with a picture of himself sharpening a knife to kill Gaudier he burst out laughing, and said he never knew what a real he was until he saw that. I hear that he has been suffering from rheumatism lately. It is said that he cannot bear to hear John Dunn's name mentioned—one cannot wonder at that."
