THERE appears to be a poss bility that the Canadian Pacific Company's new liners, Empress of Britain and Empress of Ireland, may make Halifax their terminus when they are placed in service. This was rumored some time ago but not much was thought of i then ; but lately Captain Murray of the company's steamer Lake Manitoba, has been at Halifax and has intimated that his object in coming there was in connection with terminal facilities at that terminus.
