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

steel pens. The great objection to the steel pen when it first came into general use was its stiffness. There was not that 'give" and spring in the metal pen which characterized the old-fashioned goosequill pen. This was remedied. lowever, by the side slits which we ee in pens to-day, and for many years the method of slitting pens by eans of a press was kept a secret by ose famous pen-makers, Gillott and on. Briefly, the method of manu-Mason. 



### Civic Elections.

Several citizens have already given ormal notice of their intention to offer themselves as candidates for election as Councillors at the forthcoming Municipal Elections.

We have not heard how many of the present Councillors have decided offer themselves 'as candidates

As to the Mayoralty contest it is generally believed that the present civic career of the candidate has been think of. a successful one. For this reason the old style of the composition of Municipal bodies in England appeals strongly to us. Many of these bodies are composed of a Mayor, a bench of Aldermen and a body of Councillors. Every year one-third of the Councillors retire. After every election not more than one-third of the Councillors can be new men, one-third will have a year's experience at least, and the other third at least two years' experience. Aldermen are chosen from successful and experienced Councillors and the Mayor from the Aldermen. This insures always a Council of men well versed in the affairs of always veterans of some standing. and yet there is a constant accession of new blood

Although the Constitution of our municipality does not provide automatically for the retention of a majority of experienced and successful grews, summoned three others of the embers of the municipality, yet it does afford the public opportunity of returning successful and experienced members of the municipality back to office, and also of infusing what is desirable in the way of new blood.






