Montreal Items.

On the night of Sunday, the 2nd
inst., Montreal was given an oppor-
tunity to hear the famous Protestant
preacher, Rev. Dr. Clifford, of Lon-
don, England. Olivet Baptist Church
was filled to overflowing and many
stood outside the doors trying to
catch what was said. The congrega-
tion stood and waved handkerchiefs
when the rev. gentleman entered.
Taking for his text: "And yet you
are unwilling to come to Me that you
may have life" (John v. 40.) Dr.
Clifford delivered a very thrilling and
vigilant sermon. He showed what
religion should be to him. It will
be remembered that last September
Father Vaughan stated in this city
that "Protestantism was a religion
without a soul." Dr. Clifford gave
it as his opinion that far from being
a religion without a soul Protestant-
ism represented in the history of
Christianity the recovery of the soul
of religion—the recovery of the Soul
of Jesus Christ. It meant, he claim-
ed, the disheartening of truths which
had been buried for centuries by the
Roman Catholic Church. At the end
of the service the Doctor shook hands
with the majority of the congregation
who wished him every success in his
tour.

A tremendous heat wave has been
passing over Montreal during this
last week. The average temperature
is 90 to 97 1/2 in the shade, which would
give about 102 in the open. Many
deaths have occurred due to the
great heat. Not for thirty-five years
as such has been known, and it is
to be hoped that it will not be met
with for the same time to come. If
it continues much longer its results
are likely to be even more serious as
it is possible that the water may be
affected.

McGill University has again been
the recipient of another handsome
gift from one of its friends. This
time it comes from Sir Wm. MacDon-
ald, who has formerly given largely
to that University. McGill now pos-
sesses the Molson-Law estate and this
extends her grounds from Sher-
brooke Street to the Mountain. This
is one of the best University proprie-
ties on this side of the world. Sir
William MacDonald's former gifts
amounted to \$2,600,000, and this last
is valued at \$1,200,000.

The event which was the recep-
tion accorded Sir Wilfrid Laurier on
his return from the Coronation. He
arrived in this city on Tuesday night
in the Government yacht. Thousands
awaited him at the wharf but there
were many more at the Camp Des
Mars where he was escorted and
where he addressed the people. Dem-
onstration after demonstration
was given him. The route from the
wharf to the Camp Des Mars was de-
corated with banners bearing: "Wel-
come to Laurier," "Honour our Cana-
dian" and such inscriptions. One of
the prettiest sights imaginable was
the arch of maple leaves and electric
lights leading to the wharf. The fire-
works were splendid. Sir Wilfrid
said that he was glad to get back to
Canada, and it is certain that the
people are glad to have him back.
Perhaps he was never more popular
than he is at this time.

back was a lean year, cold, and with
a lack of sunshine, for in that year
the growth was but two-thirds of the
average."

The trunk is, in fact, a calendar of
a kind.
The most extraordinary natural
calendar in existence is to be seen
in the British Isles. It consists of
a large stone, known as the "Sunday
Stone," and was removed from a
drain in an English coal-mine.
When the mine was working, the
coal-dust coloured water left a black
deposit, but at night, as well as on
Sundays and holidays, the water,
running clear, left a white deposit.

A Place of Honour.

These deposits, in course of time,
built up the stone. Its section
shows a black streak for each day
of work, a white one for night, and
wider white streaks for Sundays and
holidays.

Nature provides us with other cal-
endars of an interesting description.
Every glacier, for instance, is, in a
way, a calendar. The ice shows lay-
ers rather resembling the rings in a
tree trunk. Each layer represents a
winter's snowfall, and by their vary-
ing thickness the severity of past
winters can be roughly calculated.

The most wonderful calendar in the
world is the stone known to archaeolo-
gists as the Aztec Calendar. It is,
properly speaking, a zodiac carved out
of solid rock, and is no less than
eleven feet eight inches in diameter.
It weighs twenty-five tons.

At the time that Columbus discov-
ered America it had been in position
for thirteen years. After the Con-
quest the fanatical Spanish priests
pulled it down, and flung it into a
marsh.
Thirty years later it came to the
surface, but they buried it again, and
there it lay for two and a half cen-
turies. It was President Diaz who
recovered it, and it now occupies a
place in the Mexican National Mu-
seum.

2291 Years Old.

The most ancient and interesting of
British calendar stones is the so-
called Prioress's Heel, at Stonehenge.
Stonehenge was obviously built to
face the rising sun at the midsum-
mer solstice. Its axis is a line drawn
through the centre of the altar stone
of the slaughter stone and of the
outer stone, the Prioress's Heel, and
it is reasonable to suppose that this
line pointed exactly to sunrise when
the temple was built. Now the place
of sunrise changes slightly from year
to year, owing to the changes of the
earth's course round the sun.
Sir Norman Lockyer has made a
calculation of the year when the
axis line of Stonehenge would point
precisely to the sunrise. This was
in the year 1650 B. C., and
we have, therefore, reasonable
grounds for saying that this mar-
vellous old monument is at present 3-
291 years old—Answers.

A Request to
Headquarters.

A stationmaster at a country sta-
tion, when making the usual monthly
requisition for stores, amongst other
things applied for a new sweeping
brush.

has taken effect."

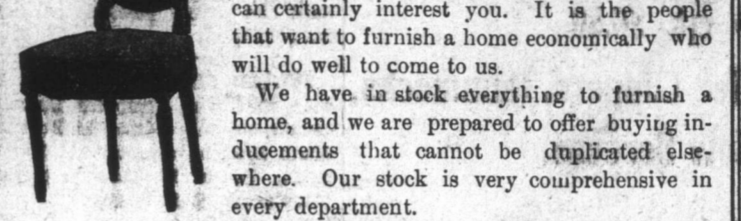

Special Evening Telegram.
HONG KONG, July 21.
The strikers to-day held up wagons
belonging to a Chinese steamship
crew, and after overpowering the
police guard, they burned and looted
them. Men and women carried off
valuable booty in the shape of furs
and wig-bags, and what remained
they made a bonfire of. There are
6,000 life men and dockers in Can-
ton, and 156 ships are now detained
in the harbor. Five hundred of the
Lancashire tailors have arrived
here and occupied buildings in the
Dock district, which is strewn with
wreckage due to the rioting by the
strikers. The hospitals are filled with
victims of the violence of the mob.

Special Evening Telegram.

PORT AU PRINCE, July 21.
The Government has proclaimed a
blockade of the ports of St. Marc,
Gonaives and Port Lierre. Having
only one warship at its disposal, an
effective blockade is impossible; and
the order for the bombardment of St.
Marc and Gonaives has not been
carried out. The cruiser Antoine Simon
is now anchored before Archaise
port, eighteen miles northwest of the
capital. General Marais, the Minis-
ter of War, who failed to disembark
on his arrival here with President
Simon, has been dismissed from office.
Word reaches here that pillaging at
Cape Haytien has been stopped by
messages taken by the revolutionary
committee. The American, German
and Italian Governments have made
requests for the despatch of warships
to Hayti for the protection of their
respective interests.

Special Evening Telegram.

TEHERAN, July 21.
News that the ex-Shah, Mohammed
Ali Mirza, is hurrying to the capital,
has caused great consternation. The
Government has declared martial law,
and the Bakhtiari chiefs have offered
5,000 men to defend Teheran, but they
cannot arrive in time. Sepahar, the
new Premier and leader of the Nation-
alists has received a telegram from
the ex-Shah, ordering him to main-
tain order until he arrives in Teheran.
The Premier replied that Persia obeyed
the constitutional monarch, and
would never tolerate pretenders.

BIRMINGHAM, July 21.
Private Garrod of the Oxford Uni-
versity Corps, won the silver medal

A Grave Situation.

Is Lloyd George to be numbered among the jingoes? We do not think so, although the report of his speech at the Bankers' banquet last night savours somewhat of "We don't want to fight, but, by jingo, if we do, we've," etc. Lloyd George's past and his associates exclude the surmise, and point to the gravity of a situation when the most peace-loving man in the Cabinet is reported to state that Britain will not sacrifice her honour or her trade for the sake of peace. The odium Lloyd George incurred by his outspoken hostility to the Boer War; his close association with the "cocca" press and the Quakers who control it, are conclusive evidence that Lloyd George would be the last person to make such a declaration wantonly, hastily, or if overwhelming necessity did not dictate it.

British honour is at stake if she does not live up to the Anglo-French entente, and Germany's action is an invasion of the French sphere of influence in Morocco, and her later actions indicate that she is inclined to take France by the throat and force territory from her. British trade is menaced because the seizure of Agadir in South Morocco is the taking of a base by which Germany can cut the British trade routes to South America, and South Africa, Australia and New Zealand.

A Cadet Hurt.

After the Demonstration last night, Private Barney Hart of the C.C.C. was entering one of the rooms of the Armoury when he picked up a rifle and playfully presenting it at Private Jno. Dunphy, pulled the trigger. The gun which was loaded, fortunately, with blank cartridge, seriously hurt Dunphy about the face, the powder also burning the flesh and injuring his eyes from which he could not see for a long while. Hart had not the slightest idea that the gun was loaded. It was left there carelessly after the boys returned from the trip yesterday morning.

The Amethyst Ashore.

To-day the Customs Department were advised by wire that the s.s. Amethyst had gone ashore in a dense fog at Cape Mutton, at the entrance to Trepassay Bay. A message was received from Inspector O'Reilly saying: "Steamer Amethyst ashore at Cape Mutton; leaving at once for scene of wreck with Wreck Commissioner Murphy." Mr. Murphy also wired that the ship was ashore at the mouth of the Bay at the back side, and the impression is that the ship will likely be a total wreck. It is likely the Fogota will go to the scene and that the Portia will also render assistance on her way up the coast. Two weeks ago we referred to the fact that there were three fog alarms in Trepassay Bay, one of which, that on Cape Fretia, was practically unknown to mariners, not being advertised, and therefore was mystifying to them. It is not unlikely that this is the cause of the accident to the Amethyst, and if it is, the blame must rest with the present Government and will be a monument to their supineness and stupidity. The wonder is that certain passenger boats which made in here in the fog were not lost will all on board.

The demonstration last night in honor of His Excellency the Papal Delegate eclipsed any event of the kind ever witnessed in the city. Monsignor Riordan, Monsignor Stanzani, about 30 priests, the Sisters of the Convents at Cathedral Square, Mr. Justice Emerson, Chairman of the Citizens' Committee, Mayor Ellis, F. J. Morris and Mr. Power, father of the Bishop-elect. As the carriages passed through the ranks the occupants were cheered again and again. The Cadets presented arms and the band played stirring airs. After the party passed through the ranks were joined and the procession continued its way down town to the Cathedral by way of New Gower Street, Duckworth Street and Cochrane Street. The whole route was lined with spectators on each side of the street. Fireworks were set off at the arches and from the roofs of several private houses. Meanwhile the prelates and clergy had driven back to the Cathedral grounds where thousands of people began to assemble. The procession reached the front of the church at 9.30. The Papal Delegate, Archbishop Howley and the clergymen took their station on the steps of the Cathedral. By the time all the societies had reached the plaza a mass of humanity, probably 15,000 people, blocked the whole square from Garrison Hill to the Mercy Convent. In-

cluding the area near St. Patrick's Hall. A display of fireworks followed that eclipsed all the other pyrotechnical displays. Rockets of the most artistic and expensive design were shot up into the walkin for an hour. The arch of St. John the Baptist in front of the Cathedral was a veritable blaze of glory with red, white and blue electric lights. After the numbers had departed and passed in front of the Apostolic Delegate, he addressed a few words to the universe gathering, and said:

"My Dear People—I am extremely grateful for the royal reception you have given me. I am overjoyed at the wholesome manner in which I have been received, and take pleasure in your own joy. Your demonstration is not for me, but for the Holy Pontiff, whom I represent. I am edified over the orderly manner in which the reception has been conducted, and the manifestations of concord, harmony and good feeling existing between all citizens. I shall never forget the reception given me to-night, and on behalf of the Supreme Pontiff I thank you heartily—the citizens who arranged matters, the authorities of our city, and the people of Newfoundland."

Cherubs were then given for the Pope, for Monsignor Stanzani, His Grace the Archbishop, Bishop-elect Power, Monsignor Sinnott, Bishop March, the visiting clergy, Cathedral clergy, and finally three cheers and a "tiger for King George. The bands then played a selection of Irish airs, "God Save Ireland" and "Let Erin remember the days of old." Finally the C. L. B. band struck up the National Anthem and brought the programme to an end. The Delegate and clergy retired into the Cathedral and in a few minutes the sacred edifice was filled with people. At the request of the Archbishop, the Papal Delegate ascended the altar steps and imparted the Papal Blessing to the kneeling thousands, a fitting finale to the day's celebration. The successful carrying out of the programme yesterday is due in a large measure to the officers of the societies, including Mr. E. M. Jackson, Mayor Ellis, Mr. J. L. Slattery, Hon. D. J. Greene and Major Donnelly, of the Cadets; Mr. J. Scott, President of the Mechanics Society; Mr. John Barron, head of the Knights of Columbus, said to be the finest looking body of men in the parade. Congratulations are also due to the special aides-de-camp appointed from the Cadets, viz. Mr. V. P. Burke and Mr. J. Summers, who are attached to His Excellency's staff while in the city.

Imparts the Papal Benediction.

Yesterday afternoon a large number of people visited the B. C. Cathedral and received the Papal Blessing from His Excellency Monsignor Stanzani. He celebrated Mass after his arrival yesterday in the Presentation Convent, and in the afternoon drove to Mount Cashel Orphanage, accompanied by His Grace Archbishop Howley. The prelates were received by Rev. Bro. Ennis, who showed the Delegate through the building. He was delighted with what he saw.

Entertained C. L. B. Band

When the B. L. S. returned to St. Patrick's Hall last night after taking part in the demonstration in honour of the Papal Delegate, the C. L. B. members who headed the Society in the march were entertained by the body. Vice-President J. L. Slattery in a brief speech congratulated the band on their turn out, and spoke in a very appreciative strain of the music rendered by them. He also referred to the co-operation of people who though not co-religionists of the members of the Society yet helped in a great measure to make the demonstration in honour of the Delegate such a splendid success. The officers of the Society then brought the members of the band to the music room where refreshments were served—and an impromptu concert was given and a most pleasant time was enjoyed. J. L. Slattery, T. H. O'Neill and several of the members of the band contributed selections.

Accident Last Night.

While Mrs. Thomas Croke, of Wood Street, was in the grounds of the B. Cathedral last night viewing the fireworks and illuminations a cane from a skyrocket hit her in the head and hurt her severely but not dangerously. She hid profusely, and men near took her to the Central Fire Station where she was attended by Rev. Fr. Sheehan and Dr. Stafford, the latter doing the necessary for the wounds received. Mrs. Croke was later taken to the Hospital in the ambulance.

Constitutional Revolution.

LONDON, To-day.
The constitutional revolutions appear to be an accomplished fact. Britain in future will be governed practically by the House of Commons with its hereditary upper house, possessing only a veto with a time limit of two years. The peers find their one gleam of hope in the prediction that the next Conservative Government will overturn Asquith's revolution, and restore the old condition, but the radicals are confident that in such matters the hands of the clock never turn back. Yesterday the future career of the bill was apparent to all politicians, and its eventual acceptance by the lords not doubted. Mr. Asquith dispelled all clouds by communicating informally to Mr. Balfour the substance of the announcement he will make on Monday, in the House of Commons. The Prime Minister stated that the King had agreed to such measures as were necessary to secure the passage of the bill.

A Hot Spell.

LONDON, To-day.
London is sweeter with the hottest weather for five years, the temperature reaching 88 in the shade. Mr. Justice Williams' presiding over the Appeal Court made an almost unprecedented sacrifice of judicial dignity to comfort by doffing his wig and permitting baristers to follow suit. The hot spell has now been unbroken for two weeks. London is threatened with an ice famine and thousands of people are flocking to the seaside. There have been no rainfalls in the greater part of the country districts for three weeks and farmers are complaining of ruined crops.

Church Discusses Suicide Burial.

London, July 17.—The question of the burial of suicides, with or without the full rites of the Church of England, has been occupying the attention of the Upper House of Convocation of Canterbury, the reason being that it had been represented to it from many quarters that the cause for the alarming increase of suicides in recent years was due to a widespread belief that burial with full rites of the Church was not likely to be withheld in any case in which the verdict of *felix-ae* was not given.

It is not the case that the bodies of suicides have hitherto been taken into the Church on all occasions, it being left very much to the discretion of the officiating clergymen to act as they thought fit; but the Bishops have now declared that it is desirable to permit the bodies of suicides to have the burial service read over them in church before being committed to the grave, with certain deletions from the service, except "in any case in which a clergyman may be compelled to believe that serious harm will result in the parish," in which case "he shall bring the matter before the Bishop of the diocese, and be guided by his judgment."

Moroccan Situation.

Grave Speech by Lloyd George
Special to Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-day.
Addressing a banquet of benefactors in London, Mr. Lloyd George, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, referred to Britain's continually growing prosperity, which could be arrested only by a disturbance of the world's peace. He was ready to make great sacrifices to preserve peace, and he would rejoice at the success of the arbitration negotiations with the States, but it was essential that Britain at all hazards should maintain her prestige among the great Powers. If a situation were forced upon Britain where peace could only be preserved by a humiliating surrender of the position she had won by centuries of heroism and achievement by allowing herself to be treated where vital interests were concerned as though she were of no account in the cabinet of the nation, peace at that price would be a humiliation intolerable to any great country like England to endure. National honour, said Mr. Lloyd George, and security of industrial trade are not party questions. The Peace of the World is more likely to be secured if all the nations of the world realize fairly what the conditions of peace must be. This speech made a deep impression as Mr. Lloyd George seldom makes incursions into the domain of foreign politics. The audience interpreted the speech to mean that the Moroccan situation was serious enough to have caused the Cabinet to debate the question of the Exchequer to take the opportunity the banquet afforded of affirming the standpoint of the Government.

The operation which is said to have been the first of its kind, consisted of cutting a small tumor from the spinal cord and an osseous growth from the spine itself. 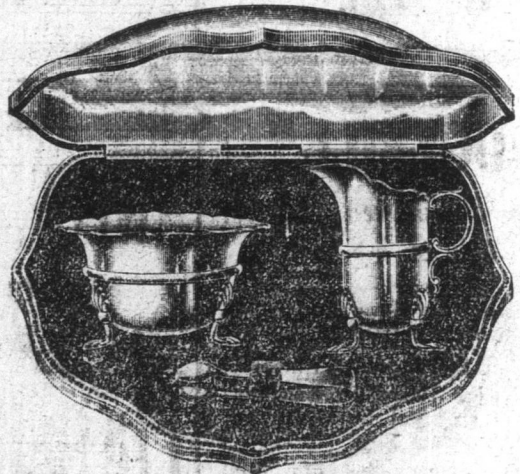

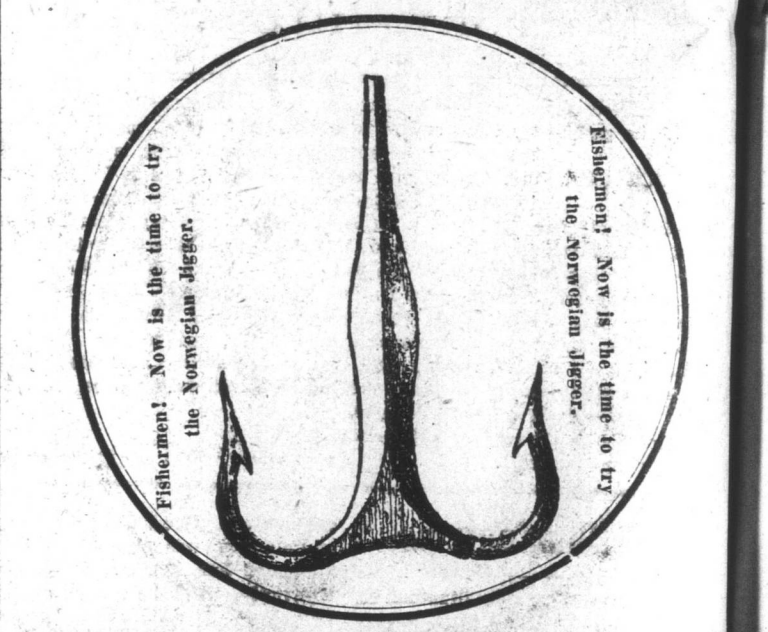

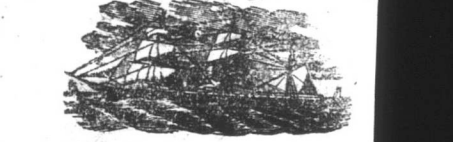
