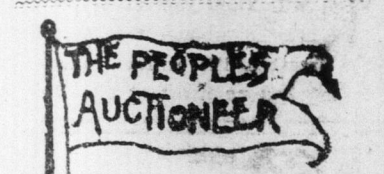

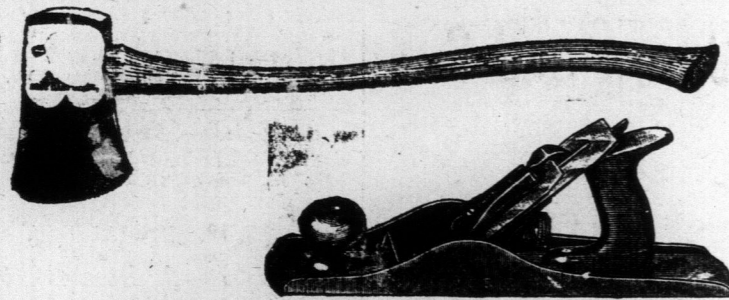

A Warning.

In the past, we have passed by many defamatory attacks made by the Hon. P. T. McGrath on our private character and professional standing. We have preferred so far to treat them with contempt. Yesterday the latest of these appeared in the Chronicle. By hint, suggestion and innuendo the public are advised that we are incapable of earning our living and on our way to the Poor House as an imbecile. The University title we worked for and won is degraded by italicizing and collating it with the nickname of "Dr." Neal, who is said to be in the Poor Asylum. The public are told we are "full to the bung" when we write our articles, and generally the suggestion is conveyed to the public that we are a chronic drunk, who should be in the Penitentiary or Lunatic Asylum, and is incapable of conducting a newspaper or law work, or doing any work to earn a living, and who is bound to finish his career in the Poor Asylum. All these statements, suggestions, hints and innuendoes are false and defamatory. For nearly nine years we have edited the Evening Telegram, which has continued to grow in size, circulation and importance by leaps and bounds during that period. For ten years we were Vice-Principal of Bishop Feild College, and during the interval served an apprenticeship as law student with Sir William Whiteway and Sir Wm. Horwood. During our residence lived respectably and earned our living, and during that time have never been absent from work one hour.

from alcoholic indulgence or other misconduct. As to the statement that we were "full to the bung" when we wrote the article which appeared in the Evening Telegram on Thursday, it is an absolute and unqualified falsehood. We are not teetotal. But for four weeks preceding that time we had drunk only two glasses of spirits. During 36 hours before that time we had drunk only one glass of a beverage made of light beer and lemonade, and that was some twenty hours before the period of writing. We admit we have given Mr. McGrath some immunity in the past by passing by such attacks. We therefore right here give him fair warning as to the future. We shall not pass by any express statement, hint, suggestion or innuendo that we are a chronic drunk, "full to the bung," when we write, or any statement calculated to injure us in our occupation or profession, either as a journalist or lawyer. Whether we elect to devote our energy to journalism or law, or in what proportion to either, is none of Mr. McGrath's business. It is purely a private matter. We have worked for and obtained certain titles in law from universities and the N.S. Law Society. What we elect to do with them is our business and not his. We do not propose to permit in future without challenging them in the law courts any such statements as "We are sorry we cannot nominate him (previously referred to as 'Dr.' Lloyd) for the Poor House." "Dr. Neal is there already." If we have been careless of such defamation in the past, we propose to be more careful in the future; and we warn Mr. McGrath that any attacks capable of creating the impression that we are a "drunk," incapable as an editor, or a lawyer, incapable from lack of knowledge or misconduct or mental imbecility of doing legal work will be followed by the institution of legal proceedings.

Saved Boy's Life.

At 9.30 this morning X. Finney of the West End saved the life of a boy named Snelgrove who was in the water between J. J. Mullaly & Co's. and Angel's wharves. The man had just come out of the shed when he noticed the boy's head just above water. He had gone down repeatedly and no one but Finney saw him at the time. Being a strong swimmer the man jumped overboard and grasping the lad swam with him in the water to shore. When he first reached the lad he clung to his rescuer's arms so tenaciously that the man had to hit him between the eyes to make him release his grasp. The boy was much exhausted and both were chilled from their immersion.

Schrs. Collide.

The schr. Messenger, Capt. Legrow, left here laden with provisions, etc., Thursday night for Broad Cove, T. B. in company with schooner owned by a man named Belmont. Both ran under easy canvas when it began to get stormy and Belmont decided to run back to port, when the other vessel which was bound to Scilly Cove shot across her there was a heavy crash as the schooners came together and the Messenger was split in twain forward and water poured into the hull. The accident occurred off Quidi Vidi and the men on board the damaged schooner worked before pumps with such energy that they got her safely back to port and she was hauled at Pitts' wharf. All the freight has been taken out of her and is being transferred to the schr. "Passover" to be taken to Broad Cove. But for the fact that her cargo was mostly owned by poor people who had no insurance on the goods the crew would have abandoned the vessel.

Bonaventure in Port

FROM FRUIT TRADE. The S. S. Bonaventure, Capt. Cross, arrived in port at 12.30 to-day from Sydney with a load of coal for A. Harvey & Co. The Bonaventure was engaged for four months in southern waters running between Boston, West Indies and South American ports and brought over a dozen cargoes of fruit, giving every satisfaction to the people who chartered her. She left Boston on Saturday last for Sydney and left the latter port four hours ahead of her consort, the "Bonaventure." All the crew of the "Bon" are well and to-day were examined by Dr. Campbell and given a clean bill of health.

Schooner Dorothy Lost.

CREW ARRIVES. By the s.s. Prospero, which arrived from the northward to-day, there came a shipwrecked crew. They told a Telegram reporter that they belonged to the schr. Dorothy, which went ashore at Cape Fogo Thursday afternoon during a thick fog. The Dorothy was bound from Twillingate to Fogo to load fish. At the time the vessel struck the shore there was a heavy sea running and soon she was almost dashed to pieces on the rocks. The crew barely escaped in boats and had a difficult time getting ashore. They went to Fogo, where they joined the Prospero, which steamer was coming south. The Dorothy was a staunch English new vessel and was owned by Mr. W. O. Morris, of Port Maddock, England. This vessel was an ideal fish carrier, and lessens the number of our foreign sailing fleet, which is fast dwindling away.

Unconscious Again.

We learn with regret to-day that Miss Lizzie Martin, daughter of Mr. Arthur Martin, of the G. P. O., is again dangerously ill. Miss Martin was for days insensible as the result of a fall over the stairway of her brother-in-law's residence at Bell Island, but revived and was thought to be making good progress towards recovery. Yesterday she again became unconscious, and was in the father left for the island last evening.

Prospero Back.

The S. S. Prospero, Capt. A. Keau, arrived back from northern ports this forenoon, bringing a full freight and the following passengers: Messrs. J. L. 

Why Who's Who.

It is a great handicap in the race of life to be born without a nickname or a name which can be nicked by vox populi. Some names are nicked more than others, as for example our Theodore, who is called everything from Rosenfelt to the czar of Russia. President Taft never had a nick-name that got him anything, and it is one of Albert B. Beveridge's life that he can't be nicknamed without calling him "Bertie."

Worse off than any of these, however, is Governor Woodrow Wilson, whose parents were serious people and did not propose to have his front name juggled with by posterity.
