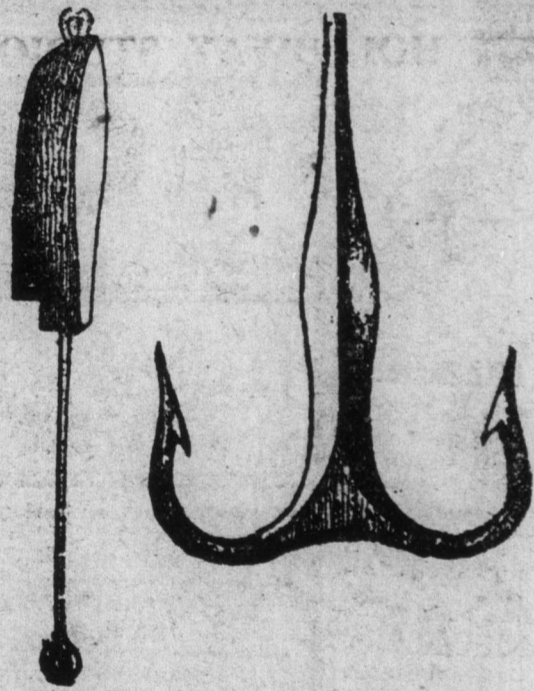

## Household Notes.

To destroy red ants, gresse tin plates with lard and put them on the floor, with a few sticks for the ants to climb up. Soon the plates will be covered with ants, which prefer lard even to sugar. Turn the plates upside down on a hot fire.

Never sit on the edge of a sick person's bed, and never place your chair so that he must strain his eyes or turn his head to see you. Get directly in range of his vision, so that he may see you comfortably. Never whisper in a sickroom.

Lamb's liver, which is very delicate, and not so much used as it deserves to be, is delicious minced and served on toast. It is also excellent, cooked two or three minutes in a tablespoonful of butter, and folded in an omelet, with peppers and a minced onion or two.

A sweet biscuit may be made with ordinary biscuit dough, with the addition of chopped dates. Roll the dough quite thin, spread with plenty of soft butter, and then put on a thick layer of dough, and cut out with a small cutter. Bake in a hot oven.

A delicious dessert is made of French chestnuts that have been peeled, boiled tender and mashed until they are smooth, and then seasoned with a little vanilla or other extract and sugar, heaped around the sides of a glass dish and filled in the center with whipped cream. The cream may be dotted with jelly.

The latest way of serving oyster or clam cocktails is to use a new double glass, quite similar to the glass used for grapefruit. The outer receptacle is filled with finely shaved ice. The oysters are placed directly on the ice, while the dressing is put in the glass. Each oyster, as it is picked up, is dipped in the sauce.

To make whole wheat bread, take four cups of whole wheat flour, two of white flour, half a cupful of sugar, one teaspoonful of salt, one yeast cake, dissolved in enough warm water to make a stiff batter. Let rise until light, mold in two loaves, let rise again and bake in a moderate oven. A teaspoonful of shortening adds to the richness.

Left-over cereal may be used in either of two ways. Mixed with some chopped meat, seasoned well, it is al-

Freshly Nellie returned to the class-room, her face wreathed in smiles, and presented the mistress not only with a large bag of plums, but also with the coppers.


For some time she could do nothing but burble incoherently. Then, more or less recovering her composure:

## The Boston Opera Co.

Edwin Bower Hesser, director of the tours of the Boston Opera Company, arrived on the Florizel last Thursday, and is staying at Waterford Hall. After talking with gentlemen of the city Mr. Hesser decided to arrange the first grand opera season in the history of Newfoundland, for about three days, early in September at the Casino. He plans to bring a company of noted stars, and make the visit in connection with the tour of the Maritime Provinces, Halifax, St. John's, New Brunswick, and other cities were visited this year and with such great success that it was determined to make the tour an annual one and hence, if local support is adequate, we shall each year have a short season of grand opera in St. John's, which is certainly better than none at all.

Mr. Hesser made the following statement:—

"The Maritime Province tour proved a very great success this year, and so we have arranged to visit Halifax, St. John, N.B., Sydney and several other towns each preceding the opening of the regular seasons at the Boston Opera House and the Metropolitan Opera House in New York. The tours, which we instituted two years ago are mainly educational in character; that is, they are undertaken to spread widely the gospel of grand opera. We feel that the greater the interest in opera created in outlying districts, the greater will be the interest manifested in visitors from these districts when they visit Boston or New York, in hearing the operas at the home opera houses. So the great opera companies have found that while the actual tours are always a financial loss when considered separately, that they later reap benefit from the widespread advertising which they receive from them.

"Further," said Mr. Hesser, "we feel it a duty to enable the greatest possible number of people to enjoy opera. As everyone knows, the great opera organizations in the United States are almost public institutions—they are certainly supported by the people through their generous annual contributions. And the largest donors, who certainly represent the majority, have expressed themselves as willing that their money may be spent to widely spread things operatic, for the greatest good of the greatest number. The tours have always proved a huge success artistically, as a visit here certainly would, but the time we should lose in coming here would be so great that I must be sure of great local interest before completing plans.

"By cable I have arranged to shift other dates so it will be possible for us to give three opera performances here—on September 8th, 9th and 10th. We should play Sydney on the 5th, and then come here by rail. Mr. J. P. Kely, who suggested the trip after hearing enthusiastic comments from traveling men who had heard our operas in the Provinces, suggested that the plan be put before the public, and that an opportunity to subscribe for seats be given them. Arrangements of this nature are now being completed, and if the subscription proves adequate, I shall certainly send the company here.

"As a beginning of an annual season here, I think the singing of the operas 'I Pagliacci', 'Cavalleria Rusticana' and 'Rigoletto' would be about the best. The plan in the Provinces this season included the singing of condensed versions of 'Faust', and of 'Martha', preceded by one or two excerpts from other operas—such as a scene from 'Madame Butterfly', or 'La Tosca'. This plan can be carried out in relation to the short operas 'I Pagliacci' and 'Cavalleria Rusticana'."

Mr. Hesser also said that the company would consist entirely of stars, including such well known names as Mesdames Maria de Gabbi and Gertrude Hutchinson, prima donna soprano; Mme. Brestina Cautious and Etienne de Courcy, prima donna contraltos; M.M. Umberto Sacchetti and Giovanni Catti, tenors; M. Pietro Vittono and Frederick Hudd, baritone; and M. Heathcote Gregory, of the Metropolitan Opera, as primo basso.

### The Downfall of Morris Party.

Although the distribution of the votes at the election of 1909 gave the Morris Government a substantial majority of members in the House of Assembly, it requires but a small overturn of ballots in a number of the Districts which elected Morris candidates at that election, to give a substantial majority to Sir Robert Bond. A small per cent change in the aggregate of the crosses marked in 1909 would leave Sir Edward Morris in a minority of 12. In other words a change of a few crosses in every hundred, marked for Bond instead of Morris, in certain districts which elected Government men would give Sir Robert Bond a majority of twelve men in the House of Assembly. As an illustration we may take the Port de Grave District. Thirteen crosses taken from the Morris candidate's name in Port de Grave and given to the Bond man would have put in the Liberal. A comparative small change in Bay de Verde, Carbonear, Harbor Grace, Harbor Main, and Fortune Bay will turn out the Government and put them on the Opposition side of the House. The change of sentiment of less than five hundred voters will give the Liberal Party a strong party in the House of Assembly. It will be idle for anyone who is cognisant of the unpopularity of the Government party in St. John's and in every district north of St. John's and on the West Coast to-day, that the change of sentiment is overwhelmingly greater than any mere overturning of the votes of 500 electors. The chances of the Liberal Party securing a sweeping victory this fall was never greater, not even in 1900 and 1904. Well may the Government men shake in their shoes at the fate which awaits them next fall.

### A Pleasant Dance.

The C. C. C. Band of Harbor Grace held a very pleasant dance in the British Hall (this city) last night. Upwards of two hundred persons patronized our friends from over the Bay, and a most enjoyable time spent by all. The visiting band supplied the music, and the affair terminated at an early hour this morning.

### Cable News.

**LONDON, To-day.**  
 The correspondent of the Telegraph, who arrived at Nigritia on Saturday morning, describes the town as a reeking heap of smoldering ruins, and confirms the report of wholesale murders being committed by Bulgarians, in all villages around as well as in Nigritia. He estimates that sixteen hundred persons have been killed in this manner. The correspondent declares that these atrocities have imbued Greek soldiers with a frenzied rage and a desire to be revenged on the Bulgarians which carries them to victories against any odds.

### Special to Evening Telegram.

**LONDON, To-day.**  
 It has been decided to ask the King and Queen to open the Parliament in Dublin. The Home Rule Bill which passed the third reading in the Commons on Monday, is now something like its final form. In the forecast of procedure as regards the institution of Home Rule, the Daily News says on the act becoming operative, it is understood the King will be advised to send for John Redmond who will be asked to form a Government. On the final passage of the Bill the Irish Privy Councilors will be conferred on Redmond and Dillon, and three of his leading colleagues. In due course Redmond will retire from the active leadership in the Nationalists in the Commons and will doubtless be succeeded by T. P. O'Connor. Redmond's retention of office will depend upon the result of the first Irish election. It is hoped in Nationalist circles that arrangements may be made with the Bank of Ireland whereby the old Parliament House on College Green may be restored to its constitutional function. The Chamber of Lords still remains much as it was, and if it were devoted to the Irish Senate it would be here that the opening ceremony would naturally be enacted and the King's speech read. It is the present hope that under Home Rule, the Duke of Connaught may be Lord Lieutenant of Ireland. The character of the Redmond policy will be what in this country would be called Conservative. It may be taken as certain that the main desire of responsible persons will be to respect and pay due honor to the high character of Prodigal of Ireland. Even in the event of an Irish election taking place in Ulster, according to present intentions, Nationalists will be counselled not to vote. Drilling is undoubtedly proceeding in four counties, but it must be clearly understood there will be no shooting down of these levies unless it is absolutely necessary to protect the lives and property of the Catholic minority. It is anticipated that the Royal Assent to the Home Rule Bill will be signified about the month of June next year. The act comes into operation on the first Tuesday, eight months after this month, which would be the first Tuesday in February, 1915, but by an Order in Council, the Imperial Government can antedate the operation by seven months or post-date it seven months. It may be assumed the operation of the act will not take effect until after a general election in 1915 in the United Kingdom.

Bowring, who represents Newfoundland in the Royal Commission on the Natural Resources, Trade and Legislation of certain portions of the Dominion of His Majesty the King, arrived to-day on the Red Cross Liner Stephano, accompanied by Mr. W. Greene, his private secretary. Mr. Bowring has been absent from the Colony six months. During that period he journeyed not less than fifty thousand miles. In an interview our Commissioner said that the Conferences were held in various parts of Australia and New Zealand. In each State of the Commonwealth, mines, irrigation areas, large farms, etc., were visited. Those who attended were representatives from Great Britain—Sir Edgar Vincent, Chairman, Sir H. Rider Haggard, Sir Alfred Bateman, Mr. Wm. Lorimer, Mr. Tom Garnett and Mr. Tattio; Canada:—Hon. George E. Foster, L.L.D.; Australia:—Donald Campbell, Esq., L.L.B.; Hon. John Robert Sinclair; Newfoundland:—Hon. Edgar Bowring. Owing to illness the representative of South Africa could not be present. The Colonial representatives visited all the important towns in Australia and New Zealand and took evidence as they went along. The work embraced enquiries into all matters appertaining to Trade in its various branches and considerable attention was given to the important question of migration. The Commissioners left London on January 17th last and proceeded to Toulon, France, where they joined the Orient Liner Trans and proceeded to Port Said near the Suez Canal, thence to Australia. Fremantle, Adelaide, Melbourne and various other places were visited and the taking of evidence occupied two months. On February 28th the Commissioners embarked for New Zealand. Here the principal cities were visited, including Dunedin and Christ Church in the South Islands and Wellington and Auckland in the North Islands. Auckland was left on March 24th and a journey was made to Sydney, New South Wales, where the party took evidence and proceeded to Brisbane, the capital of Queensland, doing the same work there. Then a passage of a thousand miles in Tropical Australia was made, afterwards returning to Brisbane, Sydney and Melbourne, respectively. At the latter place a week was spent. The next place visited was Tasmania and then the two chief towns of that Island, Hobart and Lancelton, thence to Tasmania where the Commission, which occupied three months, dispersed. Most of the party returned to England by way of the Suez Canal, whilst Hon. E. R. Bowring, accompanied by Sir Edgar Vincent, the Chairman of the Commission, and their two secretaries took passage on the liner Ven Bore for San Francisco, calling on the way at Samoa Islands and Honolulu in the Hawaii Islands. From San Francisco Sir Edgar Vincent returned to England and the Newfoundland representative journeyed to New York and joined the Stephano for this port.

### Just Go Out And Murder.

"Eskimos never wash themselves," says a missionary stationed at a tiny settlement on Great Whale River in the far north. "I have often seen an Eskimo woman washing her young children like a cat does a kitten—by licking them all over. Their only means of livelihood lies in catching seals. They are always on the look-out for seal holes in the ice. They eat the blubber—that is, the fat of the seal—and clothe themselves or at any rate make their trousers out of sealskin. It is very cold—45 degrees below zero as a rule—and we Europeans have to keep roaring fires going in every room of our houses. "The people don't live in villages, but separately in families, so as to have a wide a field for hunting as possible. They are a revengeful people. A short while ago an Eskimo was out hunting and saw a black dot in the distance on the ice. On approaching he was certain that it was a seal just protruding from a seal hole. He fired and hit it, but when he got up to it he found that he shot a man. He called on the widow, said how sorry he was, promised to help the woman and asked for her forgiveness. The son of the dead man entered, and when he heard rushed off and killed all the unfortunate hunter's family in revenge. In retaliation the hunter killed all the dead man's family, and so the feud began. When we were informed of this and came to investigate we found that there was only one man surviving out of two families and about 17 persons. We could do nothing but lecture the survivor.

Chief Engineer David Howe, of the s.s. Bruce, and a native of Scotland, died in a tragic manner as the steamer was entering Sydney Harbor at 6 a.m. yesterday. Mr. Howe, who has been several years in the employ of the Reid Nid. Co., and just as he came on deck dropped dead of heart failure. Mr. Howe has a wife and children at Port aux Basques, and his remains came along by the Bruce today. They will be interred at Lewisporte where his wife belongs.

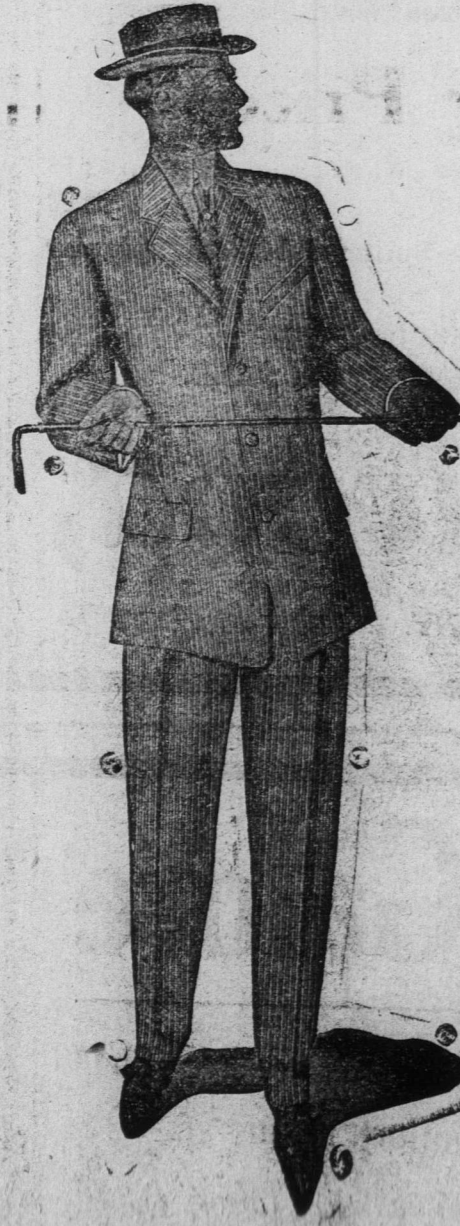

**To-Day's News.**

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, To-day.  
Out of the conflicting stories from the Balkans it is almost impossible to sift the truth. This was markedly illustrated in last night's despatch from the Telegraph's correspondent at Uskup, dated Tuesday, reporting there had been hardly any fighting the last few days; while the Belgrade dispatches reported further Servian victories. Later advices from the Serbian capital asserting that all Bulgarians who had invaded Serbia had been driven back across the frontier. There seems to be little doubt that General Ivanoff's army is steadily retiring before the victorious Greeks. It is reported that the Bulgarians have evacuated Kavala where the Greek fleet is operating.

ATHENS, To-day.  
An official bulletin issued last night says the Greeks on Tuesday attacked an mountain passes toward Strumitza. The Bulgarians reinforced, perhaps from Istip, offered a vigorous resistance. The fighting was stopped by darkness, with the expectation it would be resumed on Wednesday. Later bulletins declare the Bulgarians are in headlong flight through the defiles, the Greeks having made a night frontal attack on Strumitza, forcing the Bulgarians to abandon the positions with heavy losses, including five guns and other war material.

CONSTANTINOPLE, To-day.  
The reply of Bulgaria to the request of the Sublime Porte, agreeing to evacuate the Marmora coast, intimates the Bulgarian delegates M. Natchovitch, ex-Foreign Minister, who arrived at Tchatalja, is empowered to negotiate a settlement. The Turks will proceed with the military occupation of all the territory up to Enos and Midia in accordance with the peace protocol signed in London. The bustle of military preparations forcibly reminds one of the state affairs last autumn.

CHARLOTTETOWN, To-day.  
The steamer Caracina, of the Black Diamond Line, and the schooner Sarah A. Townsend met in a collision yesterday morning off Cape Tormentine. The schooner struck the steamer amidship, coming bow on, drove a hole six feet square through the steamer's side above the waterline. The Townsend was badly broken up forward, and was, later on, beached. The crews of both vessels were uninjured.

HALIFAX, To-day.  
General Sir Ian Hamilton is here inspecting troops. He leaves for England on the 24th, and will then go to New Zealand on an inspection tour.

**Died Suddenly.**

NORTH SYDNEY, To-day.  
David Howe, Chief Engineer of the steamer Bruce, died suddenly yesterday, while the ship was on her way from Port aux Basques to North Sydney. Howe was an Englishman but lived many years at Port aux Basques.

**A Heroic Policeman.**

Saves Heat Victim Who Had Tumbled into the Water.  
New York, July 2.—New York and environs awoke exhausted to-day after a night of sultry oppressiveness. The mercury stood at 81 at midnight, a drop of 9 degrees from yesterday's maximum, but began to mount again shortly after sunrise.  
Unable to sleep on account of the heat, William Huntoon, middle-aged, left his bed in an East Side hotel during the night and sought comfort on the river front, where he toppled off into the mouth of one of the huge sewers which empty into the East River. Policeman Wm. J. Cowden found him struggling in the muck against being drawn into the sewer by the intake with the tide. The officer plunged in and both men were in danger, when a second officer threw them a rope.

**From Village To City.**

Amazing America is always giving us something extraordinary to talk about. Its latest product in this line is the city of North Battleford, Saskatchewan.  
We in this country think that such places as Middleborough have sprouted remarkably quickly. Compared to the mushroom growths of America, however, Middleborough is a veritable laggard. Only eight years ago, in 1905, North Battleford was a village. In 1910 it attained the dignity of a town, and now legislation has been passed creating her a fully-fledged city.  
Railways and grain are the good ships that have carried to North Battleford her prosperity. Sixteen million bushels of grain were grown last year, showing an increase of 60 per cent. on the year before, and the local farmers are still far from being satisfied.  
Arrangements are at present being made by Commissioner Neill for the changing of the new city's name, and it is anticipated that the campaign in connection with the fresh title will include the offering of prizes totaling \$5,000.

**A Nice Bloody Fight in Spain.**

"Attention.—The attention of tourists and lovers of sport is called to the bull fight to be given in Santander, on the Bay of Biscay, Northern Spain, on the twenty-first day of June. This will be the greatest bull fight in history, and it is probable that there will never be another on so grand a scale. Instead of the usual six bulls, the customary number, no less than eighteen bulls will be killed. Six bull-fighters, all numbered among the most famous in Spain, with their suites, have been engaged, and it will be an all-star gathering from beginning to end. The bull fight will occupy the entire day commencing early in the morning and ending only at sundown, with an intermission of two hours for luncheon. The prospects are of the brightest for the full success of this great undertaking, and Spaniards and visitors to this country will see a festival such as has never before been presented, and scarcely will be repeated."  
The small bills supply additional details regarding this great sporting event. It is predicted that no less than fifty, and probably as many as a hundred horses will be killed before the day's festivities are over. As the six matadors are the nimblest and most expert in Spain, it is hardly to be hoped that any of them will be slain, although that is, of course, quite possible. Among their host of picadors and assistants, however, it is almost certain that some will fall before the vengeance of the bulls. Even an ordinary bull fight is not quite complete without the death or wounding of a picador, and this "greatest bull fight in history" should, to be a "full success," be marked by several human sacrifices.
