PRIZE. WASHINGTON, To-day. Count Von Bernstroff, German Am

bassador, to-day formally notified Sec-retary of State Lansing that the Appam was brought into Hampton Roads as a prize under the terms of the Prussian-American Treaty, which guarantees her to the captors, and thus officially served notice that Germany contends for the possession of the ship.






