

True Generosity.

The announcement of the generosity of Mr. George W. B. Ayre, in handing over the British Hall, recently purchased by him, to the Directing Board of the Church of England Colleges in this city, at a nominal rental of one silver dollar per year, is one which will come as a pleasant and joyful surprise to every member of the Anglican Communion in Newfoundland, and to those particularly in the outports who send their children to the Capital for the purpose of receiving a final education. For a long time it has been a fact that there is insufficient accommodation in the city colleges of the Church of England for the number, (ever growing) of pupils who desired to attend at one or the other of these institutions. Chieffy no was this the case with Bishop Spencer College for girls. Of late plans have been made to erect a series of buildings, in some central locality, which would be specially built to house the maximum number of scholars seeking tuition, both city and outport. The construction of such buildings could not possibly be completed at an early date, and a number of years would have to elapse ere the project materalised. It is well known that the Directors were not at all satisfied with the present accommodation afforded by Bishop Spencer College, and wave desirous of making some other arrangement whereby better provision ould be made to carry on and increase he work done by this institution. Mr. Ayre being thoroughly cognizant of this, as well as of the proposal to put up new collegiate halls, and likewise knowing the many difficulties in the way of the Directors, shows himself as a true educationalist and makes an offer hitherto unprecedented in our school annals. He practically gives gratis the whole of the commodious and spacious British Hall to the use of the staff and pupils of Bishop Spencer College, thereby lifting a heavy load from the Directorate, and carrying his generosity still further, undertakes 'he cost of making any alterations that

The work of the Community Nurses in St. John's has grown apace. Miss Rogers and Miss Kendall are having a great many more calls for assistance in the transmitter of the control of the street of the transmitter of the transmitter of the transmitter of the monther as to its care. Next they visit all sick children when a maked by the doctor or parents to do so, and between the hours of four and five each day they are at the office to receive visits from parents asking their help.

The work has caught on splendidly and I believe that it is the most beneficial social service work that has been undertaken here in a generation.

The reports which Miss Rogers has submitted to me from time to time are sad reading. Our people little know under what unhappy conditions so many of our poorer classes are living. Upon the mothers and children the burden falls heavily. Beyond an occasional visit from a doctor, they have no one to help or advise them, consequently the feeding and general tratment of the children have been found by the nurses with slight defect and legs. All of them could be helped and many cured if there were a children's hospital here where they could be treated. The waste of life and the loss of efficiency in those who survive is a much heavier tax upon the community than would be the cost of the remedy.



Electric Lighting For Outports!

For a number of years there has been a growing demand for a satisfactory electric lighting system for use in the outport There are dozens of so-called "farm lighting systems" on the market. Almost without exception they are unable to produce a steady flickerless current, without first charging storage batteries and then taking the lighting current from the batteries. In using this system they are up against many difficulties: In using this system they are up against many difficulties: batteries of fair capacity are expensive; they require constant attention.
