





> The traders of the Hudson Bay Company, whose forts pushed deep into the primeval forests, fought many wars with the Indians and French, but contrived withal to maintain a rich import trade in furs, the essential business of the company. Another century of commercial warfare followed the peace with France in decided the Indian and French war. The advance of the political hopes of Canada caused them in 1869 to surrender "all rights of Government auyears. The company did retain the right to not more than one-twentieth of the so-called fertile area in the farming regions of the Dominion.



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
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
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
