WILIAM WILBERFORCE.

REV. W. M. PUNSHON'S LECTURE IN THE WESLEYAN CHURCH.

THE WHELAN TRIAL.

TUESDAY'S PROCEEDINGS. OTTAWA, Sept. 8th.

The Court opened this morning at the usual hour. An immense crowd of people was present and hundreds were unable to gain admission.

The evidence on Whelan's case so far is considered highly unfavorable to the prisoner. The counsel for defence are less sanguine, and Whelan has lost the defiant air he assumed on the first day, and appeared anxious and depressed.

Called to Account.

The Attorney-General of Nova Scotia, Mr. Martin J. Wilkins, the other evening delivered a very violent and which was considered a sedition speech for which Lieut.-Governor-General Doyle, doubtless acting on instructions called on him to say whether the disloyal sentiments attributed to him by unofficial reports in the Halifax papers, were really uttered by him as alleged or not. The correspondence which passed between these gentlemen has been published. Mr. Wilkins replies that he is incapable of entertaining or uttering disloyal sentiments; that his reasons for opposing confederation is a conviction that it will lead to annexation to the United States. And he promises that the official report when it appears will be evidence of his loyalty. Perhaps it will; for the Attorney-General has influence enough with a reporter paid by the Government to get the sting taken out of the official report of his speech. But this would not prove that he did not utter the words attributed to him in the non-official reports of the Legislative debates. As a sign of repentance or a confession of folly, the disclaimer is well enough; but that is about all he is entitled to pass for. We do not judge Mr. Wilkins harshly. He must have seen the reports in question the day they were issued; and if they were false, he should at once have caused them to be contradicted, and their fabricators called to account. But he did nothing of the kind.

General Doyle acted with promptitude. His letter of inquiry is dated the 4th inst., and it was answered next day by the Attorney-General. This rebuke should prove a warning to Mr. Wilkins not to allow himself to be betrayed into like policy in future.

The Week's Work in Normanby.

The Hamilton Spectator thus sums up the week's work of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway delegates in Normanby:—Looking back at the week's work, nothing can be more gratifying to the friends of the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway, than the magnificent triumph which the goodness of their case, and the sound sense of the people of the Township has given them. On Monday they found their opponents boastful and defiant. The Reeve and Deputy Reeve who act with them, would not think of the withdrawal of the By-Law. Although a petition signed by 436 of the ratepayers of the Township asked for such a withdrawal, and although three of the Councillors favored the granting the prayer of the petition, the Reeve backed by the Deputy, refused to put the resolution, on the ground that the Council had no legal authority to withdraw a By-Law after its submission. They adjourned the Council meeting from Giles, where they were meeting, to Enniskillen, there to meet at six and finally decide. The Reeve and one of the Councillors meanwhile went to Durham to consult Lawyer McDonnell, so that the Council might have the benefit of his opinion in coming to a conclusion. When they met, the Reeve submitted the following opinion which he had obtained:—

"DURHAM, 31st August, 1868.

"GENTLEMEN,—My opinion is against withdrawing the By-Law at present advertised. Signed, "D. McDONNELL. Messrs. Robertson and McCalmont." On that opinion it was agreed that the voting should go on, and the announcement was made accordingly. Then came the defeat of the narrow-gauger's at Dugan's, the splendid meeting for the broad at Aytton, Ball's, and the defeat of the narrow-gauger's at their own meeting at Dickson's and with that came the conviction that the people of Normanby had souls above the narrow gauge. And then on Thursday, the same Reeve would not even put a resolution in favor of withdrawal on Monday, who got a legal opinion for which the Township will have to pay, to sustain him in that refusal, discovered that withdrawal was not only quite legal, but highly proper. He did, on Thursday, at the instance of a few interlopers from Toronto, in spite of a legal opinion which he had obtained, what on Monday he had refused to do on the requisition of 436 of the ratepayers of the Township whom he is supposed to represent!

The Council of Normanby after the withdrawal of the by-law, adjourned until Friday next then to meet at Aytton, the understanding being that a by-law granting a bonus of \$50,000 to the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway will be introduced on that day, to be voted upon in all probability on the 7th of Oct. The by-law will contain the usual conditions, binding the company to enter the township either from Harrison or Mount Forest, and to place stations at Aytton and Neustadt. Of its passage there is no doubt. The adoption of the Hamilton by-law by so overwhelming a majority, has imposed confidence in the scheme, and the certainty of its going on; and that confidence established, the people are really a unit in favor of the broad gauge and of connection with the railway system of the county at Guelph. The 'Sabastopol' of this railway controversy has been gallantly stormed by the Wellington, Grey and Bruce Railway Company, and as gallantly taken and occupied.

THAYER & NOYES' GREAT CIRCUS.—We would call attention to the advertisement of Thayer & Noyes' great Circus and Menagerie, which will exhibit here on Tuesday first. FROM OTTAWA.

It is thought that Whelan's trial will not be finished till Friday night. The cross-examination of nearly every witness so far is lengthy and searching. One reason for this is no doubt that the principal witnesses are being placed before the Court first. The evidence of Starr; a messenger of the House, was a very telling one for the prosecution, and produced considerable effect. Starr's memorandum shows that he had noted Whelan's appearance in the gallery before he knew of the murder. Buckley's evidence in some respects was contradictory of what he gave at the inquest. The points of difference seemed so marked that Counsel questioned him again and again on them, but he adhered to the version he started with, that he had only seen Whelan some three or four times before the murder—that he had no suspicion of him as intending to be, or as being the murderer—and even went so far as to say that slight as his knowledge of Whelan had been, he would be the last man to suspect of such an atrocity.

It is stated that Mr Sandford Fleming is to be made Chief Engineer of the Intercolonial Railroad, and Mr. A. Light, Assistant Engineer. Mr Brydges has had an interview with members of the Government on the subject of the cattle disease, and the prohibiting order in Council. It appears the Great Western and Grand Trunk are losing about \$10,000, from decrease in freight, in consequence of the order. It is said the railway people think that if the Government made a close inspection of cattle when entering the country at Windsor and Seattle, any difficulty or danger would be avoided, and there is no contact on the cars with cattle in Canada to communicate the disease.—It is expected the original Order in Council will be relaxed, if not repealed.

TO CORRESPONDENTS.—We have received a letter from "Vigil" in regard to the Nassagaweya post office, but on account of the length of the Whelan trial and other matter it is crowded out this week. PACIFIC RAILROAD.—Alluding to the progress of the Pacific Railroad, the New York Tribune states that two or three great companies are engaged under the patronage and control of the Government in opening communication by railroad across the country from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Probably not less than one hundred thousand men are employed and paid by these companies to cut timber, dig ore and coal, make iron and roll it into rails, &c., grade track, build bridges, lay track, &c. The Government backs this enterprise, to a limited extent, with its credit, besides giving the corporations certain lands along their respective tracks. Every cent of the cost of these railroads is to be paid by the companies which will own their respective roads; but the Government lends them its bonds to a prescribed amount per mile to facilitate the work. The Companies undertake to pay, and thus far have paid the interest on these bonds as they accrue, and they further agree to pay the principal of the bonds as they fall due. The total amount of these bonds issued to them up to the 1st ult. was \$32,210,000.

ANOTHER ATLANTIC TELEGRAPH. The French Government has conceded to Messrs. d'Erlanger and Benton the right to lay a submarine cable to connect France with the United States, and bound itself not to grant such right to any others for twenty years from the first of September, 1869. An Anglo-French Company has been formed for the purpose of constructing and working this cable, which will be manufactured in England and laid by Englishmen. The new cable will be laid from Brest to the French island of St. Pierre, off Newfoundland, and thence either to New York or to some place between Boston and New York, whence the line could be continued to the latter city. The line will consist of two cables, the first section, from Brest to St. Pierre, being two thousand three hundred and twenty-five, and the second section, that from St. Pierre to the United States, being seven hundred and twenty-two miles. Allowing the necessary 20 to 23 per cent for "slack," the cable will be 3,500 miles. It will be shipped in June next, and the line is expected to be opened for business in the course of next year. The tariff will be lower than that of the English cable. Among the parties interested are M. Drouin de l'Huys and Robert Lowe.

The preparations by the militia authorities for a Fenian raid are very complete. Such an event is considered not improbable even yet.

It is reported in Ottawa that Lord Monck is going to leave for England in October. If the Imperial Cabinet have not by that time selected his successor, Sir Charles Wyndham, commander of the forces in Canada, will, we understand, be appointed administrator of the Government of the Dominion until Lord Monck's successor is named.

The New York Albion says that it has learned, on inquiry, that there is "not a word of truth" in the current reports of a new Reciprocity Treaty at Washington.

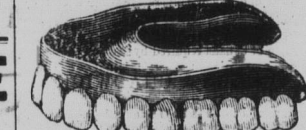
