The Trouble Between Britain and Russia.

The press despatches from London have lately given us some information respecting a diplomatic passage at arms which has taken place between Great Britain and Russia, on the old question of the latter's encroachments in Central Asia. The facts as gathered from these despatches are, that ever since the triumph of Russia in the Black Sea business, and since Britain allowed her to slip out of the obligations of the Treaty of Paris, the Czar and his Government have been gradually but steadily making inroads in Central Asia. The progress of the Muscovite armies was supposed to fill British statesmen with extreme apprehension, and the Russians imagined they had only to threaten Afghanistan in order to compel them to acquiesce in any further encroachments they may meditate against Turkey. Lord Loftus, the British Minister at St. Petersburg, addressed very strong representations to his Government, urging them to take some steps which might convince Russia it was not safe to presume upon their neutrality. Lord Granville, who always deprecated the policy pursued during the embargo concerning the Treaty of Paris, in 1870, took alarm, and addressed a very decided note to the Russian Government. What that note contained we can only guess. Our impression is that it contained a distinct intimation that any interference on the part of Russia with the internal affairs of the states adjacent to the north-western portion of the Indian empire would be considered an act of hostility.

This note created some alarm in the minds of the Russian statesmen, and a special envoy was at once despatched from that Government, with instructions to assure the British Government that the feeling of Russia was one of friendship and good will, that no aggressive measures were contemplated, and that under no circumstances would Russia provoke a quarrel with Britain. So the matter stands at present. We are glad to find that Britain has taken such a firm stand. A great part of British strength in India depends on prestige. England not only must not give way there before Russia or any other Power, she must not seem to give way. She is not to rely nonchalantly on her naval power; she is an Empire, stretching over a great part of the globe, and her Imperial power rests on India in this sense, that if she cannot keep India, she cannot keep anything. Her power here we have no need to surrender, India, or to recede from the Imperial position India gives them. They will fight Russia, if need be, in Asia. They would greatly prefer not to fight, but show them that Russia is menacing India, and that the moment is coming when I see advance threatens English supremacy in India, and they will start an army for Afghanistan and in fleet to Kronstadt, and set half the world in a blaze sooner than yield an inch on the banks of the Oxus.

Great Fire at Washington.

Washington, Jan. 23.—The National Theatre has been entirely destroyed with all its fittings, etc., also the Billiard Room, and Mr. Uler & Jones' sample room on the first floor. Fortunately when the lower part of the Theatre was burned the entire roof fell in, checking the fire there by and adding to the security of the surrounding buildings. The Imperial Hotel was at the time on fire, and the guests commenced to vacate the premises, but just as the roof of the Theatre fell in, it is now thought that all danger to other buildings is passed. It is impossible at this time to estimate the total loss. The Theatre was a wooden building and generally considered as unsafe. During the height of the excitement, when the Theatre was in full blaze, the flames rolling up in great volumes, and above the surrounding buildings, an impression seemed prevalent that the fire would reach Washington, and in a short time an immense crowd of men, women, and children had gathered from all parts of the city. The employees of the Treasury, War, Navy, Post Office, and Interior departments rushed out, thinking that the city was in danger. Loss \$100,000. The loss on the Imperial Hotel, adjoining the theatre, is \$50,000.

Ontario Legislature.

January 28. Hon. Mr. Pardee presented and returned copies of all correspondence between the Government and the Municipalities indebted to the Municipal Loan Fund. Hon. Mr. Crooks moved to be third reading of the Toronto University Bill, which after some discussion was carried. On motion of Hon. Mr. Crooks the House went into Committee on Supply. Mr. Hodgins in the chair—and adopted the resolution granting preliminary supply of \$73,000. The report of the Committee was then concurred in.

London.

On motion of the Hon. Mr. McKellar the House went into Committee on Resolutions respecting monies to be expended in drainage works. Attorney-General Mowat announced the approval of His Excellency to the grant of a sum not exceeding \$200,000 for this purpose. The Committee agreed to the resolution, and the Report of the Committee was concurred in. Hon. Mr. McKellar then moved that the House go into Committee on a Resolution authorizing the investment of not more than \$200,000 at any time in the purchase of Debentures issued under Municipal Acts. He had two Bills before the House on the subject—one providing that municipalities might do the work, borrowing the money from the Government, and the other providing that the Government may do the work if the municipalities desired it, the municipalities paying for it. The Committee rose and reported and the report was adopted. On motion of Hon. Mr. McKellar the Bill to authorize the investment of certain monies in debentures to be issued for the construction of drainage works by municipalities was read a second time. Hon. Mr. Crooks moved the second reading of the bill to establish a lien in favor of mechanics and others. He explained the bill under the title of the bill. When the bill was read a second time of

taken in the county court of the county in which the land is situated for the sale of the estate and interest therein affected by said lien; and the judge of the said court may proceed in a summary manner by summons and order, and may take accounts and make requisite enquiries, and in default of payment may direct the sale of the estate and the interest charged; and such further proceedings may be taken for the purpose aforesaid as the said judge may think proper in his discretion; and the fees and costs in all proceedings taken, shall be such as are payable in respect of the like or similar matters, according to the ordinary procedure of the county court. In other cases the lien may be realized in the Court of Chancery, according to the ordinary procedure of that court. Hon. Mr. Crooks moved the second reading of a Bill to facilitate the adjustment of disputes between Masters and Workmen. He observed that this was merely a transcript of an Imperial Act passed in 1857, except that a clause was added of consulting the board of arbitration was proposed. A number of other bills were advanced a stage, when the House adjourned.

From OTTAWA.—At a meeting of the Privy Council, held on Monday afternoon, it was decided to call Parliament together for the first Thursday in March. Hon. Mr. Chaplin has retired from the Government. This is the first card played after the shuffle, which has already taken place in the Ministry, but which in all its details, has not yet been made public. The Adjutant-General has received a letter, dated 9th January, from Sir George E. Cartier, announcing his steady progress towards recovery. The names of the Pacific Railway Directors will not be officially announced until next Thursday.

A bill has been introduced into the Legislature to make betting on elections illegal, and *ipso facto* disqualifying from voting any persons who shall make a bet or wager on the result of any election, and also imposing a fine for the offence. Such an Act is greatly needed, for betting leads to bribery, and to the exercise of other undue and improper influences at the elections. We have no doubt this bill will pass and become the law of the land.

Senior Girls School.—We understand that the Chairman of the Board of School Trustees has received a telegram from Miss Mary Walker, stating that she will be in Guelph on the 10th of February, to commence her duties as Teacher in the Senior Girls School.

School Teacher Election.—The election of a school trustee for the East Ward, in room of Mr. Jones, resigned, will be held in the Town Hall, on Wednesday, 5th February.
