The Reciprocity Negotiations.
The prospect of a favourable termination of the negotiations now going on for a new Reciprocity Treaty between the United States and Canada is naturally engaging a large share of public attention. As the question is one of great importance to all classes of the community in Canada, any information which can be given regarding it will be of in-terest. We find in the New York terest. We find in the New York.—The Belleville Intelligencer, owned by Mr. Enwes of Wednesday a long despatch from its Washington correspondent, giving in substance the despatch on the subject which we published on Wednesday, with copious comments on the old Treaty, and the probable basis of the one now in contemplation. The correspondent states that our Canadian' representative at country will receive an announce. Washington puts a very high value on our fisheries, and has collected statistics to show how valuable they have been to the United States; that in 1862 the Americans had 600 small vessels fishing for mackerel in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, employing 28,000 seamen, and that the value of the fish caught amounted to close on live million dollars. The profit from this large fishing interest depends in a great measure on the American fishermen having access to our shore fishermen hav ig access to our shore fisheries. 
