

Voting Machines To Be Used

Ratepayers to Make a Test of Them on Library Site By-Law.

Council Reached Decision to Limit Choice of Lots to Two.

Voting machines are to be used for the first time in the history of the city of Victoria on April's next, when the ratepayers will be called upon to decide upon a site for the Carnegie library.

LOCAL STRIKE SITUATION

Remains Practically Unchanged - Tees Will Sail Tonight For West Coast.

Yesterday saw little change in the strike situation. The deck hands, firemen and others, the members of the B. C. S. S. and the N. R. strikers, are being held in the wharves where the C. P. N. steamers were lying.

The Carnegie Library Site Bylaw was next taken up and four new possible sites were proposed. Ald. Yates desired to have included in the list a lot on the James Bay and the latter was not included.

The council decided not to include any of the sites above mentioned in the list to be voted on. Ald. Yates desired that the ratepayers be allowed to exceed in price the sum of \$4,500.

Ald. Stewart opposed this. The resolution was carried and the council met with the matter any longer.
