LONDON WOMAN'S RIDING MASTER

She Hlustrates Her Teachings by Her Own Fine Performance.

London has a woman riding master, a Mrs. Hayes, who insists, notwithstanding the traditional supremacy of the English woman's horsemanship, that you rarely see an English woman sitting gracefully and firmly in her saddle, and the French women are really the more graceful equestivenes. Mrs. Hayes teaches in a modest boyish costume without a skirt, and takes a five-foot gate on her lively charger without holding her reins at all. Her theory is that a riding master cannot teach a woman to sit well on a side saddle because he doesn't know how himself except theoretically. She is taught to rely first and foremost on her reins, when it is not her reins at all that save her when her horse shies or falls. They are True.
Sir Richard Owen, says a correspondent The Daily News, had two remarkables of The Daily News, had two remarkable ghost stories which it was a high privilege to hear him relate. The one about to be recorded here was perhaps the better of the two, but its quality can scarcely be judged of when detached from the peculiarly expressive style the old professor had, which added charm to his telling of the story. In his early days, when he held the post of surgeon to the prison at Lancaster, a negro died in the jail and a post-mortem as well as an inquest were necessary. After the inquest the young surgeon saw the body put in the coffin and the lid acrewed down to be ready for the funeral next day. Owen had at the time been already attracted to the study of comparative anatomy, and negroes' heads were not plentiful; so he made up his mind that this one should not be lost to the cause of science. In the evening he returned to the prison with a black bag containing a brick—from his official position he had no difficulty in getting admittance to the mortuary, where the coffin lid was unscrewed and screwed down again. During this process the brick and the negro's head changed places. The ground outside the principal entrance to the jail has a considerable descent, and the time being winter with snew and frost, Owen had scarcedly passed out when he slipped and fell all his length, the bag went from his hand, and the head tumbled out and rolled down the paved way. He jumped up, caught the bag, and following the head clutched it just his length, the bag went from his hand, and the head tumbled out and rolled down the paved way. He jumped up, caught the bag, and following the head clutched it just as it finished its career in a small shop where tobacco was sold. Pushing it into the bag again, he vanished out of the shop with all the speed he was [capable of. Next morning, when Owen was going to his usual duties at the prison, he was called in by the woman of the shop where the accident had occurred on the previous evening. He had had, she said, a fright the night before that caused him to look wild and dazed-like. The man, it turned out, was a retired sea captain, who had been in many adventures among the West India Islands, where many deeds were done that did not at that time require to be accounted for. Among these had been the killing of a negro, in which he hada hand, and the transaction had left a touch of trouble on his conscience. After giving these details, the old captain told of the horrible event that took place the night before. He was sitting in his shop, all was quiet, and it so chanced that he had been thinking of the negro, when suddenly he saw his very head roll into the shop in front of the counter, and it was followed by the Devil, all in black, with a black bag in his hand. The Devil snatched up the head, and both disappeared through the earth like a flash of lightning. The description was perhaps not quite complimentary to the young anatomist, but it was satisfactory so far that it showed that his ideutity had not been fecognized.

Burman has earned a little money he immediately proceeds to spend it all, for the Burmese have no ambition to be rich and never hoard. Consequently, there are no large land-owners, and there being

no aristocracy the people are as near being on an equality as possible. Poor people are quite as rare as rich people, and the only beggars to be met with are the lepers who sit on the steps of the pagodas. Should a Burman find himself in possession of a large sum of money he builds a pagoda, and possibly a zayat or rest-house. If any money still remains he gives a theatrical performance.

There is no Burmese theatre, but when a Burman wishes to entertain his friends he engages a troupe of actors and actresses to give a performance in a space which he curtains off outside his house. Scenic effect is entirely dispensed with, the stage being simply a platform decorated with flags. When the actors and actresses have said their parts they step down from the platform to sit among the audience and smoke their cheroets until it is time for them to go on again. No dressing rooms are provided for them, and they are, therefore, compelled to make up before the admiring gaze of the audience. The play is, as a rule, far too realistic to please respectable Europeans, but the Burmese follow the fortunes of the Prince and Princess—the chief characters are almost invariably royal personages—with the greatest interest. The performance generally commences at 9 o'clock at night, and frequently the doings of the hero and the greatest interest. The performance generally commences at 9 o'clock at night, and frequently the doings of the hero and heroine are strung out to such an enormous length that daybreak finds the actors still forming and the audience as interested ever. Sometimes the play is so long that it takes three nights to get through i


