

England Anxious for Silver Repeal.


The silver proceedings at Washington are, you may be sure, closely followed and the now confident hope of repeal is not here or anywhere in Europe an entirely selfish hope. Few are the competent judges of finance who doubt that the prosperity of the United States depends largely on repeal, or that prosperity there and here are closely connected. Seldom do foreign affairs, if merely political, long monopolize English attention, or do they commonly think of American affairs as foreign.

The Matabele Campaign.

The so-called Parliament is a defence union, composed of 600 delegates from 170, 900 Ulster loyalists. 
