The minister is determined that the officers shall set an example to the men and while the officers can keep liquor in their tents it will not be allowed in public.

The minister understands that an agitation is on foot to have canteens again in the camps, and those favoring it are stating that liquor can be got near by to camps. Colonel Hughes will see that his regulations are rigidly kept and spare no one who disobeys them.


