Lee, of Rice, Lewis \& Son (Limited), Toronto, has buen elected a director to fill the vacant sent. An agency of the bank has been opened at Chesley: in the county of Bruce, under the charge of Mr. J. H. Stuart.

Haman \& Co, hardware, Bracebridge, Ont, have not been sinccessfull in their business and have assigned. 'I he business was commenced last spring under the style of Simmons \& Hillman, but the former retired shortly after and the present firm is composed liillman and a Mrs. M. G. Maudsley. The capital was not more than $\$ 1,000$ and the firm were not known to be good pay.

At the recent meeting of the American Bankers' Association, a Mr. Van Allen, who has been writing on the subject to some of the newspapers for some time past, suggested that all the banks in America form a combination for mutual protection against defaulters and others who may have taken criminal liberties with their property, with the view of bringing them te condine punisbment.

By giving his full share of attention to the lumber business or to real estate or even to milling, Robert Bryaus of Lindsay, Ont., would in all probability bave continued to prove successful, but the responsibilities of all three seem to have weighed too heavily on his finances and he has assigned. His liabilities aro said to be heavy but it is expected the statement will make a pretty fair showing.

A gicantic sheme is mooted in Toronto to convert the marsh of the river Don into solid land, for commercial aud residential pupposes, and the polluted Ashbridge's bay into a mavigable body of water. The projectors ask for a lease of the new land, renowable at the end of 21 years, at.a rental to be determined by arbitration, or in case of the city's refusal to renew the lease, compensation for the work donc.

Among the recent applications for incorporation by letters patent is that of Chas Riordan, John G. Riordan and W. J. Douglas, all of Toronto; T. H. Taylor and J. A. Marquis, of St. Cathariner, as the Riordan laper mills, with headquarters at Herritton, and a capital
stock of $\$ 500,000$. It is proposed also to incorporate the Cobban Manufacturing Company, limited, Toronto, with a capital stock of $\$ 150,000$.

Receipts of the Grand Trunk Railway at Brantford, Ont., for the past year were $\$ 250,000$ - I'lhe Regina is Loug Lake Railway, in the North-West, has been graded for 132 miles, or within vine miles of Saskatoon, and operations have been suspended for the winter.-The Temiscouta Railway Company are beginuing to build their workshopa, station, buildings, etc., at Fraserville, Que., which is the torminus of the line.

David Campaell, the junior partner of Duncan Camploell \& Son wholesale dealers in tailors trimmings, this city, who left for unknown parts on Sept. 9th, after committing forgeries by which several banks were victimized, has been arrested in New York, and will be returned to this city. It will be remembered, Duncan Campbell \& Son assigned on September 17th, at the instance of Stewart \& McDounld, of Glasgow, with $\$ 45,280$ linbilities, as a result of their junior partner's recklessness.

Wa. M. Fullan, commibsion merchant, of this city, has assigned. His total fiabilities will not exceed $\$ 3,000$ and are divided into numerous small amounts, that of Mr. Geo. W. Stephens being the largest. Mr. Fuller has been in business for a number of yeare, and the trade are in sympathy with him in his present difficultios which seem to bave been brought about by his inability to attend to the dutails of his business owing to poor health

When it is recollected that the usual schooner or sloop cargo of whiskey is about 160 barrele, it is needless to say that the seizures beiow Quebec, referred to recently in the newspapers aro somewhat exaggerated. It would take quite a fleat to transport 150,000 gallons. Reports of seizures of small lots near Quebec, in cellars barns, wells and other hiding places, are to hand. The chief actors are suspected to be the brothers referred to some mouths ago as frequenting the islands of the lower St. Lawrence.

From New York it is stated that the coffee market will be particu－ larly affected by the overthrow in Brazil，as present supplies are only sufficient for the next two months The first news caused an advance of 15 to 40 points．The unusually high price of coffee during the past two years is having the natural effect of causing a decrease in its consumption throughout the Dominion，where its preference as a beverage over that of tea has not yet been shown．In many parts of the States a like distinction is being gradually noticed，since ted can now be retailed at a less price per pound than coffee，which at once com－ mends the use of tho former from an economic point of view．

A degrates from Ottawa announces that it is understood the subsidy for the stemmship service between Halifax and Jamaica via Bermudn has been awarded to Messrs Pickford \＆Black，of Halifax， and the subsidy for the service between St．John，N．B，and Demerara， calling at St．Kitta，Gaudaloupe，Martinique，San Lucia，Barbadoes and Trinidad，to a company promoted by Mr．Van Wart，of Frederic－ ton．These sorvices are to be performed by vessels of not less than a thousand tous burthen．Messrs Pickford \＆Black have already stamers plying to the West Indies，and they will at once put a provi－ sional steamer on the Jamaica route．

Tae old adage of＂the rolling stone＂would seem＿to have had no terrors for Moise Gnuvreau，shoe dealer，of this city，who mado his last finnncial move this week by assigning with liabilities of $\$ 4,500$ ． He was formerly at St．Johns，Que．，and came here about two years ago and has moved about considerable since，buying and selling stocks in different stores；his present location being cor．Notre Dame street and Dupre Lane．His business，like his shoes，seems to have become worn by too many moves．

Dedcoting the amounts secured to the great majority of creditors， there remain in the Reiplinger warehouse，this city，goods to the extent of $\$ 7,000$ to $\$ 8,000$ ，and fixtures valued at between $\$ 2,000$ and $\$ 3,000$ ．The insolvent must have committed some serious blunder when he finds himself obliged to borrow trifles from his larger credi－ tors to keep the wolf from the door．The remarks made by a New York dealer on a recent visit to this city were more forcible than

## THE POSITION OF IRON．

An absurd mistake in transcribing a market cable led to the publishing，in one of our morning contemporaries（three days later），of a statoment that Scotch pig iron warranis had fallon 13 s per ton，that Middlesboro iron had fallen 18s，and Hematite 14s．It is hardly necessary to say that these amounts should have been pence－not shillings－or that three hours later this drop（due to extra large realizations）had been more than re－ coverad．No serious drop in iron values is likely to obtain just now ；but undoubtedly an element of weakness is present in the fact that the steady and legitimate advance in values，which in－ augurated the upward movement，has been followed of late by a speculative advance，founded on the existence of $\mathfrak{a}$ short interest in Middlesboro iron，which has rushed values up to a point which a few months ago we should have deemed unattainable．

In order to understand the true position of iron，it is neces－ sary to go back some three years to the time when the Scotch makers agreed to reduce thoir output by twents－five per cent， Shortly after this wholesome reduction in manufacture，stocks of iron in Cleveland commenced to steadily decline；but in Glaggow the amount in yard was still over a million tons at the commencement of the current year，and the knowledge of these figures operated to check any tendency to rise for a while；since so long as there was no reduction in stocks in Glasgow，mer chants doubted whether the heavy reduction in Cleveland was not the result of a temporary demand．They argued that there was no great increase in the foreign demand for Britishiron and steel to account for it，and therefore they largely abstained from

buying, believing that prices would soon go beck to their former level. So soon though as it became apparent that stocks in Glaggow had began to diminish also, and that the demand was overtaking the supply every day, they began to purchase more freely; and when once it became known that nine-tenths of the iron in the yards was common hard irow, not available for shipping, the demand grew perceptibly more brisk and prices commeaced to move up rapidly. At this point the speculative element rushed in and began to anticipate the legitimate trade demand, in the hope of being able to resell at a profit later on. Under the influence of this specnlative demand, prices went up by the run, until, at time of writing, they had advanced to 63 s $2 d$ for Scotch warrants and 65 for Middlesboro.

It now remains to consider carefully the true points of the iron situation botb pro and con. There cau be no doubt that the advance is based primarily on theimprovement in England's domestic trade. Shipbuilding is once more active. Wear and tear and shipwrecks have caused an active demand for ships that has none of the speculative element about it that marked the last revival of this trade; and Government orders have recently given it a valuable stimulus. 'The railways'are again purchasing freely. During the late period of depression they reduced their expenditure for repairs and renewals to the lowest possible point. Now, that times are better, they are getting in supplies and making provision for the next period of depression. Jastly, most of the uew colonial louns that have been placed lately have been used largely in railway and other industrial expansion, and have thus stimulated the demand for irou and its products' Germany, too, has long since overtaken her domestic production, and is now inporting largely from both England and Belgium; and on this continent there is but little likelihood of any falling of in consumption.

So much for one side of the question. 'lurning to the other side we fave two grave elements of danger; firat, that the rush of speculation may force prices too high and thus check consumption, and, secoud, that high values may augment production and thus once more swamp the market with surplus stock. We must remember that the present improvement in the position of iron is due primarily to the restriction of the output to which the Scotch manufacturers agreed three years ago, and that, now that England has lost control of the world's market owing to the steady development of domestic resources in all the principal consuming countries, sle is no longer able to keep abreast of her full producing capacity, and therefore is compelled to limit her production. Of course, it is not desirable to curtail the ontput unduly, or else prices would reach such a point that foreign makers conld $u$ adersell the English in their own markets; but at the same time, if a sudden rush of production were to set in, it would very soon overtake even the present good demand.

We can see, then, that if the English makers confine themselves to a gradual and prodent increase in production, so as not to exceed the consumption, and thus admit of prices been mainLained at a reasonably proitable figure without being so high as Logive foreign makers a chance to undercut them, the prosperity of the trade is assured; but if, on the other band, they rush in to make as much iron as they can, and as quickly as possible, and force it on the market at once in order to take advantage of the existing high prices, we shall witness a "slump" in iron values that may carry prices back to the dark days of last year when Scotch warrants touched 37 s 1 d . It just depends upon the sagacity and colesion of the makers. The iron situation is in their hands, and upon the wisdom of their future course depends the outlook for the markel.


## THE ISSUES IN NEWYOUNDLAND.

The recent elections in Newfoundland possessed more than the usual interest, and the commotion caused by the sweeping defeat of the government has scarcely yet subsided. Twentyone seats have been captured by the opposition, the old government retaining about eight.

It is an old adage that "the amaller the pit the fiercer the rats will fight," and this has been especially true of Newfoundland politics in the past. No sectarian questions entered into the present conflict, but more than this the ballot system of voting was in use for the first time in the colony, and the advantage of the secret vote in preventing rioting and the display of physical force has again made itself apparent. No disturbance of any importance has been recorded in any part of the Island The great question before the people was the Bait $\Lambda$ ct, lout a most important factor in the late contest has been the new Manhood Suffrage Act. This added some 15,000 to the list of voters and naturally rendered neeless all calculations based on the old lines of warfare. Most public inen imagined the government would be sustained with a good working majority, or at most that the parties would be evenly balanced. The election was worked very quietly, the opposition having few candidates in the fleld unill a few weeks before nomination day, when a big fight was begun all alnag the line.

The leader of the victorions party, Sir William Whiteway, is a clever lawyer who has on former occasions played an important part in local politics and is commonly supposed to aspire to the Chief Justiceship. The new addition to the olectorate afforded a splendid opportunity to assail the "Merchant government," at the head of which was a prominent and succesaful merchant, Sir Robert Thorburn. As the briof despatches received, tell us, "it was masses against classes and the former won." The fisbermen and laborers were appealed to and called upon to "break their chains" and "crush their oppressors," etc, and in this way a popular wave of ferment was created. The expenditure on railways and other national works, causing an increase in the public debt, was also worked to the disadvantage of the government and the poor result of the season's fisheries made the mass of the people discontented and ready for a change. 'The Bait Act was not gone into on its merits and confederation with the Dominion was not an issue in the contest.

As to the Bait Act, the now defunct lhorburn government secured the Royal assent to this measure after a most sevore struggle. Montrealers engaged in the Newfoundland trade speak of it as the very life of the colony. When pressure was first put upon Downing street to have it sanctioned, the fear of irritating the Trench caused repented delays and refusals, but at last the British government sent a commissioner to investigate and if possible convert the colonists to a less exacting and easy moorl. The result of the visit was, that the commissioner was quite won over to the views of Newfoundland, and reported that strict, repressive measures, such as proposed, were essential to the well being and prosperity of tho country. As is well known, the legislature met early in the following year and passed the Act again, sending two commissioners, if we remember rightly, Sir Ambrose Shea and Sir William Whitoway, to England, to press for the Royal sanction which was then given. Figares prove that the Bait Act has operated in a satisfactory manner. It has greatly curtailed the French catch of codfish and has increeased the value of Newfoundland's catch in the past two years fully 20 per cent. The colony has been to some expense with cruisers to enforce the law, hut the beneficial results have greatly exceeded the outlay, and the aggressive operations of the

French fishermen have received a check, both speedy and effectual.

It is probable the new premier will do little in the way of amending the Bait Act; even if so inclined public opinion would soon be argainst it. Supporters of the Thorburn party point out that the French fishermen now have half the coast and changes are so sudden and violent in Newfoundland politics that any weak measures of concession mislitsoon bring the question of excluding tho Firench allogether into prominence. The policy of the old government was a stringent enforcement of the Act, as it was recognized that the enormous bounty of 11 francs per quintal allowed by the lirench government to its fishermen, gave them an undue advantage over the Newfoundland fishermen in the foreign markets. In his manifestoas to the electors the new premier announced he would modify this Act. His plan, it appars, is to allow the French to come into the poris and buy or take bait, and to exact light and tonnage dues. This is evidently pandering to the poorer class who formerly made a living by selling bait to the lirench, carrying it to them, for the most part, to St lierre.

It has been shown most conclusively that foreign fishermen are entirely dependant on Newfoundland for bait and the Bait Act was a most effective weapon with which to fight the competition of bounty fed tish. The policy of the new goveroment, if succesefully carricd out, will give the lirench and other foreigners, abundant supplies of bait, and with heavy bounties in their livor, their supremacy in the foreign markets will sjon be again established. We do not think such an absurd step will be carried ont, or it enforced, that it will be long toleratedFiah is the staple of the Island colony and the people of Newfoundand have long suffered from a bad treaty which gave undue privileges to foreigners. No one has a better right to catch and sell the fish which swarm on the coast than the Newfoundlanders themselves, and their best friends and best statesmen aro those who can look to the foture, and repel the encroachmonts of outsiders, The profit arising from the sale of bait is a petly alfarin comparison with the larger interests involved. In fact it might be grood policy to grant compensation to neody sellers of bail. Wise after-thought will, no doubt, cause the new rulers to consider carefully any retrograde steps which would impair the eflicacy of an Act which cost so much to obtain and put into oporation.

## 'THE POR'L OF NONTREAL

A review of the business done during the past season demonstrates that it has been one of the most prosperous years in the history of the port. The grain trade has not recovered its former position by any means, but other exports, as well as importe, have incrensed in volume.

A freight blockade of some magnitude, this fall, has again caused complaints to be heard about the limited accommodation of the harbor, but the fact soems to be there was a scarcity of shipa, fow earing to venture up the St. Lawrence so late in the soason. While improvements are certainly wanting, there are those who state that a few steamship companies are allowed to monopoliso the best positions and a lack of capable administration and econony of space is apparent. A great deal more business should be concentrated within a mile of the Custom House. The pet idea of certain adermen and politicians, who know nothing whatever about shipping, has been to atretch out a long lino of wharves in the east end, rasulting in greater charges on heavy goods for cartage than the ocean freight in some instances. We are not inclined to look with sympathy on the present mad rush to spend millions of dollars on the harbor, until it can be more clearly shown the present advantages are made the most of, and that the practical experience of shippers, forwarders, ship owners, steved res, railway oflicers and active business men shall rule and not the advice of contractors, politicians and scheming aldermen, who have been so instrumental in getting up the present agitation. A change in the plan of the harbor which would provide increased wharfage at the upper end by means of piers, etc., might meat the requirements for some yoars without involving the immense outlay contemplated. There is little hope, however, that reasonable suggestions will bo entertained. The construction of a dry-dock would be much more to the public interest than some of the schemes for spending money which have been contrived.

A sagacious expenditure to improve existing terminal facilities is without doubt required at the present time. Our policy is to draw larger traflic from the American North-west, from
territory which in reality is tributary to Montreal in a commercial sense, as offering the speediest and most direct route to and from Europe. Such thriving centres as St. Paul, Minneapolis and Duluth, are now connected with this port by the Sault line and energy and enterprise seem alone wanting to make business relations both close and profitable. Doubtless, with the giew of making our citizens better acquainted with western civilization, trade and progress, the Canadian Pacific has invited the members of the City Council, Harbor Board, Board of Trade and others, to visit the district tapped by the Sault line as guests of the company. This is a step which we hope will bear good fruit. 'I'he Council has already authorized an expenditure of one million dollars on the harbor, and the by-law seems likely ' to be ratified by the electors. A large outlay is a.so contemplated by the Harbor Board. The public service requires a wise and economical administration of these funds.

The efforts of the Canadian Pacific to divert western trade to Canadian ports is deserving of recognition. It is said to be the intention of the company to build six fine steamers to ply between Chicago, Milwaukee, Gladstone and Owen Sound. Ele. vators and terminal facilities are to be provided at the latter point. This will save the long rail haul via Sault Ste. Màrie around Georgian Bay. It is proposed to give a through lake and rail rato to Montreal, as low as that now peor zissed by Baltimore. With numerous advantages in our favor the trade of the port should yearly undergo a steady and substantial augmentation. The railway facilities have been so increased and improved in recent years that there is no longer much cause for complaint on this score. A judicious expenditure and the euforcement of laws without fear, or favor, compelling the prompt handling and despatch of freight from the wharves will do much to remove grievances at this point, and no exclusive privileges should be granted to any ships, or railway, steamship, or elevator company, whatever.

The extent of the business of the port for the past season will be best seen by a perusal of the following comparative statement of exports from January 1, to November 13, in the years named:-

The exports of cattle have been the largest in the history of the port, reaching 80,600 head, against 60,000 in 1888, 64,600 in 1857 and 63,900 in 1856. Exports of sheep were also large being 57,400 , against 44,900 in 185s, 36,000 in 1887 and 93,800 in 1886. Shipments of lumber, phosphate, asbestos, etc, have been considerable and reference will be made to these exports in subsequent issues.

## 'JHE NEGRO PROBLEM IN TPHE UNITED STATES.

The acts of violence chronicled from time to time during the last few months in the South-Eastern States of the neighboring Republic, have again directed the attention of throughtfol people to the sititude of the tro races in that country. The statement hazarded from time to time after the close of the rebellion, that it wonld have been wiser and cheaper for the Northern States to have purchased tbe whole slave population at a reasonable valuation from their masters, than have entered into the terrible conflict of a quarter of a century ago, is still occasionally revived. Southern statesmen, who know better, say that such a course was not practicable, avd that anyone suggesting it at the time would receive a long shift and a short rope for his temerity. The development which the negroer have achieved, morally and intellectually, in certain portions of the country, especially in the north where their numbers are few, has not been accompanied by any relaxation of the abhorrence felt by the whites in regard
to social intercourse and association. The abhorrence is rather increasing; and from recent outbreaks of riot, outrage and lynch law in the south, one cannot but feel that serious trouble is yet in store for the Republic before this problem is fully solved. Our English exchanges have been dealing with this matter at some length lately, but the writers lack that intimate acquaintanceship with the difficulties, ever present to us in Cauada, so necessiry to a full grasp of the subject.

Americans who may be perfectly willing to respect a negro's political rights, will do almost anything rather than be brought into personal relations with him. This was well seen in the case of the halfbreed, Fred. Donglass, the famous old emancipation lecturer, who on being lately appointed Minister at Hayti found it impossible to procure means of transport on the ordinary mail steamers to the West Indies, the rules of these vessels being so strict in regard to colored passengers that they could only give deck accommodation to the Minister and his party. Fiven the officers of the United States navy could not be relied upon to obsy orders in the case, and three captains in succession allowed themselves to be deprived of their commands rather than willingly take Mr. Douglass to his destination. This is the more remarkable in view of the very strict discipline that prevails iu the navy of the United States.

If the officers had been ordered to turn their vessels into cattle boats, it is not likely they would have refused to obey. Mr. Donglass was also refused accommodation while on his way southward by all the leading hotels in Jacksonville, Florida, simply because of his boing a molatto. This is the more remarkable when it is remembered that the hotels in question are kept by northerners; and are mainly supported by northern visitors to that city during the winter.

A further example of this exclusiveness is shown by the fact that the Young Men's Christian Aspociation will, nowhere throughout the United States, admit colored young men to membership, and that many of the religious conventions refuse to allow colored clergymen to take part in their deliberations. In Brooklyn, any colored citizen, whatever his wealth or position, cannot obtain a place in the theatres except in the upper gallery; in Boston, the great hotbed of abolition before and during the war, most of the retail tradere refuse to employ colored assistants in their shops, and at one of the fashionable watering places of New Jersey, blacks are not allowed to bathe in the sea at the same time with their white fellow-citizens, and in every rank of life this intolerance prevails In Chicago, not long since, several hundred workmen in a soap factory went on strike because two negroes had been employed in some subordinate position in the oftice; and the Trade Union of Locomotive Engineers openly announced that no negro can become a member of their body. In New York, the negro is practically boycotted. He cannot obtain work on the streets; and is not considered even worthy of digging in the sewers. He is unable to obtain work as a mason, a carpenter or a painter. Should he attempt to drive a truck, a car or cab, every white driver whom he meets does his best to upset him. Even as a barber he must cunfine himself to shaving of the chins and cheeks of those of his own color. The restrictions as to negro travelling on the railways, and the refusal of the whites to allow colored children to be educated along with their own, are too well known to call for extended reference or description. Our readers will probably remember the case of a respectable and wealthy mulatto, of Detroit, who brought an action against a saloonkeeper who had refuesed to serve him, and in which, although taere was no doubt about the facts, the jury unanimously decided against the plaintiff, who was, moreover, obliged to pay heavy costa. At Decatur, Illinois; the leading confectioner of the place refused to serve a colored clergyman withean ice-cream, solely on acconnt of his color.

All this is significant enough, and is merely leading the way to a recasting of the franchise which must come soonor or later. Ihe demand for either expelling the negroes or else depriving. them of political rights, has become a subject of actual debate It is only a few weeks ago that Sonator Gibbs, a leading politician from the sonth, advocated in the Senate of Georgia, "forced emigration or extermination of the negroes," whom he deolares to be wortbless as laborers and a danger to the community at large. On a ballot taken, it was found that the votes of the Senate, with regard to the expulsion of the negro element from that state, stood 16 to 16 , the presiding officer giving the casting vote against Senator Gibbs, whose motion was thus lost only by a single vote. Anotber Congressman, in Richmond, in seeking election recently, declared that his sole aim would be to secure
the disfranchisement of the negro. Even General Sherman, the hero of the march to the sea, in recently addressing a meeting of his former fellow-soldiers, at Cincinnati, expressed limself prepared to vote for the disfranchisement of the negroes, provided that the representation of the south was reduced in proportion to the number of colored persons deprived of the right to vote. This feeling appears to be gaining ground throughout the north.

A general opinion prevails along the surface, even with us in Canada, that the Northerners entered upon the late war in order to abolish slavery rather than to save the Union. If the abolitionists had been allowed to free the blacks by peaceful means, they would, in all probability, as in the case of the Indians and the Chinese, have refused them the franchise; and experience has shown many of them that this would have been the true policy. In the Southern States, the blacks have, as a rule, been practically deprived of all political power, and are mere tools in the hands of white politicians. This is more especially the case in the Carolinas, Georgia and Alabama. Under the circumstances, it is not to be wondered at that the Northerners should question the right of the south to a voting strength on a population half of which is deprived of its rights. It is urged that, if disfranchisement were to take place, the colored population of the south be placed under the special protection of the Federal Government, as are the Indians. The scheme, however, is not likely to meet with universal favor. The whole question abounds with difliculties. The Democrats could not be expected to endure a reduction of their power in Congress, and there would be great difliculty in disfranchising the negroes of the Northern States, many of whom have enjoyed the franchise all their lives, as their fathers did before them. In concluding an article on this subject in a recent number, the London Spectator justly says :-
"We must, in justice to the American people, say something as to the instances of social oppression exercised upon negroes in the United States. Enclish people cannot easily realize the conditions. To begin with, they seldom hear the other side of the question, for it is one that Americans naturally slirink from speaking about. The outrages on and lynching of negroes are abominable enough, and no word shall ever be said here to condone the cruelty and injustice of such acts. We must not forget, however, that in many parts of the south no white woman will go outalone withont a revolver. Unquestionably a portion of the negroes of the Gulf States are still licentions savages not yot emancipated from the hideous abominations of the Obeah, nor from the persistent inchnation towards evil always existing in nuci vilized mankind. If we lived within sight, as it were, of a population whose graudparents were Guinea, savages, we should lind it no easy task to think and act calmly and justly in regard to the negroes."

## Feathers.

We have inquiries from time to time from subscribers in remote parts of the country as to where certain articles can be procured; which would certainly seem to call for more liberal advertising on the part of many lines of industry, which are supposed by their managers, on account of being rather exclusive in their nature and not subjoct to much opposition, to require no further efforts at extending the business than a shingle or board over the door. That such industries could be onlarged and made more profitable goes without a doubt. A subscriber writes us from Fredericton, N. B., this week, as follows: "Dear Sira.-Noticing your article last yeek on feathers, please tell me where I can procure feathers cheapest in Canada." Most of the feathors used in the manufacture of pillows, etc., in this city, are procured from the United States, Chicago and St. Lonis being the principal centres. For mattresses feathers are no longer used; hair, fibre, sea-weed, etc., being now entirely substituted by manufacturers. Only back from "the madding crowd" in the rural districts where eariy custom thill holds sway, is to be found the original and everlasting feather mattress, or tick. I'be fledgling who aspires to a new home of her own is still the recipient of that inviting adjunct, its softness betokening a warmth and comfort apparently unknown where it is not. But among the many modern appliances which from year to year send back into oblivion the woll remembered health-sustaining simple customs of more primitive daye, the modern mattress which has left the feathers in the rear can be classed as much more desirable than its predecessor. When we consider that one-third of our time is spent in repose, it at once behooyes us to obtain that rest in such a manner as will be most conducive to health. In this the modern make, with the perfect springs now being used, is claimed to hold first place.

Amons the feathers used by the milliners for ornamental purposes, the ostrieh is highly prized. These aro occasionally procured in New York by the wholesale trade here, but the greater guaulity is selected in London where special ehades and a ereater varioty are more satisfactorily obtained. The lagge showing of feathers this season in Paris and London, and, to a certain extent in New York, is looked on as a forerumer of a return next spriny to the profusion fin feather ornaments which has been gradually diminishing of late years.

The majority of ostrich feathers comes from lort Blizabeth and Cape Town, Soutil A frica, where both the wild and the tame bird is found. They are mhipped mostly in the ratw state to foris and dondon, and, after being prepared, are sent from there to all parta of the globe. A fow come from Bravil, but are of inferior quality. As to the preparation of these feathers, they are generally shipped in bales from which they are first assorted, the various sizes heing kept by themselves. They are then mibjected to a sapo bath, in order to get them clarified and any fureigu subulance removed. Those to bo dressed black are properly cloaned and dyed. 'The natural grey's are put through the paroxidedydrogen process and worked till they are a cream white. Those to be made white are subjected to the blneing procoss, and the others ayo dyed crean, strong lemon, tuscan, fawn, biege, coil and other desirable tints. After the requisite' shades are obtained, thay are then dried and the fibres expanded. -'Thoy are nexi chrled, mounted in pompom and aigrette, or sewed logethor and made into long flati. 'lips are sorted and mounted into bunches and are reaty for sale.

Tha prices are for matural grey's, after being bleaded and dyod tho fashionable shades, assorted from $\$ 3$ to $\$ 6$ per dozen bunches. The Bunteguen vary from $\$ 12$ to $\$ 36$ per doz. bunches. Speedoon's aro sold at from 84 to $\$ 12$ per doz. feathers. Long prime, all colurs, range in price all the way from $\$ 12$ to $\$ 06$ per doa, and A-1 black flat from Slo to $\$ 100$ per doz. Black Amazons, which are large, heavy feathers, composed of pieces, sell from st to sis per doa.

## 'IHE LATE CORDAGE AFFAIR.

We regret that, in $n$ degree owing to undue pulbicity elecwhere, the largo cordage firm, to whose financial difficulties we adverted Home weeks ago, have been compolled to issue a circular to their ereditors, and that the position of their affairs has assumed a tinge, in publicestimation, not in any degree warranted by the real condition of uffaics.

It was early in 188G that the two grandsons of Mr. John A. Converse trok over his businees, but long before that time Mr. A. W. Morris had hecome known as a elever and popular manager, and bad sneceedod in largely reducing the then existing mortgage on the pro. perty. It was thon estimated to bo worth at least $\$ 150,000$ over the mortgaga of $\$ 2,000$, and as one-third of this came to the graidsons as direct heirh, they only became liable for the sum of $\$ 100,000$, on which they had to pay to Mr. Converse interest at the rate of 0 per cent per annum (or about the sum he had yearly drawn from the business), with the privilege of repaying the principal almost at their own option. From the tirst their business was one sertes of successes. Mr. A. W. Morris, tho manager, won golden opinions in the commercial world. He wis elected alderman, and becama a director in a loading bank. Evorything he touched seemed to prosper. A clever speculation in sisal, at the commencement of the present your, was looked upon as an instanco of his commercial astutmere, and on all sides his credit stood higher than ever. Unfortumately ho had overrated the absorptive capacity of the country, and in spite of his virtual monopoly of the irade, he split upon the rock of over-production. Last year owing to the vory large harvest in Manitoba, the demand for binder twite was exceptionally great. Yet even under these fuvorable circumstances the stock of this article made by The firm was in excess of the demand, and it was rushed forward to the North-West until the market was overfilled. This year the harvest was a rimall one, and the demand for binder twine still smaller; but, weverthelese, the mills continued to turn ont the usual quantity, the resull heing that the firms to whom it was consigued could not disprosu of it, and consequently drew back upon A. W. Morris \& Bro., who were unmbe to meet these drafts, and were naturally compelled, in imm, to fall bick nyousheir bankers.

It is probable that the investment of upwards of $\$ 50,000$ in the works at Port Hope, where theyobtained a bowns of $\$ 30,000$ - the town's hends being cashed by the Bank of 'lorouto-was a factor in the firm's diftientfes, as tending towards the overproduction referred to. it is known that Mr. Morris spent more timeand destroyed more of his rest in travelling botweou the factories at Montreal and Port Hope than was
altogether prudenteven for one of his years, and it is generally conceded that anxiety is quadrupled when on wheels. The charges of extravagance are not well founded. The yacht freely spoken of cost ecarcely one-third of the $\$ 30,000$ mentioned. Rut, as with horses and carriages, it is not the first cost of these luxuries that telle, but rather the expense of maintaining them. To sum the matter up, the frm's present trouble is due to miscalculatione-over purchasing on a risitug market and over manufacture on the eve of an expected harvest yield, of an article which the Government bad assisted to render a practical monopoly. The tritivg iuterruption, in the way of their continued prosperity, was a new expeience, and in a sensitive and high-strung organization, such as that of the principal of the firm, so preyed and wagnified itself by contiamal brooding, that the phyeical coconomy became affected, a ad night after night for weeks together, "tired nature's balmy restorer," was a strauger to his couch. Had Mr. Morris not felt his lemporary set-back so acutely-bad be maintained his wonted coolness and judgment, there would bave been no occasion for the suspension, as the statement to be presented in a few days will undoubtedly show. In a month or two, we venture to asy, all will be going on again as well as ever. The firm also, probably, miscalculated the position and attitudo of the farmers. Bindingthe making of shcaves -is not an absolute necessity with the farmer in thess days of portable power threshers,-which means that binding-twine may be bought too dear. In many places during last harvest, the grain after being cut down was pitch-forked into ricks like bay and fed in that condition to the threshing machine. The banks are secured, one by the town and strong men of Port Hope the other two by the stock manufactured and unmanufactured. Ontside of these the habilities are about $\$ 50,000$, of which $\$ 40,000$ are in the United Kingdom and $\$ 10,000$ in Canada. Wise men will not overlook the lesson hereby given, especially in view of recent "booms" in other articles, also highly promising for the future.

There is no foundation whatever for the rumor concerning auy disagreement among the banks interested, nor for the statement pointing to a compromise of the liabilities.

## A RUMOR CORRECTED.

What between the eagerness manifested on the "strect" to obtain "pointers" which may raise or depress some bank or other stock a fraction more or less, and the no less keenness with which news is sought by the vigilant reporters of the daily pross, it is next to impossible now-a-days for any change in the perzonnel of prominent firm or company to escape comment and being attributed to various causes all of which are likely to be wide of the mark. The "street" man cares little whethor rumor be correct or not if it ouly enable him to squeese a few dollars out of the "drop," and the reporter-or rather, the nowsman-cares only to get something new to publish whether fact or fiction or a mixture of both. Tho groat success attending this modern mothod of conducting a nowspaper is exemplified by a New York daily paper which, under its uew policy, has within a few years, attnined a degree of prosperity to which it had long been a stranger. A weekly from the same city has secured a large circulation in Montreal because of its incorrect nows from this city. We are led to these romaks by the following comsiunication addreseed to a Toronto daily, beariug on a recent change in the persounel of a prominent dry goods house in that city, in which house the writer of the note had for some time been chief manager during the absence of Mr. Macmaster in England; -

A Note prom Mr. Daruing. -To the Bditor: As a statement recently made in the public press, to the effect that iu the future it is my in. tention to devote a larger share of my time to the affiairs of the Canadian Bank of Commerce than herctofore, seems to have given rise to the impression that a change in the active management of tho bank is involved therein. I desire, through your valuable columus, to correct this impression.

As President of the bauk I have certain welledefined duties to perform, and these cannotin the nature of thiugs difier materially in the future from what they have done in the past.

The policy of the Board of Directors has been clearly expressed in placiug the active management of its affairs in the hauds of geutlemen trained to the business.

Nothing could be more saribfactory than the result of this policy, nad I would regard it as a matter of regret were auy Director to take part in the active management of the affairs of the bank except as a
member of the Board. member of the Board.

Investabet Tables.-Ono of the most compendiour and practical among the many labor-saving works dealing with economicsia any of its branches is the handsome little volume of abnat 50 octavo pages, compiled and published recently by Mr. William Powis, F. C. A., a gentleman better known probably in Hamilton and Toronto than the is as yet in Eastern Oanada. Mr. Powis' work bears on the title page this legend: "Sinking Fund Tablesand Instollment Tables wiih extracto froma paper on Municipal finances and Acoonts, read by the au: .; ! ; me tho Institute of Chartered Accountants, Toronto, Canada" We shall not attempt here any reviow of the work, but conteat ourselves with quoting a few of the headings of the subjects treated, which cannot fail to recommend it to everyone who has to deal with municipal finances and accounts, debentures and the principal kinds of investments current in this country. Under "Municipal Finnnces and Accounts" wo have the following sub-titles:-Management, Debeatures, Dobt, Powers, Excrcise of Powers (with examples), Recital of Debts, Registration, Sinking Fund, Computation of same, with examples, Adjustment, Investment, Expenditure, Striking flice Rate, Local Ass ssesments with examples, Asscssing, Accounts, Arrears, Balancing Assessment Rolls, Collector's Rolis, Collector's Cash Book, Treasurer's Cash Book, Vouchors, Pay Rolls, Debenture Register aud other accounf books, statements, and Tabular Computations. The tables occupy 16 pages of the book and bear a relation to the labor of those for whom the work is prepared, somewhat akin to that of interest tables to the banker or tables of logarithms to the statisticang. 'I hus the most tedious calculations are rendered ensy, simple and accurato. The governor of the Leeward Islands; West Indies, when in Otlaws recently consulted the Premier in reference to better steamship accommodation and improved trade relations between Canada and the islands under his care. The islands, he said, have a population of about 120,000 people, and are capable of supplying Canada with sugar, coffee, cocos, cotton, tobacco, molasees, rum, lime juice, fruit and cabinet woods. In return Canadians would find there a ready market for lumber of all kinds, fish, breadstuffi (including flour), and manufictured goods, providing they were of thenght texture and could compete with English goods. At the present time tha Leeward Isles
were procuring all their breadetuffs from tho States, except fish, which is carried from Nova Scotia in vessels seeking cargoes of molasses. The people of the Leeward Isles were desirous of obtaining better stemaghlp accommodation, the only regular line calling there at present being the vessels of the Quebac line of New York. It is understood that if the Demerara route be selocted as one of the subsidized routes tenders tor which are now under consideration, the vessels would call at the Le日ward Teles. The interchange of money orders between the two conntries was urged, and also the applieation of the parcol pots system

The devalopment of the country tributary to the French River and Byng Inlet has been so great that it has completely ontgrown the means nov provided for the transportation of passongers and freight. The mercbants, lumbermon and traders there have formed a joint stock company, subseribed the necessary stock and have given an order to the Owen Sound Dry Dock Company to build them a birstclass steamer. The contract calls for the completion of the steamer by the 1st May, 3890 , and it is intended she shall make tri-weekly trips on the Goorgian Bay, calling at the ports of Midland, Collingwood, Parry Sound, French River and Byag Inlet. She is to be 126 feet long and is to be claborately furniehed and to provide good accommodation for 60 cabin and 75 stecrage passengers. Tho cost will be about $\$ 40,000$. It is the first venture in the building of a pabsenger stenmer by our merchnntion the North Shore, but it is to be hoped it will not be the last.-Globe.

We hope the present olection may not prove fruitless.-A potato merchnat, of Shediac Capo, N.B, is londing a schooner with the tubers for the West lndies.-Track'laying on the Lunenburg end of the Nova Scolia Central Railway has been completed, und ballasting has been commenced. Regular passenger trains, it is expected, will be running not later than Decomber 10th.-More freight was handled at the Sack ville, N.B., depot during October than in any olber month since the Intercolonial Railway was opened.

Jasrs D. Leary is making preparations to baild another large timber raft at Joggins, N.B, and has seventy-five men at work in the woods getting out the timber. When there will bo enough snow on the ground, fifty or sixty teams will haul the required materiais to the scenc of building operations. The raft will consist of 27,000 sticke of timber, with about $1,000,000$ feet of hardwood in the centre, and will weigh in the arighborhood of 11,000 tons. Its leagth will be 750 ft . 100 ft . longer that the former raft; the width will be 65 fl , 10 ft wider than the other raft. The present raft will be 45 ft deep, and will draw 25 ft . of water. The chains for bluding the ruft together and the steel wire rope for the rigging, etc, will be imported from England.

The inadequacy of the rates is shown by the facts. There are no quite one hundr $d$ thousand church edifices in the United States Of these, one hundred and five burn anaually-something over one in a thousand. Roeblinge, Son \& Oo , New York, are the largent creditors, their claim being $\$ 12,598.15$; 25 others in New York, Boston, Philadelphia, Toronto and this city, range from $\$ 100$ to nemrly $\$ 2,000$ ench, and a number of others for lesser amounts.

Encodraging reports continue to arrive from British Columbia, where, it is said, there is a large amount of building going on, and this is likely to continue for some time. The mills are running night and day, factories are running overtime aud the merchants without an exception roport business in $n$ very satisfactory coudition. In the town of New Webtminister the trade for the prosent year has nearly doubled any record of the past. The 'longehormen's strike, at Vancouver, is ended, and did not prove a success to the strikors The men went to work at the old rate of wages- 35 cents an hour for day work and 40 cents for night. The McLaren-Ross Lumbering Company has purchased the powerful tug boat $S$. L. Mastick, to run in connection with its mills at New Westminister. It is alleged that tho towago tariff charges for velsols ontoring Burrard inlet are such as to favor the sound mills. The determination of the now proprietors of the Mastiok is to so
reduce the rates as to effect a saving of several hundred dollars in favor of Burrard inlet and Fraser river. A contracting purty bave returned to Victoria, after locatiog 30,000 ecres of timber land near Comox, for the Victoria Manufacturing Company.

## JAPANESE RICE.

The great proportion of fatty matter that chemical aualyses have shown to be contained in the better quality of Japanese rice, says the Pall Mall Gazette, renders one of the most uutritions, as it is one of the most palatable grains in the world, and as both these characteristics of it are gainiug more and more recognition in the priacipal Euro pean centres of consumption, which is testified by the fact that it now commands a better price in the home market than most other descriptions, the demand for it in those markets may fuirly be hoped to show a steady if not the iame striking progression that it has done in the past year. The advance that took place in the foreign shipping at Hiogo during 1888 in largely due to the export of rice and British ships have been peca-iarly favored, while in the trade a large amount of British capital has alko found protitable investment. $\Delta$ few years ago Australia was the only foreign market for Japauese rice, it having, though in most of the colonies its import was laden with heavy duties, there early gained the recognition it deserved; but in the export during 1888 thero were included 111,108 tons shipped to Europe, principally to Mediterranean ports for transit to southon Europe nad Germany 2,651 tons to the United States and Canada, besides 26,123 tons to Australia.

The chief item of interest during the week has been the advance in money，which has had the effect of checking speculation in everything．Cansdian Pacific bas held the lead，and，in fact，is about the only stock in which any business of consequence has been tranencted．Banks have been rather weaker owing to a few orders in the market to sell， and buyers have not been disposed to support prices，although some of them are evidently buying on the scale down．In Bank of Mont－ real，a few sales have taken place at $230 \frac{1}{2}$ ，ex－ dividend，and it closed at this price asked， $230{ }_{4}$ bid．Commerce has also been weak selling as low as 124，ex－div．，at which price it closes．Peoples ruled alightly firmer and on a small investment order the price ad－ vanced to $101 \frac{1}{2}$ ．Molsons was weak selling at 158，but there have been no transactions for a few days．Small sales of Hochelaga at 97 comprise about all the trading in bank stocks． In the miscellantous list，Telegraph，Gas and Pacific have absorbod the bulk of the busi－ ness．Telegraph has sold in round amounts at 94．This is the highest price for some time．The strength is，no doubt，due to the belief that the dividend will be paid on the 3rd December next．Gas has been traded in to a less extent at $200 \frac{1}{2}$ down to 199 and closes weak，owing to the dearer money． Canadian Pacific has reacted about 1 per cent from the highest point．This is no doubt due to sympathy with New York and London where the etock bas not been so greatly sought after as heretofore．The local fealing is still bullish and the monthly statementwhich will appear this time next week，will，it is thought， be beneficial to the＇bull＇element．Cotton stocks have been neglected with ouly one or two sales and those in Canada cotton which sold at 47 and $47 \frac{1}{2}$ ．Money loaned on call at $52 \ldots 6$ per cent．，the outside rato predominatiog．Other lenders than the banks charged more．New York funds easiar，par to 1－16．In sterling，60－day
