by Parliament, Canada will make a contribution of 350,000 Canadian dollars to

This represents an increase of 60,000 Canadian dollars over the 1965 Canadian  
contribution of 290,000 Canadian dollars.

This contribution is another concrete proof of the strong  
support which the Government and the people of Canada continue to give to the  
United Nations and to its social, economic and humanitarian activities and  
our appreciation of the invaluable efforts which the High Commissioner does  
to relieve the plight of refugees.
