Rub the body briskly, but lightly, until the moisture has dried. Moisten it again. and repeat the drying process. Go over the whole body in this way, allowing about half an hour for the entire bath. Remember to do all the drying with the hand, since it is the friction and evaporation which reduce the fever.

Plenty of water to drink may be allowed if there is no excessive vomiting. If the mother has not controlled the fever within 12 hours, or at least made sure of the cause of it, so that she can control it, she should pass over the responsibility of treating the child to the family doctor.



WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any mate over it years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitobs, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each or three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a tarm of at least so acres solely owned and oscapied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.
