

The Exhibition Lease.

The debate of the day, however, arose over report No. 15 of the Committee on Parks and Exhibitions. 





Partial Reaction From the Advance of Tuesday.

Liversool Cables Were Higher Yes Opinion-Local Grain and Pro-

To-morrow (Thursday) being Thanksgiv-ing Day, both in Canada and the United States, all exchanges will be closed. Liverpool wheat markets manifest some strength to-day. Futures closed ½d to ½d above yesterday's final figures. Paris wheat futures closed 10 to 20 centimes higher for the day, and flour 5 to 10 centimes higher. Despite the higher cables and light receipts, Chicago futures to-day reacted from yesterday's high closing price. All deliveries made a net decline of about ½c per bushel for the session.

Liverpool maize futures to-day closed 4/d to 8/d per cental higher than yesterday. Chicago futures receded over 4/c per bush. Total clearances to-day: Wheat and flour, 656,000 bushels; corn, 586,385 bushels. Exports at New York to-day: Flour, 7242 barrels and 28,425 sacks; wheat, 162,-888 bushels. Primary wheat receipts to-day, 1,072,000 bushels, against 1,078,000 the same day a year ago. Corn, 642,000 bushels, against 757,000 bushels.

Wheat receipts at Minneapolis and Du-ith to-day, 328 cars, against 740 same Broomhall cables: Australia chartering slowly. Wheat cargoes firm. Corn firm.

67c; calls, 68c. May corn puts, 344c; calls, 84%c. The Corn Trade News cables: Reports from Argentine state that weather is unfavorable. The Chicago Dally Bulletin says that private cables state that, while the crop in Argentina would be late, the yield will be a bumper one.

Broomhall cables: Odessa reports navigation on the rivers still open and arrivals of wheat large.

Speculation in Italy.

The Corn Trade News attributes the recent action of the Italian Government in placing the reserve supply of wheat intended for the army at the disposal of needy communes and districts at a moderate price to the fact that speculators in the Southern Provinces, had attempted to corner the market, and had advanced prices illegitimately. As the crop was a fair one, there was no good reason for high prices, which could only have been established on account of the smallness of stocks held, after a year of very deficient wheat crop and moderate imports.

European Wheat Prices.

The Liverpool Corn Trade News, Nov. 8, reports that 27s 6d would probably buy cargo, f.a.q., Rosario-Santa Fe wheat, Jan. Feb, steamer shipment. It quotes wheat at Amsterdam, cash, 27s 5d for 480 ibs; March delivery, 27s 7d; at Parls, Nov. 37s 9d; Jan.-April, 37s 3d (duty, 12s 2d). It reports sale of 1000 quarters of American buckwheat-in London at 26s per 416 lbs. The farmers' deliveries in the United Kingdom during the three months, Aug. 1 to Oct. 31, were a little under 12,000,000 bushels and considerably less than in same months of 1897. As this season's crop is about 20,000.

600 bushels more than last year, it is evident that British farmers are holding back an unusually large proportion of their crop. Stocks at all ports in the United Kingdom 28c very low, and cash and December de-European Wheat Prices.
