Packages of envelopes will be furnished, on application to the Managers, to Members and Adherents of the Church who are willing to adopt the "Envelope System" of making their weekly offerings. The plan is the following: Each envelope bears a number corresponding to the number opposite to the contributor's name on the Treasurer's book. Each contributor undertakes to give a fixed amount weekly, and to make up the deficiency in case of absence on one or more Sundays.

Missionary, Educational and Benevolent Funds.

Contributions will be made on the third Sunday in each month during the current year, in special envelopes provided for the purpose, to the Missionary, Educational and Benevolent Funds of the Church. Contributors may, if they choose, indicate the special objects to which they wish their contributions applied. The amount not so designated will be distributed by the Kirk Session. The following are the chief objects for which contributions are asked:

I. Home Missions.—For the support of 714 Mission Stations in the needy districts of Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, the North-West Territories, and British Columbia. The amount required for the current year is \$46,000.

2. FOREIGN MISSIONS.—For the support of Missions in five fields. (1) Among the Indians in the North-West; (2) in Formosa and Honan; (3) in Central India; (4) in the New Hebrides; (5) in Trinidad. \$79,000 is needed this year.

3. French Evangelization. — Missionaries, Colporteurs and Teachers are employed, under the direction of the Assembly's Board, in spreading a pure gospel among the French Canadians. There is an admirably conducted School at Pointe aux Trembles. The estimated amount required for the current year is \$52,00c.

(4) Colleges.—(1) There is a common fund for the support of Knox, Queen's and Montreal Theological Colleges. The amount required this year is \$14,500. (2) This Congregation is responsible for two scholarships—one of \$60 and the other of \$50—in Queen's University. (3) A grant is also made for the support of Manitoba College.

5. Ministers' Widows' and Orphans' Fund.—For providing annuities for the widows and orphans of ministers who die in the service of the Church. Each minister contributes \$12 per annum to this Fund.

6. AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.—Amount required, \$10,000. The maximum annuity hitherto granted is only \$220, and ought to be increased.

7. St. Mark's Mission.—Of the Missionary's stipend, \$500 is paid from the monthly contributions to Missions.

8. The Sunday Schools.—The expenses of the St. Mark's and Dorset Sunday Schools are a charge on the Missions Fund. The St. Andrew's School is hereafter to be provided for from ordinary revenue.

The Fund for the Augmentation of Ministers' Sti-PENDS is not included in the above. A special collection is made for this object in December. The amount required for the current year, in order to secure to each minister in the Western Section of the Church a stipend of \$750 per annum, is \$30,000.

Minutes of the Annual Meeting of the Congregation.

The Annual Meeting of the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church was held in the School Room, on Wednesday evening, January 18th, 1888.

After devotional exercises conducted by the Minister, The Rev. D. J. Macdonnell was appointed Chairman, and Mr. William Mitchell, Secretary, of the Meeting.

The Minutes of the last Annual Meeting and of the special meeting of the Congregation held in June last, were read and sustained.

The Secretary to the Board of Managers read the Managers' Report, and submitted statements of the ordinary Revenue and Expenditure, and of the Special Account for Repairs and Improvements on the Church and Manse.

The Chairman having requested Mr. Kay to take the Chair temporarily, proceeded to state in strong terms his objection to accepting the increase of stipend referred to in the Report, and at his request the Secretary read Mr. Macdonnell's letter to the Board of Managers, declining the increase. After a very general expression of opinion in favour of the increase of stipend, it was moved by Mr. Davies and seconded by Mr. Hodgson,—That the Report of the Board of Managers now submitted be received and adopted without amendment. Carried unanimously by standing vote.

In terms of the notice of motion given at last Annual Meeting to increase the number of Managers, it was moved by Mr. Maclennan, seconded by Mr. Gemmell,—That the

Board of Managers shall consist of not more than eighteen nor fewer than fifteen members, and the exact number for any year may be determined by the Congregation at the Annual Meeting. The names of the Managers shall be placed upon a roll in the order of seniority of election, and as between those elected at the same time in alphabetical order, and seven members shall retire in each year at the Annual Meeting in the order in which they stand on the roll, and seven new members shall be elected, the retiring members being eligible for re-election.

This motion was subsequently withdrawn in favour of an amendment moved by Mr. Hart, seconded by Dr. McCurdy, and carried by a majority,—That the minimum number of Managers shall be ten, and the maximum twelve, four to retire annually, the exact number for any year to be determined at the Annual Meeting, and that the number for the current year shall be ten.

The following nominations for Managers were then made: Messrs J. I. Davidson, R. W. Sutherland, J. W. Langmuir, John Muldrew, B. E. Walker, W. A. Shepard, A. J. Robertson, Geo. Bell, E. A. Scadding, Jas. M. Alexander, David Walker, and John McMichael.

It was agreed that the vote should be taken by ballot, and Messrs. Kay and Fulton were appointed Scrutineers. The Scrutineers reported that the following having the largest number of votes were duly elected, viz.: Messrs. Davidson, Sutherland, Robertson, Alexander, Langmuir and Shepard.

Messrs. J. D. Henderson and W. D. Beardmore were appointed Auditors.

A special vote of thanks was tendered to Mr. Russel Inglis, who at his own request now retires, for his valued services to the Congregation as Manager and Treasurer during the past eighteen years.

Votes of thanks were also tendered to the Sunday School Teachers, the various Workers in the different Associations, the Ushers, the Choir, and the Managers, for their valuable services during the year.

The Chairman and Secretary of this meeting were appointed a Printing Committee.

Mr. Macdonnell then closed the meeting with prayer and the benediction.

Fifty-Seventh Annual Report of the Board of Managers.

The Managers herewith submit detailed statements showing the ordinary revenue and expenditure, and the special account for repairs and improvements on the Church and Manse.

The total ordinary revenue, including balance of \$331.09 from 1886, amounts to \$10,714.36; and the ordinary expenditure to \$10,644.93, leaving a balance in the Treasurer's hands of \$69.43.

The ordinary Sunday Collections amount to \$5,568.22; of this sum \$3,470.85 was contributed by weekly envelope, and \$2,097.37 by open collection, the average being

\$107.08 per Sunday; while the revenue from pew rent amounts to \$4,512.00. Both of these sources of revenue show an increase over last year.

The expenditure for repairs and improvements amount to \$6,764.99, and the payments received on account of subscriptions \$3,221.35, leaving a present debt of \$3,543.64 to provide for the payment of which there are unpaid subscriptions amounting to \$3,827.65. The Congregation has only been partially canvassed for contributions towards this fund, and the payment of the floating debt. \$2,716 is still required for this purpose, and it is hoped will be obtained from those members of the Congregation who have not already contributed. It will be observed that the expenditure on this account has considerably exceeded the sum authorized, but during the progress of the works, other repairs and improvements besides those originally contemplated were found necessary, in order to give permanency to the work and unity of effect to the internal decorations.

At the suggestion of Mr. Macdonnell, the Managers gave their consent to the setting apart of the whole of the open evening collection, taken up on the third Sunday of each month, for the Missions of the Church; thus practically contributing out of ordinary revenue, for this purpose, a sum not less than \$20 per month. It is satisfactory, however, to note, that the Congregation has not allowed the revenue to suffer through this decision.

The matter having been subsequently brought before the Managers by the Superintendent of the School, they have agreed to make the financial support of this School a charge upon ordinary revenue, it being understood that all contributions hitherto made through other channels towards the St. Andrew's Sunday School will in future be made to ordinary revenue.

The Managers have unanimously resolved to increase Mr. Macdonnell's stipend to \$4,500 per annum, commencing from the 1st instant.

The Managers who now retire by rotation are Messrs. Davidson, Inglis and Sutherland.

The monthly contributions to Missions have amounted to \$3,313.32 (including interest \$32.55), as compared with \$2,943.61 in 1886, showing an increase of about \$370. We have thus been enabled to make larger appropriations to some of the Schemes of the Church, as well as to provide for increased outlay in connection with St. Mark's Mission. Deducting from the total given above, the amount expended on St. Andrew's Sunday School (\$160), which is hereafter

to be a charge on ordinary revenue, and the special contributions for the Library, we have the sum of \$11,641.01 expended on the Missionary, Educational and Benevolent Work of the Church.

It is gratifying to note the liberality which has been displayed both in the contributions for an additional Foreign Missionary, and in the subscriptions to the Jubilee Fund of Queen's University. For the latter purpose this Congregation has subscribed \$24,205 out of a total of \$40,365 subscribed in Toronto.

The Rev. Alfred Gandier, M.A., who had laboured with much acceptance in St. Mark's during two previous summers, was last spring appointed Assistant Minister, with the view of his having special charge of the St. Mark's Mission and giving occasional service in St. Andrew's. This arrangement has proved entirely satisfactory. The report submitted facts set forth therein are worthy of very careful consideration in endeavouring to estimate the prospects of the Mission.

The Session rejoices at the energy and success with which the several Associations have prosecuted various branches of work for the benefit of those who are in bodily or spiritual need. The Minister testifies that the Bible Reader has past year.

The District meetings, three of which were held before the end of the year, are to be continued, and it is hoped they will prove a means of drawing members of the Church into closer fellowship.

The resignation of three elders, viz., Messrs. McGee and Robinson and Dr. Geikie, renders it imperative that new Elders should be elected. The Session has therefore decided to add six to the present number, and the Congregation will be shortly called upon to elect suitable men.

The death of Dr. Barclay, which took place on the 27th September, 1887, was an event fitted to awaken solemn thought, and to strike a chord of tender recollection, especially in the hearts of those who had known the deceased in his prime.

Dr. Barclay was inducted to the charge of St. Andrew's Church in December, 1842, succeeding Mr. Leach. For 28 years, from 1842 to 1870, he ministered to the Congregation in the old edifice at the corner of Church and Adelaide Streets, and occupied a prominent position in connection with various matters of public concern. A man of genial temper and dignified bearing, of scholarly acquirements and singularly clear judgment, his counsel was greatly prized both in the Courts of the Church and by those who were charged with the care of educational and philan-

thropic interests. He resigned the charge of this Church in 1870, owing to ill health, and his later years were sadly clouded by mental trouble. He died at the ripe age of 75.

May we who have been spared be found diligent and faithful in the work given us to do in the new year upon which we have entered.

Report of St. Andrew's Sunday School,

There has been no appreciable increase in the average attendance of scholars during the past year as compared with 1886. This is owing to the attendance having fallen off during the months of July and August when the School arrangements were a good deal upset in consequence of the use of the School Room for public worship pending the repairing and improving of the Church building. In their liberality, however, the scholars have made a very considerable advance. Their total offerings, including bank interest, amount to \$334.43, being an average of \$6.43 per Sunday; an increase, as compared with 1886, of \$1.48 per Sunday.

These moneys have been distributed as follows: Central India, \$60; "Dayspring," \$50; North-West Indians, \$35; West Indies, \$25; Formosa, \$25; Home Mission Fund, \$20; Pointe aux Trembles Schools, \$25; Sick Children's Hospital, \$32; Sabbath School Association of Ontario, \$15; Dorset Schools, \$45.17; "Willing Helpers'" Bible Reader, for expenditure in connection with her work, \$2.26.

Numerous gifts were contributed by the children on the occasion of their annual entertainment, from which a valuable box of books was sent to the Sunday School at Vancouver, B.C., and a parcel of toys and picture books to Indian children connected with our Missions in the North-West

West.

A Mission Band in connection with the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society has recently been organized

from among the girls in the School, and gives promise of becoming a very helpful adjunct to our work among the girls.

The Library has been substantially improved by means of the moneys kindly subscribed in response to the state ments made when the last report was presented.

Report of Mission Work in St. Mark's.

The past year has been one of encouraging progress in St. Mark's Mission. The attendance at the morning and evening services on the Lord's Day has been steadily increasing. The evening attendance is almost double that of the morning, and gives indication that a larger place of worship will soon be required.

But while the attendance is increasing, it is still very small compared with the number of families who ought to attend. There are about 190 families in this district of the city who are connected with no other Church, who are visited in their homes by the Missionary, Bible Reader and other members of St. Mark's, and who ought to attend this place of worship regularly. Of this number, as nearly as I can estimate, 40 families never attend, 65 attend occasionally, and 85 with some degree of regularity.

If we could awaken among all of these 190 families such an interest that they would come regularly to hear the Gospel preached, our attendance would be more than doubled. But this seems well nigh impossible, so confirmed has become the habit of staying away from God's house. In our visitation we constantly meet with families who, years ago, before coming to Toronto, attended some place of worship regularly, and in some cases were Church members, but are now quite indifferent. Coming as strangers to the city they went occasionally to one Church and occasionally to another, but they knew nobody and nobody knew them. They had no interest in any particular

Church, and no Congregation of God's people seemed to take any interest in them. The result was that they soon ceased attending Church altogether, and have now been two, four, six, or even ten years without entering the house of God.

These people, who when they came as strangers to the city were neglected, we now visit in their homes and invite them to attend our services. In some cases we have succeeded, in others we have failed.

It is worthy of notice that a number of those who have been received into the Church on profession of their faith, are persons who were at one time members of the Presbyterian or some other Protestant Church, but who for years have been out of Church connection.

We are now endeavouring to prevent a recurrence of this evil by calling upon every family that moves into this part of the city. If they are Presbyterians, or would like to attend a Presbyterian Church, their names are placed upon our book and they are called upon regularly by the district visitors. In the future very few will be able to say, district visitors. In the future very few will be able to say, "We were alienated from the Church because when we came as strangers to this place we were neglected." New families are being added to our list every week, and there is no doubt that within a few years a large Congregation will gather about this centre.

Among those who worship at St. Mark's there are about 100 communicants, of whom more than 30 were added during the past year.

At the Thursday evening meetings there has been an average attendance of 50. These meetings vary in their

character. Once each month some missionary topic is considered and special prayer offered for the Missionaries and Mission operations of our Church. Once every two months and sometimes more frequently a Gospel Temperance Meeting is held. We have had very little success in permanently rescuing those who have once become drunkards, but we endeavour to lead the young to become, or to continue, total abstainers, and thus save them from ever becoming drunkards.

The Monday evening Bible Class has become one of the most interesting features of our work. In the early part of last summer the attendance was very small, but now we have an average attendance of fifty, many of whom take a deep interest and some a positive delight in the study of God's Word.

There has also been a gratifying increase in the grace of liberality during the past year. The Sabbath Collections have been more than one-half greater than for the preceding year, and in addition there has been a monthly collection for Missions. The whole amount realized for Missions is comparatively small, yet the giving even of a small amount leads the people to feel that they have an interest in the work of Christ, not only at St. Mark's, but throughout the world.

In closing this report I desire to bear testimony that notwithstanding many failures God has owned the work at St. Mark's Perhaps no Mission or Sunday School in the city has made greater progress in the same time. But what has been done is very little compared with what is to be done, what ought to be done, and what will be done.

St. Mark's Mission Church—Managers' Report

In presenting our Annual Report for the year just closed, we have reason to be thankful to the bounteous Giver for His continued goodness to us, and for the measure of progress we have attained during the year.

The sums that have been received from the various sources of revenue are as follows: The amount from Collections for the year has been \$642.28; from Cottage Rents, \$220.75; from special envelopes for Missions, \$110.79; from special donations for Bible Class Room, \$201.93; making a total of \$1,175.75.

The average collection for each Sabbath amounts to \$12.35, being an increase of \$3.00 over last year. The average collection for the past three months, since the envelope system was introduced, has been \$17.65, which shows an increase of \$8.00 over last year; which is a proof that this system of giving to the support of the ordinance of the Church has been very successful since its introduction, and the Managers would strongly recemmend every member to adopt this way of giving.

The expenses of the current year will amount to about \$1,200.00, which means an average of about \$23.00 per Sabbath, or an increase of \$5.00 over the present collections, which there should be no difficulty in obtaining. As the seats are free the Managers expect all to contribute according to their ability, as they have guaranteed this amount to be collected during the year to the St. Andrew's Managers.

Owing to the overcrowded state of the Sunday School, the Managers have been under the necessity of erecting a new Bible Class Room, in rear of the present building, at a cost of \$391.66. The amount paid on this (which was raised by an Illustrated Lecture by Rev. John Mutch, from the Sunday School Teachers, and from the Children's Missionary Collections) is \$201.93, leaving a debt still due of \$189.73.

As this debt is entirely separate from the current expenses of the Church, and as the Class Room will be a means of good to the Congregation as well as to the Sunday School, the Managers hope that the increased liberality of the people will enable them to pay off this debt during the year just commenced.

Report of St. Mark's Sunday School.

In presenting the Eleventh Annual Report of this School, the Teachers would unite in thankfulness to God for His blessing on the work of the past year.

God has committed to us the honour of scattering the word of His grace among the little ones, and has strengthened us with His promise, "My word shall not return unto me void, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and it shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent it."

We are glad to be able to report, that having started out at the beginning of the year with a united effort to interest more of the parents in teaching their children the lessons at home, good results have followed, and we work and look for yet greater co-operation between the home and the school.

As reported last year our School was quite full, but we have crowded in 25 more scholars, and as there is no room for additional classes, any new scholars have to be placed

in some class already full. We have only taken in the children of those attending the Mission services; all others have been refused.

The number of scholars on the roll is 350, viz., 148 boys and 202 girls. The average attendance has been 277, an increase of 46 over last year. The contributions amounted to \$180.72, an increase of \$51.62 over the previous year. The first Sunday of each month is set apart for Missions, and the amount raised has been \$72.65, divided as follows: \$62.65 to the Bible Class Room and \$10 to Queen's College Missionary Society.

Our Bible Class Room has been built at a cost of \$391, having acommodation for 60 pupils, and it has added greatly to the comfort of the School, besides the advantage to the Bible Class of having a separate room to be taught in. The attendance has averaged about 18, with Mr. Boyd as teacher.

Three of the scholars have become communicants in the Church during the year, and four of Christ's lambs have been gathered into His fold above; the names are: Albert Galoska, Edith Galoska, Willie Reeves, Emma Lawson.

A social gathering was held on the 23rd December last, at which only the scholars who had been coming regularly to the School were admitted. A very profitable evening was spent, thanks to the Dorset Harmony Club, and others who kindly lent their aid.

The Library is still under the very efficient care of Mr. Alex. Hay, assisted by Mr. James Kirkness. The number of books is 550, \$80 worth having been added at the beginning of the year.

Abstract of Reports of Women's Association.

The several branches of work undertaken by the Women's Association have been carried on with fair success.

THE DORCAS COMMITTEE has, with \$275.00 entrusted to it by the Session, attended to the wants of eighteen families, ten of whom belong to St. Mark's. Two or three of these eighteen are pensioners, old and infirm people who receive help monthly all the year round, but in most cases the assistance has only been needed temporarily, through sickness and trouble.

THE SEWING COMMITTEE has earned the sum of \$40.00, which is the payment of work done, and is therefore the direct gift of the members of that committee. The meetings at which the sewing was done have been a pleasant means of social intercourse to those who availed themselves of them.

THE VISITING COMMITTEE has called on thirty-five families who have joined the Congregation during the year. In nearly every case the visitors were well received, and were allowed to feel that they at once formed a link between St. Andrew's and the new comers. It was found impracticable for the ladies to call on the stranger MEN not connected with families, so they have asked the "Men's Association" to relieve them of that part of the work.

THE RECORD COMMITTEE has distributed the copies of the Monthly Record at the homes of members of the Congregation. In some cases the work has been done most regularly—in others there has been failure. The Convener of the committee hopes to secure a sufficient number of ladies—some twenty-five or thirty—to carry on this work this year punctually in the beginning of each month.

Apart from its committees, the Association has held eighteen meetings with an aggregate attendance of 504, the largest attendance at any one meeting being 59, on the occasion of our Thanksgiving Meeting, when a special offering was brought to the treasury. At these meetings the general business of the Association is transacted, devotional exercises engaged in and missionary intelligence received. A large number of members took part in circulating information and in soliciting membership fees for the "Woman's Foreign Missionary Society," as well as in making up warm clothing, to be sent through that Society to the North-West Indians. Our funds have been raised by these fees; by collections at our meetings and in mite boxes; and by special donations. The amount raised this year is \$551.80.

The Willing Helpers are glad to be able again to report a year of steady progress in work of one kind and another.

We have had five regular meetings in January, February, May, November and December, two largely attended social gatherings, and three lectures, by Rev. Adam Chambers, Prof. Clark and Rev. G. Al. Howie.

Our membership though larger than last year, is not yet as large as we think it should be. And we have changed our night of meeting from the second Tuesday to the second Monday of each month, so as to allow those of our number who are engaged in Dorset night school work and the Choral Society, an opportunity to attend our meetings.

We have now 21 regular District Visitors. In October a house-to-house visitation of the eastern end of the parish was made; and in November a large committee of men was formed to visit young men in their boarding houses and invite them to church, etc. This committee supplied a long felt need, and we are looking for good results from their help. To aid us in this work of visiting, we have ordered 100 copies of a monthly paper "The Cottager and Artisan," for distribution in the homes around us. But the work which has been the most arduous and perhaps the most comprehensive is that connected with the Fuel Club, which was organized in June last. Since that date the Collectors have called weekly on 66 families, for their contributions to this fund, and a great help and blessing it has proved to

The past year is acknowledged to have been our happiest as an Association, and it has been such in the work of its Bible Reader.

We have made in the year over six hundred, what might be called, regular visits, the special object being the reading of God's word, and conversation concerning the wonderfully great salvation He has provided for us by Jesus Christ. We have found that at least eight of every ten are quite ready and glad to speak or be spoken to of God's great gift to us, if we come in a friendly, loving, sisterly spirit, and are able to say that we know the things whereof

we speak.

It is when we visit as a duty, or in any way that savours of official capacity, that we have met with complete failure, and proved the truth of Paul's words, and have become as sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal. Although the failures have been many, and the fault has in nearly every case been ours, we know there are some of those visited who a year ago knew Him not, and said, "There is no beauty in Him that we should desire Him," who can now testify as did the Samaritans of old, "Now we believe not because of thy saying, for we have heard Him ourselves, and know that this is indeed the Christ, the Saviour of the world."

Circumstances in the homes visited are not always conducive to our purpose. Something may have gone wrong that day which has so flurried the mother that she hardly knows how to get through the day's work. The baby may be sick or cross, a neighbour may be calling who seems determined to out-stay you. Even with these or other hindrances good may be done; but we leave, hoping that when we accept the invitation to be sure and come again soon, circumstances may be more in our favour.

Then there are the homes, if such they can be called, where drunkenness, laziness, wastefulness, filthiness, rudeness, and all manner of uncleanness reign supreme, and where order is an unknown condition. These places (for we cannot call them by that precious name, home), although comparatively few in number, are a burden upon our hearts; humanly speaking, improvement is impossible. In beginning a new year, we would put ourselves into the Father's hands, asking Him to use us if He needs us for this special work.

In visiting we are often asked questions, to answer which would lead us far beyond our depth. We never try to stifle such questions or prove them of no importance, but prefer to confess that we have not got on that far yet. That our prayer ever is, "Open thou mine eyes that I may behold wondrous things out of Thy law." Never forgetting to be clear in our testimony that, "Whereas we were blind, now we see" Jesus, and that He is the chief among ten thousand, and the altogether lovely to our souls, and that we are persuaded that no creature shall be able to separate us from the love of God which is in Him. We have often found such testimony lead some to the great central truth of the whole Bible.

Six hundred may appear to you very few visits to be made in such a large parish, but other work has occupied much of the time.

Every Monday (with the exception of two in August) has been spent in collecting money from 25 families living in that part of the city lying between Strachan Avenue and Tecumseth Street; this money has been collected for coal which is being supplied through our Fuel Club. Many of the subscribers have of late heartily thanked the "Willing Helpers" for having helped them in this way.

The most of every Saturday afternoon, is spent in the St. Mark's Mission Sewing School.

Every Thursday afternoon is devoted to the Mothers' meeting held in the Dorset Mission. These meetings have greatly increased in interest and attendance. They were discontinued during the months' of July, August and September. We began again with a very good meeting on the first Thursday in October. Many of the mothers attending, and also members of our Association who have helped, look back upon these Thursday afternoons as some of the profitable seasons of 1887. The plan of selling at these meetings instead of giving the half worn clothing sent us for distribution, has proved very successful, and fostered a spirit of independence. Our average attendance has been 17.


