Enemy Sustains Losses and Obtains No Results-Air Craft Brought Down-Two of German Flying Squadron Pay Penalty For Raid on English Coast

Paris, Aug. 13.—The Germans attacked last night on the Aisne front in effort to recapture trenches taken by the French on Saturday. Today's of-

icial statement says they were repulsed with losses. The announcement follows: "Between Cerny and Craonne the enemy's artillery developed pronounced activity, especially in the sector south of Ailles. "The Germans attacked in vain at the point at which we captured trenches

on Aug. 11. They were repulsed with losses and obtained no results. "In the Champagne, east of Rheims, in the regions of the Casque and the Teton, and on the left bank of the Meuse there were spirited artiflery actions. Two surprise attacks by the enemy, at Caurieres Wood and Bezonvaux, were repulsed by our fire. Elsewhere the night was calm.

"Two German airplanes and a captive balloon were brought down yesterday by our pilots. Three other enemymachines were forced to land having been severely damaged."

TWO HUN MACHINES DESTROY ED. London, Aug. 13-Two of the German machines which yesterday ev raided the English southeast coast watering places, were destroyed by British naval airplanes. The official statement issued by the government today says

Second Lieut. (Acting Captain) David Philip Hirsch, late York Regiment.—For conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty in attack. Machine gun fire was so intense that it was necessary for him to be continuously up and down the line encouraging his men to dig and hold the position. He continued to encourage his men by standing on the parapet and steadying them in the face of machine gun fire and counter-attack until he was killed. His conduct throughout was a magnificent example of the greatest devotion to duty.

Sergeant Gosling sprang out, lifted the nose of the bomb, which had sunk into the ground, unscrewed the fuse, and threw it on the ground, where it immediately exploded. Hon. C. J. Doberty moved the second reading of a bill to amend the criminal code respecting insurance. The bill provides that it should be an indictable offence punishable by fine or imprisonment for anyone to solicit or carry on a business of insurance unless duly licensed by the minister of finance. Penalty ranging from \$20 to \$50 for the first offence and from one to three moaths in default of payment for the first offence and imprisonment of from three to six months for the second is provided.

Mr. Doherty replied that this provision had been in the law for some time past. He did not think it was right that better terms should be given to one man to han to another simply to bolster up the insurance business. The fund might be affected.

VICTORIA CROSS IS WON BY GALLANT CANADIAN AIRMAN

London, Aug. 12—The intrepidity of Captain William Bishop, a Canadian and a member of the Royal Flying Corps in attacking a German airdrome singleanded, has been rewarded by the be-owal upon him of the Victoria Cross the most prized of the British valor med-als. The official Gazette gives the fol-lowing resume of the action which brought Captain Bishop the Victoris

Cross:





CANADA MUST MAKE BIG CUT IN WHEAT CONSUMPTION

Canada and the United States must cut down their normal wheat consumption by 160,000,000 bushels to meet the needs of Great Britain and the Allies, Hon. W. J. Hanna, Canadian Food Controller, estimates that to feed Great Britain, France and the other Allies, and the men at the front will require 1,105,000,-600 bushels of wheat. This means at least 460,000,000 will have to be imported from Canada and the United States. There will be under normal consumption in these two countries only 300,000,000 bushels surplus for export, and so by special efforts of food conservation the special efforts of food conservation the people of the United States and Canada will have to make up a shortage of 160,-




