DEAR DOROTHY DIX—I am a widow of 50, with two sons who are about to be married. What am I to do? I don't mean for support, but for companionship? I don't fit in with the young people and, believe me, I spend some mighty lonesome times. Don't say "How about your friends?" You can't impose on them all the time. Most of my friends are married and I hate to stick around with them. What shall I do? YOURS IN HOPE.

ANSWER: There is one thing not to do, and that is not to go and live with your sons when they are married.

There are thousands of well-to-do widowed mothers, such as you are, who saddle themselves on their children when they get married just because they are terrorized by the bogey of lonesomeness. 
ANSWER: Certainly not.
